

Sewer Ordinance Is Introduced

NEPTUNE TWP. - The Townshp Commttee met Monday in the Municipal Complex and were presented an unsigned letter and petition from the Neptune Tavern Owners, requesting the rescinding of a June 5 ordinance that set a 2 A.M. closing of bars.

Claiming a loss of 22 barrelated jobs, owners felt the ordlinance was passed with the belief the 2 A.M. closing would be state-wide and clalmed the issue has not received action in Trenton.

Mayor Lawrence M. Lawson said bills have been introduc. ed in both state houses and not enough time has passed for adoption of uniform rulings.

The committee adopted an ordinance setting the Ocean Grove sewerage district fee collection schedule. Also, members itroduced an ordinance setting up user rules and regulations for the new sewer district. The body was formed after a superior Court orered the township to assume control from the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association. This now makes Ocean Grove compatible with other township districts.

Bids were accepted for roof repairs to the public works gaage, which has had leaks for the past few years.



Here is an item from GINNY YOUNG, Slocum Ave. about her recent European Trip. She calls it "8 Countries in 20 Days", also her "Trip of a Lifetime".

* * * * GINNY YOUNG'S EUROPEAN TRIP

Lift off was from Kennedy Airport for a 7:30 P.M. flight on British Airways to London. Arrival at Heathrow Airport was very good. They were then met by Golden Age Festival Representatives, who were all dressed in bright Kelly Green jackets emblazoned with the gold letters. First stop was at the Forum Hotel which was very imposing. "A surprise awaited me at the desk," that a David Wade had called. He lives 40 miles out of London, in a town called Ashington. Ginny had met him when he was 18 years old and stationed at the 'HMS Asbury' when the Berkeley-Carteret Hotel was used by British sailors back in 1942. They have kept in contact with them over the years. It was unfortunate that they could not meet, but at least had a nice chat over the phone. London is a lovely place, and is a fascinating city.

The next day we left London early and began touring Kent, known as the "Garden of England", then on to the White Cliffs of Dover; which brings back memories of the song in WWH. The Hovercraft trip was intriguing across the English Channel to Calais, where the DeLuxe Motor Coach would take us on our tour. Just a bit about the Hovercraft, it was like a Ferry boat with rubber pontoons, which hovered over the water. Made the trip in 45 minutes, by boat it would have been 31/2 hours.

After arriving at the Hotel Bedford, Brussels, we had a very enjoyable tour of this old city and to see the famous square "The Grand Place" the most beautiful square in Europe. Our next day took us shopping in Cologne, and saw miles and miles of vineyards, also many quaint old country homes. When we arrived at the Hoel Zur Krip in Bad Salzig, Germany, the bus had to be backed up the road, since the streets are so narrow.

Ah, this is the day we cruise on the River Rhine. From all reports this is the most scenic route in this area. Of course more vineyards, quaint villages, the castles and the Leg. endary Lorelei Rock. A side trip to see a museum of antique musical objects in Rudeshein, and luncheon at Baden-Baden Restaurant. Another nice shop was in the Black Forest at Triberg. This is where the famous clocks come from. Nightfall found us in a very ritzy condominium, which I understand some wealthy doctors rent out during the skiing season. I don't think I will forget Liechtenstein, at lunch time. To think I travel. led all those miles to get stung by a bee!!! Our, tour today was along the shores of Lake Konstance and into Austria, over the Arberg Pass in the Alps and finally arrived at Innsbruck, home of the Winter Olympics, capital of Tyrol and Hotel Grauer Baer. We visited a

nearby Night Club where we learned to Yodel, also saw a Tyrolean Show. The next day some more shopping, then to lunch at a little restaurant in the mountains on the way to, Salzburg. More shopping and then to the Hotel Pitter.

As a new day dawned we took a tour entitled "Sound of Music" with our Tour Guide on an Optional Tour. We wanted to see everything that we could possibly squeeze in, with the time we had.

Highlights here were the Resurrection Cathedral in the Palace at Hallain, its gardens, and fountains. Now we are ready to tour Vienna. What a lovely place, here you see the Lake Region of Austria, the Blue Danube and Lake Traun, deepest lake in this area. Ah, Strauss's Waltz, at the Kursalon Palace, where professional dancers waltzed away. The big treat was the Giant Ferris Wheel that gave us a wonderful view of this beautiful city. Of course we had to taste the local wines at the Winery in Grinzing.

