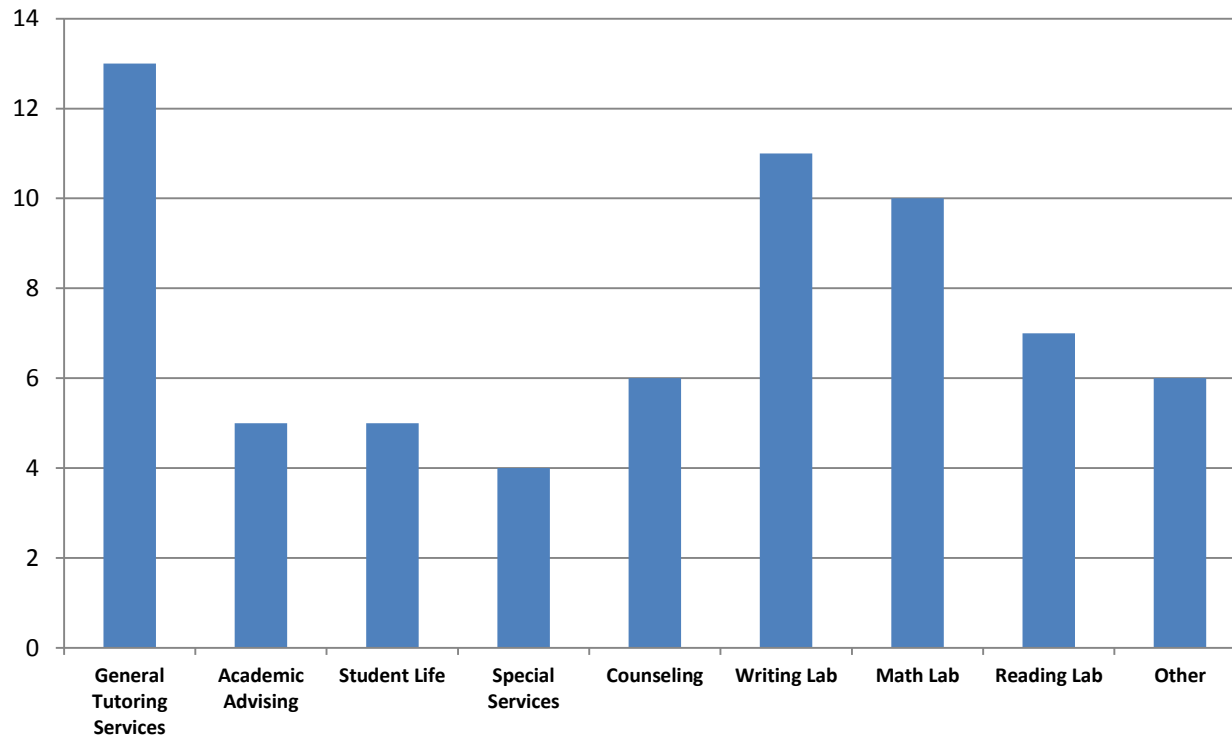

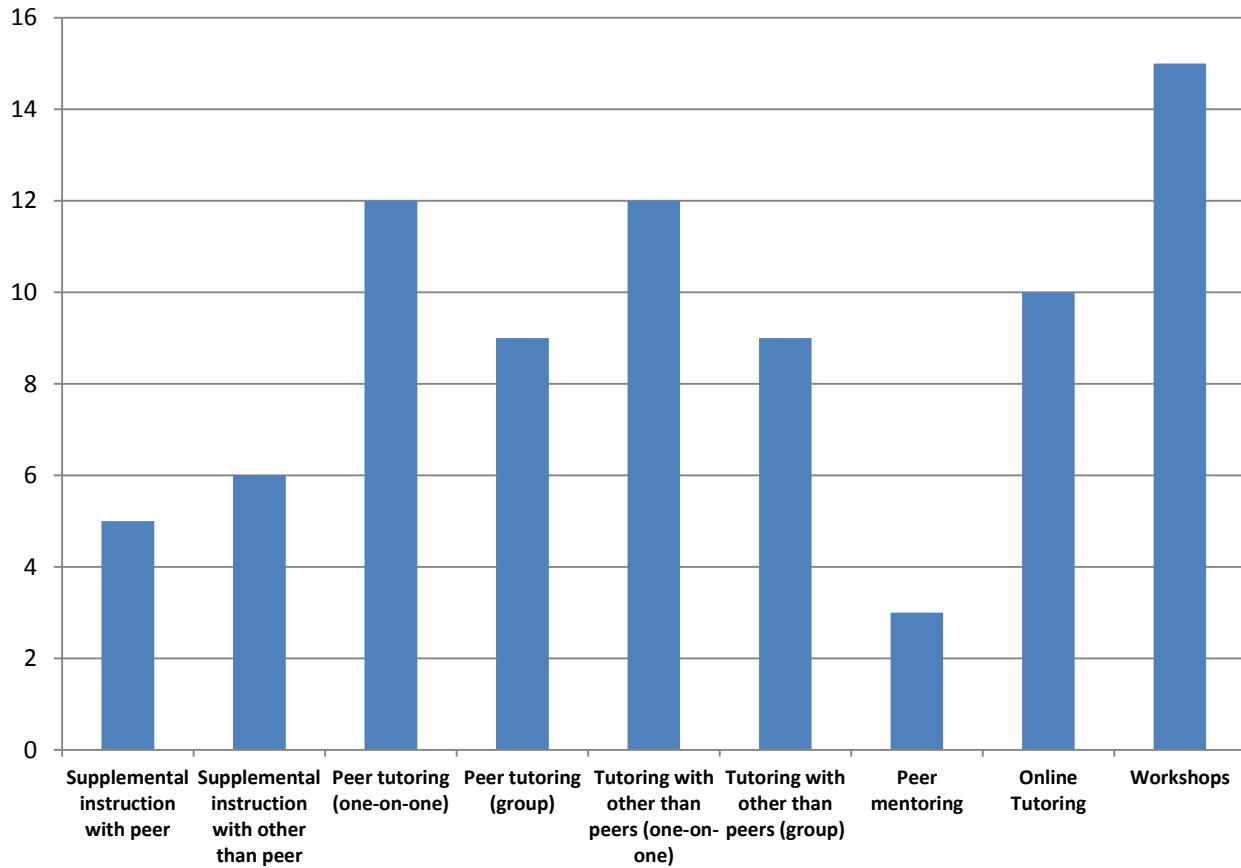

Writing Lab/Center

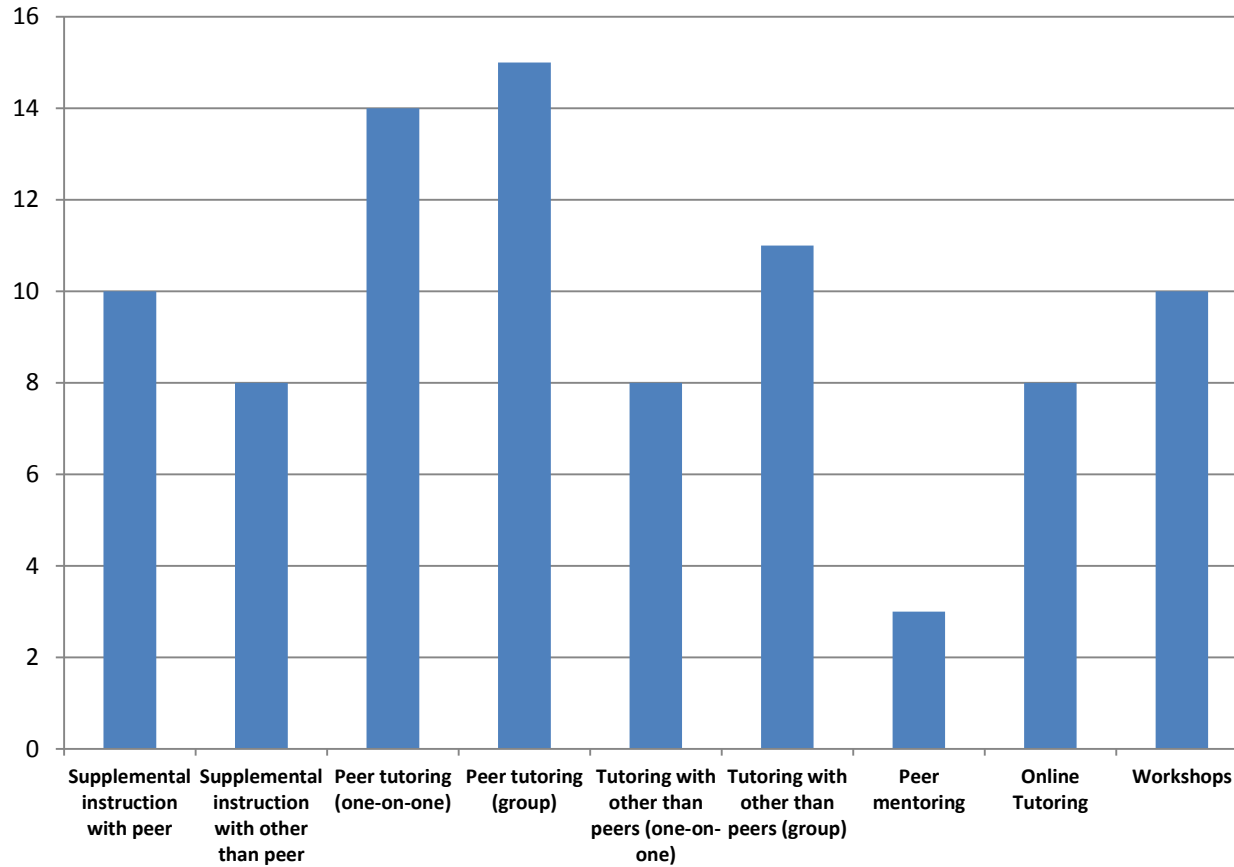


16 colleges have dedicated writing labs/centers

Writing Lab/Center

- Average 1,424 students in fall and 1,340 in spring
- Provide 630-17,000 sessions in fall and 575-20,000 sessions in spring
- Center staff ranges from 1-6 FT, 1-46 PT, 4-40 peer tutors/ work study
- 4 Centers report to provosts, 5 to deans, 3 to English department, and 4 to directors
- Funding sources: CUE, Tax Levy, Perkins, Title III or V, internal budgets
- Online tutoring: WC Online interactive, Vyew, Lotus Notes, Google Docs or Chat, Skype, OWL, Blackboard, IPASS

