The purpose of a risk assessment is not to eliminate all risks, but to put in place control measures in order to mitigate against them as far as possible. It is not realistic to expect that all risk measures should be rated as minor (green). The probability of something happening may be

low, but should it happen, the impact would be high, and the risk would therefore be rated as red (severe). In practice, for example, if there was not sufficient cleaning capacity in place to clean an academy, the impact of this would be high, in that we would not be able to open the academy due to the stringent requirements around hygiene. This may therefore rate red on the risk assessment. This does not mean we do not have sufficient cleaning capacity, but only that should this be the case, the impact of this would be high.
