



Country Specific Guideline for Malaysia Part 1 of 3: Peninsular

This guideline has been prepared by the Australian Government and the Malaysian Government. It is intended to assist businesses importing regulated timber products from Malaysia into Australia in understanding the regulatory framework in Malaysia in order for them to carry out their due diligence obligations under the Illegal Logging Prohibition Regulation 2012, which supports the Illegal Logging Prohibition Act 2012.

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1 What is required under Australia's Illegal Logging Laws?

Australia's Illegal Logging Prohibition Regulation 2012 (the Regulation) prescribes due diligence for businesses importing 'regulated timber products' and for Australian processors of domestic raw logs. Under the Regulation, importers and processors have to undertake due diligence to minimise the risk of sourcing illegally logged timber.

The due diligence requirements for importers include the following steps:

- **Step 1**: Establish and maintain a due diligence system.
- **Step 2**: Gather information about the timber in the product that is being imported.
- **Step 3**: Assess the risk (using one of the three methods outlined in the Regulation).
- Step 4: Risk mitigation (if required).
- **Step 5**: Keep records.

2 How to use the Country Specific Guideline (CSG)

The forestry and timber industry in Malaysia is governed by laws, regulations and institutional arrangements in the three regions; Peninsular, Sabah and Sarawak. Therefore, the CSG is divided into three separate parts:

Part 1: Peninsular

Part 2: Sabah

Part 3: Sarawak

This three-part CSG is intended to assist an importer of regulated timber products from Malaysia to Australia to comply with the due diligence requirements of the Regulation.

An importer must gather information about the product in accordance with section 10 of the Regulation, this includes gathering information or evidence contained in this CSG.

Information listed in this CSG is not an exhaustive list of evidence or documentation required to satisfy the due diligence requirements under the Regulation.

The information gathered by applying this CSG, along with any other information gathered in accordance with the Regulation, needs to be assessed in accordance with the processes outlined in section 12 of the Regulation (including considering any other information the importer knows, or ought reasonably to know, but is not contained in the CSG), to identify the risk that a regulated timber product is, is made from, or contains illegally logged timber. All data included in this document is the most current as available at time of publishing.

2.1 Development of the CSG

The development of the CSG was undertaken by a working group which comprised members from the following Ministries, departments, agencies and councils, and trade associations.

The CSG has been subjected to several consultations with relevant stakeholders groups in Malaysia at national and regional levels.

Malaysia and Australia have agreed in bilateral discussions that the CSG forms the basis for compliance with the due diligence requirements as set out in the Regulation.

3 Scope of the CSG for Malaysia

This CSG provides detailed information on the control of pathways for timber harvested and then processed/ manufactured in Malaysia and informs Australian importers of what is considered legal timber. It is also only applicable for timber products with a Malaysian origin of harvest, directly exported from Malaysia to Australia.

3.1 Timber harvested outside of Malaysia

There may be timber, forest products or products which contain timber, wholly or in-part, which was harvested in another country, before it was imported into Malaysia. Any product that contains timber that was harvested, processed, manufactured, or exported outside of Malaysia is out of scope of the CSG.

While these products are not in-scope of this CSG, the information contained in this document may assist importers in conducting due diligence using either the timber legality framework or the regulated risk factors pathways detailed in section 11 and section 13 respectively of the Regulation.

4 Overview of Forest Management in Malaysia

Malaysia is a tropical country that covers an area of about 33 million hectares consisting of 3 regions: Peninsular Malaysia, the state of Sabah and Sarawak. Malaysia regards its natural forest resources as an important and valuable resource that contributes significantly towards the country's economy and environmental well-being. As such, Malaysia is committed to ensure at least 50% of her land area remain as forest and adhered to the Principle of Sustainable Forest Management (SFM). In addition, Malaysia encourages SFM through forest certifications which among others include the Malaysian Timber Certification Scheme (MTCS), Programme for the Endorsement of Forest Certification (PEFC) and other internationally recognised schemes. These schemes continuously support the trade in timber and timber products that use wood originating from sustainable and legal sources that take into account the environmental, social and economic aspects of SFM. Generally, there are 3 categories of forest: Permanent Reserved Forest (PRF)/ Permanent Forest Estates (PFE), state land forest and alienated land. The management of the forestry sector is governed under the National Forestry Policy and laws which has stringent forest laws and regulation to monitor and enforce forest related activities.