Math Lab/Center

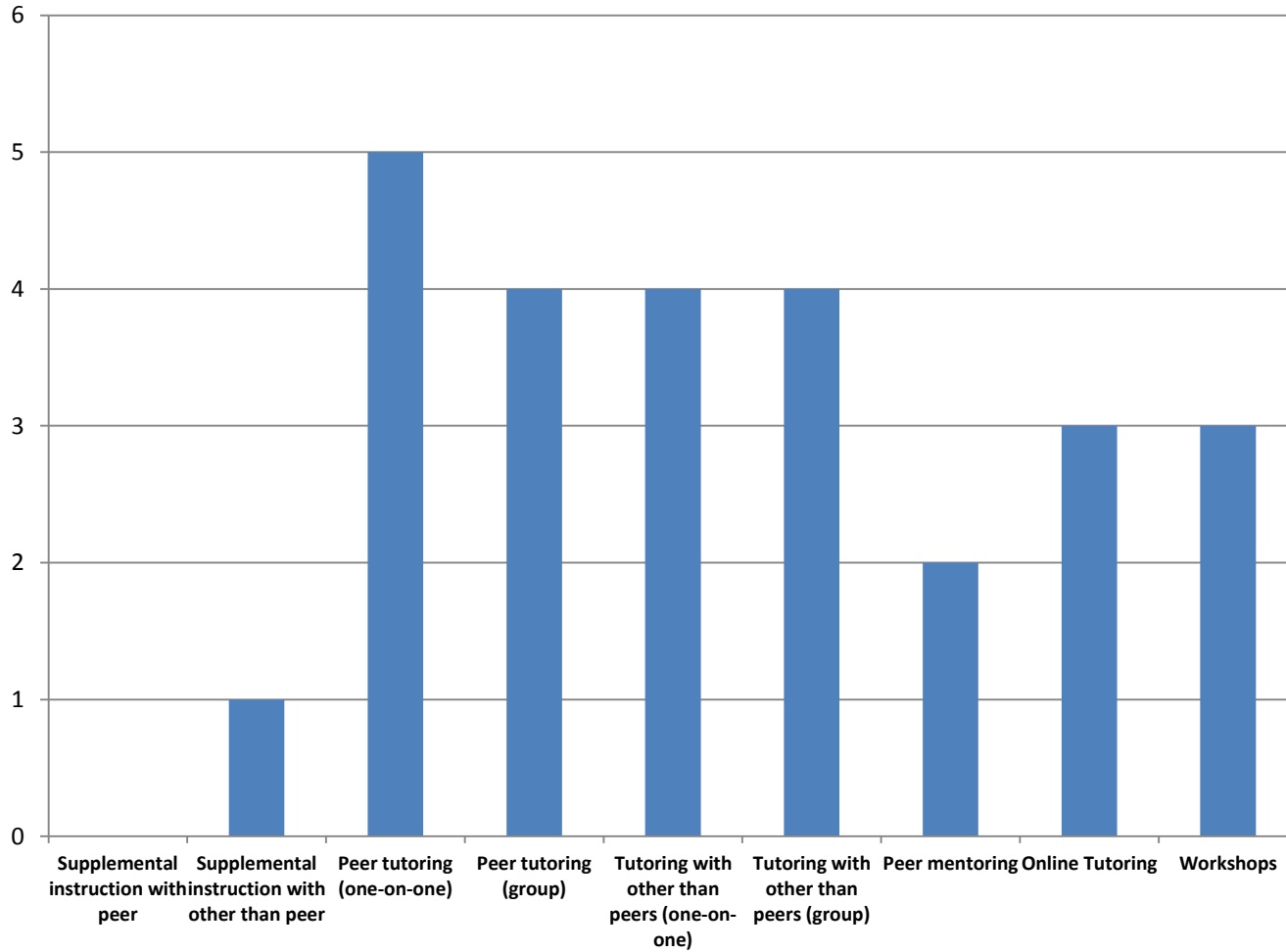


16 colleges have dedicated math labs/centers

Math Lab/Center

- Average 1,182 students in fall and 1,100 in spring
- Provide 787-22,000 sessions in fall and 712-18,000 in spring
- Center staff ranges from 1-5 FT, 1-60 PT, 7-24 peer tutors/ work study
- 4 Math Lab/Centers report to provosts, 1 to dean, 8 to math or science departments, and 2 to director
- Funding sources: CUE, Tax Levy, Perkins, Title III or V grants, grants for special programs (e.g. PBI), internal budgets
- Online tutoring: ALEKS, PLATO, Webassign, MyMathLab, MyMathTest, MATHXL, MAPLE, STATDISC

