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A message from Richard Klemme, Cooperative Extension Dean and Director:

Gov. Scott Walker's 2015-2017 proposed Wisconsin budget includes a \$150 million base cut to the University of Wisconsin System. Because UW-Extension is part of the UW system, this cut will negatively impact the quality and variety of UW-Extension programs available around the state. Cooperative Extension faces targeted cuts that would eliminate over 13 positions in addition to the nearly \$13 million from our budget.

UW-Extension resources benefit Wisconsin communities, businesses, farms, families and people. You can help us communicate the value and importance of UW-Extension by sharing exactly how you benefit from our educational programs through a social media campaign entitled "Because of UW-Extension."

Emails and telephone calls are very important methods for communicating with lawmakers. Recent trends suggest comments and conversations over social media are increasingly influential to legislators and their staff. Think about the following: How has your life, business or community changed because of UW-Extension? What skills, connections and resources have you received by working with UW-Extension, to help strengthen your life, family, business or community? Then, share a Facebook post or Tweet starting with..."Because of UW-Extension."

For Twitter users add the hashtag #UWEXmatters to any tweet that you might share related to UW-Extension. Adding the hashtag will link your tweets to our social media campaign. For Facebook users, please also add the hashtag #UWEXmatters to any status updates or photo/video uploads you might share related to UW-Extension. You can also tag legislators in your Facebook posts, photos and videos. You can start typing their name with "@" in front, and Facebook will suggest options for who you're trying to tag. Please tag the UW-Extension, Cooperative Extension Facebook page to your posts too.

A well constructed post/tweet would begin with "Because of Extension," and include a brief statement about the impact UW-Extension has had on your life as well as the #UWEXmatters hashtag, and would tag your district legislators and Extension.







What Should I do now?

Write a rough draft of your 4-H Story.



Condensed Description of Events

Registration 7:00 – 10:00 a.m., Awards to follow after events tabulated

Archery – The indoor archery is a total of 60 arrows, 30 arrows per event. Course of fire for the NFAA target:

Five arrows will be shot per end. A total of six ends will be shot. Course of fire for the Vegas target:

Three arrows will be shot per end. A total of 10 ends will be shot.

Course of fire for the 2-D Shoot

The 2-D shoot yardages will be based on age group with approximately 20 animals.

Intermediates wanting scores considered for National will shoot from the Senior distance in Archery.

Age Group Distances

Juniors: Ages 8 and in 3rd grade-11 (10 yards) Intermediates: Ages 12-14 (15 yards) Senior: Ages 15-19 (20 yards)

Shotgun event will use a 2 ¾ inch shells of either 12, 16, or 20 gauge or different shot size either 7 ½ to 9 only. Competitors supply their own guns and ammunition. Actions open on all guns except competitors shooting at station in proper order. Empty hulls will be picked up after last round by participants. In the event of ties, awards shall be decided on the basis of the longest run in the total event beginning with the first target hit. If a tie remains, a ten shoot-off will be shot; 2 clays per station. Should this not resolve the tie, the event will be decided by a station by station (1 shot) "sudden death." **Muffs required.** Eye protection required.

National 4-H Competition does not allow any load with a velocity greater than 1,290 feet per second with a maximum shot charge of 1-1/8 ounces or 1,325 feet per second with a maximum shot charge of 7/8 ounce or less, as measured in any individual shot shell. In addition, no load containing more than 1-1/8 ounce or any shot larger than Number 7-1/2 can be used.

Shotgun – Trap – 16 yards. Two rounds of 25 clays per round for a total of 50 clays. No practice clays will be thrown. One shell in gun at a time. Five rounds shot at each station, a total of five stations. Competitors rotate through stations left to right with the fifth station competitor walking behind other competitors to station 1. All competitors at their station before a new round is fired. Competitor who starts in station 1 always shoots first as competitors rotate through stations. Competitors can refuse bird if thrown untimely.

0.22 Pistol – NRA B-8 target at 25 yards. Open/Iron sights only.10 shots slow fire, 15 shots timed fire & 15 shots rapid fire (40 shots for record). Position: One hand standing. <u>Slow Fire</u>: 5 minutes for one 10 shot string of fire. <u>Timed Fire</u>: 20 seconds per 5 shot string, three strings. <u>Rapid Fire</u>: 10 seconds per 5 shot string, three strings. **Muffs required. Eye protection required.** Completed and signed authorization forms required if bringing your own firearm.