Another area to be visited on a bright new day is the Capital of the Waltz, and enjoyed such views of Belvedere Palace, St. Charles Cathedral, plus many famous statues along the route. Next a tour of the famous Vienna Woods which inspired so many composers. In this drive, you see so much of Vienna and the lower Karpathian Mountains, behind the Iron Curtain, since Vienna is the easternmost western city of Europe.

Now we are headed for Venice, with spectacular Semmering Pass, on our way to the Province of Styria and the Italian border. Well in everyone's life a little rain must fall, and fall it did, a downpour. We have arrived in Italy. Since the bus was left far from the Hotel, a quick run through the deluge to a boat that would take us to our Hotel Bonvecchiati, just off St. Mark's Square. Now for a tour of the city. St. Mark's Square is a busy area, St. Mark's Cathedral, Bridge of Sighs, leading from Dodge's 'Place, seeing Ventian glass being made, and finally a ride in a Gondola. This was a busy day and to top it off in the evening, a visit to a Ventian Tavern was in order; "Ai Musicanti". That is listening to the local music and singers.

Well, today we are on our scenic way to Switzerland. We passed Verona the town of Romeo & Juliet, also Lombarfertile land with many fruit trees. Soon after Milan, we arrived in lovely mountaineous area with Lake Como, the deepest lake in Europe, had lunch then reached the border. After arriving in Switzerland, we went through the longest tunnel in the world. 16.3 kilometers which is through the mountain St. Gottard Massif. Some ride!! At Lake Lucerne, the land of legendary hero, William Tell, we stayed at Hotel Kolping and after dinner were treated to Swiss Folklore at the Undlinkeller, which included dancing, yodeling, flag throwing and blowing of the Alpine Horn.

terhorn." This was followed by a boat ride around Lake Lucerne, still enjoying the beautiful scenery. A stroll across Chapel Bridge, to the old city for some shopping. Later on we enjoyed a Fashion Show of Swiss finery.

Now we are headed for Paris, and our Hotel Brebant. In the evening we took a night tour to see the famous Champs Elysees, the Louvre, and of course the Eiffel Tower. Well, another boat trip to see more of Gay Paree, then on to Notre Dame Cathedral, the Palace of Verseilles. And an evening trip to the famed Moulin Rouge, with spectacular floor show and of course the "Can-Can." Oooh, la, la. It's about time to say "Au Revoir" to Paris and head for England. Another trip on the Hovercraft across the Channel to arrive at the Hotel Royal Scot.

A dear friend, Rita Slark made plans for our last day in London, by having us over to her house in Richmond, England. Before that, we went on a tour of London, naturally we saw all the highlights, St. Paul's Cathedral, where Lady Diane and Prince Charles were married; Buckingham Palace; Clarence House, (Queen Mother's Home.) Then after lunch, a trip to Windsor Castle and a stroll through the village waiting for the bus.

Following a delightful full day at the Stark's, reminiscing about our families, it was time to leave for the hotel. Fond farewells and we were on our way back to London. Just about now the trip is coming to an end, as we head for Heathrow Airport and the trip home. After we landed and got settled in the car for the drive home, we discussed the trip.

EDITOR, TIMES:

At the outset, we should be aware that the Kremlin is not only fearful of its own people and the rest of the world, but it is also envious of the Unied States with its high technolog expertise and its high standard of living.

A nation, like a person who is envious, needs to be cajoled and soothed, NOT HARSHLY CRITICIZED.

At the samt time unilateral disarmament on our part should be discouraged, when we can barter with the Kremlin and mutually reduce armaments. For example, rather MX than just terminate he missile production contract (to reduce the deficit), we should tell the Kremlin we'll stop producion of the MX missile. If you'll stop production of your misssiles.

Nuclear arms reduction always should be done on a mutually give and take basis, not unilaterally. We've tried unilatunder disarmament, eral Pres. Carter. It did not produce the desired resuls. The only thing the Kremlin respects is military strength. We should maintain our strength, at the same time be willing to negotiate. Similarly, we should not stop production of the B. 18 bomber without obtaining equivalent concessions on the part of the Russians.

