For those of you lucky enough to have already shared an evening with Neshama, this is a chance to introduce her to your family.

Neshama's rendition of traditional and modern Jewish music, both on her recordings and in her appearances at concerts across the country, has thrilled millions. The daughter of the late **Rabbi Schlomo Carlebach**, she continues his tradition, begun in the late 1950's, of performing historical religious selections as well as classic Hebrew folksongs before live audiences. Following in his footsteps, Neshama has performed in concerts in Israel, Europe, South Africa, Canada and all across this United States.

Some of her appearances have included concerts at San Francisco's Gershwin Theater, at New York's Manhattan Showcase, and before a growing number of synagogue audiences, such as Adath Israel in New York City.

The concert begins at 5 p.m. on Father's Day, at the **Larkin High School** auditorium, 1475 Larkin Avenue in Elgin.

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From the Rabbi's Study...

A Pesach Carroll

One of my favorite commentaries on the *haggadah* comes from Lewis Carroll. I don't say that the reverend gentleman of Christ Church, the author of *Alice in Wonderland*, intended a *Pesach* sermon, but his words still serve, in the form of four quatrains from his epic poem, *The Hunting of the Snark*.

We start with the question, "What does it mean to be free?" Carroll supplies the answer for each of the *Haggada's* four sons.

For the Simple Son, he writes of a ship's Bellman:

"He had bought a large map representing the sea, Without the least vestige of land: And the crew were much pleased when they found it to be A map they could all understand."

That's the Simple Son's idea of freedom: a world of no restrictions. You can go in

any direction. You just can't get anywhere.

Thank goodness our world is not like that. We need things in the way that we can trip over and bump into. And so we answer the Simple Son: Being free means restraining our actions.

Then we have the Wicked Son:

"'What's the good of Mercator's North Poles and Equators, Tropics, Zones, and Meridian Lines?' So the Bellman would cry: and the crew would reply 'They are merely conventional signs!'"

"Okay," says the Wicked Son."You have your land. But why all those other markings on the map?

"You want restrictions?" he says. "I have restrictions. I don't steal. I don't lie. That's what my map needs. I've got ethics. There's my spiritual coastline. All those ritual things are just doohickies that the mapmaker put in."

Yes, perhaps, maybe, but—no map will guide a sailor who doesn't know where he is. Let the sailor find a landmark. Help him turn his map into a guide. And so we answer the Wicked Son, "Those doohickies show us where we are. Tell us, where are you?"

As for the Son Who Does Not Know How to Ask, Carroll writes:

"Then the bowsprit got mixed with the rudder sometimes

A thing, as the Bellman remarked, That frequently happens in tropical climes, When a vessel is, so to speak, 'snarked.'"

That's where most of us seem to be. We're pretty snarked, wondering how to follow the map when our ship is stuck inside out and backwards. For this son, the Haggada teaches, we have to open up. That's all, it says. Just open up, do something, and begin.

And the Wise Son:

"But the principal failing occurred in the sailing, And the Bellman, perplexed and

And the Bellman, perplexed and distressed,

Said he had hoped, at least, when the wind blew due East, That the ship would not travel due West!"

There is a wind blowing. The ship may not yet respond, but the Wise Son feels it. It blows to the East. Up anchor, get unsnarked, and we sail. All four together. Next year in Jerusalem.



A Message from Our President

Recently I attended a talk by Arnold Eisen, the new Chancellor Elect for the Jewish Theological Seminary, at North Suburban Synagogue. During the past several months Chancellor Eisen has been occupied with what can be accurately described as an informational road show, giving talks at various synagogues across the country. While he made clear that his intent was to share his vision for JTS, it was by no means a one-way conversation with the larger Jewish community. Dr. Eisen is also gathering opinions and ideas for the future direction of Conservative Judaism.

One of the main points of his message that struck a chord with me was the following:

"What we stand for is the conviction that the freedom to criticize goes along with and strengthens our commitment. It does not undermine it. Knowing *Torah* well, inside and out (which means knowing the disagreements that Jews have had about *Torah* and adding to that conversation ourselves) – this is the key to building the future."

Dr. Eisen views divergence of opinion as the growth medium for allowing our movement to accept change, within the context of principles contained in the

Torah School News

Another story from Reverend Meyer that made

me think about life and our *Torah* School.

