








Fort Lauderdale Campus Event Locations

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

Since Rousseau's Emile we have become increasingly aware of the importance of play in learning: "[The ideal child] would run about barefoot all year round, upstairs, downstairs, and in the garden..." While many of our students wish they could do this, an increasing number find their ludic learning in the world of computer games. Using some cheap, free and widely available computer games, Ewan will take the session on a creative writing and speaking journey, before inviting participants to explore some other web-based games and stories which can help stimulate the creative juices in even the most reluctant learners. We will also take a look at how no-tech or lo-tech lessons can be drawn from video games culture, lessons for building curriculum in new ways, and ideas for the technology-challenged classroom.

W3 - A New Bag of Tricks Egan Auditorium AC 5

Kristy Britt, University of South Alabama Terri Wilbanks, University of South Alabama

It's hard to keep up with the changing resources available on the World Wide Web, so we've compiled a resource list for foreign language faculty. By "resource list" we mean a list of predominantly free websites that faculty can utilize in the classroom. In compiling this list we considered various criteria such as: cost, ease of implementation, availability, user-friendliness, appropriateness of language level, pedagogy, philosophy, and teaching styles. At the session, we will outline a sample of what we have found to be available, successful, and ready to use in the classroom. Greek, Latin, German, French, and Spanish sources will cover different areas such as grammar, vocabulary, and culture. Additionally, ideas will be presented on how to incorporate these sites into lesson plans. Participants will have handson practice and are encouraged to bring the addresses of their favorite free websites.

W4 - Imagine the Possibilities! I.C.I. Lecture Hall

Norah Jones, Vista Higher Learning Participants enter the *Imagina* and *Imaginez*. programs to go on lively linguistic and cultural tours of the Spanish- and French-speaking worlds. In an integrated demonstration lesson plan, we'll watch short films, read and listen to cultural magazine features and literature, listen to music, do research, and practice language skills, all by using text and the latest multimedia and web technologies. Participants will experience the thought-provoking content and methodology for themselves and see how the content encourages the development of a community of learners in the classroom. Experience of the materials is followed by discussion, as participants reflect on how the programs may be structured to provide upper-level language students with motivational and effective instruction that integrates skills, content, and culture. Texts and support materials provided to each participant.

Methods: Demonstration (through texts, visual and audio media, internet, and PowerPoint), hands-on practice (with various materials in classroom simulation), and small- and whole-group discussion

Benefits: Participants observe and practice specific methodologies to integrate contemporary culture and technology in instruction in the Spanish or French language classroom. Participants learn how and why to use such culture-based technological tools as film, music, and student-centered language and cultural research activities; how to plan lessons to make optimal and comfortable use of technological instructional tools; and how to provide differentiated instruction and assessment using such tools and methodologies. Throughout, we all learn and discuss together how such content and tools can create a sense of the classroom as community while connecting the community of the classroom to the world – so as to prepare motivated and skilled citizens for the future.

Ewan McIntosh, New Technologies Research Practitioner, Learning and Teaching Scotland

New technology fascinates us and daunts us. All this talk of blogs, podcasts, wikis, photosharing, Google Earth, online bookmarking, massive multi-user online games can be reduced, though, to five underpinning principles through which we can adapt our practice and engage students like never before. As a teacher, how can you use social networks to further your own learning and development? How can you learn to use these with your students to run international or classroom-based collaborative projects, get students organizing and sharing their own learning and get students so engaged with languages that you can't stop them learning?

Otmar Foelsche, Dartmouth College Jason Nash, Dartmouth College

The presentation will address issues of production and delivery of digital materials on equipment that is available in the K-12 environment as well as in higher education. On the production side we'll discuss the various types of source materials, file formats, the digitizing, editing, and quality and compression options. Among the various compression options, we'll spend a little time dealing with Apple's X-Grid and PodCast producer environments that may have great potential in education. On the delivery side we'll discuss server options in Windows, Linux, and Macintosh environments. We'll also take a very brief look at risk management, security, and copyright issues that, by necessity, need to be dealt with in this context. The presentation is based on the experience of eleven years of network delivered media on the Dartmouth College campus. Our objective in this presentation is to take out the complexity of media production and delivery and demonstrate that it is possible, with a minimal investment, to start building a system that is flexible, scalable, compatible, and can be integrated with today's and future delivery systems like Blackboard, Sakai, and Moodle.