A generation of Neptune students remembers BEN DILL-ENBECK. He came to Neptune High School as boys' physical education director and devoted both regular hours and many extra hours to encouraging good training habits.

TRACK AND FIELD seemed to be his favorites. Maybe that's why he had extra complimentary tickets to the Princeton Relays in the spring of 1933.

Ben Dillenbeck offered the ducats to two high school students who had spent afterschool hours helping him with

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pair of teen-agers The promptly accepted, without a thought of how they would get to Princeton.

They were doubly lucky, for they had no trouble hitch-hiking to Princeton and on that day 51 years ago they saw track history in the making.

A principal event was the Princeton Mile. The crowd clearly favored Princeton's steady miler, Bill Bonthron.

BONTHRON had a strong, steady stride and was either one or two for most of the four laps around the quartermile Princeton track.

The competitors hoped to break a three-year-old mile record held by Jule's Ladoumegue of France, who had set

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a new world record of four minutes, ten and four-tenths seconds in 1930.

Pressing Bonthron was a New Zealand runner by the name of JACK LOVELOCK. He never gave up.

As they came to the tape, Lovelock had the extra thrust and he was clocked at a new world record of 4:07.6, steps ahead of Bonthron.

The meet announcer informed the throng that they had seen the world record beaten twice in one race. Timers placed Bonthron about one second behind Lovelock and about one second better than the Ladoumegue record of 1930.

Records are made to be broken. One year later, Glenn Cunningham ran the mile in 4:06.8.

Twenty years later (1954) Roger Bannister became the first to break the four-minute record with a mile run in 3:59.4.







AN ORDINANCE REGULATING WITHIN THE GEOGRAPHIC BOUNDARY OF THE OCEAN GROVE SEWERAGE DISTRICT, THE USE OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SEWERS AND DRAINS, INSTALLATION AND CONNECTION OF BUILDING SEWERS AND THE DISCHARGE OF WATERS AND WASTES INTO THE PUBLIC SEWER SYSTEM AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF IN THE TOWNSHIP OF NEPTUNE, COUNTY OF MONMOUTH AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY.

WHEREAS, the Ocean Grove Sewerage District as successor to the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association of the United Methodist Church, is a member of the Neptune Township Regional Sewerage Authority and as a member thereof, is subject to the rules and regulations of said Sewerage Authority; and

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The rules and regulations established by the Neptune Township Regional Sewerage Authority for use of its facilities and the regional sewerage for treatment is hereby adopted, en-acted and established for the Ocean Grove Sewerage District, a public entity created by the Township of Neptune together with all amendments and supplements are attached hereto and made a part hereof as though set forth herein at length. Three copies of said rules and regula-tions entitled "Township of Neptune Sewerage Authority, Monmouth County, New Jersey, Sewer Use, Rules and Regulations" together with said amendments and supplements similarly entitled have been placed on file in the Office of the Clerk of this municipality upon the introduction of this ordinance and will remain on file in such office for the use and examination of the public.

ARTICLE III Use of Public Sewers Required

Section 1. The owner(s) and/or leaseholder(s) from the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association of all houses, buildings or properties used for human occupancy, employment, tecreation or other purposes, situ-ated within the Ocean Grove Sewerage District and abutting on any street, alley or right-of-way in which there is now located or may in the future be located a public sanitary sewer is hereby required at the owner(s) or leaseholder(s) expense to install suitable toilet facilities therein and to connect such facilities directly with the proper public sewer in accordance with the provisions of this ordinproper public sever in accordance with the provisions of this ordin-ance, within ninety (90) days after the date of official notice to do so, provided that said public sever is within one hundred (100) feet of the ordenty line of the property line.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful to discharge to any natural outlet within the boundary of Ocean Grove or in any area under the jurisdictio of the Neptune Township Regional Sewerage Authority, any wastewater or other polluted waters, except where suitable treatment has been provided in accordance with subsequent provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. Except as hereinafter provided, it shall be unlawful to construct or maintain any privy, privy vault, septic tank, cesspool, or other facility intended or used for the disposal of wastewater.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to place, deposit or permit to be deposited in any unsanitary manner on public or private property within the boundary of Ocean Grove or in any area under the jurisdiction of the Neptune Township Sewerage Authority, anyn or animal excrement, garbage or objectionable waste.

