#### Course Number, Name, and Credit Hours

PS 4463 Cultural Dynamics of Congregational Ministry-3 Credit Hours

#### **Course Description**

This course examines the human and religious dynamics that affect congregational ministry. It will explore the differences in thinking and values that affect ministry. Special attention will be given to the differences between ministry in the smaller church and the larger congregation and to the nature and importance of congregational culture.

#### **Course Goals**

In this course you will:

- Examine the nature of culture
- Explore the factors that shape congregational culture
- Develop a foundational theology for cultural engagement
- Appreciate the challenge of transforming congregational culture

#### **Course Objectives**

After completing this course you should be able to:

- 1. Give a basic definition of culture
- 2. Describe the various layers of culture
- 3. Articulate a taxonomy that describes how the use of physical space affects relationships and ministry
- 4. Explain the characteristics of various sizes and stages of organizational growth experienced by the church
- 5. Describe how church size affects the dynamics of congregational culture
- 6. Analyze a cultural setting for ministry purposes