A woman and a handful of her family and friends gathered on a grassy hillside overlooking Half Moon Bay in Northern California to bury her husband. When the graveside committal was done, the widow stood on the verdant slopes of Skyline Memorial Park and watched the autumn sun beginning to set over the blue Pacific. It was then she said, "Isn't it lovely? We picked this spot because it had such a great view." And then her voice wistfully trailed off. "Roger always wanted a table with a view."

"He always wanted a table with view." As I heard more about Roger's life, I realized that epitaph fit him perfectly. Not surprisingly, he worked hard. He made it through college on an academic scholarship, then slowly began to rise up the corporate ladder of a chemical engineering company. In time, he began to reap the harvest of his labors – larger and larger homes in nicer and nicer neighborhoods, more impressive cars, grander vacations – all the things he wanted. He didn't want the failure of his first marriage or one child in trouble with drugs and the other hardly ever speaking to him.

When he died, Roger had a big in-theground pool and a house whose dining room looked out on the Bay. He had a corner office that overlooked the Golden Gate Bridge, and he had enough clout at the best of restaurants to get "a table with view."

I guess there's a little bit of Roger in all of us. But in the busy routine of our days and our struggles to gain some external validation that says we've made it, maybe we put too much emphasis on "a table with a view" and actually forget to "view the table we have."

Here we are at Passover, resurrecting those once-a-year recipes and setting the table we have with those intriguing Passover items that might be new and contemporary or inherited and sentimental. And soon all that marvelous food will grace the table, and we will all enjoy the feast.

Now take a step back and **view the table you have.** What an extraordinary epiphany! It isn't the table with a view that's important. It's viewing the table we have with all the blessings that have come our way.

How often I have been at meetings where principals have talked about their schools. I have walked through their synagogues and have seen their classrooms, equipment, facilities, and materials. "Wow," I've thought, "what we at CKI could do if we had a table with that view." But we don't. We're neither that kind of community nor do we have that kind of cash flow or financial cushion. So I stop thinking about that and say to myself, "View the table we have." And, my friends, we have set a table of which we can be so very proud.

The table of *Torah* School has an energy, life, vitality, and brightness that brings love and laughter and joy in learning. And we have a community that helps us in so many ways, by rolling up their sleeves to do work and by giving us donations that enable us to buy a little more, do a little more, give our children a little more.

As I view the table we have, I see some wonderful things for April. The children will again participate in Passover Stations, where they will learn about the major elements of the seder. On Friday evening the 13th, we will have Kindergarten Consecration. That following Sunday, Marilyn Price, puppeteer, author and storyteller, will be here to do an entire morning of interactive sessions with our students. Following two extraordinary Confirmation Classes in March about Israel with Dr. Roddy Frankel and Gary Kenzer, Dr. Frankel returns to Confirmation to show the students how to navigate important sites to glean information about Israel and the Middle East and talk about anti-semitism. We have our last Junior Congregation of the year on Saturday morning, April 21st with Lucy Marshall as our "cantor." Then on Sunday, April 29th, vocalist, guitarist and Israeli folk dancer Naomi Bayer is here to entertain and teach the children. And looking ahead to May 6th, we all go to *Etz Chaim* in Lombard for the Walk With Israel!

We do have a blessed table! It's a pretty full one, for sure. And you see, sometimes the true wonder of our table is not so much where we are sitting and how gorgeous a view we might have, but what we are doing to improve the table we've set, and viewing it knowing that it will serve us well, and shower us with immeasurable rewards.

Let us teach our children that if they're asked which table is for them, this is the answer. "I will not live a life in pursuit of a table with a view. I will view the table I have." Let them reap the learning, the loving, and the laughter of that table – the one that teaches them about Judaism and being good, kind and compassionate people. Let that be their epitaph.

Torah. Change takes place not by abandoning *Halachah* (Jewish Law) but by finding new directions based on that law. From this idea he articulated three main challenges that he is setting for JTS:

1) Defining what is Conservative Judaism – He is unwilling to settle for the traditional explanation, which simply states that we fall somewhere between Reform and Orthodox Judaism. In his words, "Come on: we have a proud history, a history of ideas, of values and commitments, which distinguishes us. I think that we know that this is a movement that really does stand for something." I believe Dr. Eisen is concerned about the ambiguity that many of us see in our movement, the perception that it lacks a clear mission.