Reading Lab/Center

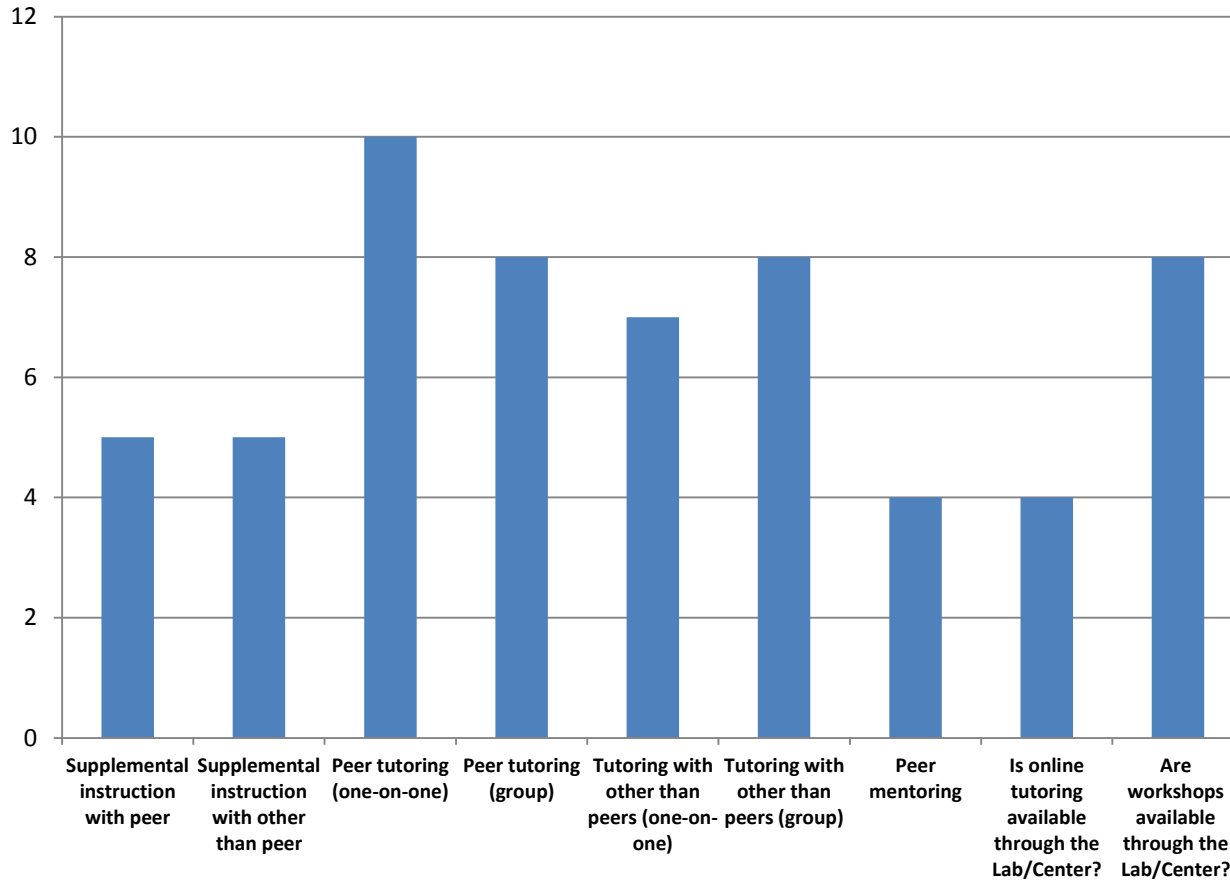


9 colleges have dedicated reading labs/centers

Reading Lab/Center

- Average 1,399 students in fall semester and 1,219 in the spring
- Provide 100-10,000 sessions in fall and 75-8,300 sessions in spring
- Center staff ranges from 1-2 FT, 5-13 PT, 1-7 peer tutors/ work study
- 6 Centers report to reading, communication or other related departments; 1 reports to a director
- Funding sources: CUE, Tax Levy, Perkins, grants for special programs (e.g. BMI), internal budgets
- Online tutoring: ConnectRead, Pearson Learning, internally developed software

