





# Small is bountiful

The hopes of the upstarts are bolstered by news that big firms are planning to launch constellations of hundreds or even thousands of satellites that would provide low-cost Internet access, especially to more remote areas of the world, writes Samantha Masunaga

uddenly, everyone from the US government, commercial satellite companies, universities and even high school students needs to have a small

And that is fuelling another boom, in Southern California and across the West, in companies dedicated to giving the satellites a ride to space.

By one estimate, 210 satellites weighing less than 110 pounds will be launched this year, to do such things as map the Earth, expand broadband access and track packages on shipping vessels.

That's up from just 25 launches in 2010. The number is expected to double again in five years.

In the last six months, at least half a dozen new launch vehicle firms aimed at the small satellite market have cropped up, said Marco Caceres, senior space analyst for Teal Group, an aerospace and defence analysis company.

The ever-growing list includes Firefly Space Systems in Cedar Park, Texas: Rocket Lab in Los Angeles and Richard Branson's Virgin Galactic, best known for its space tourism endeavours.

In a quiet industrial park

near Long Beach Airport where warplanes were once built around the clock, Virgin Galactic is making a satellite-launching rocket that will drop from the wing of a 747.

There is strong confidence in the aerospace community that small satellites are the way to go," said Kevin Sagis, chief engineer for LauncherOne. "It's an exciting

The hopes of the upstarts are bolstered by news that companies such as SpaceX outside Los Angeles and OneWeb in Arlington, Virginia, are planning to launch constellations of hundreds or even thousands of satellites that would provide low-cost Internet access, especially to more remote areas of the world.


Last year, SpaceX opened an office in Seattle where engineers will build smaller satellites for launch. Around the same time, Branson announced an investment in the OneWeb venture.

"Just those two companies alone can create a whole new market," Caceres said. "And I think that's what launch companies are looking for."

Traditional satellite manufacturing has long been based in Southern California.

**Hughes Electronics Corporation** built satellites at its El Segundo facility outside LA for years before its space and communications businesses were acquired in 2000 by aerospace giant Boeing Co. Boeing still manufactures satellites in El Segundo.

Swarms of satellites are not a new idea. Huge satellite constellations were proposed back in the 1990s as a way to provide telecommunications services around the globe. But entrepreneurs badly underestimated the steep cost of building and blasting hundreds of satellites into orbit, and the



proposed services were undercut by cheaper ground-based cellular services.

Plans for the ambitious Teledesic satellite constellation collapsed in the early 2000s. The network, which was to provide high-speed Internet service, was founded by cellphone pioneer Craig McCaw and garnered some investment from Microsoft cofounder Bill Gates, but couldn't raise enough money to cover its high costs.

In 1999, satellite communications company Iridium filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection after it signed up fewer than 50,000 customers for its global telephone service. The company later reorganised and its network of 66 satellites still provides services.

Industry players say this time will be different. They point to the greater diversity in satellite usage now as insurance against the bust of any one particular industry.

Planet Labs, for example, says it operates the largest fleet of Earth observation satellites. Data from the San Francisco company's nanosatellites can be used to monitor farmland and track carbon emissions.

Demand for mobile connectivity is also greater than it ever was in the 1990s, even in previously unconnected places such as airplanes.

And new technology has driven down the cost of developing and launching a satellite, aided in part by miniaturisation; smaller satellites weigh less, and thus are cheaper to launch.

Tom Stroup, president of the Satellite Industry Association, said it's not likely that all the

satellite constellations that have been announced will be launched. But he expects at least one, if not more, of the proposed projects in each sector - imaging, broadband, communication services - to succeed.

"We live in a different world than we did in the 1990s," he said.

Another plus for this round of satellite projects is that they're more likely to be backed by the companies' own money, said Caceres of Teal Group.

"They're not totally reliant on investors like they were in the 1990s," he said. "So there's a good chance that many of these companies will be able to put these thousands of satellites into orbit, and if they do, they need launch vehicles.

Currently, small satellites can hitch a ride by going "piggyback" on a rocket purchased by a larger company and squeezing in where there's space. But aspiring launch providers say this method can restrict the launch time and location, as well as the orbit where the satellite will be placed.

That's where companies like Virgin Galactic think they can succeed.

The company announced its LauncherOne project in 2012 after it saw the potential in the smallsatellite market. Virgin Galactic plans to eventually produce 24 rockets or more each year in its

150,000-square-foot facility, which borders the Long Beach Airport and is near the former Boeing C-17 plant, which closed in November.