Section 5. All connections directly or indirectly to the Ocean Grove sanitary sever lines, for sump pumps, roof liters, area way drains, swimming pools, ornamental ponds, water cooled refrigeration and air conditioning units, fire sprinkler systems and any other similar connections, are prohibited.

Section 6. All existing connections, directly or indirectly to the Ocean Grove sanitary sewer lines as heretofore stated in Sectio 5 above, shall be disconnected and physically cut off no later than May 1, 1985. ction

Section 7. An application on an approved form and plans to dis-connect and to physically cut off the connection as heretofore stated above to the Ocean Grove sewer lines shall be filed with the Health Office of the Township of Neptune. The application and plans shall be reviewed by the Plumbing Inspector and after approval thereof, a permit shall be issued. A fee of \$10.00 shall be charged by the Health Office for each permit issued. All work shall be performed in accordance with applicable state codes and municipal rules, regu-lations and ordinances. lations and ordinances.

ARTICLE IV Private Wastewater Disposal

Section 1. Where a public sanitary sewer is not available under the provisions of Article III, Section 1 above, the building sewer shall be connected to a private wastewater disposal system complying with the provisions of this article.

Section 2. Before commencement of construction of a private Section 2. Before commencement of construction of a private wastewater disposal system, the owner shall first obtain a written permit from the Health Office of the Township of Neptune. The application for such permit shall be made on a form furnished by the Township of Neptune upon which form, the applicant shall supply any plans, specifications or other information as are deemed necessary by the Township Engineer. A permit and inspection fee of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars shall be paid to the Township of Neptune at the time the application is filed.


Section 3. A permit for private wastewater disposal system shall not become effective until the installation is completed to the satisfaction of the Health Office. The Health Office or its authorized agent, shall be allowed to inspect the work at any stage of construction and, in any event, the applicant for the permit shall notify the Health Office when the work is ready for final in-spection, and before any underground portions are covered. The inspection shall be made within twenty-four (24) hours of the receipt of the notice by the Health Office.

Section 4. The type, capacities, location and layout of a private wastewater disposal system shall comply with all recommen-dations of the Department of Public Healthof the State of New Jersey and/or all other rules and regulations of any Pederal, State or local agency applicable at the time. No permit shall be issued for any private wastewater disposal system employing sub-surface soil absorp-tion facilities where the area of the lot is less than 2500 square feet. No spetic tank or cesspool shall be permitted to discharge to any natural outlet.

Section 5. At such time as a public sever becomes available to a property served by a private wastewater disposal system, as pro-vided in Article IV Section 1 above, a direct connection shall be made to the public sever within sixty (60) days in compliance with this ordinance, and any septic tanks, cesspools, and similar private wastewater disposal facilities shall be cleaned of sludge and filled with entryies a property of the sector. with suitable material.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Neptune, as follows:

ARTICLE I Definitions

Section 1. "Building drain" shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from soil, waste and other drainage pipes inside the walls of the building and conveys it to the building sewer, beginning five (5) feet (1.5 meters) outside the inner face of . beginning five (5) the building wall.

Section 2. "Building sewer" shall mean the extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal, also called house connection.

Section 3. "Garbage" shall mean the animal and vegetable waste result from the handling, preparation, cooking and serving of foods.

Section 4, "Industrial wastes" shall mean the wastewater from industrial processes, trade, or business as distinct from coméstic or sanitary wastes.

Section 5. "Natural outlet" shall mean any outlet, including storm sewers and combined sewer overflows, into a watercourse, pond, ditch, lake or other body of surface or groundwater.

Section 6. "Person" shall mean any individual, firm, company, association, society, corporation or group,

Section 7. "Sanitary sewer" shall mean a sewer that carries liquid and water carried wastes from residences, commercial buildings, in-dustrial plants, and institutions together with minor quantities of ground, storm and surface waters that are not admitted intentionally.

Section 6. The owner shall operate and maintain the private stewater disposal facilities in a sanitary manner at all times at no expense to the Township.

Section 7. No statement contained in this Article shall be construed to interfere with any additional requirements that may be imposed by the Health Office.

ARTICLE Building Sewers and Connections

Section 1. No unmithorized person(s) shall uncover, make any connections with or opening into, use, alter or disturb any public sewer or appurtenance thereof without first obtaining a written permit from the Nealth Office.

