We have asked the University of Northern Colorado's Research Lab to assist us with a parent survey. The survey will be sent to you via email the second week of April. The survey is anonymous and the Research Lab will compile the results. Your feedback is important to us, so taking your time to complete the survey is sincerely appreciated.

Our budget committee will begin meeting in April to prepare a proposal which will be presented to the Board of Governors. Our budget is based on funding from the State of Colorado. Preliminary reports have stated we may receive a 2.6% increase in funding.

April marks the beginning of a busy schedule of special events and activities. Our Spring sport season is underway with baseball, track and girls' tennis. standard will have an opportunity to make up the presentation at the end of April. Any student who does not pass a board presentation at that time will have one more opportunity to present to University Schools' administrators (who will

have the final say as to whether the project presentation meets requirements) in mid-May.

Statewide testing will take place between April 15 and 21. 9th graders will take mathematics tests on April 15. On the 19th, juniors will take the ACT, sophomores will take the PSAT and freshmen will take the English language arts test. Seniors, who will have completed their project presentations the previous day, will stay home on April 19. Juniors will finish up testing on science tests Thursday and

Friday of that week.

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From the Middle School Principal, **Paul Kirkpatrick**

I want to clarify a topic that has been brought to my attention several times in the last few weeks. The 2015-2016 Middle School Handbook (pg. 9) outlines the expectations for promotion to the next grade. This applies to 6th graders moving to 7th grade, 7th graders moving to 8th grade and 8th graders moving to High School. All students are required to pass all five core classes (Language Arts, Math, Science, Social Studies and STEM) to be promoted. Calculations for passing involve examining work from all three trimester grading periods.

Evidence is very clear regarding the success rate of a student being retained and the chances of him/her showing significant improvement repeating the same grade (only 6 percent success rate). It

stands to reason that having the same teacher, covering the identical content, working on the same assignments and taking the same tests, would yield approximately the same results. That being

the case, it makes no sense to have a student repeat the same grade level. It is also our contention that we would be doing a huge disservice to a student by promoting her/him to the next grade without evidence of appropriate preparation.

What options or conditions remain?

- Ι. Complete the rest of the year with a flurry of good grades so that all five core classes are passed. 2.
- If you Google "credit recovery for middle school," you will find numerous on-line options. Some THE BEAUTIFUL THING are free and some are hundreds per class.

3. Register at your neighborhood/boundary school or another school of choice, to enter at the grade level you want to enroll your child.

From the Elementary Principal, Mike Mazurana

As we head into April, I think it is important to remember where we started and why we have all cho-sen to be a part of the Bulldog family. Our Mission statement of: University Schools will prepare students emotionally and educationally for learning, leading, and caring citizenship in their academic, social, and civic communi-ties certainly rings true with two months to go.

Students have now presented two PLPs that were extensions of learning here at school or totally unique interests derived from years of wonder or interest outside of our building's walls.

They continue in their growth and understanding within the social and emotional arenas of life through weekly counseling meet-ings (many of which are one-onone) which are a very scarce commodity these days around the state. We think this is another reason our kids and parents choose us as they value a safe and caring environment where students can practice lifelong skills of acceptance, empathy and kindness with trained profession-als like Ms. Laura and Ms. Shayna as facilitators.

- Students are challenged physical-
- ly daily, as well as mentally
- through our physical education
- program that boasts 3 elementary PE teachers and accommodates
- close to 700 students every day!
- The research shows that cutting
- programs like PE, music or the arts in favor for more academic
- time may help in the short term
- but will have lasting negative effects in the long run. From creat-
- ing their own dances to team-
- building activities and learning

- the basics of throwing, jumping, running and cooperative play, our PE department prepares students as leaders, learners and caring
- citizens every day.

As far as the arts are concerned, I believe these two quotes sum it up best as to why we believe in our specials rotations every week for every child: "Those who have studied learning process-

- es throughout the ages, be-ginning with Plato, have em-
- phasized the importance of
- the arts in the education pro-
- cess. Arts education refers to

education in the disciplines of music, dance, theatre, and visual arts...The arts are what make us most human, most complete as people. The arts cannot be learned through occasional or random exposure any more than math or science can. Education and engagement in the fine arts are an essential part of the school curriculum and an important component in the educational program of every student" (Bryant, 2015)."

