
# Cookie Comprehension & Composition


Cookie Comprehension & Composition can be used to help kids understand how your "textbook" nonfiction paragraph is put together or structured, with a main idea, supporting sentences and closing sentence.

And understanding how many nonfiction paragraphs are constructed can help them compose their very own paragraphs. We used this with descriptive writing, but it can surely be used for other kinds of nonfiction writing, like cause and effect or problem and solution.


