PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome back

A big welcome back to all of our students and staff to the 2019 School Year. In particular, I welcome all our Year 7 students and their families especially those joining our learning community for the first time. I must say that from my engagement with the students from day one, they are a fantastic group of young people. A strong sense of connectedness with our school and with each other is already evident. We are so happy to have each and everyone of them become part of our learning organisation. Here is a day from one of our Year 7 students on their first day reflection at Eltham High School:

My First Day

"The area surrounding the office was crowded, flooded with people who were now, in 2019 finally allowed to call themselves Year sevens at Eltham High School. As well as parents walking besides some of them, but not without getting told by their kids that they were 'too embarrassing'.

Although we were all quite apprehensive at the beginning of the day, we would all soon come to realise everyone was in the same boat.

We started off by having an assembly in The Nalleijerring Performance Centre with Mr Sicari, as well as some of the Year twelve leaders. They talked us through the school values and motto 'Deeds Count'. Each of them went on to talk specifically about a school value, giving their interpretation to each one and explaining what it means to them. They talked about the impact that each quality could make, if we adopted it, to our learning experience.

After that my class ended up sitting in the Drama Room for what seemed like ages, trying to decipher our locks for our lockers. Eventually an older student, or a 'locker expert' according to Mr Franklin came and helped us out.

Later on we had Ms Hughes, our English teacher and our Junior School Coordinator, who asked us the question "How does what Mr Sicari said this morning link to learning your locker combinations and how to unlock the lock?" We had multiple answers but mine was linking creativity and initiative to problem solving and coming up with a solution if your locker lock won't open.

We had breaks in between to socialise and also finally had Music during which the majority of my class participated in the timbre test. The timbre test would determine which instrument was best suited to each of us; which one would be best to pursue. Then returning to our Music Class for about fifteen minutes before we went back home to report how our day went to our parents.

The perplexing nature of high school comes from the fact you can feel so many different emotions that you can't describe all in one word. The apprehensive feeling entering, the sadness of leaving friends behind but the happiness of gaining some, meeting new people and additionally pursuing our interests. The underlying comfort and support Eltham High School teachers provide astounds me. It was so lovely getting to see them and work more closely with them a little more."



At the first assembly for the year with each of the year levels, we reflected on our school purpose statement and the fundamental school values that define who we are and what we stand for. A number of our Senior School leaders presented their understanding and interpretation of one of the values and this reinforced to the students just how important it is to first understand the values and secondly align with them for a successful progression through the school over the years. I ask parents/guardians for your ongoing support and encouragement of our young people during their time away from school as well as for what the school is aiming to achieve.



At the same assemblies, we communicated to the students that at Eltham High School, the default position is a growth mindset as opposed to a fixed mindset. It was heart-warming to see our Year 7 students pick up on this very quickly even in the most mundane, operational task of opening their locker locks, persevering and saying to themselves, I cannot seem to do this yet but I know that with some help I will be able to do it.

In my presentation to the students, I went through our school vision for our young people:

To develop creative students who are active seekers, users and creators of their own knowledge,

who have a strong sense of responsibility towards society and the environment and who act with integrity and show that "Deeds Count."

At each year level, we spent a little time exploring what this means and how we need to work together in order to fulfill this vision for very child. Again it was surprising to see that at least one of our Year 7 students, on say one was able to define and articulate "Deeds Count" as being the School Motto. Very impressive!

Our Year 12 students were very excited to be back and get straight into the work that lies ahead. Our Year 11 students were immediately presented with information about their Study Camp. Year 10 stduents were excited to now be part of the Senior School as well as by the prospect of being supported to identify their particular pathway into the senior Years and beyond. Year 9 students were enthusiastic to be back and primarily to be able to expereince learning through the choices thay made in relation to the Elective Program. It will be an exciting Year for Year 8 stduents; In addition to their Curriculum Program a number of exciting expereinces will open up to them as the school furher engages with the Banyule/Nillumbik Tech School through the STEAM/STEM initiative.

In summary it seems that we have made a good start.

School Drop off and Pick up times

I remind all parents and guardians and inform new parents and guardians to our school that student safety is the primary consideration at all times including both drop off time and pick up times.

Whilst traffic seems to flow smoothly through the circular driveway of the school at the start of the day, there seems to be greater congestion at pick up time in the afternoon.

The circular driveway is to be used purely for drop off and pick up.

There is no parking available within the school grounds between the following time (8:00 – 10:00am and 2:00 – 4:00pm). "No Standing Anytime" signs are located within the school and it is important that parents/guardians adhere to these. Furthermore, double parking is illegal and within the school grounds, it causes further congestion, which in turn impinges on student safety.

We will be enforcing the use of the circular driveway purely for drop off and pick up of students.

As you move into the circular driveway, if your child is not at the front of the school you will need to exit the driveway and re-enter. You may need to do this more than once. Alternatively, it is advisable that you organise with your child another location for pick up.

As always, we will continue to expect everyone to abide by road and safety laws and procedures as they move through the driveway.

Subsequently, it is imperative that everyone behaves in a lawful and safe way out in Withers Way, Susan Street, Bell Street and Ely Street. We have informed the Ranger of the school's strategy and it is possible that the Ranger's office may take action against people who disregard road and safety laws out in the streets.

The school strategy is necessary in order to ensure the safety for the young people in our care

I trust that you will understand the need for this direction and I ask you for your continued support to ensure the safety of our kids.

