The NAACP (national association for the advancement of colored people) had its annual state meeting last week at the Illinois Dunes State Park Hotel in Zion, Illinois and I was there. Among the resolutions they passed were 1—On World Justice; the advancement of the colored people anywhere depends upon the advancement of all people everywhere; and the primary cause for war and poverty in all the years of human history has been the various practices which deny equal opportunity for all men. 2—On Education; the NAACP has long fought to end racial discrimination and segregation in all educational institutions, knowing such practices to be detrimental to both White and Negro children. 3—On Employment; the Negro is heavy on the bottom of the economic ladder; we should begin our own Operation Boot Strap—every community has some skilled people and we must do as others have done. Pass our skills on to our children or some one else's child. Use your local Skills Tradesman as your instructor—keep your dropouts in school—agitate for a massive public works program in each community to improve living standards and to provide unskilled and semi-skilled jobs now. 4—On equal housing opportunities; One-fifth of American citizens are denied decent homes for themselves and their families, to the detriment of all citizens of America, therefore all members are advised to actively work for freedom of Residence in Illinois, and so on and so on. Is that too much for a people to ask for? I think not and deep in the hearts of all men who think otherwise, there must be shame and mortification that a man dares to refuse his brother equality and understanding.

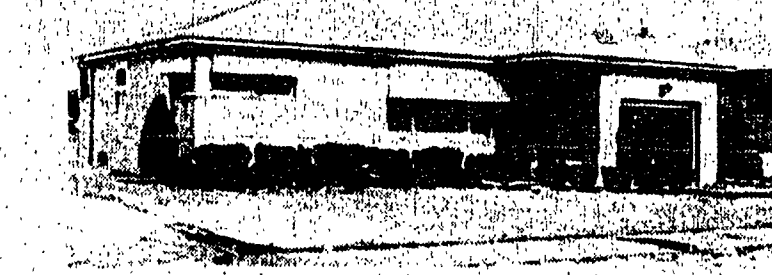

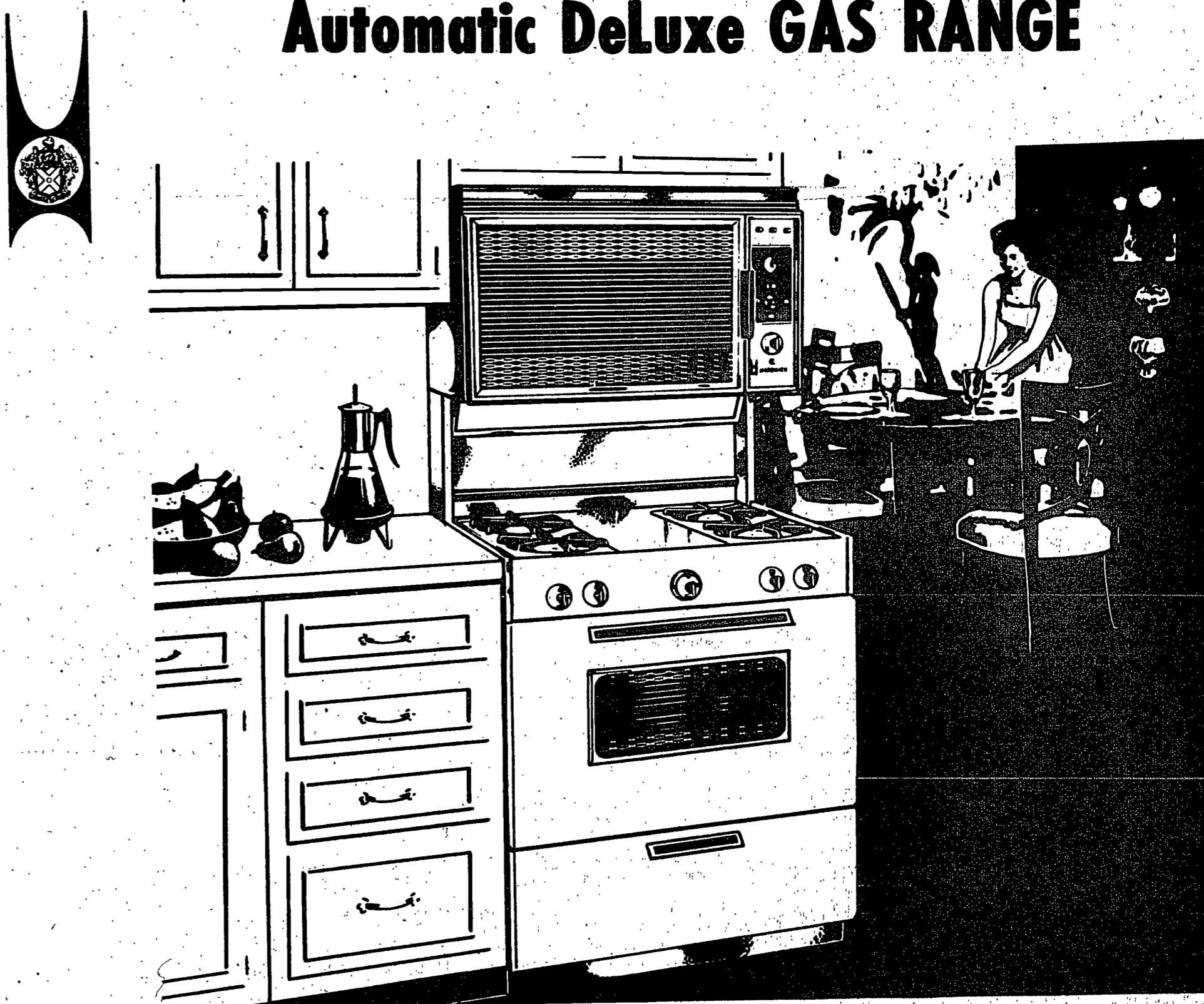

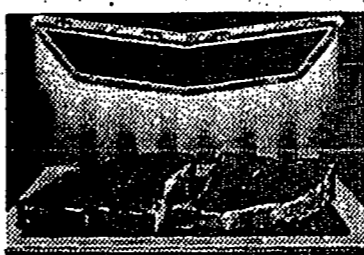

After being jettisoned at 300,000 feet, all eight cameras were recovered by the U.S.A.F. Air Rescue Service.

In addition to the talk there will also be an display one of the camera capsules that was actually fished from the high seas as well as a motion picture which shows in part the colorful and dramatic interstage separation sequence.

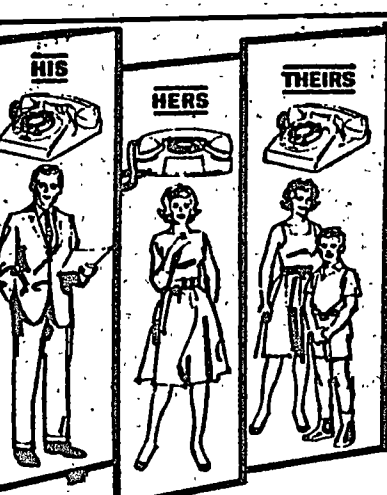

The increase in Educational rate will not affect this year's taxes in any way. Any tax increase of a few cents cannot be levied until 1965 and would not be effective until 1966.

Unless the rate referendum is approved it will be necessary to curtail the educational program of the district and this will affect the quality of the educational program now offered. Voter approval is necessary if the district is to maintain its present program.
