I am truly excited to announce the Deaf and hard of hearing K-12 art competition for all Deaf and hard of hearing students living in Maryland with the contest theme "The Deaf Experience." Governor Larry Hogan and First Lady Yumi Hogan are strong supporters of art, especially artwork produced by Marylanders.

The art competition focuses on the use of De'VIA elements. De'VIA is an art movement that examines and expresses the Deaf experience from a cultural, linguistic, and intersectional perspective. De'VIA has specific characteristics within the art, including contrasting colors and a centralized focus on facial or body parts such as the eyes, ears, mouths, arms, and hands, along with motifs, metaphors and insights representative of the Deaf perspective. The movement is also a celebration of Deaf culture and sign language through artistic expression. De'VIA provides artists with the freedom and opportunity to explore dimensions of one's hearing status and its relationship with the world.

We have always been supportive of Deaf-centered efforts, such as De'VIA. This is an opportunity to promote awareness of art and its relationship with Deaf and hard of hearing people. It is also an opportunity to see the unique diversity among Deaf and hard of hearing students in Maryland, and see life through their experiences.

This art competition seeks to integrate development of art along with young artists' awareness of their hearing status. The contest also hopes to bring public awareness of what it means to be Deaf while recognizing the language, communication, culture and history of Deaf people.

I urge you to learn all about De'VIA and enjoy the artistic process of creating an original piece to share with Maryland and the world. I look forward to seeing the artwork, and meeting Deaf and hard of hearing artists!

#### **De'VIA Information and Resources**

This is an informational sheet detailing De'VIA and the resources available for educators, parents, and students.

#### What is De'VIA?

De'VIA stands for "Deaf View/Image Art," an art that examines and expresses the Deaf experience from a cultural, linguistic and intersectional perspective.

### De'VIA: What does the word represent?

**De** = **De**af and **De**afBlind people's expression of resistance, affirmation and liberation

V = View of how Deaf and DeafBlind people experience the world

**I** = **I**mages/motifs/symbols of the Deaf/DeafBlind experience

A = Art, Aesthetics and Authentic expressions of Deaf/DeafBlind experience

#### De'VIA: Details

De'VIA can be identified by formal elements such as Deaf artists' possible tendency to use contrasting colors and values, intense colors, and contrasting textures. It may also most often include a centralized focus, with exaggeration or emphasis on facial features, especially eyes, mouths, ears, and hands. Currently, Deaf artists tend to work in human scale with these exaggerations, and not exaggerate the space around these elements.

Specific elements of De'VIA include the use of intense and contrasting colors, an emphasis on eyes, mouths, ears and hands/arms, along with motifs, metaphors, insights and perspectives of Deaf experience.

## Deaf and Hard of Hearing K-12 Art Competition: Details and Requirements

The K-12 art competition is open to Deaf and hard of hearing Kindergarten to 12th grade students living or attending school in Maryland.

Deadline for submission: Wednesday, January 31, 2018.

The art work will be categorized and judged according to the following grade groups:

• Elementary School: K - 2nd Grade

• Elementary School: 3rd - 5th Grade

• Middle School: 6th - 8th Grade

• High School: 9th - 12th Grade

Winners will be notified via email and the formal announcement will be made in March.

Requirements for artwork:

- Two Dimensional Art Work (drawing, photography, painting, computer-generated art, or the like) that can be framed within one of the following sizes:
  - 5" x 7"
  - 8" x 10"
  - 11" x 14"
  - 16" x 20"
  - 20" x 24"
  - 24" x 36"
- Originality:
  - Artwork must be the contestant's original work without assistance of anyone else.
  - Artwork previously submitted to other competitions will not be accepted.
- Represent the perspective of the artist:
  - Artist must be Deaf or hard of hearing
  - Educators and parents are encouraged to guide the student, NOT assist or co-create the artwork.
- Include one or more aspects of Deaf people's experience in these areas:
  - Language and Communication
  - Culture
  - History
