


BREAKING BREAD 'ROUND THE WORLD

The table was decorated with confetti, crepe paper streamers, and party hats. There was a cake with candles glowing. No one had to remind me that this was a birthday party. The scene said it all. Another day, the table was laden with turkey, dressing, cranberry sauce and all the other trimmings. That was a Thanksgiving dinner to be sure.

On the first Sunday of every month our altar table at church is adorned with bread and juice. Every Christian knows that would be the Table of the Lord. One of my favorite days of the year is World Communion Sunday. It is the first Sunday in October—this year October 6. On this Sunday, Christians all over the world will break bread together and lift the cup of Salvation to their lips at a table that circles the world.

There's a story about a small church in Norway called the Church of the Lamb: "Instead of having a cross on its steeple, it has the figure of a lamb. The people of that village love to tell why that lamb was placed on the top of their



church. One day, as work was being completed on the brand new church building, a young man lost his footing and slipped from the steeple. At the precise moment that he was falling toward the ground, a flock of sheep was passing by. The workman fell right on top of a little lamb. The man's life was saved as the lamb was crushed to death. Today, when the townspeople see that lamb on top of the steeple, they remember how its life was sacrificed to

save the life of that construction worker. But more importantly, they are reminded of Jesus, the Lamb of God, who willingly, not accidentally laid down His life to save all people." (*From "Holy Communion is..." by R. E. Lybrand*)


BIRTH ANNOUNCEMENTS

UM NEWS TIDBITS

All over the country, United Methodist churches and other groups pack up used eyeglasses and ship them to an address in Maryville, Tenn. The boxes - marked "fragile" and "glass" and bursting with bubble wrap - arrive almost Fairview United daily at Methodist Church. The office workers say they delight in seeing where the packages originated from. Someday, the eveglasses will be shipped to



an overseas mission. Until then, the new arrivals will join some 20,000 other pairs in a church storage room or the 10,000 pairs that Tom Beard (director for "Glasses to the Masses") keeps in his living room. The 7 year-old ministry has supplied thousands of glasses for more than 30 missions, including Methodist Mobile Medical Clinic in Paraguay and Operation Classroom in Liberia. Missions have also been served in Costa Rica, Bolivia, Brazil, Cuba, Ukraine, Guatemala, Honduras, Kenya and Venezuela. Unpacked, the eyeglasses are stored until they can be cleaned in the church dishwasher, often by a Boy Scout troop or Sunday school class. Then it's just a matter of time before volunteers test every lens in every pair of glasses for prescription strength. They use a machine called a "lensometer," which Fairview's congregation donated \$2,200 to buy in 1995. The lensometer spits out a slip of paper containing the prescription. The paper accompanies every pair of glasses on the way to the mission field. The ministry started in 1995, when Fairview Sunday school classmates Tom Tate and Jerald Johnston learned that the local Lions Club had collected a stash of used eyeglasses that had yet to be distributed. The son of an optician, Tate knew that it is illegal to distribute eyeglasses in the United States without a doctor's prescription. "But there is such a need in other countries for these eyeglasses that our country is just throwing away," Tate says in a telephone interview. Say missionaries Marion and Mary Woods (who operate clinics in churches in Costa Rica): "We believe that is another way to fulfill the words of Jesus: Take up the pieces that nothing be lost. It is one more way to help people to have the life that is more abundant in quality and spirit."

BUCK CREEK FISH FRY: 2002

It was the opening of the 2002 Buck Creek Fish Fry on Saturday,

August 24, and at exactly 4:30pm the rains came. It poured over the grounds. It flowed through the parking lots and rained on the tents, it drenched the people working and the people eating. Charlie Younker saved his meal before he got under the table.

It rained on the workers reroofing East Tipp Middle School (the fry was held on the



grounds of ET). It soaked the volunteers manning the food tables and the men scurrying to cover the hot oil tanks where the fish were frying. (Raindrops hitting the uncovered hot oil -snap-crackle-pop- turned instantly to steam.) The workers in the cake tent kept moving the cakes for auction farther down the shelves in the tent away from the rain. Cake bakers were hurrying with their finished products to the tent, but a few



raindrops managed to trickle onto some the of cake nametags, blurring them. (Ala mystery cakes!) Some folks decided they were already wet SO there was no use to seek cover. Several got new from hairdos the rain shower (as

Ruth said). Folks pulling into the parking lot reached for their umbrellas



and waited to see if the pouring would rain stop. (This could have been a chaotic scene. but it was an organized process as if it had been rehearsed by its cast.) They all knew what to do if it rained. Someone called the

local radio station to let them know that yes, the fry was still on. The rain left as suddenly as it had come, and the sun shone. Straw came from nowhere to cover the muddy ground patches. Rolls of paper towels appeared on the tables to sop up the water on the chairs. The diners began to set at the long tables with their backs to the sun instead of under the tables. Soon the sun turned to partly cloudy, but no more rain as the evening progressed. The roofers poured water from their tarps atop of the

school, and the Fish Fry continued. Hard to believe all this happened within just a few minutes.

of Because the it seemed there rain. were a few more carryouts than usual. No floating french fries in those covered styrofoam boxes! Despite the rain early on, the crowds came and the lines were everyone long, and



enjoyed the delicious catfish. The standard fashion accessories of the evening were umbrellas seen dangling from wrists and belt loops.

