29 SEPTEMBER CHAPTER EVENT

Campbell United Methodist Church celebrated their organ's 20th anniversary with an outstanding concert played by Carolyn Pryor and Mary Ann Gee with Andy Clayton on steel drums. Andy Clayton is a member of the San Francisco Panhandlers Steel Band. We were provided with excellent program notes.

Carolyn led off with a full and rich rendering of Bach's All Glory be to God on High, BWV 715. This was followed by Brahms' Prelude and Fugue in g minor, Sowerby's Toccata, and Diemer's "Fiesta" with its tricky rhythms, all difficult pieces played with notable clarity.

Mary Ann played the second half of the program starting with "Bach's Fantasia in G Major BWV 572", Ashdown's "A Tuscan Adagio" featuring peaceful chords with florid figuration on top. "Hamlin's It is well with my Soul" (Mary Ann's favorite setting), Lefebure-Wely's rollicking "Sortie in B-flat major" and followed with "Praise" by Carol Barnett, with steel drums played by Andy Clayton, a real crowd pleaser. "Praise" was commissioned for the 2008 AGO National Convention in Minneapolis.

Carolyn and Mary Ann together ended the program with Dinda's toe-tapping Max Cat Rag with an impressive four feet pedal section and Charles Callahan's catchy" Fiesta".

They received a well-deserved standing ovation and obliged us by putting a Viking headpiece on the organ and playing the Ride of the Valkyries, thunderous and beautifully registered. What a ride! And what an organ! Our chapter is truly lucky to have this beautiful instrument so generously available.

LOTHAR BANDERMANN'S MUSIC

Last week I participated in the Palo Alto chapter's literature sharing for the upcoming seasons through January. Such an event is always worthwhile (unfortunately often poorly attended) because much useful as well as enjoyable literature is never recorded by concertizing organists or not in publication. As one of the many mostly unpublished composing AGO members, permit me to let you know that nearly all my organ (as well as piano) compositions have been recorded (mostly by myself on the St. Joseph of Cupertino 3m Moeller/Rodgers hybrid organ). They can be heard on my website

I have now about 350 titles, counting transcriptions and arrangements and "organ plus" [e.g. organ plus piano) pieces. There are over 100 hymn arrangements or "chorale preludes" of which I played two selections for the Advent season in last week's literature sharing event. Among my arrangements are also the famous (notorious?) Ives Variations on "America," arranged for piano and organ, and I gave the piano the more difficult passages in the original. I think this remarkable

piece, written by the 19 year-old Ives, is worth making known to piano students (so I arranged it also for 4 hand piano – and, yes, with permission of current publisher, which did not come cheap, by the way!). I have not recorded that arrangement yet but I plan to do play it with Susan Snook-Luther of the San Jose chapter for Veterans' Day in November and record it then.

PASSING OF DR. DOUGLAS BUSH

With sadness, the BYU College of Fine Arts and Communications notes the passing of Dr. Douglas E. "Doug" Bush, Professor of Organ in the School of Music. He joined the faculty at BYU in 1978 and was a renowned concert organist and musical scholar as well as a beloved teacher and friend.

Bush leaves a profound legacy as a mentor and colleague at BYU. Over the years, many have been touched by his kindness and inspired by his knowledge and wisdom.

Bush was born in March of 1947 in western Montana. He completed bachelors and master's degrees from BYU in 1972 and 1974, followed by a doctoral degree from The University of Texas at Austin in 1982. Bush concertized extensively in the United States, Mexico, and Europe and was a featured soloist in several concert series. In summer of 2013, Bush was honored as the Convocation Speaker at BYU's College of Fine Arts and Communications graduation.

PASSING OF CAROL SUE NEWTON HAWK

On Tuesday, March 5th Carol Sue Newton Hawk passed away after a courageous battle with cancer. She was 64 years old. She is survived by her husband, John, daughters Christine and Julia, four grandchildren, Riley, Tyler, James, and Jemma, mother, Frances, and brother Donald. She is predeceased by her father, Charlie, and brother, Robert, who founded the Newton Organ Company.