Virgin Galactic is looking to produce rockets quickly and at low cost. On average, the company said it will cost \$10 million to launch a 440-pound satellite to a 500-kilometre sun-synchronous orbit, the most commonly requested orbit. That compares with SpaceX's starting price of \$62 million for its Falcon 9 rocket, or Rocket Lab's \$5 million charge for a 330-pound payload.

The company has invested in machines that speed the rocket

production line. One of them creates new parts through 3-D printing, while simultaneously shaving off any extra material that could make a part even a hair's width too big.

Even the launch system was

designed with costs in mind. The 65-foot-long rocket will be secured under the left wing of a modified commercial 747-400 jetliner dubbed Cosmic Girl. After the plane climbs to about 35,000 feet, it will release LauncherOne to deliver the payload into orbit.

LauncherOne's first test flight is scheduled for next year. The plane will take off from Mojave and launch the rocket off the California coast near Santa Barbara.


The company has already started to fill its launch manifest. Its biggest customer is OneWeb, which has purchased flights for 39 satellites. Last year, Virgin Galactic won a \$4.7 million Nasa contract to carry more than a dozen small satellites into orbit. Firefly Space Systems and Rocket Lab won similar contracts.

Stratolaunch Systems, a project backed by Microsoft co-founder Paul Allen and his company Vulcan Aerospace, also hopes to launch satellites from midair. It is building a rocket-carrying aircraft in Mojave that, when completed, will have the largest wingspan of any plane ever built.

Caceres said he doesn't expect all of the start-up launch companies to survive. "Many of them will fold," he said. "As long as you have someone wealthy and vou're not relying on attracting private investors, you have a much better chance." -Los Angeles Times/TNS

## Critical reflections on new directions in contemporary religion

GU-Q Professor Patrick Laude's new book is based on several years of research and reflection in religious metaphysics

rofessor of Theology at Georgetown University in Qatar (GU-Q), Patrick Laude, has made a critical contribution to the understanding of religion in the modern world with his book titled Apocalypse des religions. Pathologies et dévoilements de la conscience contemporaine (Apocalypse of Religions: Pathologies and Unveilings of Contemporary Religious Consciousness).


"Religious consciousness is one of the most significant factors, if not the most significant one, in the major turbulences through which the world is going today," said Professor Laude. "One of the critical theses of the book is that religion has become unduly 'ideologised' and 'psychologised' out of a loss of attention to both the dimension of transcendence and the sense of the sacred or divine presence."

Based on several years of research and reflection in religious metaphysics, comparative religion, the contemporary sociology of religion and the study of new religious movements, this book is published by the renowned French publishing house L'Harmattan, which has included the title in its collection Theoria, besides works by major French philosophers and theologians like Jean Borella and Françoise Bonardel.

The book deals, in part, with the spiritual and intellectual crisis of the Muslim world, as well as the positive contributions of traditional Islamic thought and spirituality. "But it is not specifically a book on the crisis of Islam," explained the author, who critiques religious currents in the modern and post-modern contemporary context in this volume. "While religions have always had a sociopolitical dimension and psychological aspects, it can be argued that most of what stands for religion today is simply religion as ideology and religion, or spirituality, as psychology."

The positive side of the analyses developed in the book, he argues, is that these negative trends are helping, by contrast, to unveil more essential and interior aspects of religious phenomena. "There is a critical process of renewal going on amidst the turmoil and the ruins, although it is very much 'a still silent voice?

Professor Laude joined the faculty of GU-Q in

2006, where he teaches courses in religious studies. Professor Laude's scholarly interests and output lie in comparative mysticism and metaphysics, poetry and mysticism, and Western representations and interpretations of Islamic and Asian spiritual and wisdom traditions. A prolific writer, he is also the editor-in-chief of the bilingual journal of interreligious studies Religions-Adyan, published by the Doha International Center for Interfaith Dialogue, as well as a regular chronicler for the French review



# A tangled web

his is a tough crime thriller that falls between the two quality extremes. It is the tale of a gang of corrupt police officers led by Special Forces ace Michael Atwood (Chiwetel Ejiofor) and other officers who pull off a heist and the latter are blackmailed by Russian mobsters to carry out their nefarious plans.

How they plan to eliminate their colleague Chris Allen (Casey Affleck) in order to buy themselves time to pull off their next heist, forms the crux of the

The other members of the team are Russell Welch (Norman Reedus) and his brother Gabe (Aaron Paul), along with Marcus Belmont (Anthony Mackie) and Franco Rodriguez (Clifton Collins, Jr.)

