

The Elinjikkal Family:

in conversation with Nicola Hanzic

To think about India is to bring to mind a country in Asia which, as Father Kevin would put it, is throbbing with life. Well, this interview centres on the Elinjikkal family who migrated here in 2012 from the Kerala State of India which is in the southwest of the country.

Joy Thomas and his family migrated to Australia from India hoping for a better life and better job prospects here. In actual fact he applied to come here as a skilled migrant when he was working in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia his trade is that of a boiler maker and welder. Currently he is working at JC Butko Engineering in Wodonga.

Joy Thomas has a wife, Shiji, and 3 children, Mariya, who is in Year 9 at Xavier College, Martin, who is in Year 3 at St Pats and Gloriya who attends kindergarten at Albury North Public School.

Joy Thomas is the 4th of six children. His wife, Shiji, comes from a family of 4 daughters. Joy Thomas and his wife met and married in a place called Vennoor and, as is the custom, their marriage was arranged for them. The majority of people in Kerala State where the family used to live are Hindus, followed by Christians and Muslims. All cohabit and practice their faith peacefully. In fact, Hindus and Christians occasionally attend each other's services.

To be a Catholic in India is definitely a way of life. I learnt that it is compulsory for all Catholics to attend Mass each week and every child from 6 onwards has to attend Catechism classes on a Sunday between 8am and 12Noon, the latter part of the class is devoted to the Celebration of the Eucharist, which the parents also attend.

The church that the family attended in Vennoor is called St Marys. January is a very special time in all the parishes because this is the time when Mary is celebrated as being the Mother of God. It is a time of festivities and on the Feast Day is an occasion when people, walk to church in procession carrying decorated umbrellas and playing drums and other instruments. The bishop decides where this walk begins. Parishes take turns to host this event but January 2015 is the turn of St Marys, and the Elinjikkal family is returning for this occasion, (as well as to meet up with family and friends.)

With regard to lifestyle I learnt that every state in India is different, having a different language (Malayalam is mainly spoken in Kerala State), and different food and clothing styles. However the cities are similar in that life is hectic.

I suppose one would say this is the essence of India. The cities are full of noise, smells, bikes, buses, cars, honking horns and bustling people either going about their business or just socialising. Life in the cities never stops. Throughout the country, respect is very important in the Indian way of life and the elderly are revered and well looked after. This must be a great comfort to them.

Joy Thomas told me that three national holidays are observed in India: Republic Day, Independence Day and Mahatma Gandhi's birthday. Republic Day falls on 26 January and is a time when the people remember the adoption of the Constitution of India in 1950. Independence Day is observed on 15 August and is a time when the people celebrate India's Independence from the British Empire in 1947. The occasion of Mahatma Gandhi's birthday is celebrated on 2 October.

The biggest and most important festival for the people of Kerala State is Onan. This is celebrated around the world sometime during August or September and can last from 4 to 10 days. What is so special about this festival is that all people can join in because it is beyond the boundaries of religion or caste. In Albury, it is celebrated in St Pat's Hall with much joy and happiness sometime during September.

The Elinjikkal family is settling down into life in Albury. They frequently meet up with friends and Joy Thomas also plays cricket once a week in Alexandra Park. I am sure that he would be a fountain of cricketing information should you have the chance to catch up with him.

It was a privilege being able to meet up with this family who is new to our region and obtain a glimpse into their lives. May they find real peace and happiness in their new home, which is far away from the land of their birth... Nicola


