



## An Optimist, a Believer: Professor Emeritus David McConnell Graybeal

Graybeal, who taught in the Theological School for 55 years, passed away on June 2.



David McConnell Graybeal passed away at his home in Morristown, Tennessee, early in the afternoon on June 2, 2017, just two weeks shy of his 96th birthday, surrounded by his loving family. He lived a long and fruitful life and made a lasting impact on those who knew him. After serving in the Navy in WWII, he attended seminary at Yale and earned his doctorate in the sociology of religion. Subsequently he served several churches in the Etowah, Tennessee, area and

then as chaplain at Emory and Henry College until 1956, when he and his young family moved to Madison, New Jersey, where he joined the faculty of the Drew Theological Seminary. He taught at Drew from 1956 until his "retirement" in 1996, but stayed on part time for 15 more years as a professor emeritus. Beloved member of the Drew community Jacqueline Berke passed away on June 13, 2017.



Jackie was professor emerita of English at Drew, and she was the founding director and a director emerita of the Center for Holocaust/ Genocide Study, as well as a generous benefactor of the Center. Jackie taught literature and writing in both the College of Liberal Arts and the Graduate School at Drew.

Jackie also served as director of the Writing Program from 1965 to 1985. Jackie was the author of a well-known and much used text on rhetoric, *Twenty Questions for the Writer* (Harcourt Brace, 6th edition, 1996), which is still widely used in freshman composition classes throughout the country. Additionally, Jackie was the research director, consultant and coordinator for a series of writing-related

research projects, such as the federally funded "Project English" (1965) and a computer-centered composition "experiment" sponsored by the New Jersey Department of Higher Education (1985).

Having been preceded in death by her husband, Philip, Jackie leaves behind her daughter, Laura, and son, Matthew, as well as their spouses, two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Contributions in her honor may be made to the Center for Holocaust/Genocide Study at Drew University.

## A Visionary Leader: Former Drew President Paul Hardin

His legacy at Drew includes the United Methodist Church Archive Center and the RISE program.



Paul Hardin III, the ninth president of Drew who served from 1975 to 1988, passed away on July 1, 2017, from ALS. He was 86.

Paul joined Drew after serving as president of Wofford College and Southern Methodist University. At Drew, Paul was an energetic fundraiser whose legacies on campus include the United Methodist Church Archive Center, an addition to the library and the Research Institute for Scientists Emerti (RISE) program. He is also credited with putting a personal

computer on the desks of each student and faculty member in 1983, long before it was commonplace. Also in 1983, Paul worked closely with Governor Tom Kean to found the first New Jersey Governor's School in the Sciences—an intensive summer program at Drew—which brings the brightest New Jersey high school students to campus. Every year one or more seniors are awarded the Hardin Prize, endowed by Winifred Baldwin and Inez Nelbach, to recognize the students who best exemplify his ideals and accomplishments.

Of his passing, President MaryAnn Baenninger said, "Paul truly epitomizes a visionary leader whose dedication to higher education benefits not only the students of today but also tomorrow."

Paul left Drew to serve as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, a position he held until his retirement in 1995. At the time, Board of Trustees Chair Nancy Schaenen told *The Acorn*, "This has taken hard work, courage, a willingness to run risks, enthusiasm for the job, a lovely sense of humor and enduring optimism. He will be difficult to replace."

Paul, the son of a Methodist minister and bishop, attended Duke University, graduating Phi Beta Kappa, and continued to Duke University School of Law, serving as editor-in-chief of the *Duke Law Journal* and graduating first in his class. Following a stint in the Army, he worked as an attorney and taught in Duke Law School before beginning his career as a university president.