Section 2. There shall be two (2) classes of building sewer permits: (a) for residential and commercial service, and (b) for service to establishments producing industrial wastes. In either case, the owner(s) or leaseholder(s) or his agent shall make application which shall be supplemented by any plans, specifications or other information considered pertinent in the judgment of the Health Office. A permit and inspection fee of ten (\$10.00) Dollars for residential or commercial building sewer permit and twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for an industrial building sewer permit shall be paid to the Township at the time the application is filed.

Section 3. All costs and expenses incidental to the installation and connection of the building sever shall be borne by the owner(s) or leaseholder(s). The owner(s) or leaseholder(s) shall indemnify the Township from any loss or damage that may directly or indirectly be occasioned by the installation of the building sever.

Section 4. A separate and independent building sewer shall be provided for every building except where one building stands at the rear of another on an interior lot and no private sewer is available or can be constructed to the rear building through an adjoining alley, court, yard, or driveway, the front building may be extended to the rear building and the whole considered as one building sewer, but the Sewerage District or the Township of Neptune does not and will not assume any obligation or responsibility for damage caused by or resulting from any such single connection aforementioned.

Section 5. Old building sewers may be used in connection with new buildings only when they are found, on examination and tests, by the Health Office, to meet all requirements of this ordinance.

Section 6. The size, slope, alignment, materials of construction of a building sewer, and the methods to be used in excavating, placing of the pipe, jointing, testing and backfilling the trench, shall all conform to the requirements of the building and plumbing code or other applicable rules and regulations of the Township. In the absence of code provisions or in amplification thereof, the materials and procedures set forth in appropriate specifications of the American Society for Testing and Material and the Water Pollution Control Federation Manual of Practice No. 9 shall

Section 7. Whenever possible, the building sewer shall be brought to an elevation below the basement floor. In all build-ings in which any building drain is too low to permit gravity flow to the public sewer, sanitary sewage carried by such' building drain shall be lifted up by an approved means and discharged to the building sewer.

Section 8. No person(s) shall make connection of roof down-spouts, foundation drains, areaway drains or other sources of surface runoff or groundwater to a building sewer or building drain which in turn is connected directly or indirectly to a public sanitary sewer unless such connection is approved by the Health Office for purposes of disposal of polluted surface drainage. drainage.

Section 9. The connection of the building sewer into public sewer shall conform to requirements of the building and plumbing code or other applicable rules and regulations of the Township, or the procedures set forth in appropriate specifications of the American Society for Testing and Materials and the Water Pollution Control Federation Manual of Practice No. 9. All such connections shall be made gastight and watertight and verified by proper testing. Any deviation from the prescribed procedures and materials must be approved by the Health Office before installation.

Section 10. The applicant for the building sewer permit shall notify the Health Office when the building sewer is ready for inspection and connection to the public sewer. The connection and testing shall be made under the supervision of the Health Office or its representative. Office or its representative.

Section 11. All excavations for building sewer installation shall be adequately guarded with barricades and lights so as to protect the public from hazard. Streets, sidewalks, parkways and other public property disturbed in the course of the work shall be restored in a manner satisfactory to the Township

ARTICLE VI Use of The Public Sewers

Section 1. No person(s) shall discharge or cause to be discharged any unpolluted waters such as stormwater, groundwater roof runoff, subsurface drainage, or cooling water to any sewer except stormwater runoff from limited areas which stormwater may be polluted at times and may be discharged to the sanitary sewer by permission of the Neptune Township Sewerage Authority.

Section 2. Stormwater other than that exempted under Section 1, Article VI, and all other unpolluted drainage, shall be discharged to such sewers as are specifically designated as storm sewers or to a natural outlet approved by the Health Office and any other regulatory agencies. Unpolluted industrial cooling water or process waters may be discharged on approval of the Health Office, to a storm sewer or natural outlet.

Section 3. No person(s) shall discharge or cause to be discharged any of the following described waters or wastes to any public sewers.

(a) Any gasoline, benzene, naptha, fuel oil or other flammable or explosive liquid, solid or gas.

(b) Any waters containing toxic or poisonous solids, liquids or gases in sufficient quantity, either singly or by inter-action with other wastes, to injure or interfere with any waste treatment process, constitute a hazard to humans or animals, create a public nuisance, or create any hazard in the receiving waters of the wastewater treatment plant.