There will be enough time for questions and answers at the end of the session. A staff member (Jason Nash) will participate in this session via video chat and can answer specific technical questions.

10:30 am – 11:15 am Sing Your Way to Spanish with Jody Middle School 103

Jody Dreher, Sing Your Way to Spanish Musical method of learning Spanish for bilingual and immersion programs. Uses music, games, drama, and other of distance language course - Intermediate - offered activities which promote long-term retention while simultaneously spicing up classroom routines. Mundane vocabulary and grammar lessons become games and activities students want more of (e.g. subject pronouns, noun-adjective agreement). Musical theatre in the classroom motivates students to want to participate. Primarily for elementary with applications for middle/high school students. Teacher endorsed. No musical talent required. Participants will leave inspired!

10:30 am - 11:15 am Interactive Videoconference in a Modern Language Classroom Middle School 109

Linda Crescimano, Pine Crest School Pat Freund, Pine Crest School

The hardware to videoconference peer to peer with other schools and to facilitate virtual tours with museums and educational institutions is available now that allows you to connect anywhere in the world using the Internet. This equipment can be portable and wheeled into any classroom to instantly give you the ability to reach anywhere in the world. We will begin by discussing the equipment and set up necessary to have an interactive videoconference in your classroom. We will review the etiquette of participating in videoconferences and tips for successful experiences. Two searchable databases will be explored that list and have links to current distance learning content.

We will connect with the Cleveland Museum of Art to showcase the distance learning opportunities that this remarkable museum offers. Learn about the works of Impressionist and Post-Impressionists painters such as Monet, Degas, Van Gogh and Cézanne whose experiments with the effects of different conditions of light and paint application created a new way of seeing the world. The world these artists shared had much in common with our own era of rapid technological change and, in general, a rising standard of living. Sessions are offered in English, Spanish, and French. The session will wrap up with questions.

The learning community is ever-expanding its horizons and including more and different groups of students, many of which are no longer tied to the traditional classroom. Alternatives such as distance learning courses, both tied to or independent of a traditional on-campus class, have challenged the traditional methodologies of student performance measurement.

While in-class assessment is still the mainstay of measuring student performance, advances in technology have made available an array of tools which permit on-line assessment in addition to, or even replacing traditional in-class assessment. Furthermore, technology has permitted an expansion into the area of distance learning, which presents its own issues related to measurement of student performance.

This presentation will provide an overview and analysis of on-line assessment techniques as they relate to campus and distance learning contexts, as well as a comparative analysis of online vs. in-class assessment of student performance.

Jeffrey Samuels, Goucher College The Spanish and Technology course was developed at Marist College to appeal to students with interests in both content areas. For example, students who seek teacher certification in New York must meet technology standards as well as standards in their subject area of choice. The course therefore appeals especially, but not exclusively, to future language teachers. Although the course was developed as a face to face offering, the on-site instructor was unable to offer it in the Fall, 2007 semester. The presenter was given the opportunity to teach the course at a distance from his location in Baltimore, Maryland, using the Sakai learning management system and web 2.0 technologies. The course was redesigned to update the technology components to focus on web 2.0 and social computing; and the pedagogy focused on Problem-Based Instruction. Toward that end, the students met twice per week in the Language Resource Center, where they comprised the staff of a ficticious community organization dedicated to the Hispanic community of Poughkeepsie, New York. The instructor, who acted as the Director of this nonprofit organization, facilitated the founding of the community organization, the service to ficticious clients, and the compilation of a final report, all in the target language. In this presentation, the instructor / director will share experiences, lesson plans, and sample realia created by the students / employees of the non-profit.

The content of this session will include an introduction to the basic features and functionalities of the SmartBoard and examples of lessons and activities used for Spanish instruction. Of course, the instructional strategies used in these examples can be applied to all Modern Languages. Participants will leave this workshop with classroom resources as well as an understanding of how the SmartBoard works and how it can be used to help teach Modern Languages. Opportunities for hands-on experience with the SmartBoard will be provided.