WISCONSIN 4-H SHOOTING SPORTS RULES FOR SMALLBORE .22 PISTOL COMPETITIONS INTERMEDIATE (AGES 12-14) OR SENIOR (AGES 15-19) DIVISIONS ONLY

General Rules for Smallbore Pistol Shooting

Objectives of the 4-H Shooting Sports program include teaching safe use of rifles and pistols, introducing and developing marksmanship skills so that participants enjoy the recreational aspects of Shooting Sports and finds it rewarding and, perhaps most importantly, HAVING FUN!

Smallbore Pistol was added to the Wisconsin 4-H Shooting Sports Program in 2009. **Participants will need to be at least 12 years old and have completed a certified Hunter Education and Safety program.** Participants and their families need to take note of the following:

Per BATF regulations, all pistol shooters under the age of 18 must have in their possession a written permission statement from their parent or guardian stating their permission to possess and fire Pistols. In accordance with federal laws pertaining to youth and pistols (see Youth Safety Handgun Act), the National 4-H Shooting Sports Program prohibits the transportation of a pistol for any reason by a youth under 18 years of age. Arrangements must be made for an adult to transport all smallbore pistols.

The Smallbore (.22) Handgun Parent/Guardian Authorization (consent form) follows this update. The page contains two forms that will be used for the Wisconsin 4-H Shooting Sports Smallbore Pistol discipline. Both forms need to be signed, witnessed, and dated. One form needs to be given to the County or Club 4-H Shooting Sports Certified Pistol Leader to keep on file. The other form needs to be laminated and kept in the pistol case so the youth has access to it at every training session or pistol competition. Youth will only be able to shoot the pistol at a 4-H Tournament (practice or competition) after presenting the completed form when checking in to the Tournament. We recommend keeping this form in the pistol kit being used by each youth participant. Youth will also need to present proof of completion of DNR Hunter Safety.

Youth under the age of 18 may NOT possess a Smallbore Pistol without adult supervision. This includes driving themselves to the tournament or even walking from the parking lot into the building. Similarly, at any match, parents may not just hand the cased gun to their youth in the parking area and send them on their way to the pistol match. A parent or guardian needs to accompany the youth to and from the .22 pistol match.

EYE AND EAR PROTECTION REQUIRED You may be aware that eye protection is required for Air Pistol. For Smallbore Pistol, ear protection will also be required. Ear plugs and/or protective muffs will do. A number of pistol instructors wear both. Please visit the hardware store, a sporting goods store or the sporting goods department at a neighborhood store to get proper hearing protection. Hearing protection is usually rated in terms of how much decibel reduction they provide. A higher number gives more protection.

SMALLBORE PISTOL MATCH There will be three stages for Smallbore Pistol Match at this tournament. The stages are: Slow Fire, Timed Fire and Rapid Fire.

PISTOLS and AMMO Participants will need to bring their own .22 Long Rifle rim fire non-jacketed ammunition and pistol. Semiautomatic pistols are easier to shoot with for most competition, mostly because you don't have to thumb cock the hammer for each shot (remember, bullseye will be shot one-handed). Good semiautos are available from Ruger, Browning, Smith & Wesson and others. Feel free to discuss your pistol choices with your instructors.

