Course description (According to the University Catalogue)

Japanese Language for Beginners (1) teaches the basics of Japanese language. It introduces students to modern spoken Japanese through aural, oral and written drills and exercises. The students will master the basic grammatical structures. The students are also introduced to Japanese writing systems to meet practical needs. The aim of this course is to enable students to use Japanese language in making basic sentences and to enable them to write and read in Hiragana.

Course objectives:

1. To provide students with a variety of Japanese words and basic expressions that are often used in everyday life.

- 2. To enable students to successfully perform basic communicative acts in limited daily situations.
- 3. To introduce students to writing systems in Japanese that include: Hiragana, Katakana and Kanji, and to teach them to read and write in Hiragana.
- 4. To enable students to listen to basic conversations in Japanese and understand the conversations.
- 5. To encourage students to communicate altogether in a role-play using appropriate Japanese language.
- 6. To familiarize students with the structure of simple Japanese sentences.
- 7. To enable students to speak utilizing the proper social registers, with a basic understanding of Japanese cultural norms.
- 8. To introduce students to some aspects of Japanese culture through watching videos and performing activities such as Anime, Origami and Japanese Calligraphy.

Teaching methods (Lectures, discussion groups, tutorials, etc)

Japanese language instructors use methods of teaching that are engaging, interesting and interactive. They help students communicate in Japanese by using a variety of tutorials, such as visuals, videos, auditory material and written texts. They also encourage them to produce Japanese by having discussion groups and role-plays.

Learning outcomes:

• Knowledge and understanding

Students learn Japanese in a way that resembles natural language acquisition practices: listening, watching and reading scripts in Japanese.

• Cognitive skills (thinking and analysis).

This course encourages analytical learning, improves critical thinking skills and involves students in evaluating, comparing, contrasting and problem-solving.

• Communication skills (personal and academic).

Japanese for beginners (1) helps students to perform basic communicative acts in limited daily situations. After finishing the course, students will be able to introduce themselves, ask for places, communicate with others, describe objects, express their needs when shopping and write personal texts such as diaries all in basic Japanese.
