



- In the mid-1990s, the company's founder and chairman, <u>Torstein Hagen</u>, took a river cruise through Russia.
- The experience inspired him to create a river cruise company in 1997. Educated at Norwegian Institute of Technology and Harvard Business School, Hagen was formerly CEO of <u>Royal Viking Line</u>, and also served on the boards of <u>Holland</u> <u>America Line</u> and Kloster Cruise Ltd.
- The company started with the purchase of four Russian vessels in 1997. The following year, it acquired additional ships and continued to cater to European passengers. In 2000, Viking purchased Europe's KD River Cruises, which was founded in 1827, though KD retained its Rhine Line passenger ferries, scheduled services and day-excursion operations.

- Viking River Cruises operates a fleet of more than 60 vessels as of 2017.
- All of its ships have been custom built or fully renovated since 1999; 100% of the cabins are "outside" staterooms with windows or balconies.
- The ships also have onboard restaurants, bars, lounges, libraries and sun decks.
- As of 2014, more than two-thirds of the company's European fleet are classed as "Viking Longships."







- Longships were a type of ship invented and used by the <u>Norsemen</u> (commonly known as the <u>Vikings</u>) for trade, commerce, exploration, and warfare during the <u>Viking Age</u>.
- The longship's design evolved over many centuries, beginning in the <u>Stone Age</u>



- The longship appeared in its complete form between the 9th and 13th centuries.
- They were all made out of wood, with cloth sails (woven wool) and had numerous details and carvings on the <u>hull</u>.
- The longships were characterized as a graceful, long, narrow and light wooden boat, with a shallow-draft hull designed for speed.



- The average speed of Viking ships varied from ship to ship, but lay in the range of 5– 10 knots (9.3–18.5 km/h) and the maximum speed of a longship under favourable conditions was around 15 knots (28 km/h)
- The most common way to classify longships is by the number of rowing positions on board.



- Viking Longboat
- The sail was held in place by the mast which was up to 16 m (52 feet) tall. Its base was about 250 mm
 × 180 mm (9.8 by 7.1 inches)
- Sails measured perhaps
 11 m (35 feet) to 12 m (40 feet) across, and were
 made of rough wool cloth.



- The Sutton Hoo longship, sometimes referred to as the ghost ship of the Wulflings, is about 27 m
 × 4.5 m (89 by 15 feet) maximum beam and built about 625 AD.
- Each plank was hewn from an oak tree so that the finished plank was about 25 mm (0.98 inches) thick and tapered along each edge.
- A ship normally used about 700 kg (1,500 pounds) of iron nails in a 18 m (59 feet) long ship.
- Analysis of timber samples from Viking long boats shows that a variety of timbers were used, but there was strong preference for oak.
- Construction of the 35 m long Skeid longship Draken Harald Hårfagre