3:30 pm – 4:15 pm To Blog or Not to Blog? – Pedagogical Implications of Blogging in Foreign Language Education Middle School 107

Marcel Rotter, University of Mary Washington

In my PowerPoint presentation, I investigate the pedagogical and organizational preconditions to

make blogging a tool in establishing a successful learning community. Beginning with a quick look back into media history, I compare expectation of new frontiers in learning at the arrival of new technologies and how they were met. I then establish a catalog of possible pedagogical implications based on my own experiences and on interviews with my colleagues and students. Finally, I contrast my theoretical framework with our recently launched blogging platform (based on WordPress) UMWblogs. Topics include blogging as process writing, revisions and annotations, anxiety to write in the Foreign language, the role of textual and audio-visual prompts for blogging, the role of the instructor and so on.

The presentation is directed towards high school and university teachers that are hesitant about blogging as well as experienced users of blogging in the FL classroom. I would like to conclude my presentation with a discussion on the experiences of others.

3:30 pm – 4:15 pm CPS IR for Language Learning and Assessment Middle School 104

Lee Howell, Pine Crest School This presentation will be given in English to demonstrate the variety of language learning and assessment activities available to language instructors using the Classroom Performance System (CPS IR) by eInstruction. Sample lessons, review activities, tests, and team games will be demonstrated in Spanish. The discussion will include how to use CPS as an assessment tool, importing class rosters and assigning Response Key Pads to capture individual student data. We will create a lesson, view reports and see how to import ExamView test banks into CPS. Supplementary handout materials will be provided. Over 50 leading publishers create and distribute ExamView-formatted questions with over 5,000 elementary, middle school, high school, and post-secondary textbooks.

3:30 pm – 4:15 pm Learning Programs International Middle School 103

Olivia Tamzarian, Learning Programs International

A 45-minute presentation that is relative to all language teachers but most specifically useful to high school and college teachers. I will speak about LPI, a study abroad/language immersion program designed to open students' eyes to the language and culture of

another country, while preparing them for the SAT II/AP exams and helping them to gain speaking, listening, writing, and reading skills. Students of all ages (usually 15-22 years) receive college credit for their classes abroad. Teachers can choose to go abroad with their students and can even customize a program for their own school, for which LPI collaborates with them on the dates, length of time, activities, class hours, etc. Teachers don't have to be involved in the program- they can simply attend the workshop and recommend the program to their students if they wish to do so. Students may sign up individually from any U.S. high school. My presentation includes a 10-minute informative slideshow with images of destinations that our students visit, as well as a 25-minute PowerPoint presentation that outlines what the most important aspects of the study abroad experience: room and board with host families, classes, activities, daily schedule, safety, etc. I discuss the benefits of study abroad, highlighting language acquisition, life experience in a foreign country, preparation for college, etc. Then I will usually answer questions for 5-10 minutes. I am very flexible and will tailor the presentation to the particular crowd. Since LPI is the high school division of ISA (International Studies Abroad) and I have experience with both our high school and college programs, if there are many college professors in the room then I will be sure to include those programs. For example, ISA offers programs in Argentina, Belgium, Chile, Costa Rica, Czech Republic, Domincan Republic., England, France, Italy, Mexico, Morroco, Peru, and Spain.

9:30 am - 10:15 am A New Bag of Tricks Boca Raton Middle School S103

Kristy Britt, University of South Alabama Terri Wilbanks, University of South Alabama

It's hard to keep up with the changing resources available on the World Wide Web, so we've compiled a resource list for foreign language faculty. By "resource list" we mean a list of predominantly free websites that faculty can utilize in the classroom. In compiling this list we considered various criteria such as: cost, ease of implementation, availability, user-friendliness, appropriateness of language level, pedagogy, philosophy, and teaching styles. At the session, we will outline a sample of what we have found to be available, successful, and ready to use in the classroom. Greek, Latin, German, French, and Spanish sources will cover different areas such as grammar, vocabulary, and culture.

9:30 am – 10:15 am Implementing Computer-Based Speech Technologies and Strategies in a Classroom without Walls Boca Raton Middle School S107

Robert G. Brito, McFatter Technical Center Aural-oral communication is the most important goal of any foreign language course. The presenter will demonstrate how innovative computer-based technologies are making this goal possible. Further, it will be proposed that appropriate Web-based resources can liberate the L2 learner from the

constraints of a walled classroom. These classrooms without walls are a reality by utilizing increasingly powerful and moderately priced computers that run robust speech and multimedia technologies accessed from the Internet.