(c) Any waters or wastes having PH lower than (5.5) or having any other corrosive property capable of causing damage or hazard to structures, equipment and personnel of the wastewater works.

(d) Solid or viscous substances in quantities or of such size capable of causing obstruction to the flow in sewers, or other interference with the proper operation of the wastewater facilities such as, but not limited to, ashes, bones, cinders, sand, mud, straw, shavings, metal, glass, rags, feathers, tar, plastics, wood, unground garbage, whole blood, paunch manure, hair and fleshings, entrails and paper dishes, cups, milk containers, etc, either whole or ground by garbage grinders

Section 4. The following described substances, materials, waters, or waste shall be limited in discharge to the Ocean Grove Sewerage system to concentrations or quantities which will not harm either the sewers, wastewater treatment process or equipment, will not have an adverse effect on the receiving stream, or will not other-wise endanger lives, limb, public property or constitute a nuisance. The Neptune Township Sewerage Authority may set limitations lower then the limitations established in the regulations below if in its opinion such more severe limitations are necessary to meet the above objectives. In forming its opinion as to the acceptability, the lealth Office will give consideration to such factors as the quantity of subject waste in relation to flows and velocities in the sewers. of subject water in relation to flows and velocities in the guantity materials of construction of the sewers, the wastewater treatment process employed, capacity of the wastewater treatment plant, degree of treatability of the waste in the wastewater treatment plant, and other pertinent factors. The limitations or restrictions on materials or characteristics of waste or wastewaters discharged to the sanitary sewer which shall not be violated without approval of the Sewer Authority are as follows:

(a) Wastewater having a temperature higher than 150° Fahrenheit (65° Celsius).

(b) Wastewater containing more than 25 milligrams per liter of petroleum oil, nonbiodegradable cutting oils, or product of mineral moil origin.

(c) Wastewater from industrial plants containing floatable oils, fat or grease.

this Article, and which in the judgment of the Health Office and/or the Neptune Sewerage Authority, may have a deleterious effect upon the wastewater facilities, processes, equipment or receiving waters or which otherwise create a hazard to life or constitute a public nuisance, the Health Office may:

(a) Reject the wastes,

(b) Require pretreatment to an acceptable condition for discharge to the public severs,

Require control over the quantities and rates of discharge, (C) and/or

(d) Require payment to cover added cost of handling and treating the wastes not covered by existing taxes or sewer charges.

When considering the above alternatives, the Health Office, shall give consideration to the economic impact of each alternative on the discharger. If the Health Office permits the pretreatment or equalization of waste flows, the design and installation of the plant and equipment shall be subject to the review and approval of the Sewer Authority. the plants

Sever Authority. Section 6. Grease, oil, and sand interceptors shall be provided when, in the opinion of the Health Office and/or the Neptune Sewerage Authority, they are necessary for the proper handling of liquid wastes containing floatable grease in excessive amounts, as specified in Section 4 (c), or any flammable wastes, sand or other harmful ingredients; except that such interceptors shall not be required for private living quarters or dwelling units. All interceptors shall be of a type and capacity approved by the Health Office and the Neptune Sewerage Authority and shall be located as to be readily and easily accessible for cleaning and inspection. In the maintaining of these interceptors, and owner(s) or leascholder(s) shall be responsible for the proper removal and disposal by appropriate means of the captured material and shall maintain records of the dates and means of disposal which are subject to review by the Health Office and/or the Neptune Sewerage Authority. Any removal and hauling of the collected materials not performed by owner(s) or leascholder(s) personnel must be performed by currently licensed waste disposal firms.

Section 7. Where pretreatment or flow equalizing facilities are provided or required by the Health Office or the Neptune Sewer-age Authority for any water or waste, they shall be maintained continuously in satisfactory and effective operation by the owner(s) or leaseholder(s) at his expense.

Section 8. When required by the Neptune Sewerage Authority, the owner(s) or leaseholder(s) of any property serviced by a building sewer carrying industrial wastes, shall install a suitable structure together with such necessary meters and other appurtenances in the building sewer to facilitate observation, sampling and measurement of the wastes. Such structure, when required, shall be accessible and safely located and shall be constructed in accordance with plans approved by the Health Office and the Neptune Sewerage Authority. The structure shall be installed by the owner(s) or leaseholder(s) at his expense and shall be maintained by him so as to be safe and accessible at all times.