Lab/Center for Other Content Area

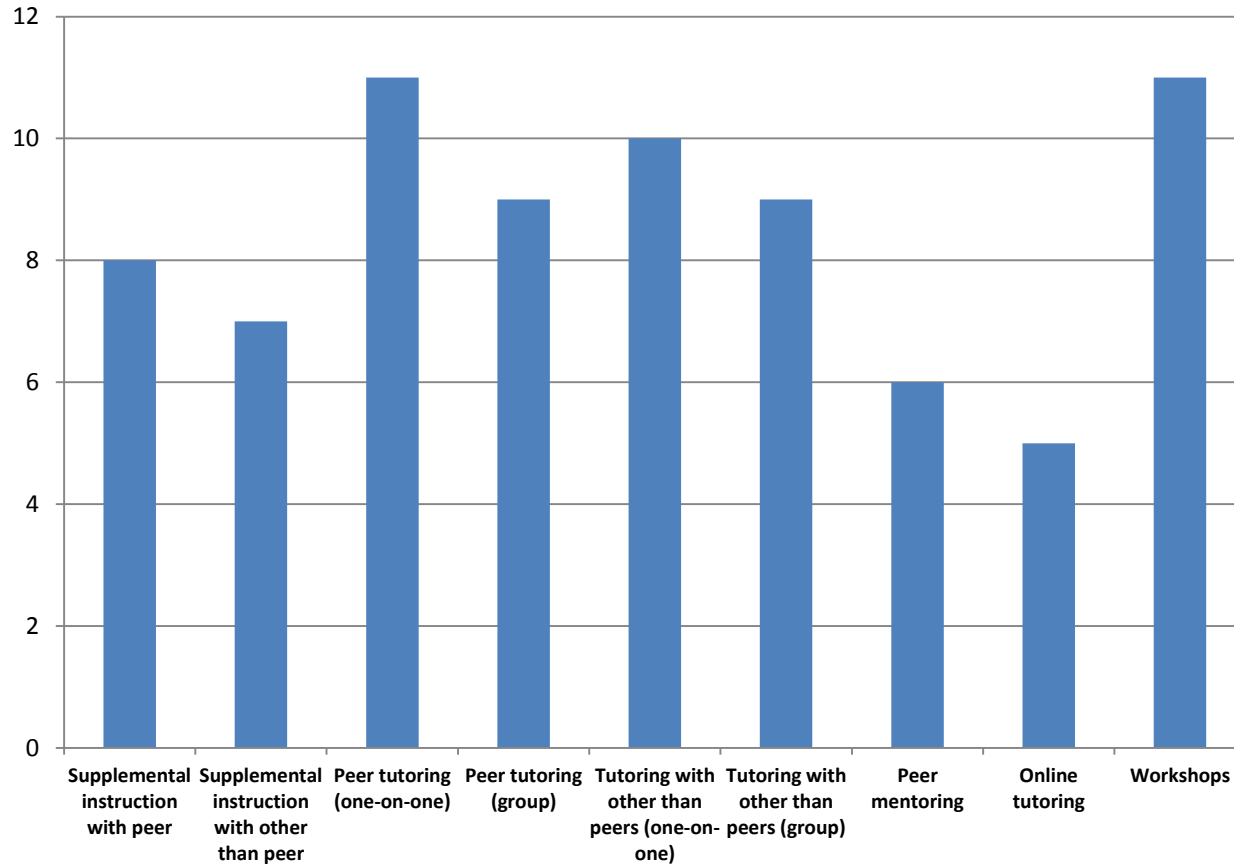


14 colleges have dedicated labs/centers for other content area(s)

Lab/Center for Other Content Area

- 6 ESL/Language, 7 science (physics, chemistry, biology), 1 business, 1 nursing
- Average 971 students in fall and 930 in spring
- Provide 600-6,928 sessions in fall and 405-7,938 in spring
- Center staff ranges from 1-2 FT, 1-81 PT, 2-8 peer tutors/work study
- 5 Centers report to a related departments, 2 to provost, 3 to a director