Computer-based technologies will be discussed in light of how they can benefit L2 instruction and learning. Speech Technologies, specifically Text To Speech applications, are highlighted. Mr. Brito will discuss and demonstrate how L2 students coordinate the use of text to speech with the digital sound recorder, a word processor and the Internet. Classroom and individualized student activities, involving all four applications for intended aural-oral communication at fluency levels, will be demonstrated as the multimedia, web-based, Spanish for Business online course. It is expected that this presentation will be a springboard for further discussion and investigation among the participants.

Gilda Socarrás, Auburn University Student Response Systems (SRS) have been available to higher education for a quarter of a century and while many disciplines such as Economics, Science. Music and Statistics have taken advantage of this methodological tool, Foreign Languages have lagged behind. Perhaps one of the reasons for the delay pertains to the role of SRS in the communicative classroom. This session presents applications of the Classroom Performance System (CPS) in the Elementary Spanish Program at Auburn University, showing that clicking is not only a desirable option but a novel way to engage students in the learning process.

establish contacts through e-correspondence. They will be exposed to written and audio materials from textbooks used both in the USA and Spain. Teachers will be shown how to adapt special realia to their classes so as to achieve better social communication with business people in all parts of the Spanish speaking world.

11:30 am – 12:15 pm Cuaderno .2: Online Notebook and Writing Portfolio **Boca Raton Middle School S103**

Frances Matos-Schultz, University of Minnesota

This session will present and discuss an electronic writing portfolio developed by the Department of Spanish & Portuguese Studies and the University of Minnesota's CLA Language Center. Presenter will share the development process, samples, as well as students' and instructors' perspectives and reactions to Cuaderno which is a system for creating and managing web-based writing portfolios. Cuaderno allows instructors to create and then provide timely and contextualized feedback on online writing assignments via a system of color-coded markups. Students draft and submit their writing assignments online, and then receive their instructor's comments within the same Cuaderno environment. Students' works are archived in their portfolio, which they and their instructors can review at any time. A new version of Cuaderno has expanded the functions of this writing tool to accommodate needs and suggestions of both students and instructors. For example, now students can work collaboratively in group assignments as well as post comments and questions for their instructor and peers.

The Impact of Academic Podcasting on **Student Learning Outcomes: A National Endowment for the Humanities - Digital Humanities Initiative**

Boca Raton Middle School S107

Betty Rose Facer, Old Dominion University With an award from the National Endowment for the Humanities - Digital Humanities Initiative, the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures at Old Dominion University is building upon its Pilot Podcasting Project to determine if the use of podcasting technology in foreign language courses results in increased pedagogical effectiveness and greater student learning outcomes. This poster session will share findings from the project that is

currently developing effective strategies for incorporating the use of podcasting – disseminating audio programming over the internet – to improve foreign language instruction. The academic use of podcasting allows for 24/7-accessibility and portability of the teaching and learning experience that expands the boundaries of the classroom. It also will permit restructuring valuable classroom time and converting the popular ipod and other MP3 players into a multi-purpose teaching and learning tool that can be used to reinforce class content, improve pronunciation and vocabulary, and improve oral and aural skills. The popularity and ready availability of ipods (many students own them) will promote the use of podcasting as a pedagogical tool by college instructors, and its acceptance by students as a learning tool. Because podcasting does not require institutions to invest in expensive facilities, the instructional strategies developed by the project are likely to be widely adopted by college instructors, as well as instructors at the secondary level. By improving foreign language education, the project also will make an important contribution to preparing a workforce with the ability to function in an increasingly culturally, technologically and linguistically diverse environment.

A Distance Learning Russian Course with Blackboard

Boca Raton Middle School S103

George Mitrevski, Auburn University
This presentation describes an independent study, distance learning Russian course with Blackboard at Auburn University. The course is designed for motivated students who do not have access to regularly scheduled classes, or who prefer the option of learning Russian at their own pace. The cornerstone of the course is on Blackboard. Students learn Russian at their own pace using self-instructional materials and a variety of electronic resources. The course focuses on all four language skills: speaking, listening, reading and writing. Students have daily assignments that focus on each of

these skills. To help students stay on track, each assignment is due by a designated due date. This type of course allows quite a bit of freedom, but it does, however, entail quite a bit of self-discipline and determination in order to keep up with assignments. The textbook for this course is *Nachalo*, and it includes a variety of audio and video clips. The video program that accompanies this course presents selected scenes from the storyline comprising the readings in each lesson. The video clips have been digitized and placed on a secure server, and students are provided links to them in the course schedule.