- 1. Competition Divisions:
 - a.) Intermediate 12 yrs to 14 yrs,
 - b.) Senior 15 yrs to 19 yrs.
- 2. Youth must be at least 12 years old to fire a Smallbore Pistol in practice or competition.
- 3. BATF (Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives) Regulations:
 - All pistol shooters under the age of 18 must have in their possession a written permission statement from their parent or guardian stating their permission to possess and fire pistols. In accordance with federal laws pertaining to youth and pistols (see Youth Safety Handgun Act), the transportation of a pistol for any reason by a youth under 18 years of age is prohibited. Arrangements must be made for an adult to transport all pistols.
- 4. The Smallbore (.22) Handgun Parent/Guardian Authorization (consent form) is above. This page contains two forms that will be used for the Wisconsin 4-H Shooting Sports Smallbore Pistol discipline. Both forms need to be signed, witnessed, and dated. One form needs to be given to the County or Club 4-H Shooting Sports Certified Pistol Leader to be kept on file. The other form needs to be laminated and kept in the pistol case so the youth has access to it at every training session or pistol competition. Youth will only be able to shoot the pistol at a 4-H match (practice or competition) after presenting the completed form when checking into the Tournament. We recommend keeping this form in the pistol kit being used by each youth participant.
- 5. The Smallbore .22 Pistol Match is a "single pistol" match, meaning participants are to shoot the entire course of fire with the same pistol. No pistol changes are allowed between stages. Only one pistol per shooter is allowed on the line. No bolt action pistols, including cannon bolt, turn bolt or straight bolt will be permitted.
- 6. Target and distance: NRA B-8 at 25 yards.
- 7. **Course of fire:** 10 shots slow fire, 15 shots timed fire and 15 shots rapid fire (40 shots for record). No sighters or warm up shots.
- 8. **Time Limits and Shooting Positions:** a. Slow Fire: 5 minutes for one 10 shot string shot in the one handed standing position ONLY. b. Timed Fire: 20 seconds per 5 shot string, three strings, shot one handed OR two handed standing position. c. Rapid Fire: 10 seconds per 5 shot string, three strings, shot one handed OR two handed standing position.
- 9. **Equipment:** Any pistol or revolver firing the .22 long rifle, long or short rimfire cartridge with a sight radius no greater than 10 inches, and a trigger pull no less than 2 pounds. (Rule 3.4-except iron sights only.)
- 10. No optically enhancing sights or laser sights that project an image onto the target are permitted.
- 11. Rules: NRA Pistol Rules CP16650 (Most recent printing)
- 12. **Information:** http://materials.nrahq.org/go/products.aspx?cat=Rulebooks
- 13. **Tiebreakers:** Ties will be broken with the most number of X's first, then most number of tens, most number of nines, most number of eights, etc.

Chippewa County Farm/Tractor and **Machinery Safety** Certification

Bloomer, Cadott, Cornell and Chippewa Falls

The purpose of this program is to teach youth about tractor, machinery, and farm safety.

Tractor and farm machinery operators need to be knowledgeable and safety-smart. Studies show that many farm accidents are caused by inexperience, carelessness, haste, fatigue, stress, or poor judgment or attitude. These problems, and practical tractor operation, will be discussed by program instructors.

With certification, youth ages 12 to 16 will be allowed to operate tractors or self-propelled implements of husbandry on a public road, under the direction of their parent or guardian (state law).

Youth ages 14-15 will be certified to be employed or to work without pay on a farm other than their family farm (federal law). They will be certified in:

- TRACTOR OPERATION Operating a tractor over 20 PTO horsepower. This includes connecting or disconnecting equipment or any equipment parts to or from a tractor.
- 2) EQUIPMENT OPERATION Operating or assisting to operate equipment listed below. This includes starting, stopping, adjusting, feeding, or any activity including physical contact associated with the operation of the equipment listed. This equipment includes: hay mower, hay baler, forage harvester, forage blower, unloading mechanism of a nongravity-type self unloading wagon or trailer, grain combine, corn picker, auger conveyor, feed grinder, crop dryer, cotton picker, post-hole digger, post driver, nonwalking-type rotary tiller, and mobile pea viner.

Upon successful completion of this 24-hour program, the student will receive certification in both the State and Federal Tractor and Machinery Programs (see back panel for details). This safety program is directed toward youth who are 12-16 years of age. To enroll, youth must be at least 12 years of age the day that the class begins.

The **state certification** is good for four years. The **federal certification** will automatically be issued when youth reach their 14th birthday.

In order for a youth to successfully complete the program and receive the Wisconsin Safe Operation of Tractor and Machinery Certificate of Training, he or she must:

- Attend 24 hours of instructional training;
- Pass written exam with a score of 70% or greater; and
- Pass a driving exam, which demonstrates tractor driving ability in a 2-wheel course with a trailed implement.

Students will also be asked to complete a 15question identification quiz.

Students must bring lunch and a beverage to each class for noon lunches, and a writing utensil.