Section 9. The Health Office and/or the Neptune Sewerage Authority may require a user of sewer services to provide information needed to determine compliance with this ordinance. These requirements may include:

 $\left(1\right)$ Wastewaters discharge peak rate and volume over a specified time period.

(2) Chemical analyses of wastewaters.

(3) Information on raw materials, processes, and products affecting wastewater volume and quality.

(4) Quantity and disposition of specific liquid, sludge, oil, solvent or other materials important to sever use control.

(5) A plot plan of sewers of the user's property showing sewer and pretreatment facility location.

(6) Details of wastewater protreatment facilities.

(7) Details of systems to prevent and control the losses of materials through spills to the Ocean Grove sewer.

Section.10. All measurements, tests and analyses of the character-istics of waters and wastes to which reference is made in this ord-inance, shall be determined in accordance with the latest edition of "Standard Methods for Examination of Water and Wastewater", published by the American Public Health Association. Sampling methods, location, times, durations and frequencies are to be determined on an individual basis subject to approval.

Section 11. No statement contained in this Article shall be construed as preventing any special agreement or arrangement between the Neptune Sewerage Authority and any industrial concern whereby any industrial waste of unusual strength or character may be accepted by the Neptune Sewerage Authority.

ARTICLE VII

Section 1. No person(s) shall maliciously, willfully or negligently break, damage, destroy, uncover, deface or tamper with any structure, appurtenance or equipment which is a part of the wastewater facilities. Any person(s) violating this provision shall be subject to immediate arrest under charge of disorderly conduct.

ARTICLE VIII Power and Authority of Inspectors

Section 1. The Health Office and other duly authorized employees of the Township, the Ocean Grove Sewerage Authority or the Neptune Sewerage Authority bearing proper credentials and identification shall be permitted to enter all properties for the purposes of inspection, observation, measurement, sampling and testing pertinent to discharge to the community system in accordance with the provisions with this ordinance.

Section 2. The Health Office, the Ocean Grove Sewerage District and/or the Neptune Sewerage Authority or any duly authorized personnel thereof, are authorized to obtain information concerning industrial processes which have a direct bearing on the kind and source of dis-charge to the wastewater collection system. The industry may withhold indormation considered confidential. The industry must establish that the revelation to the public of the information in guestion might result in an advantage to competitors.

(d) Any garbage that has not been properly shredded, that is, where the particles cannot be carried freely under the flow of conditions normally prevailing and where the particles are greater than one and one-half (1 1/2) inch in any dimension. Garbage grinders may be connected to sanitary severs from homes, hotels, institutions, restaurants, hospitals, catering establishments, or similar places where garbage originates from the preparation of food in kitchens for the purpose of consumption on the premises or when served by catering. or when served by caterers.

(e) Any water or waste containing iron, chromium, copper, zinc, and similar objectionable or toxic substances to such degree that any such material received in the composite wastewater at the wastewater treatment works exceeds the limits established by the Sewer Authority for such materials.

(f) Any waters or wastes containing odor-producing substances eeding limits which may be established by the Neptune Sewerage exceeding Authority.

(g) Any radioactive wastes or isotopes of such half-life or concentration as may exceed limits established by the Sewerage Authority in compliance with applicable state or federal regulations.

(b) Quantities of flow, concentrations or both which constitute a "slug" that is any discharge of water or wastewater which in concentration of any given constituent or a quantity of flow exceeds for any period of duration longer than fifteen (15) minutes more than 5 times the average twenty-four hour concentration or flows during normal operation and shall adversely effect the collection system and/or performance of the wastewater treatment works.

(i) Waters or wastes containing substances which are not amenable to treatment or reduction by the wastewater treatment processes employed, or are amenable to treatment only to such degree that the wastewater treatment plant effluent cannot meet the requirements of other agencies having jurisdiction over discharge to the receiving waters.

ARTICLE IX Violations and Penalties

Section 1. Any persons, firm or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding the sum of \$500.00 or by imprisonment in the Monmouth County Jail for a period not exceeding 90 days or both in the dis-cretion of the Judge of the Neptune Municipal Court who shall hear and determine the matter. Further each day that a violation exists shall constitute a separate violation under the terms of this ordinance. ordinance.