Building Learning Communities and Cultural Knowledge with Twitter Boca Raton Middle School S107

Sharon Scinicariello, University of Richmond

Twitter is a social networking tool that rapidly became popular in 2007. It has several features that make it worth exploring as a tool for building learning communities and fostering connections with other languages and cultures. This presentation introduces Twitter and shows examples of how it is being used to create learning communities among technology-using teachers. Especially valuable is the ease with which Twitter users cross not only national boundaries but also the ones that exist between ESL and FL teachers and, more importantly, between K-12 and post-secondary teachers. Other examples will show how Twitter can be used to build connections with other languages and cultures. For example, following tweets from global news organizations promotes awareness of issues that are important outside the U.S. and can help build the vocabulary needed to discuss them. Following tweets from individuals in other cultures can offer insights into daily life. Finally, the participants in this session will consider possible classroom uses of Twitter. For example, sending tweets about their daily activities can help motivate novice writers. Although Twitter is easy to use, there are some practical considerations involved in its educational use. This presentation will include information on privacy, Twitter clients, other implementation issues, and other "microblogging" applications.

The presenter will show examples of Twitter communications and ask the participants to consider how this kind of communication can help build learning communities and cultural connections. Participants will then brainstorm classroom applications and consider implementation issues. They will receive handouts (probably virtual) with

Twitter examples, resources, and links to similar applications.

Participants in this session will learn how a new tool can help them as professionals and introduce their students to authentic communication from other cultures. They will leave with resources to help them use the tool effectively.

Designing, Implementing, and Supporting an Integrated Media Delivery Platform Boca Raton Middle School S103

Peter Janssens, Georgetown University Susan Pennestri, Georgetown University In 2003 Georgetown University choose to partner with a private company to develop a secure, scalable, and TEACH Act-compliant audio and video delivery system. Together with the libraries and University Information Services, the Language Learning Technology Center was a major partner in the system's design and development. Today the Georgetown Media Service provides streaming and downloadable course media to some 160 foreign language courses from Arabic to Turkish, with the Spanish program, an early adopter, still its largest user. Assets range from MP3 audio clips to fulllength films in streaming video format. The system features authentication and authorization, integration with Student Information Systems, a Blackboard Building Block, and an RSS podcast feature. We will review why, how, and with whom we have developed the Media Service, how it differs from our previous self-service system, how it is being used, and what user feedback we have received.

Old Dogs and New Tricks: Latin Joins the World of Technology Boca Raton Middle School S107

Jan Robison, Shorecrest Preparatory School In this session the audience will view technology based activities for the acquisition and retention of upper level Latin and most specifically, Latin AP. With these "new" techniques the learning styles of all students can be successfully addressed, enhancing the retention of vocabulary of upper level Latin and also aiding in the analytical/ synthetic activities of translating.

Student/teacher collaborative methods such as sound recordings using Garage Band to aid in proper pronunciation and scanning techniques will be discussed. Along with this, additional collaborative activities such as student/teacher based websites for the posting of translations and commentary will also be explored.

Student generated techno -projects such as power point projects and the rubrics for grading a student activity of this nature will also be presented. In addition to power point, study materials which can be utilized from the internet will be discussed. University of Miami IALLT, MAALLT, and SEALLT need to increase membership, reach out to K-12 and other underrepresented groups, and sustain all members with valuable services. This session is a brain-storming session in which participants will attempt to outline programs that these groups can initiate to address the following questions: How can IALLT, MAALLT, and SEALLT better promote community at the regional level? How can teachers at all levels communicate better about language teaching and technology? How can IALLT, MAALLT, and SEALLT better serve their members? MAALLT members have already talked about several possibilities; these can serve to start the conversation. For example, MAALLT established a close relationship with the Maryland Foreign Language Association last year. How can this relationship be expanded? How can similar relationships be built in other states? Another suggestion has been to establish a series of workshops to be offered at local, state, and regional foreign language meetings or for professional development days. What topics would these workshops address? Who would offer them? In addition to the three listed presenters, who will act as organizers and facilitators, other members of the MAALLT and SEALLT executive boards will work with one or two participants to come up with ideas. They will then report back to the entire group and the various ideas will be discussed and prioritized.

Ultimately, the benefit is better community within IALLT and its regional groups. In the short term, the participants will have a chance to make their voices heard in what should be their professional organizations.
