







# Sylvan Necklace

Walk in woods any time of the year with the Sylvan Necklace, suitable for wearers of all ages!

This free pattern is very versatile. Crochet the chains in equal length to create a fun headband or even belt! Or just crochet the flowers to create a cute Flower pin or brooch. The necklace can be made using a wide range of yarn weights, from fine to medium and bulky weight yarns, for any season or occasion. Work it in jewel tones or pastels, in solid colors or softly variegated shades for a one-of-a-kind accessory! A perfect gift idea!

#### Yarn

DK weight (#3 Light).

**Shown:** Cascade Yarns Ultra Pima (100% pima cotton; 220 yd [200 m]/3.5 oz [100 g]): 1 ball each of #3742 mint (MC) and #3740 sprout (CC).

#### **Crochet Hook**

Size D/3 (3.25 mm)

#### **Sizes**

18" (46 cm) in diameter

## Gauge

SKILL LEVE

Flower Motif is 2.75" (7 cm) from point to point. Gauge is not critical for this design.

#### **Notions**


- 25" (64 cm) of 1/4" (6 mm) wide lime 100% polyester ribbon (**shown** by Celebrate It )
- 3 beige and one brown 0.5" (1.3 cm) wooden beads with approx. 0.25" (0.5 cm) hole (**shown** by Creatology)
- 3 size 2" (2.5 cm) padded green leaf appliques
- Sewing needle and coordinating thread
- Tapestry needle for weaving in ends

#### SPECIAL STITCHES AND NOTES

Magic (adjustable) ring: Make a large loop with yarn. Holding the loop with your fingers, insert hook into loop and pull working yarn through loop on hook. Continue to work indicated number of stitches into loop. Pull on yarn tail to close loop (see *Tutorial on p. 7*).

To change color: Work stitch until 2 loops remain on hook, drop working yarn color, pick up specified yarn color and draw trough both loops on hook. Fasten off first color.

## Stitch Key

O - ma

- magic (adjustable) ring

- chain (ch)

- slip stitch (sl st)

single crochet (sc)

- worked in back loop only

#### **FLOWER MOTIF (make 2)**

Refer to Flower Stitch Diagram at right for assistance.

Rnd 1 (RS): With MC, magic ring (see Special Stitches and Notes), ch 1, (sc, ch 3) 5 times in ring, join with sl st to beg ch—5 ch-3 sps and 5 sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, (sc, hdc, 5 dc, hdc, sc) in each ch-3 sp around, join with sl st to beg ch-5 petals.

Rnd 3: Ch 1, working behind petals of Rnd 2, (sc in next sc of Rnd 1, ch 5) around, join with sl st to beg ch.

Change to CC (see Special Stitches and Notes).

**Rnd 4:** Ch 1, (sc, hdc, 9 dc, hdc, sc) in each ch-5 sp around, join with sl st to beg ch. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Make second Flower Motif in opposite colors.

#### **NECK CHAINS**

#### First Chain

Refer to Neck Chain Stitch Diagram, p. 3 for assistance.

With MC, chain 18" (46 cm) long Neck Chain.

**Row 1 (RS):** SI st in first and each ch across. Fasten off.

### Second (3rd) Chains

With MC, chain 20 (22)" (51 [56] cm) long Neck Chains.

Complete as First Chain.



#### **FINISHING**

Wet or steam block all pieces to finished measurements.

With sewing needle, sew ends of First, Second and 3rd Neck Chains in the order. Cut ribbon in half and sew to the same point.

String beige beads onto ribbons and push them to chains point.

Referring to detail picture for placement, with sewing needle, sew Flower Motifs and leaves to chains. With tapestry needle and coordinating yarn, sew beads in the centers of each flower.

<sup>\*</sup> There is a difference between the crochet stitch terminology in North America and that used in UK/Australia/Europe. These is one set of basic stitches worldwide, but there are two sets names for them (see Conversion Charts, p. "Conversion Charts" on page 8).

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## Techniques

### **MAGIC (ADJUSTABLE) RING**



Pinch yarn tail between thumb and ring finger. Wrap working yarn into a ring around the index finger twice. The working yarn should be on the right if you are right-handed, on the left if you are left-handed.



Continue crocheting over the loop and the yarn tail until you have the required number of single crochet for the first round.



Carefully slip the set of loops off your index finger. Grasp the join where the stands of yarn overlap along the ring. Insert hook from front to back through the ring. Yarn over hook with the working yarn.



Pull the non-working yarn tail to tighten the hole.



Pull up a loop. Yarn over again and pull through loop. Pull the yarn tight to secure the magic ring. This does count as the first single crochet stitch.



Insert hook into first single crochet.



Yarn over to start first single crochet. Pull up a loop.



Yarn over and pull through both loops on hook.



Yarn over and pull through both loops on hook.



Continue to work in the round as usual.

\* GUIDELINES ONLY: The above reflect the most commonly used gauges and hook sizes for specific yarn categories.

\*\*\* Steel crochet hooks are sized differently from regular hooks—the higher the number, the smaller the hook, which is the reverse of regular hook sizing.

## **Types of Yarn Packaging**



Ball: Yarn, wrapped into a ball shape.

**Skein:** Yarn wrapped in loose twist. Yarn packaged as balls and skeins come ready to knit or crochet.

**Hank:** Yarn wound into a large circle and then folded. You need to wind hanks into a ball before use them.

<sup>\*\*</sup> Lace weight yarns are usually knitted or crocheted on larger needles and hooks to create lacy, openwork patterns. Accordingly, a gauge range is difficult to determine. Always follow the gauge stated in your pattern.
