Ham radio classics

Galaxy V provided great value, engineering for '60s SSB rigs By George Misic, KE8RN

The Galaxy V 80-to-10 meter transceiver is one of my favorite rigs from the 1960s. I sold and serviced the Galaxy when I worked at Bernie's Ham Shack on East 21st St. while in high school.

The Galaxy competed with the Drake TR-3, TR-4, and Swan 350/400. It was priced lower than Drake offerings, and priced with the Swan 350.

Like the Drake, Collins S-line, KWM-2 and National NCX-5, the Galaxy used a tuning VFO that covered a fixed range on all bands. It wasn't switched like the tuning oscillator in the Swan 350 and most non-Drake and non-Collins receivers of the time. This made rigs like the Swan less stable on the higher bands, and caused the tuning rate to change on various bands.

The Galaxy mixed the internal VFO with a very stable crystal oscillator to get the needed injection frequencies. Like many rigs of the era, it had a 9 MHz IF frequency. For tri-band radios (80/40/20 meters) like the Galaxy, 75/80 meters was covered by subtracting the VFO from the IF, and 20 meters by adding the VFO to the IF.

The Galaxy, like the Drake TR3/4 and Collins, used a crystal oscillator to shift the VFO to the needed frequency range. This scheme was widely used, and is identified by the radio tuning in opposite directions on 80 and 20 meters.

To keep costs low, while providing many features, the Galaxy III & V had optional plug-in calibrators and VOX units. Higher priced rigs like Collins and Drake had these features built in.

All Galaxy models had selectable sideband on all bands. Initially, the Galaxy ran 300 watts PEP with a pair of GE color TV horizontal sweep tubes in the final. (Swan seemed to favor RCA while Drake used Sylvanias.) Using the original brand of tubes usually allowed replacement without neutralization.



The Galaxy V was upgraded to a Mark II and later Mark III models with increased power; the triband Galaxy was dropped. Later, the Galaxy became a slightly larger model, the GT-550, that ran 550 watts PEP, but used much of the original Galaxy design.

The Galaxy rigs were built by Galaxy Electronics, the heir to the old World Radio Labs mail-order company started by Leo Myerson that made the Globe Scout and other transmitters. Leo has a QCWA chapter named in his honor in California.

These rigs still work fine today. I have a collection of all the Galaxy models. I recently picked up a GT-550 at this year's Dayton Hamvention. ■

He designed several prototypes for 160 to 6 meters, and reports that there were about 300 units sold during 1982-1983 for 80, 40 and 20 meters. The nifty little units featured a digital