In <u>Peninsular Malaysia</u>, the Forestry Department Peninsular Malaysia (FDPM) and respective state forestry departments are responsible for the management of PRF. The state forestry departments have control over the removal of timber from state land and alienated land forest. This is regulated by the National Forestry Act 1984 and guided by the National Forestry Policy 1978 (revised 1992). The Malaysian Timber Industry Board (MTIB) is the licensing authority for Peninsular Malaysia in issuing export and import licence for timber and timber products.

In <u>Sabah</u>, the Sabah Forestry Department (SFD) is responsible for forest management, control of harvesting operations, royalty payment requirements as well as issuance of export and import licence in line with the Forest Enactment 1968, Forest Rules 1969, Forest Timber Enactment 2015 and Forest (Timber) (Registration) Regulations 2017.

In <u>Sarawak</u>, the Forest Department Sarawak (FDS) and the Sarawak Forestry Corporation (SFC) are responsible for forest management. This is regulated by the Forests Ordinance, 2015 (Cap. 71). Sarawak Timber Industry Development Corporation (STIDC) is the licensing authority to issue export and import licences for timber and timber products in Sarawak.

MTIB, SFD and STIDC are the respective licensing authorities for Peninsular, Sabah and Sarawak for issuing export and import licences for timber and timber products, as provided for under Schedule 2 of the Customs (Prohibition of Exports) Order 2017 and Customs (Prohibition of Imports) Order 2017. For timber products listed by the *Convention of International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora* (CITES), a CITES export or re-export permit issued by MTIB for Peninsular and Sabah, and FDS for Sarawak, can be considered as having fulfilled the applicable national and CITES requirements.

5 Timber products exported to Australia

Australia is one of Malaysia's most important markets for timber and timber products. <u>Table 1.1</u> provides a list of regulated timber products. These span across four Customs HS codes: namely 44, 47, 48 and 94. For the full list of regulated timber products subject to due diligence requirements refer to <u>Schedule 1 to the *Illegal Logging Prohibition Regulation 2012*.</u>

6 Laws and regulations governing harvesting

6.1 Legal requirements for timber harvesting

Laws related to timber harvesting include:

National Forestry Act 1984 (Act 313);

- (i) Forest Rules of the respective States; and
- (ii) Environmental Quality Act 1974 (Act 127) Section 34A, Environment Quality (Prescribed Activities) (Environmental Impact Assessment) Order 1987, Item 1 of Schedule.

FDPM and state forestry departments are responsible for the management of the PRF of the various states within the Peninsular.

Any company or person wishing to harvest and remove timber from a PRF and State land forest needs to have a valid harvesting licence issued by state forestry departments upon approval by State Authority. A licensee pays all premiums, royalty, forest development cess and other charges payable in respect of the licence and the harvested timber before claiming ownership of the timber from the licenced area.

Any company or person wishing to remove timber from an alienated land forest needs to have a valid removal licence issued by state forestry departments upon approval by State Authority. A licensee pays all royalty, forest development cess and other charges payable in respect of the licence and the harvested timber before removing of the timber from the licenced area.

Felled logs are inspected for payment of royalty and forest development cess at the Forest Checking Stations (FCSs). These are manned by the State Forestry Departments' officials, upon which a **Removal Pass (RP)** (see <u>Attachment 1.1</u>) is issued for each lorry load. The RP carries a record of the type/species, volume of produce, and the royalty and forest development cess payable. The licensee must ensure that all logs transported from the designated FCSs to the mills are accompanied by a RP or **Exchange Removal Pass (ERP)** (see <u>Attachment 1.2</u>). An ERP is issued by the State Forestry Department concerned in cases where the load has been inspected during transit or for a load transported from one mill to another.

The quantity of logs received by the mills as recorded in the RP/ERP will also be kept and maintained by the mills. The mills are required to keep a log book containing information on logs stored and processed in these mills.

The custodians of the RP/ERP are the primary processing mills (that is, the saw mills and plywood mills). Value-added processing mills, which usually source their timber supplies from primary processing mills, do not possess a RP/ERP.

The issuing of an **Export Licence** (see <u>Attachment 1.3</u>) by MTIB demonstrates that these timbers have complied with the relevant legal requirements. In the case of other timber products that do not require an Export Licence from MTIB, the declaration in **Customs Export Declaration Form 2** (K2) (see <u>Attachment 1.4</u>) will demonstrate compliance with the relevant legal requirements. An exporter of timber and timber products listed in <u>Table 1.3</u> must pay the necessary export cess.