The narration begins with a successful bank heist, full of telling details and arresting images till matters get out of control and a red flare goes off inside a getaway car. After that everything goes downhill.

The plot weaves a tangled web among the Russian mobsters, dirty-dealing detectives, a

police officer who wants to make a difference and everybody caught in the crossfire. But they do not leave an impression, as screenwriter Matt Cook fails to make any of these characters strike a chord with the viewer.

And whether these characters live, get rich, or die trying to succeed in their motive, matters little by the second act, as the plot runs out of momentum. In the last act, just at the point when the focus should intensify, the narration wobbles almost to a halt.

Despite an exhaustive ensemble cast and a rich premise, Triple 9

fails to ignite the screen.

ased on Seth Grahame-Smith's novel of the same name, this horror film retells Jane Austen's classic tale of manners.

It reveals the tangled relationships between lovers from different social classes in 19th century England, albeit with a twist that involves zombies.

At the very onset, we are informed by a voice-over that Britain has turned into a horror zone with zombies living in close proximity to humans. To protect themselves the humans are holed up within the walled city of London and have relegated the zombies to the "In-Between"; an area outside of the walled-in city but inside a royal moat.

In the Bennet household, the sisters Elizabeth (Lily James), Jane (Bella Heathcote), Kitty (Suki . Waterhouse), Lydia (Ellie Bamber), and Mary (Millie Brady) are all trained in the art of weaponry and martial arts. Their mother, Mrs Bennet (Sally Phillips) is worried about their future as she wants them to be married off to wealthy

The suitors include Colonel Darcy (Sam Riley), an investigator who slays newly infected zombies; his close friend Mr Bingley (Douglas Booth), who is the Bennet's new neighbour; Mr Collins (Matt Smith), the girl's cousin who is a pastor; and Mr Wickham (Jack Huston), a charming soldier.

How the girls, with their pride, prejudices and daggers in their garters, navigate through the treacherous paths of marriage proposals, forms the crux of the

Director Burr Steers' script seems unsure of the plot. Though he ensures the action sequences are as sharp as the wits quotient, he fails to leave an impact. In fact, the plot shuffles between action, horror and romance in a much unfocused manner, not doing justice to any one genre in particular.

On the performance front, Lily James as the spunky and spirited Elizabeth steals the show. She captures the essence of the agile, alert Elizabeth's personality along with her fighting skills with great ease. She is the only character you feel for.

Bella Heathcote as Jane is pleasant in a short role and the rest of the sisters in one dimensional roles are all wasted.

But overall you keep wondering why anyone would want to retell a classic and ruin the charm of the original tale. - IANS

Can he be coaxed back to work? That's what the agents hope, so drive out to Clancy's house in the country to speak to him face to face, for if anyone can find out the identity of the murderer, it is him...

It's often a bad sign when a film is moved to explain its title with a short paragraph at the beginning, not so bad if that title is something obscure, but the word solace was not exactly from an ancient language. But here we were, asked to believe that one of Wales' greatest actors was an FBI psychic, a position that doesn't exist because, well, because no case has ever been solved with the help of a clairvoyant and any supposed evidence to the contrary would be laughed out of court.

With its horror inflections. Solace was closer to something like The Cell, though not as ornate, and Hopkins barely altered his expression throughout the whole performance, perhaps to indicate the loneliness of the long-distance mind reader, or perhaps because he was getting confused about what he was meant to be doing. - **GC**

# 'I have spent so many years in this universe'

X-Men director Bryan Singer dishes on superhero series and genre's future

fter X-Men: Days of Future Past — the most sprawling and ambitious movie in the mutant superhero series to that point and the franchise's top box office earner director Bryan Singer knew he somehow needed to go even bigger with the next installment. Like fate-of-humanity-in-thebalance big.

In X-Men: Apocalypse, an ancient mutant with supernatural powers (Oscar Isaac) awakens from a centuries-long slumber in a super-villain-bad mood and sets out to purify (i.e. destroy) what he sees as a fallen world.

On a recent afternoon, Singer who has now directed four films in the X-Men franchise spoke about his days with the superhero series, both future and past, and where he sees the comic book genre as a whole heading,

post-Deadpool and Batman v Superman.

### What was your first thought about where the X-Men franchise needed to go after Days of Future Past? My first thought was the villain

needed to be different than any villain we'd ever encountered before. He had to have different qualities than Magneto, for instance. Apocalypse makes no distinction between humans and mutants. He's fighting no war for either side. He's fighting a war for dominance over the Earth. He also views himself not as

a mutant. He's a vengeful who takes claim for being the father of society and faith, and when societies go astray, he destroys them. After being buried for 4,000 years, he awakens to a world that has developed hubris, so he sets about to start from scratch and build what he considers a purer world. That's a very different than I've encountered before.