2) Working on improving the quality of our institutions - Here he is talking about all institutions, including synagogues, camps, schools and, yes, even the quality of clergy produced by JTS. While recognizing that there is a need to improve he describes it not as a crisis but rather as an opportunity: from each chapter in the Chicago region physically contributes to the completion of the *Torah* on this night by assisting the *sofer* in writing one letter in the scroll. Our USY President, Molly Rosenfeld, represents CKI in fulfilling this *mitzvot*.

Sunday, April 22nd is the date for our final joint chapter event of the year: Lunch and Bowling at Elgin Lanes for USY & Kadima. Fifth graders are invited to attend as a welcome and introduction to Kadima, which they are eligible to join next year.

Finally, on the weekend of April 27-29, *Kinnus* will take place - the culminating event of the year for our Regional USY.

Looking ahead to May, elections for 2007-2008 USY Officers will be held during the Board Meeting on May 7th at 8pm. All members from 8th-12th grade are encouraged to attend and VOTE!

3) Restructuring and Reorganizing – Dr. Eisen used the example of Stanford University which, during his tenure, had gone through multiple reorganizations. As someone from the corporate world, I tend to view the term "reorganization" with as much enthusiasm as a visit to the dentist's office. However, here the context is more about the approach taken when dealing with Jewish issues in the modern world,

We are trying to fit 21st-century ideas inside structures and organizations that are fifty and 100 years old. And if they don't fit, there is a reason for that. So, here is another area where we have a lot of work to do. Here is another area that fills me with confidence. The message here is, taking a frank look at our institutions, including those at JTS, and being open to making changes where it is necessary—not being hidebound by doing things the same way simply because that's always the way they've been done.

Perhaps you have noticed that the Chancellor Elect has not provided a clear-cut road map but defined some basic questions that need to be addressed by our movement. He is asking us to participate in this process by sending in our ideas and questions to the JTS Web site: www.jtsa.edu/progs/phi/areisen/ facon.shtml

Where would you like to see our movement change (or not change)? How can our Conservative Movement become more meaningful to you in your life and those of our own community? Those are the questions that Dr. Eisen is asking us.

Earth Day 2007

When we baby-boomers were little, the longevity of the State of Israel was far more uncertain than today. In that era, we young children earnestly saved our dimes to purchase "stamps" for *Tu BiSh'vat* tree certificates. My own children could never quite

understand how spring could come to Israel (but not Elgin) in February. As a result, we developed a family custom of always planting a tree or shrub on Earth Day and blessing it in hopes that it would flourish.

In March, the kids and I would make a pilgrimage to a garden center. I also allowed them to select their own vegetable favorites. Those little envelopes held such large expectations! Tomatoes were planted in little starter cups in our basement, dutifully watered (and often accidentally drown). By April we



turned the soil in the garden and planted snow peas, carrots, spinach and radishes. The children never managed to plant the seeds within the straight furrows, but God germinated the seeds just the same. As my children matured, various neighborhood pre-schoolers replaced my children as "gardening assistants." Trust me, there is nothing quite like arriving home on a spring day, to be welcomed by small children in your driveway awaiting your arrival asking, "Shar-we, can we garden today?" I hope each of you has the joyous experience of planting with a small child, because you don't have to be little to play in the mud.

Earth Day this year is Sunday, April 22nd. As we go to press, a variety of activities are being planned to help your family observe the day. Come that Sunday to the Social Action table in the Social Hall and pick up materials and ideas. We often ask what we personally can do to help in any given issue. Change the light bulbs in your fixtures to long-lasting CFL "pig-tails." Carpool or bike more frequently. Recycle more often. Invest your 401(k) in socially conscious "green" corporations. Watch the film "An Inconvenient Truth" to learn more about the effects of CO² on our planet. Did you know that you can require ComEd to supply your residence with electricity manufactured by windmill power? Please plan to make several positive changes on April 22nd. *Make a commitment* to help lessen greenhouse gases. Saving the planet is not the responsibility of Superman; all of us need to help.