6.2 Retention of certain species from harvesting in PRF

A total of thirty-two (32) timber species have been identified by the state forestry departments to be retained in PRF. A licensee must observe that these identified species are retained during harvesting the licensed area within PRF managed under SFM.

This requirement has been incorporated into timber harvesting practices as a means to promote socially-friendly harvesting practices as well as to mitigate the deterioration of biodiversity and the environment. These species, the majority of which are wild fruit trees, are important food sources for the aborigines/indigenous people as well as birds and mammals.

However, the requirement to retain these species is not applicable to logs harvested from state land and alienated land. Thus the availability of any of these species in the market shall not necessarily be construed as illegal as these timbers will have undergone the due process of controls administered by the state forestry departments.

The list of species to be retained in the PRF is at Attachment 1.5.

6.3 Statutory charges

6.3.1 Harvesting charges

The National Forestry Act 1984 [Sections 60, 61 & 75] and the State Forest Rules (Rules 22 & 23) stipulate the statutory charges that need to be paid by a licensee to obtain a harvesting licence for the extraction of logs.

A licensee pays all premiums, royalty, forest development cess and other charges payable in respect of the licence and the harvested timber before claiming ownership of the timber from the licenced area.

6.3.2 Export cess

An exporter of timber and timber products listed in <u>Table 1.2</u> must pay the necessary export cess, as provided for in Section 20 of the Malaysian Timber Industry Board (Incorporation) Act 1973.

6.4 Special provisions for indigenous people

Under the Aboriginal People Act 1954 (Act 134), the State Authority must ensure that areas gazetted as Aboriginal Reserves and Aboriginal Areas are excluded from the areas to be planned for harvesting except after consulting with the Director General of Orang Asli Affairs and in granting any such licence it may be ordered that a specified proportion of aboriginal labour be employed.

6.5 Production and manufacturing of Rubberwood products

Rubberwood (*Hevea brasiliensis*) is produced from logs harvested from rubber plantations which are planted for latex production. The trees are usually felled when their life span for the production of latex (at about 20 years) is no longer economical and replanting is necessary. Rubberwood is now being widely used for the manufacture of a variety of products and is considered an environmentally-friendly green product which is from wood residues from rubber smallholding/estate.

Currently, the harvesting of Rubberwood logs requires the consent of the owner of the rubber smallholding or estate. Requirements regarding the legal status of Rubberwood may be demonstrated by the **Statement on Rubberwood Products** issued by MTIB (see <u>Attachment 1.6</u>).

7 Other relevant laws relating to legal timber

7.1 Timber processing

7.1.1 Timber and timber products (excluding furniture and components, pulp and paper products)

Laws related to the processing of timber and timber products include:

- (i) Wood Based Industries Enactment of the respective States; and
- (ii) Wood Based Industries Rules of the respective States.

7.1.2 Furniture and components

Laws related to the processing of furniture and components:

- (i) Industrial Co-ordination Act 1975 (Act 156);
- (ii) Wood Based Industries Enactment of the respective States;
- (iii) Wood Based Industries Rules of the respective States; and
- (iv) Customs Act 1967 (Act 235).

7.1.3 Wood pulp and paper products

Currently, there is no virgin wood pulp being produced in Peninsular. However, some wood pulp and paper product producing companies do import small quantities of wood pulp, used with wood pulp from recycled paper, for further processing.

Laws related to the processing of pulp and paper products include:

- (i) Industrial Co-ordination Act 1975 (Act 156);
- (ii) Wood Based Industries Enactment of the respective States;
- (iii) Wood Based Industries Rules of the respective States; and
- (iv) Customs Act 1967 (Act 235).

7.2 Export of timber and timber products

7.2.1 Timber and timber products under Customs HS code 44 and 94

Any company or person engaged in the export of timber and timber products falling under HS Codes 44 and 94 must register with MTIB. Registered companies or persons are issued with **Certificates of Registration** (see <u>Attachment 1.7</u>), renewable annually. Registered companies are allowed to export these products upon obtaining an Export Licence from MTIB.

Laws related to export of these products:

- (i) Customs Act 1967 (Act 235), Customs (Prohibition of Exports) Order 2017; and
- (ii) Malaysian Timber Industry Board (Incorporation) Act 1973 (Act 105).

The Second Schedule of the Customs (Prohibition of Exports) Order 2017 lists the timber and timber products that require an MTIB-issued **Export Licence** (see <u>Attachment 1.3</u>) prior to an export. The list of products that require an **Export Licence** is as shown in <u>Table 1.3</u>.