"The arts develop neural systems that produce a broad spectrum of benefits ranging from fine motor skills to creativity and improved emotional balance... In a study conducted by Judith Burton, Columbia University, research evi-denced that subjects such as mathematics, science, and language require complex cognitive and creative capacities "typical of arts learning" (Burton, Horowitz, & Abeles, 1999). "The arts en-hance the process of learning. The systems they nourish, which include our integrated sensory, attentional, cogni-tive, emotional, and motor capacities, are, in fact, the driving forces behind all other learning" (Jensen, 2001)."

Finally, our mission is realized through the acquisition and development of different languages, of which the elementary is lucky to be introduced to two, Spanish and Sign Language, and the study of all things technology. Through the learning of two other languages, our students are ex-posed to different cultures, learning styles, and challenges in their education that are quite different from almost any other in the state. With the added classes this year around Tech literacy, we believe students will be best prepared for the demands of an ever increasing technological world and how to navigate it confidently with safety, empathy and kindness in mind.

Clearly, it is the culmination of all these educational experiences here at University Schools that makes us realize what great learners, leaders and caring citizens we are producing. While this may show up in a state test score it is not something that is easily measured, but it is something we know will be the driving force for our student's success in an ever-changing world.

PARCC testing will begin on April 5 and will continue for most 3rd-5th graders until April 15. All students in 3rd-5th will be taking the Math tests in pa-per pencil, English Language Arts on the computer (except 3rd which will be paper pencil as well). Fifth graders will then finish up elementary testing April 19-25 with state science testing. Please, be mindful of doctor's appointments and scheduling vacations or days off during this stretch in April.

Spring has sprung and with it comes behaviors that are less desirable. Thank you for having conversations with students at home about expectations at school. Also, thank you for keeping to routines and structures that have helped in the learning process for the past 7 months.

Thank you for your attendance at your student's parent/ teacher's conference. Our goal is always to meet with 100% of our parents for celebrations and goals for the coming tri-mester. With 75% of the year complete, it is easy to think we are about done but, with 25% of the year's new learning left, it is imperative we have a strong finish to be best pre-pared for next year.

Thanks again for choosing to be part of our school and its mission and for working so hard with your students not only this month and next, but every month. It is a partnership; we know we can't do without your hard work and support.

Immunization Update for All Students

- There have been significant changes to the State of Colorado's immunization requirements for school attendance. Colorado has moved to align its standards with those recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) from the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta. These changes are based on the most current research on vaccine preventable disease.
- **Students entering 6th Grade are required to have a booster for Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis (Tdap).** Pertussis, or whooping cough, is prevalent in the state and in our community. It can be extremely dangerous for young babies. It can also mean extended
- absences from school or work. The protection from this vaccine wanes over time which is why a booster is needed.
- All students will now be required to have two valid doses of Varicella (chicken pox) vaccine. A valid
- dose is one given not more than 4 days before the first birthday. Chicken pox vaccine is a "live" vaccine and can-
- not be given any earlier than 28 days following vaccination with another live vaccine such as Measles/Mumps/Rubella (MMR).
- Students who may have previously been in compliance with regard to the Hepatitis B vaccination series may now need additional vaccination. This is due to changes in the recommendation for the spacing of doses and age of the child when receiving the final immunization in the series.
- If these rule changes will affect your child, you will receive a letter from me in the mail. Please discuss this with your physician
 at your next checkup or contact The Weld County Health Department 970-304-6420.
- Parents who request **Personal or Religious Exemption Status for their children will need to sign that document each school** year. We will provide these forms, upon request, at registration.
- Updated immunization information is welcomed at any time. Please be prepared with evidence of any immunizations required at registration. If your doctor visit is scheduled after that time, please inform me at registration.
 - University Schools always has high compliance rates for requirements for vaccine preventable diseases. I would like to thank all parents for your efforts.