Safety Facts for Volunteers

Thank you for volunteering to take part in Wisconsin's Adopt-A-Highway program. As a volunteer your safety comes first. Please familiarize yourself with the following guidelines and the Adopt-A-Highway (A-A-H) safety video every time you perform a clean-up session. The safety video and additional safety information is available online at: www.dot.wisconsin.gov/localgov/aid/adopt-a-highway.htm.



WHO is your quide?

A crew chief should be on site and is responsible for the following:

- ✓ Ensure there's one adult supervisor per 5–6 volunteers and all volunteers are the proper age.
- \checkmark Plan the team's approach and make sure everyone is prepared.
- ✓ Organize volunteers and carpools to and from each side of the roadway.
- ✓ Make sure cars and volunteers stay three feet from the pavement surface.
- ✓ Have an emergency plan that includes a first aid kit, information about nearby hospitals and a cell phone.
- ✓ Keep track of the group's vests, "highway worker" signs and trash bags.
- ✓ Ensure volunteers' safety.
- ✓ Submit the clean-up report.

WHERE to work

- ➤ Place "highway worker" signs at both ends of the highway segment before you begin working.
- ➤ Carpool as a group to your assigned section.
- ➤ Park parallel along the side of the road and on the same side of the highway you'll be working.
- ➤ Crews work to pick up trash along the sides of state roadways.
- ➤ When switching sides of the road to work on, gather together in the vehicles and drive across the highway.
- ➤ ALWAYS work FACING traffic and stay three feet from the pavement surface.



- ✓ Remove trash from the pavement
- ✓ Walk across the pavement
- ✓ Go onto medians, boulevards, pavement, shoulders, tunnels, overpasses, bridges or high slopes.

HOW to dress

Always wear the following:

- ✓ Safety vest
- ✓ Pants
- ✓ Long-sleeved shirt
- ✓ Sturdy shoes
- ✓ Work gloves
- √ Hat
- ✓ Eye protection like sunglasses
- ✓ Sunscreen.
- ➤ Tuck your pant legs into your footwear to deter ticks.
- ➤ Do NOT wear headphones or ear buds.
- ➤ All volunteers except the crew chief should put cell phones on vibrate mode.

HOW to be safe while you work

See the A-A-H Web site for more education on safety.

Always:

- ✓ Be prepared to perform physical activity.
- ✓ Avoid overexertion and have water with you.
- ✓ Work in groups during daylight hours.
- ✓ Stay alert.
- ✓ Be aware of your surroundings and natural hazards like wild parsnip.
- ✓ Approach items from uphill and upwind.

Do NOT:

- ✓ Schedule cleanups on popular travel days such as Memorial and Labor Day.
- ✓ Work in adverse weather and discontinue work if weather turns bad.
- ✓ Horseplay.
- √ Go near mowing or construction operations and parked equipment.
- ✓ Bring alcohol on site.
- ✓ Pick up anything you cannot identify, as it may potentially be hazardous.

WHAT to do

- ➤ Pick up common everyday litter items and place them in trash bags. Do not overstuff bags.
- ➤ Place filled trash bags at the designated pick-up site, at least three feet from the shoulder, or near a questionable item to help mark the item for county highway crews or law enforcement. Note the location on your cleanup report.
- ➤ Do NOT pick up anything heavy, dead, toxic, opaque or dangerous. This includes items that may appear to be part of a methamphetamine lab, items that could contain poisonous chemicals or bottles of liquid. To learn more about these dangers, please see the A-A-H Web site.
- ➤ Any items left behind, items on the pavement and dead animals should be reported to the A-A-H Coordinator on the cleanup report. County crews will come out and remove these items.
- ➤ If you find drugs, medical waste or weapons, your crew chief should call 911.
- ➤ Use common sense. If an item seems questionable err on the side of caution NOT to touch it or pick it up.
- ➤ Your group may keep small amounts of money you find and recyclables.

WHEN you're done

- ➤ Once you are finished, return to your gathering location with your group and carpool.
- ➤ Take down the "highway worker" signs and remove safety vests and return them to the crew chief.
- ➤ Fill out a clean-up report and submit it to the A-A-H Coordinator.
- ➤ Notify the County Hwy. Dept. to pick up trash.