A further reminder that there have been changes to the parking areas on the north side of Withers Way across the road from the entry into the school. With the completion of Leisure Centre, redevelopment four parking bays have been converted into a bus-parking zone. This is to support the new entry into the Leisure Centre that has been designated a school entry. From 9:00am to 3:00pm, this area is purely a bus-parking zone. Between 8:00am and 9:00am, this area is a school drop off zone (5-minutes Stop). Between 3:00pm and 4:00pm, this is a school pick up zone (5 minute Stop).

I encourage you to use the drop off and pick up zone but also to adhere to the time restrictions to stop. Council Officers have been patrolling the area and they have been known to issue parking fines.

Reminder - Subject Fee and Essential Items Payments

A reminder to parents that Year 11 and 12 Subject Fees and Year 9 and 10 Semester 1 Subject Fees were due on **14 December**.

Subject Fee Payments fall into the Optional Extras category of School Council Approved Contributions and are offered on a 'user pays' basis with the expectation that the fee will be paid for in full. Shortfalls in payment of subject fees compromises the quality of the educational program on offer. Please note that students may be assigned to a course without a financial charge if subject levy payment is not received.

We request that Essential Educational Items fee payments are completed by 31 March. These fees fall into the Essential Student Learning Items category of School Council Approved Contributions and provide a range of services for students including locker, lock, photocopying, whole school sports days, additional ICT support as well as other essential items for practical subjects.

Your timely payment of Fees will ensure that we are able to deliver the course curriculum to students as planned in 2019.

Fees may be paid via BPay, cash or credit card. In cases of financial hardship, special payment arrangements can be made in confidence. 2019 CSEF Applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) provides payments for eligible students to attend activities like:

- School camps or trips;
- · Swimming and school-organised sport programs;
- Outdoor Education programs;
- Excursions and Incursions.

Applications for 2019 are now open, through until the end of term 2, 2019. If you applied for the CSEF at Eltham High School in 2018, you do not need to complete an application form in 2019 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances. Eltham High School will apply for the CSEF on your behalf.

You will only need to submit an application form in 2019 if any of the following changes have occurred:

- New student enrolments: your child has started or changed schools in 2019 or you did not apply at the same school in 2018 or
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2019.

Schools are able to accept and process applications up until the end of term two each year. CSEF payments are made to schools from March onwards each year.

Secondary School Vaccinations in 2019

The Secondary School Vaccine Program offers free vaccines to Year 7 and 10 students. These vaccines provide protection against:

- Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) one dose for Year 7 students
- Human Papillomavirus (HPV) two doses for Year 7 students
- Meningococcal A,C,W,Y one dose for Year 10 students

Parents/guardians of Year 7 and 10 students should look out for the vaccine consent card coming home from school with your child. Please read the information, complete and return the card regardless of whether your child is being vaccinated at school.

If students have missed vaccines, either in childhood or adolescence, and require catch-up vaccines, they should speak with their immunisation provider. (ie. local council or GP).

Compass and Student Email

Email and Compass will be the main communication tool between students, teachers and parents. The Calendar on Compass will include important dates such as camps, school events and assessment tasks. Your child's class timetable is also visible on Compass. More information regarding the use of Compass will be provided at the ICT information night.

In 2019, students have not been provided with a school diary. They will be encouraged to use their computers, phones and other tech tools to organise their schedule. We do have a handful of hard copy diaries for students who we think might benefit from some old-school technology. Please help your child by regularly looking through their calendars and taking note of important dates and reminders.

Lockers and Locks

All students have been provided with a locker and their own combination padlock. To avoid theft or damage to books and devices all lockers are to remain locked when not being accessed. Please be reminded that lockers are school property and students need to maintain them so that they can be handed over to the next year level in future years.

All absences need to be approved through Compass. Any long term absences need to be communicated directly with the student's co-ordinator.

It is expected that all students arrive at school promptly for their first class which starts at 8:50am. In the initial weeks of school allowing extra time to organise themselves and find out where they should be is really important so that they can be in class on time. Any student arriving after 8:50am must sign in at the General Office. If students need to leave early, a parent or guardian must provide written permission and collect their child from the General Office where they will sign them out.

SPORT

House Sport Carnivals

Eltham High School will be holding two House Sport Carnivals during Term 1. Our Swimming Carnival will take place at Aquarena, Doncaster Tuesday 19 February and our Athletics Carnival on Thursday 28 March at the Doncaster Athletics Track. Both days are considered 'normal' school days and as such it is expected that all students attend. There is a strong history at Eltham High School of students dressing up in House Colours and a 'Best Dressed' competition is held at each event. Participation is not compulsory, and students can enter as many or as few events as they wish. The results are used to select the students who advance to the District Sports.

Interschool Sport

Eltham High participates in the 'School Sport Victoria' Sporting Program. We enter teams into a 'Round Robin' competition with local schools in the Nillumbik District. Each section of the school can participate in one Round Robin each term. Different sports are offered in each term and successful teams advance to Region Finals. There is an associated cost for participating in the Inter-School Sports Program - \$10 per student. This helps contribute to the upkeep of Team Uniforms, Equipment and Transport. Payment and Permission is given through the Compass Portal and must be completed prior to the event in order for students to attend. Students can participate in one sport per term – Competitions are held on the same day.

Sports for Term 1 are as follows

Year 11 and 12: Cricket, Baseball, Softball, Tennis, Volleyball, Basketball and Table Tennis Year 7: Cricket, Baseball, Softball, Tennis and Volleyball

Timetabled Sport - Year 7 and 8

Students in Year 7 and 8 participate in a Sport session once per week. Students compete in House based teams and play a range of sports throughout the term. Students are involved in the umpiring and scoring duties each week. We aim to provide students with a small taste of a variety of sports, many of which are offered in the Inter-School Sports Program. 