- Funding sources: CUE, Tax Levy, Perkins, grants for special programs (e.g. CSTEP, CASA), internal budgets
- Online tutoring: Wiki, Blackboard

Additional Tutoring Center/Lab

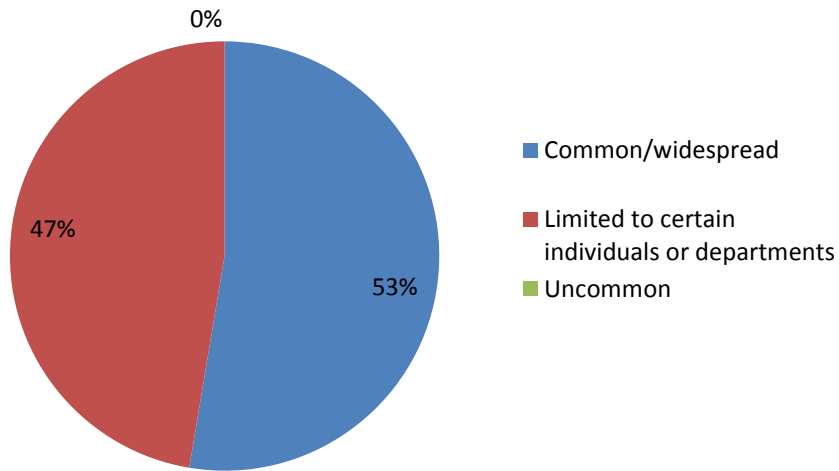
- Average 837 in fall and 745 in spring
- Center staff ranges from 1-6 FT, 1-130 PT, 4 peer tutors/ work study

- Funding sources: CUE, Tax Levy, Perkins, grants for special programs (e.g. SEEK), internal budgets
- Online tutoring: Quickbooks, American Accent, Adobe, Breeze, myskilltutor.com, CELS

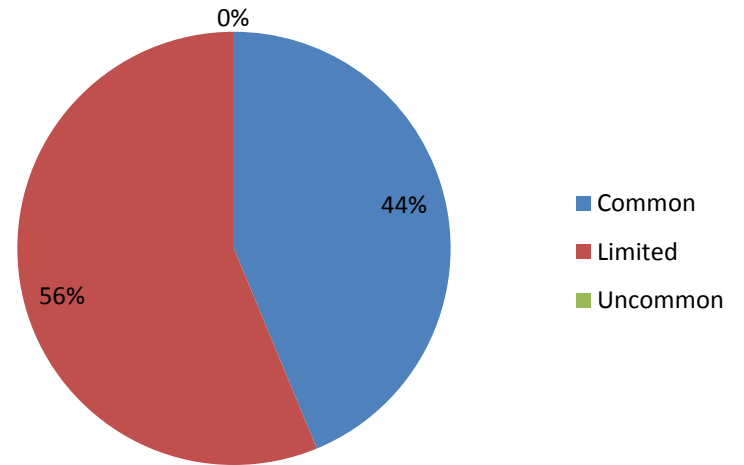