Ritually Speaking

The recitation of *yizkor* prayers on *Yom Kippur* always seems to draw a large crowd at synagogues everywhere. There are some who, though never coming to any other service the entire year, and not even formally members of a synagogue, will make every effort to attend a *Yom Kippur yizkor* service.

Actually, *yizkor*, a special memorial prayer for one's deceased relatives, is recited in the synagogue four times a year: on *Yom Kippur*, but also on the final days of *Sukkot*, Passover, and *Shavuot*.

This year, the final day of Passover is Tuesday, April 10th. To follow *halakhah* and custom, a special festival service, including *yizkor* prayers, is to be held at CKI that morning beginning at 8:30. To accommodate those who must go to work afterwards, the service concludes at 9:30. To insure that services conclude as scheduled, it helps immeasurably to have as many people as possible be here at the scheduled start. "*Yizkor*" actually means "remember." So remember your loved ones by attending services on the morning of April 10th, and remember to be there for the start, at 8:30.

ear your hiking shoes! We go to Bluff Spring Fen for an easy walk before dinner at the home of Herb and Medina Gross.

Bluff Spring Fen is an Illinois Nature Preserve owned by the City of Elgin and the Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago. A "fen" is a special wetland community created by water seeping from the ground that is alkaline (not acidic, as in a bog) and has a high mineral content. The ecosystem surrounding the spring harbors many unique and rare plant species. In addition, surrounding the Bluff Spring Fen community there are dry-hill prairies and oak savannas. Naturalist Steve Byers says the view here is the view the pioneers had when they first came to Illinois.

Our guide will be Doug Taron, who has been a steward of the Fen since 1982 and is the Curator of Biology at the Peggy Notebart Nature Museum in Chicago.

To get to the Fen, take Bluff City Boulevard south from Route 20 or east from Route 25 to the Bluff City Cemetery and follow the signs, or just follow the roads to the southwest corner of the cemetery.

Parking is limited at the Fen. Please arrange carpools beforehand (check with Medina) or meet at the synagogue parking lot. The tour is scheduled for 4 pm. If you are late, you will have to catch up with us. Afterwards we will have a dairy potluck dinner at the home of Herb and Medina Gross, 833 Prospect, Elgin. JUF Creates Israel-Focused Grant Program Joining Chicago and Israeli Teens

What if someone gave you \$25,000 to help make Israel a better place? Would you spend it, for instance, on food programs for Israel's hungry? Rehabilitation for people wounded in terror attacks or during wartime? Literacy programs for Ethiopian immigrants who are among the poorest people in Israel?

These are some of the issues that 20 teenagers from the Chicago area and 10 from JUF's Partnership 2000 region of *Kiryat Gat-Lechish* and *Shafir* will examine this coming fall in *Kolot*: The Israel-Centered Teen Giving Circle.

Through *Kolot*, the Jewish United Fund/Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago will give the American and Israeli teens a minimum of \$25,000 to allocate to Israeli non-profits. The group, which will operate as a real philanthropic foundation, will jointly research Israel's needs, and learn about philanthropy and grant-making. The program is made possible by a generous anonymous donation to The Centennial Campaign. Federation capital and endowment initiative to provide for the future of Chicago's Jewish community, and the Fel Pro/Mecklenburder Foundation.

"Chicago teens will work side by side with their Israeli peers to alleviate hardship in Israel and make Israel stronger and more vibrant," said Hallie Shapiro Devir, director of Federation's youth Initiatives. "We are asking them to use their passions, their abilities and their voices to put their ideals in action."

Over winter break, the Chicago teens will travel to Israel on a fact-finding mission, joining their Israeli peers on site visits to non-profits and performing community service. In the spring, the Israelis will come to Chicago where they will learn about Chicago's Jewish community. To apply, teenagers must be entering the 10th-12th grades in the 2007-08 school year. They will be expected to make an anonymous contribution to the grant pool which can be as low as \$10.00. Every dollar personally contributed by the American teens will be matched dollar for dollar up to \$1,000 per participant by a local private foundation. The program is free, but students will be expected to pay for their own travel expenses which are expected to cost about \$1,800. Scholarships are available.

JUF is Illinois' largest social services provider. Each year, JUF-supported social-welfare education and relief programs serve 300,000 Jews and non-Jews throughout the Chicago area and more than 2 million people in Israel and around the world.
