In the early 90s, when I was in my early thirties, I went on my first airline flight to pick up my 16 year old son in Texarkana. This required landing at DFW and flying in a small turboprop into Texarkana, then back from DFW to San Antonio. I remember thinking I would feel much more comfortable up in the cockpit, as we were bouncing along on final approach. During the flight home I was absolutely awestruck by the humongous aircraft lifting off as I sat glued to the window near the engine, in what I now know was a DC-10.

At the time I was a school bus driver for Judson ISD and took daily walks near the transportation building near Randolph's traffic pattern. After my first flight I really started noticing aircraft everywhere, especially all the aircraft at Randolph flying overhead...T-37s, T-38s, and T-43s at that time. I lost 120 lbs. by dieting & walking over the next year, which gave me the courage, and enough gumption to call a flight school at Stinson. I figured if all those military pilots could fly, I could too!

A friend said they overheard someone say that I was too old to start an airline career. That hurt, but I still persevered. So once again, that's why my favorite quote is "Follow your dreams, because they hold unlimited possibilities!"

San Antonio Aviation had a small cargo operation, which I ended up flying for 10 years later! I started flight training there in February of 1993, got my license on Halloween day that year. I had only planned to become a Private Pilot for fun, but then I discovered I could actually get paid for doing what I loved! I continued to pursue different scholarships, took loans out against my vehicle, then on my husband's truck, and worked three jobs to pay for my ratings. I finally managed to complete my ATP with a scholarship from ISA +21 in 2007. All this, while raising 2 sons was difficult, but so worth it!

I received a grant in 1998 from the Philanthropic Education Organization to help pay for my CFI. I instructed at Wright Flyers until 2000, then Flight Safety in the Mooney program until 2001.

I also won two scholarships from The Ninety-Nines, my multi-engine in 2000, & B-737 in 2008. I hoped to be hired by Southwest Airlines, but there was a huge slowdown in airline hiring at that time. I was flying cargo for Ameriflight at the time. I was ultimately hired by two airlines, Trans States Airlines in 2001, I was hired in August and was supposed to start training in October. Of course after 9/11 it was canceled.

Shortly before that, I had interviewed for a Part 135 cargo pilot position, but turned down their offer to try for the airlines. When my class was canceled at TSA I called the cargo company back and told them I was available. I flew for them for 2 years, flying contract cargo for UPS. After a back injury, (the pilot was responsible for loading/unloading up to 3000 lbs. of cargo twice a day!) I left that company and began flying for San Antonio Aviation, where I took my private pilot training. They had much lighter cargo loads that I could manage more easily.

I was hired by SkyWest Airlines in 2005. I had nearly completed my training when my former supervisor sent them inaccurate information which resulted in my termination. I couldn't afford a lawyer to fight it, unfortunately. So I returned to my former cargo company and also began instructing at Sky Safety.

In 2006 I was hired by Ameriflight, where I also flew contract UPS cargo until 2009.

In 2010 I tried something totally different and began driving for the railroad, a very interesting job transporting crews to their trains in some of the most out-of-the-way places!

I eventually returned to school bus driving, part-time at Randolph ISD, while continuing to instruct part-time. I'm now 60 years old, and have yet to fly for a passenger airline, but came very close! I still have a few years left to try for a Part 121 airline before the mandatory retirement age of 65!

Lacee Law Flight Instructor – Sky Safety




