



Having an idea of what you want to do is great but how do you make it happen? Whether you want to continue with your studies at university or would prefer on-the-job training, there's a pathway to purchasing for you.

A QUESTION OF QUALIFICATIONS

Many people looking to enter the field of procurement want to know if they need specific qualifications. The short answer is no. But the reality is that, increasingly, employers are looking for candidates with CIPS qualifications.

University degree

If you are staying on at college then you could consider a general business studies course. In the UK the BTEC Business Studies has procurement and supply modules. This might be a way for you to keep your options open and still explore what procurement is all about.

If you go straight into a junior buying role your company may expect you to study for CIPS qualifications. These are recognised globally as driving leading edge thinking and professionalism in procurement. MCIPS is recognised worldwide as the standard for top quality procurement professionals and will give you a head start over your colleagues. Apprenticeships

If you prefer to go straight into work rather than studying, then you can still enjoy a career in purchasing. Apprenticeships and on-the-job training are a great way to balance your career with your studies, and many employers look out for candidates who are keen to progress.

DOMINIC'S JOURNEY

Dominic always had a strong interest in business and decided to study for a BA (Hons) in Business Studies at Liverpool John Moores University (LJMU).

"The LJMU course stood out by some distance as it focused on employability and practical skills rather than purely business theory. The placement year and CIPS accreditation offered in the placement routes are great incentives and will hopefully increase my chances of getting a job once I graduate."

"The course is a good mix of theory and real world examples and research. For example, in my procurement module we have covered the fundamentals of buying, but also researching the history and evolution of the profession. I think it's giving me a better all-round understanding of the topic", says Dominic, who is keen to take up a role in procurement when he graduates.



DIONNE'S JOURNEY

Dionne has worked in procurement for nearly eight years, after deciding her job as personal assistant wasn't for her. She started as a procurement administrator, and soon afterwards started the CIPS Graduate Diploma to become a professionally qualified buyer – supported by her employer.

"Thinking back, most people at school were talking about roles in law, risk or customer-facing roles", says Dionne. "What's interesting is that is exactly what my procurement role is, and more. No two days are the same – it's not a normal office job where you sit at your desk all day. I have the opportunity to work with teams across the whole business and test my knowledge and awareness of the financial, legal and the business environment every time I'm putting a new supplier contract together. I enjoy the face-to-face contact and customer interactions I get from working in procurement – it's great.

"I still get a buzz from face-to-face negotiations with suppliers – that's one of the exciting parts for me."

ROSIE'S JOURNEY

Rosie applied for university courses after her A levels, but wasn't really convinced it was the right path for her.

"I wanted to keep my options open so I starting to apply for jobs and apprenticeships too. I saw the Business and Administration Apprenticeship advertised on the EDF website and it looked really interesting so I decided to go for it!" she says.

Rosie was successful and turned down her University places to take on the two-year scheme with the supply chain team at EDF. When the apprenticeship came to an end Rosie was offered a job working on supplier development and EDF are sponsoring her to complete an HND in Business Management with a view to completing the CIPS qualifications afterwards.

"I would definitely recommend a job in procurement to anyone. You get to work on projects and see all the materials you were responsible for buying all come together, it's a real sense of achievement. My rotations on the apprenticeship scheme have really helped me understand the different perspectives on projects and realise how working collaboratively with suppliers can help to get great results."
