# April fool!



Since Easter and April Fools day coincide this year, there is bound to be lots of bunny pranks and other mischief.

Although most of us have taken part in some sort of shenanigans at this time of year, it is probably fair to say that not many of us actually know when it started and why it is on April 1st.

The origin of the holiday is a bit tricky: Some historians trace back the impish tradition to Geoffrey Chaucer's "The Canterbury Tales" in 1392. One of them, called "The Nun's Priest's Tale," is a mock-heroic that emphasizes foolishness.

The tale is set on "March 32," which could be a playful way of referring to April 1, thus marking a day to make someone feel like a nitwit. Other scholars think this may have been a misprint, and Chaucer simply meant the end of March.

A few historians think it dates back to the late 1500s when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar. The Julian calendar was the prominent calendar used by most of the world until the Gregorian calendar overtook it to become the standard.

Some historians believe that April Fools' Day has its origins in ancient Rome, with a festival known as "Hilaria." Usually celebrated March 25, according to William Smith's "[Dictionary of Greek and Roman Antiquities](#)," Hilaria was a day for games, masquerades and generally whiling away the day with relentless mocking — not even local magistrates were immune.

Either way, by the end of the next century, April Fools' Day was so ingrained that people had to entirely stop attempting to achieve serious things on April 1. It's said that the [Treaty of Warsaw](#), which established an anti-Ottoman alliance between Poland and the Holy Roman Empire, was backdated from April 1 to March 31, 1683, just to prevent any possible confusion.

Even Google — a geopolitical force that is surely on par with the Holy Roman Empire — is not immune. When it rolled out its email service on April 1, 2004 (notably, on the same day it sent out a job posting for positions on the moon), people assumed that the offer had to be a hoax. A whole gigabyte of storage for free? Not possible.

And so there you have it, so enjoy the day which will be over by the time you read this, so April Fool's Day to you!

## Salem in 1968

This is what Salem was like in 1968, the year that WVCA was established. Signs at Salem's edge greeted drivers entering town saying, "Welcome to Salem Oregon population 49,500". Keizer wasn't a city, it was just an unincorporated northern suburb resisting annexation to Salem because its residents didn't want to pay Salem taxes to support a library or sidewalks they didn't want.

Gas cost 29-cents a gallon or less depending on whether a gas war was going on at any one time or not, during which gas would be even less expensive. Oh, by the way, you got a free steak knife, water glass, and S&H Green Stamps free with each fill up. Plus, a polite attendant checked your oil and the air in your tires for free, then thanked you before drove off.

Capitol Chevrolet was located in downtown Salem at the corner of Marion and Commercial at the foot of the Marion Street bridge where you could get a fully optioned '68 Corvette for about \$5000 or \$4600 for a base 327 manual model. Used Corvettes were really cheap too. An unconfirmed story says that Capitol Chevrolet gave \$400 for a '54 Corvette traded in on a new '68 SS 396 Chevelle. Capitol kept that '54 for years. The old Cap Chev building belongs to First Baptist Church today. Sorry, I can't find a period picture anywhere but just one block south at the foot of the Center Street bridge sat the Master Service Center, a Good Year tire store and Union 76 gas station back in 68. The building is the Union Gospel Mission men's shelter today.



Speaking of bridges, Salem had two in 1968. A third bridge had been planned in 1965 but those plans were abandoned because the price tag of \$30-Million plus for the bridge and a freeway connection to I5 was considered too expensive. Do you think this all sounds familiare? That's because Salem is still debating a third bridge in 2018. Some things change, others don't. Today the estimated price tag for essentially the same bridge in the same spot is estimated at over \$300-million. So far over \$30-million has been spent in the past five years on planning and studies for the "new third bridge".



Today Walery's Pizza is our choice for after meeting gatherings. Back in 1968 though, pizza wasn't a big thing, drive-in burger joints were. None were more popular or craved than Bob's burgers. The original location at the corner of Capitol and Hood street was the southern end of "the gut" as it was known by locals. Driving from Bobs north up Portland road through several other drive-ins of the day consumed many nights and uncounted gallons of gas. Just sitting in Bob's lot talking, flirting or just watching other guys cars while chowing down 19-cent burgers and 15-cent fries seemed good enough because you never knew what other opportunity might present itself before it was time to go home.

Of course, I would be missing something if I didn't toot my own horn. In 1968 I was just graduating from Salem Tech, known today as Chemeketa Community College. After graduation I began my 30-year career with the Oregon Department of Forestry out on State St. Meanwhile Further West on State St. at 14<sup>th</sup> stood my father's family business, the Arctic Circle, another drive-in with 19-cent burgers and a lot more like 89-cent chicken meals, 75-cent halibut fish&chips, etc. So, I'll share a picture here just for fun because the sign, gone now, was awesome to see at night.



Meanwhile, Salem Corvetters were enjoying their newly formed club, driving their Vettes, gathering as we do even today to enjoy each other's company and talk cars, auto cross, rally, party, and so on. Yours truly had not been bitten by the Corvette bug in 1968. I was driving a 1966 Corvair.

That's it for this month. Let's see what history I can come up with for next month. Meanwhile get your Vette and yourself ready for our big June event. We're making history now .