7.2.2 Timber and timber products under Customs HS Code 47 and 48 (pulp and paper products)

Exporters of products under HS Codes 47 and 48 must make an appropriate declaration using **Customs Export Declaration Form (K2)** (see <u>Attachment 1.4</u>) and submit to the Customs Department for export clearance.

Laws related to export of these products include:

- (i) Customs Act 1967 (Act 235), Customs (Prohibition of Exports) Order 2017; and
- (ii) Malaysian Timber Industry Board (Incorporation) Act 1973 (Act 105).

7.3 Import of timber and timber products

The Second Schedule of the Customs (Prohibition of Imports) Order 2017 lists products for which an **Import Licence (JK69)** (see <u>Attachment 1.8</u>) from MTIB is required for importation into Peninsular. For other timber products, an importer is required to make an appropriate declaration using **Customs Import Declaration Form 1 (K1)** (see <u>Attachment 1.9</u>) and seek clearance from the Royal Malaysian Customs Department (RMCD) prior to import.

7.3.1 Import Legality Regulation

The Import Legality Regulation (MTIB Director General Circular Ref. (7) LPKM 1/155/1/1 dated 7 June 2018) has been introduced to importers to ensure legality of timber and timber products imported into Peninsular.

The regulation became fully enforced from 1 July 2017 and importers need to ensure compliance prior to the issuance of an import licence. Currently, the regulation only covers the importation of logs/baulks, sawn timber and plywood (Customs HS Code 4403, 4407 and 4412).

To demonstrate legality, importers must submit a minimum of one of the following documents issued by the exporting countries:

- (i) FLEGT licence; or
- (ii) Certificate issued by a recognised timber certification body; or
- (iii) Certificate of Voluntary Legality Scheme; or
- (iv) Any legality document issued by any recognised agency / corporation / industry association; or
- (v) Self-declaration documents by the exporter with endorsement by the authorities of the exporting country; or
- (vi) Copy of the Customs Export Declaration from exporting countries.

For imports of CITES-listed timber species, all importers must submit CITES Export Permit from the exporting country before being allowed to enter.

7.4 Trade in CITES-listed timber species

As the Management Authority for timber species in Peninsular and the Federal Territory of Labuan, MTIB is responsible for issuing **export, import and re-export permits** (see <u>Attachment 1.10</u>) for CITES-listed timber species.

Laws related to trade in CITES-listed timber species include:

- (i) Customs Act 1967 (Act 235), Customs (Prohibition of Imports) Order 2017;
- (ii) Malaysian Timber Industry Board (Incorporation) Act 1973 (Act 105); and
- (iii) International Trade in Endangered Species Act 2008 (Act 686).

8 Identifying legal products from Malaysia

The **Export Licence** (see <u>Attachment 1.3</u>) issued by MTIB for those products as explained in <u>Section 7.2</u> shall be used to verify compliance with legal requirements. For other products, clearance of exports based on the **Customs Export Declaration Form 2 (K2)** (see <u>Attachment 1.4</u>) shall be deemed as having complied with the applicable legal requirements.

For products listed in <u>Appendix I and II of CITES</u>, a CITES export or re-export permit issued by MTIB may be considered as having fulfilled the applicable national and CITES requirements.

9 Legality of manufactured timber products

9.1 Traceability of domestic sources

Timber harvested from the PRF, state land forest and alienated is controlled and monitored by the respective state forestry departments. At critical points, the Departments institute control measures to ensure compliance with legal requirements and accordingly issue documents as proof of compliance. At the primary processing mills the RP (see <u>Attachment 1.1</u>) and the ERP (see <u>Attachment 1.2</u>) are the key documents to demonstrate timber legality.

9.2 Traceability of import sources

The Customs Order (Prohibition of Imports) 2017 provides the authority to MTIB to exercise control over the list of products in <u>Table 1.4</u> below. Importers of these products must obtain an **Import Licence** (see <u>Attachment 1.8</u>) and must submit a minimum of one of the following documents issued by the exporting country as stated in Section 7.3.1.



The RMCD exercises control over other regulated timber products and requires importers to make appropriate declarations prior to import (see Attachment 1.9).

9.3 Timber processing

The legal requirements for the operation of timber processing mills are provided in <u>Section 7.1</u>. Harvesting and import control procedures ensure that these mills source their raw materials from legal sources. This includes particle board and MDF mills which form a significant supply source of raw materials for furniture manufacturing.


