96 MS-13 gang members, associates charged in LI investigation, DA says

(CBCR Site) In Suffolk County, nine leaders of local MS-13 cliques, along with nearly 90 ranking members were arrested- marking the largest takedown of this nature for a group that has long terrorized parts of Long Island. Although this is a remarkable success, local officials say the investigation into this gang is still ongoing.

Afterschool Key to Preventing Juvenile Crime, But Too Often Isn't Available

New research from *Fight Crime: Invest in Kids*, a part of the Council for a Strong America, shows that the hours after school can be hazardous for unsupervised youth. Using original data and FBI statistics, the group found that the four hours after school lets out (2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.), a time when many parents are still at work, is a time when youth are most likely to get in trouble with the police.

Cincinnati Set to Triple the Use of ShotSpotter Technology in 2020

(CBCR Site) ShotSpotter, a technology that can recognize and report the sound of gunfire, is set to expand into six new Cincinnati neighborhoods this coming year. Its installation in the Avondale neighborhood led to a 50% reduction in shootings. While many support the use of this new technology, opponents question the tool's effectiveness. In at least one locality, this technology was banned after missing some gunshots.

From above, Miami-Dade police drone recorded crack cocaine sale live. It's a first, cops say

(CBCR Site) Traditionally Police surveillance "[came] from a cop hiding in a tree, an unmarked car or a nearby building." However, in a recent drug bust in Miami-Dade County, surveillance came from a drone 3100-feet in the air. This is the first time Miami-Dade police have used a drone to capture real-time evidence for a criminal investigation, and it likely won't be the last time.

How 2 Milwaukee Visual Artists are Working to Reduce Gun Violence in the City

(CBCR Site) Two Milwaukee artists have launched a poster campaign that local officially hope will deter gun violence in the city. Through a partnership with Clear Channel Outdoor and the Milwaukee Health Department Office of Violence Prevention, Guns Down Miltown, Denzel Johnson and Gideon Verdin created images now featured at eight bus shelters scattered throughout the city. Verdin stated that "the images are designed to combat the negative images young people are exposed to every day through TV and social media."

In New Approach to Policing, St. Louis Cops get Partners on Patrol

(CBCR Site) Shamika Richardson was the victim of a home invasion, where two men forcibly entered her house, terrorized her family, and stuck a gun in her mouth. Within eight hours of the crime 19-year-old, Shamika Richardson, was answering questions from two volunteer community health workers interested in connecting her with social services. They accompanied St. Louis officers and asked her about her education plans, access to transportation, childcare, and career aspirations.



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Novel partnership between police and theatre group leads to huge crime reduction in Peterhead

The Modo performing arts group has teamed with the Peterhead police department in a new initiative at Drummer's circle aimed at battling anti-social behavior with the youth. Since the initiative began, vandalism has decreased by nearly 50% at targeted "troubled spots." In 2016, Modo circus created an "encounter café" to show troubled youth a new way of living.

<u>Police praise 'Smart Street Light' program as a crime-solving tool; wary critics want more oversight</u>

San Diego police are praising a new technology that places cameras in streetlights, calling it "a highly effective tool". Police Chief Nisleit even referred to them as "a game-changer." There is at least one example of this technology providing the evidence to catch a killer.

Residents' concerns lead to major Kensington drugs, guns bust: Police

(CBCR Site) Recently, a sting in the Kensington area lead to the arrest of over 200 suspected dealers and the seizure of military-style assault weapons, and illegal drugs, including cocaine, crack-cocaine, methamphetamine, synthetic marijuana, and heroin. In total, the seized drugs are worth almost \$600,000. All this stemmed from police listening to local residents. Police stated that "with help from the FBI and DEA, [we] conducted the operation in the past week, following complaints from residents in Kensington and Fairhill."

Building Community Leadership for Sustainable Crime Reduction



Combining Revitalization and Community Safety

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The CBCR Model

Across the nation, CBCR sites connect diverse stakeholders- including residents, researcher partners, law enforcement, and service providers-to identify crime drivers and promote strategies that reduce crime, increase collective efficacy, and build trust between communities and police.

Data-Driven: CBCR targets hot spots- micro places with spatial and temporal crime concentrations. Researchers are engaged with helping sites identify challenges, assess solutions, and measure progress.

Community-Oriented: CBCR allows residents to lead the charge in identifying problems, selecting strategies, and developing safer communities.

Spurs Revitalization: CBCR focuses on problem priorities, unemployment, transit barriers, and service gaps related to crime.

Builds Partnerships: CBCR uses the resources of public, non-profit, and community leaders to create strategies to combat longstanding crime problems.
