## Sailing School Report to the AGM January 2006

The Sailing school has come and gone for the 2005 season. I believe the year was a success; we added about \$2,000.00 to the bank balance, and still purchased some \$18,000.00 worth of boats for the Bronze program. Participation was excellent in most classes; the first 2 in July fully booked and the 1st in August having a 50% fill rate, the last class in August was also full.

Under the watchful eye of Amy Guest our head instructor, the school enjoyed tremendous success in regard to planned activities and relationships with the New things to look forward to in 06 include the pro-Marina and the house committee.

This year Nick Allinson joined us after completing his Green instructor course over the winter months. Nick and Mackenzie fulfilled dual duty instructing the Adult course on Tuesday and Thursday Nights. A note in the first course one of the students went and bought a boat. The feed back from the adults was great with one Student in the first course baking goodies for the instructors and throwing a party for them at the end of the course. (Thanks Rose you are so thoughtful, and it was very much appreciated) With the help of Bruce Anderson we were able to include some Bronze sailors in the Thursday night racing program, this proved very successful to all involved.

The Dinghy regatta in the late spring was a huge success and will be included in our program next year with even more twists and turns.

We purchased two new 420 boats from PS 2000 this year; they arrived amidst a Dock strike in Vancouver the night before the first Class. Many thanks to all that helped, and special thanks as always to Sarah Visser for her tireless help and her meticulous attention to detail that made my job a very rewarding and easier one.

posal to introduce a 7<sup>th</sup> Hunter 140 into the fleet. This will allow us to have a boat for an expanded Bronze program and will also permit White sail 3 sailors to be separated from the 1 and 2 Fleet to allow for a more in-depth sail training experience for these proficient sailors.

It is my recommendation that we do this every year, thus eliminating a whole bunch of boats reaching end of life at the same time, costing a lot in ongoing up-

The Shed will need some work over the upcoming years but its size and capacity are just fine, just needs some routine maintenance.

We will be introducing a meet and greet prior to the first class to enable parents and students to tour the

I'm writing this just after driving back from Toronto through some pretty snowy weather. Of course my thoughts are on summer and boating, and in particular, safe boating. One of my responsibilities as Fleet Captain is to promote safety on the water, and to that end, I have invited Bill Visser to run a couple of seminars leading to the Pleasure Craft Operator Card (PCOC). See Bill's announcement elsewhere in the Mixer for the details. One of the sessions is late April, before most of the boats are launched, and the second is late May, just before Collins Bay Marina's Safe Boating day. If you do not have the PCOC yet, I strongly urge you to take one of Bill's seminars to get the card.

On the topic of safety, the PCOC represents a minimum level of knowledge required to operate safely (or at least legally) on the water. There are lots of other courses and training events that people have taken to improve their skills (and by extension, their safety) using their boat.

The Club would like to find out what other training events members are interested in. Some people have suggested trying to get a discount for some of the Power and Sail Squadron courses; hosting some of

those courses; and running our own events, such as a crew-overboard seminar. Please let me know your thoughts and I'll see what the Club can organize.

The other item I would like to bring to your attention is June 24, 2006. In the past, the Club has run Sailpast and Family Day on the same day. Based on members' feedback, the day has been reformatted, and now includes Sailpast; dinghy racing and a barbeque to welcome new members to the club – and to feed the existing members! Details about the day will come in the next issues of the Mixer and on the webpage, but my request here is for volunteers to help with the day's events. We had tremendous success with dinghy racing and barbeques last year – let's make this year's events even better.

#### 2006 Cruises