I'm very deeply fascinated by cults, so by taking what I've studied from cults and instituting it into the Apocalypse character, I thought, "I can make something that we haven't seen yet in the X-Men franchise'" – and that gives me a reason to return to it. Otherwise, it's going to get a little

#### We've seen various supervillains try to destroy the world before. How do you make that feel fresh and have the stakes feel real?

Our movie is all about our characters. I mean, yes, there is that stuff - the big stuff, I guess you'd say — and the audience will get their fair share of that. But ultimately, it's about the characters.

So as long as I stay true to a good and interesting story that's character-based, then all of the spectacle — and this film has more spectacle than any other X-Men film has had, probably by many times - it's still not the

focus. I think that's the difference between this and just going to see a bunch of fireworks.

When you made the first X-Men movie in 2000, did you have any idea that you'd get so deeply involved in the genre?

No ... way! I never even read comics when I was a kid. I was an old Star Trek fan. I just knew I wanted to work in the scifi fantasy space. I remember meeting Stan Lee when I was starting out at USC and taking a picture with him. I was so excited

to meet the guy who created all these characters. But that was it.

But as I watched the animated X-Men series and read the comic books, I started to find an identification with the characters. I grew up a Jewish kid in a Catholic neighbourhood. I was an only child. I was a nerd. I wasn't a very good student. I was struggling with issues. So when I suddenly come across this universe that's all about misfits and outcasts who become superheroes, it intrigued me, and I started to figure a way to tell this story not just to the fan base but to a wider audience.

You started making these movies in a pre-social media world. Last year, when the first image of Apocalypse came out in Entertainment Weekly, the Internet went nuts in a way that wouldn't have happened 16 years ago. Is it hard not to let all that fan scrutiny get in your head?

It never gets in my head. I just look at it as silliness. Someone puts out a picture that has a pink light on all the characters, and people go, "Is Apocalypse going to be pink?" I'm like, "Come on, people." The mistake was made by us in releasing the photo — it's not the magazine's fault.

The downside of social media is that everything moves so quickly, and it takes the magic away. The good part is it allows me to correct mistakes that start to catch fire. I can control any misunderstanding that gets out of control.

On Days of Future Past, they were like, "Oh, no, they're going to do leather costumes again!" I just took a picture and I wrote. "#NoLeatherCostumes," and overnight, the fans calmed down. That's the benefit of social media.

When you look at things like the huge success of Deadpool and the negative reception to Batman v Superman, what's vour sense of where we are in the evolution of the comicbook movie genre?

I think (filmmakers) have to do what they do with all good movies: They have to take their time with them. You can't just take a bunch of characters and throw them together and stir them up in a soup and hope that it works. They'll make a lot of money, perhaps, but they won't necessarily progress the universe or satisfy.

I always refer to these as movies that happen to take place in comic book universes, but ultimately, I treat them with the same seriousness that I do The Usual Suspects. ut as far as whether the world can stand more superhero movies? Oh, yes. The X-Men universe alone is every bit as large as the remaining Marvel universe. It's enormous. It's filled with mythology and lore, and it can take you anywhere you want to go through time and space. So, I think there's a long ways to go.

I just hope not every theatre is filled with a ... comic book movie because it doesn't leave any room for Steve Jobs and The Big Short and The Revenant and other movies that I love.

#### Where do you see the X-Men franchise going from here and where do you see yourself fitting into it?

For me, this is not only the finale of the trilogy that started with X-Men: First Class, it's the finale of six movies. But I also call it an "in-betwee-quel" — not a sequel or a prequel — because it happens in 1983, before the first X-Men. I've done something no other franchise has done - not even Star Wars, which is bouncing around in time. I've actually altered time so it concludes and also sows the seeds for the characters to find pieces of their destiny where we found them in the first three X-Men movies.

I recently met Danny Boyle — he and I have known of each other for many years but never met. He was prepping Steve Jobs at the time, and I was doing this, and he said, "Are you going to be doing X-Men movies forever?" And I didn't actually say no.

The reality is, even though I'm desperate to jump to something different, I've spent so many years in this universe and I love this cast and the characters so much, I just don't see myself abandoning them forever. Perhaps as a consultant, as a producer, even as a director. I could see myself returning in the future. Just right now, once this one is done, I'd like to do something really different. -LosAngeles Times/MCT