BCUMC members were very active participants in this community fundraiser for the Volunteer Fire Department. Three of the raffle prizes were donated by BCUMCer's: Fly Fishing Trip down the Eel River (Clark McCreedy) (Eel River is near Logansport for those who were asking); a red, white, and blue afghan made by Linda Austin; and two \$100 massages donated by Clayton Temple. BCUMCers were all over the Fish Fry... breading fish, frying fish, serving at the tables, working in the cake tent, manning the ice cream booth. Mmmmmm... the ice cream booth. Vanilla, strawberry, chocolate, butter pecan and added this year: cookie dough! Mmmmmm...

NUMBERS: More than 2054 were served (300 more than last year), and the cakes auction cleared (approximately) \$3100. The Ice Cream Booth brought in \$1800. After expenses and a donation to the Fire Department, they cleared \$817 which goes to the Retreat fund.



A MESSAGE FROM BOBBY DOWELL



On two consecutive Sundays (August 25 & Sept. 1) we were privileged to hear a special 2 point message from high schooler Bobby Dowell.

(Part 1 synopsis of a 2 point message, August 25)

"A friend told me this story of when he was young. He found an injured bird in the yard and brought it in. His mother said, "Get that out of here!" But they snuck it in anyway and nurtured it back to health. When his mom found it, she wanted it out of the house. They released the bird, but it dropped. They threw it in but it air dropped.

dropped, dropped, again and again. The put the bird in a cage, and he finally learned to fly.

They let him out of the cage, and opened the door of the house to let him out, but the bird saw the outside through the window instead and SMACK! He hit the window so hard the bird died. You stupid bird! The door was right there. Do you fly through soaring or do you keep hitting the window?

What kind of bird are you? [Bobby read Isaiah 29:13] In Genesis 1 & 2 the world was perfect. Man was with God. You know how beautiful sunsets are today? They are no comparison of how it was with Eden. Now the world revolves around sin. What is the worst news you've ever heard? Nothing compares with what I have to tell you—This news is so bad. I'm sorry, but we can't be with God. Imperfect beings can't be with perfect beings. You know the ark in Raiders of the Lost Ark? There really was

such an ark. Uzzah accidentally touched the ark and was disintegrated. The ark was carried on poles to the temple and placed behind a huge velvet screen. Once a year they would go in to see the ark, but first they would tie a ribbon around an ankle, and say, "pull me out in 5 minutes." [Bobby sat up two chairs.] Human. God. Eden was beautiful. You can't imagine how great it was. The animals didn't kill each other. Man didn't have to work for his food. One day came the first temptation. You know the story. We see now [Bobby holds up a full length mirror] once you sin, we turn away from God. God does not move. Once it goes up ("sin": the mirror) it never comes down. It's infinite width, height, depth... all you can see is a sinner—a reflection of yourself. Are you flying through the door or still hitting the mirror that's yourself? Time goes on, there are more people on earth, and more sin. Even though you are forgiven, you cannot be with Him. It is not a perfect world any more. The wage of sin is death. If there was no sin, we'd live forever. A barrier is what we have. I'll leave you with these questions: What kind of bird are you now? How do you feel about the barrier you keep hitting and what are you going to do about it?

(Part 2, September 1): I left you with a guilt trip last week, but it had to be done. I'll refresh your mind. (He picked up a tall mirror.) When you turn away from God, a barrier is made. If we turn back, all we see is our sinful self. Think back 2000 years. There was no America, only the Middle East. Then a man comes along and tells all these stories, but no one believes him. His name's Jesus Christ. He even proves who he is, with actual evidence he is who he says he is, but nobody believes. In John 3:16 it says that for God so loved the world He gave His only begotten Son... for us. For US. That's pretty awesome. A man came for one reason, for us. He died for us. How does that make you feel? What kind of bird are you now? A man died for you, so you can have life. How do you feel? The Pharisees put Jesus on the cross. They had whipped Him with a cat of 9 tales. It's 15 feet long made of leather, with bones, rocks, whatever they could find attached. It would wrap around the body and pull and pull. 40 whips could kill you. Our savior took 39 whips, and then they put him on the cross. They can't nail you through your hands because you'd fall right off so they nail through your wrists. A lot of people think you die from the bleeding and the whipping, but it's the asphyxiation. The way your arms are, and your body hangs, you can't breath and must pull yourself up to get a breath, minute after minute. Jesus did this for 9 hours before He died. Before He died he said, "It is finished." Of all the things He could have said, He said, "It is finished." A soldier stabbed him in the side to make sure He was dead. Last week we talked about the Ark and how it was kept behind a velvet curtain. When Jesus died, that curtain was ripped in half. Jesus was put in the tomb. Mary came and He was gone. He arose from the dead! Still some do not believe. You still have to think why did He do that? He loves every one of you. The wage of sin is death. No sin, no death, and we would live forever. If the barrier is broken [Bobby smashed the mirror with a wooden cross!] what kind of bird are you now? Do you feel you can be with God eternally? What are you going to do with your life right now? You need to know the ABC's. A = Admit you are a sinner; B = Believe in God, that he is real and does exist; and C = commit your life to Christ. The hardest thing is to stick with it. My purpose these last two Sundays was to open your minds to God."