Carol as organist at Oaks Presbyterian Church since 1989. She had deep rooted history in Worship and Music. As a young child. her father was the director of their family's church choir. Her mother held a degree in

Vocal Music, and sang in the choir. Carol sat in the front pew, watching. She was four years old!

Over the years, Carol spent many hours in church choir rehearsals, watching, and listening. By the time she was 11, and after a move from Illinois to California, she could no longer resist the urge to study the organ (piano lessons had started at the age of five, and continued through Jr. High school). Her brother, the late Robert C. Newton, became her teacher. Carol had always been fascinated by her brother's feet as he practiced is organ lessons. Eventually, she was playing for services, weddings, and funerals (beginning at age 11 1/2). It was a wonderful beginning to a long lasting love of choral and organ music. She was absolutely committed to music, which was evidenced by her active membership in and participation with the American Guild of Organists, Sacramento Choral Society and Orchestra, Mu Phi Epsilon Sorority, and P.E.O. International.

Carol has been privileged to work with some of the finest Choral Conductors over the years; Royal Stanton, Sir David Willcocks, Jester Hairston, Donald Kendrick, Maestro Keith Alford Lockhart and of course, Dr. Chris.

PASSING OF GLADYS MURRAY

Gladys Murray was born on July 5, 1914 and passed away at the age of 96 on November 15, She is survived by her daughter, Karen 2010. Baker: son-in-law, Mike Baker: granddaughter, Kim Baker. She was preceded in death by her husband, Robert Dunckley; and her grandson, Robby. Along with being devoted to her family, Gladys was also devoted to music. She was pulled out of school in 8th grade because they thought she was going blind, but in reality she was only nearsighted. This initiated her lifelong dedication to music. In the 1930's, she moved from Elmhurst, Illinois to Los Angeles. There she met and married Robert Dunckley Murray, and they spent their life together in Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, and Los Gatos, California. Gladys had been a member of the San Jose AGO Chapter. Gladys saw a lot of life in her 96 years. As an organist, choir director and music composer, she was highly involved in church music. She completed many trainings, classes and even earned an Associate's degree in music. From Paul Rosas.

PASSING OF CHARLIE JOHNSON

Charlie was born in Independence, Missouri on June 8, 1924. He attended public schools and graduated from William Crisman High School.

After Pearl Harbor in 1941 with parental permission he joined the navy. He spent his entire tour of duty aboard ships in action in the South Pacific. His ship was one of the first to sail into Tokyo Harbor at the end of World War II.

He returned to Independence and enrolled in William Jewell College in Liberty, Missouri and received his BA degree. He partnered with his father in the family business Johnson & Sons Monument Company founded by his grandfather in 1897.

He sold his interest in the business to his younger brother and moved to San Francisco January 1, 1965. After several jobs he started the Eureka School of Driving in San Francisco. After running that for several years he began teaching Driver Education in the Fremont Union High School District in Sunnyvale, CA. He began teaching Special Education after completing the necessary class. He received his Master's degree in Special Education at Santa Clara University.

November 1, 2000 he moved to Santa Rosa, CA where he resided until his death.

Charlie was a member of the American Guild of Organists for over 60 years, first in Kansas City, then in San Jose and then in Santa Rosa. He had played the organ in many churches over the years in the Kansas City area and finally at the Episcopal Mission of St. Andrew in Monte Rio, CA. Because of the driving distance over country roads he retired and was honored to be named Organist Emeritus October 30, 2011.

He was a 67 year Master Mason. First in Independence Lodge and after moving to Santa Rosa, LaFayette Lodge #126 in Sebastopol, CA where he received his 50 year certificate. He was also a member of the Royal Arch and the Scottish Rite.

His Memorial Service will be held at the Episcopal Church of The Incarnation in Santa Rosa, 550 Mendocino Ave, Santa Rosa CA on Saturday, November 16, 2013 at 11:00 a.m.
