

Recommended Procedure

This book will be read one section at a time using DRTA (Directed Reading Thinking Activity) Method. This technique involves reading a section, and predicting what will happen next (making good guesses) based on what has already occurred in the story. Students continue to read and verify predictions at the end of each chapter. (See pages 5-6 of this guide.)

Discussion Questions

- 1. Look at the picture of Ira. How does he feel? (p. 3)
- 2. What do you think Ira's problem is? p. 4 (List responses.)
- 3. Why does Ira think his sister's question is silly? (p. 5)
- 4. How does Ira feel once his sister explains what she meant? (p. 7) What is Ira's problem?
- 5. Look at the pictures. In each picture Ira has a different expression. What do you think he is thinking? feeling? (p. 10-11)

Supplementary Activity

Story Map: Many stories have the same parts—a setting, a problem, a goal, and a series of events that lead up to an ending or conclusion. These story elements can be placed on a story map. Just as a road map leads a driver from one place to another, so, too, a story map leads a reader from one point to another. (Place story map on large sheet of paper and ask the class for information to help fill it.) See page 9 of this guide for an example.

- 3. After Ira talks to his parents and sister, what does he decide to do? Who has the most influence on his decision? Why? (p. 15) What would you do?