We're just a little church in a little town far from New York City, Washington D.C. and Pennsylvania, but on the evening of September 11, 2002 we were connected to all those places in spirit. As the bell rang out from BCUMC: 9 times and silence. 11 times and silence, then 1 time, symbolizing 9-11-2001, 58 people gathered inside to remember the day

We didn't have to be told to sing The Star Spangled Banner; as soon as the piano started so did we. The Pledge of Allegiance was followed by God Bless America. Pastor Bonnie lit a tall red candle in memory of the victims, using the flame from the Christ candle "whose flame does not diminish". We read together the prayer "For Our Country" from our hymnals.

"Silent Night 9-11 (The God Song)" (telling how God was with

each and every victim on 9-11) was read aloud. It ends with these words: "September 11, 2001 was not the end of the journey for you. But someday your journey will end. And I will be there for you as well. Seek me now while I may be found. Then, at any moment, you know you are 'ready to go'. I will be in the stairwell of your final moments."

Pastor Bonnie read from Deut. 10:12-13, 17-19 then shared a true story she heard on the radio of a 15 year old Muslim boy who lived in Ohio. Kids made fun of him, called him diaper head because of his turban, and snubbed him, except for one classmate who accepted him for who he was. This classmate asked him to go to a revival. There for the first time he heard the doctrine of the Christian faith. Jesus is known to the Muslims as a great prophet, but not the son of God. Before the service ended, this man received Jesus as his Lord. The church took him just as he was. Now he is a pastor, and so is his brother. He also baptized his mother, but his father died before accepting Jesus. Pastor Bonnie asked us to "accept and hear God speaking to you."

After we sang "My Country Tis of Thee", time was given for sharing thoughts and feelings: Seeing today a man in Afghanistan playing taps was amazing; 3000+ white rose petals (one for each victim) sprinkled down from St. Paul's Cathedral in London was beautiful; seeing a crowd of office workers all dressed in red/white/blue meant so much; the reverence and respect people had all over the world; sadness; knowing now the firefighters' passion for their job and appreciating them more; a premonition of something bad going to happen a year ago and not knowing who to tell; worrying about a precious new baby after hearing the news last year and wondering what will happen next...

Fireman's wife Michele Mitchell read with great emotion and tears "A Fireman's Prayer". She shared that 9-11 opened her eyes to just how short a fireman's life can be. They leave and may not return, but she has never met a fireman who didn't love his job. She understands what those firefighter's spouses felt in NYC. Another fireman's wife, Angie Austin, said that it can be just as hard for a volunteer firefighter's wife, as they go out into the night and all



vou can hear is the crackle of the radio, and you just don't know if they'll come home. Angie also shared that she was moved to tears today when she boots saw and gear on the ground by fire truck with its lights

going: a signal that there is a fallen fireman. Please remember the 343 firefighters fallen in New York City a year ago, and all the other people killed that day in the three locations. Pray for their families and friends for peace and healing. Firefighter Steve Mitchell told us that the years worth of experience of those firefighters combined equaled 4000 years.

After Pastor Bonnie read John 8:31-36, we raised our voices for "Lift Every Voice & Sing". Then she had us come forward to light our candles from the remembrance candle, and asked us to "take this light with you out into the

world." As we all stood with candles lit, we sang "Let There Be Peace on Earth". To strive for peace on earth, we must invite those who do not know the Lord to come in and see what Jesus has done for us (and see what He can do for them). We had four local firemen with us this evening: Steve Mitchell, Ron Austin Jr., Mike Taylor and John Irr.

RECIPE CORNER

ELLA MAE'S BAKED APPLES (in her own words)

"Timely advice is as lovely as golden apples in a silver basket. -Proverbs 25:11

We usually peel apples, although some people don't. Then core—cut in halves or quarter. Place in ungreased baking dish—(you could use PAM if you wanted to).

Stir up mixture of sugar and flour—I just guess at proportions.



Sprinkle over apples. Add water to make baking dish not over half full. Red coloring may be added to water if you want a rosy red dish. Or, put red hots on apples if you like.

Dot with several small bits of oleo or butter. Sprinkle with cinnamon.

Bake in 350 degree oven about 30-45 minutes. After good and hot baste apples with cooked juice so none will be dry.

Again, you must judge doneness by sticking fork into apples. I usually let the apples get rather soft---but not mushy.

This is my Mom's recipe (Ella Mae LaMaster). She always made these in a special flowered round baking dish (see picture above). In her later years she enjoyed going to Doud's Orchard in Denver, Indiana for her apples. -Nancy S.
