What to do.

Hard tack candy by Nola Watters
-2 cups of sugar
$-2 / 3$ cup of corn syrup
$-3 / 4$ cup of water
-1 dram of candy flavoring or 1 teaspoon of an extract of your choice -food dye
-powdered sugar
-2 quart sauce pan
-a candy thermometer
Combine your sugar, corn syr-
up, and water in a 2 quart sauce pan. Stir over medium heat until sugar dissolves. Bring mixture to a boil without stirring. When syrup temperature reaches $260^{\prime} \mathrm{F}$, add color. Do not stir the mixture the boiling action with incorporate the color! Let it boil until it reaches $300^{\prime} \mathrm{F}$ then remove from the heat. After the boiling stops add your flavoring. Be careful the mixture lets of a steam try not to breathe it in! (trust me it is not pleasant) Then pore mixture on a lightly oiled cookie sheet or mold. Make sure you cut them into small pieces. Finally dust them with a small amount of powdered sugar and store them in an air tight container.

Mr. Toporski Interview by Hope Fuchs
Do you want to know more about why Mr. Toporski chooses the musicals he chooses, maybe why he chose to start doing the musicals in the Junior High again? Well it's all in this interview.
Why did you decide to bring Musical back to the Junior High students?
Musical theatre is a wonderful opportunity for students to be expressive and creative, as well as learn a number of different skills in the process. Unfortunately, when I first arrived at Hopewell, the only options for students to pursue drama were at the high school level. I wanted this to change so that younger students could get involved in acting, dancing, and even being a part of the stage crew behind the scenes.
Another benefit to having a Jr. High musical program is that the High School musicals are now getting cast and crew members who have experience being on stage. They understand the amount of work and dedication it takes to put on a successful production, and it has allowed us to move the bar even higher for the upper grades. We can spend less time initiating new students into the process and more time on rehearsals.
Finally, having two programs from 6th grade through 12th grade allows us to get students across the district excited about musical theatre and working together on common goals. Not only do we schedule musical performances for the elementary students in the Spring, but we also have high school students coming down to help the Jr. High cast and crew. Our next goal is to give high school students the experience of being directors, choreographers, and stage managers for the Jr. High musical. We are always looking to expand these opportunities for our students, and reestablishing the Jr. High program was a big step in this process.

## Why did you choose Annie JR to be the first musical

 the Junior High put on?When I made the decision to bring back the Jr. High musical and then received official approval from the school board, I had to choose my first show carefully. I wanted to pick one that would have audience appeal and recognition, because I needed to draw in good-sized crowds for the performances. In other words, I needed to kickstart the program with a high-profile musical.
My biggest challenge from there was finding a show that could be flexible with its cast. Though I had a decent idea of who would try out from my chorus classes, I had no real clue of knowing what size cast I would have, nor what kind of talent it would bring me. I was taking a shot in the dark, so to speak.
After looking through possible shows, Annie, JR. seemed to be the best fit. It featured a large cast of girls (which I knew I would have), could be flexible the in the sizes of the ensemble roles, and would be very well known. In retrospect, it was a perfect decision, and I couldn't be happier with how successful it was. It fit all of our needs for the revitalization of the Jr. High musical here at Hopewell.

How do you choose what Musical the students will be doing?
My process for choosing the Jr. High musical comprises a few steps. First and foremost, I look through the shows available for licensing and come up with a master list of possibilities. I eliminate any shows we've done recently, any shows the high school has done recently, and any shows that can't accommodate a larger cast. We had 40 members in the cast for The Wizard of Oz,
 and I anticipate a similar turnout each year.
From there, I start taking a look at the shows in more depth, asking a few questions to narrow my options. Is the show boy or girl dominant? Is there any gender flexibility with the major or minor roles? Does the show complement the talents of the students we'll have in the musical that year? Does it seem particularly easy or difficult? What are the possible technical demands? These help me filter the list until I'm down to only two or three possibilities.
The last thing I do is order what's called a "perusal copy" of the script and music. This lets me read through the script, see the sheet music, and hear an audio recording to further assess the show. I get a better idea of the characters, singing requirements, and technical aspects. Once all of this information is synthesized, I have a conversation with Mrs. Doria and Ms. Beley to get their final input, and then the show is selected!
What is your favorite part about collaborating with the students and Mrs. Doria and Mrs. Beley to make the musical a great show?
My favorite part about collaborating with others on the musical is learning new things from them. Everyone comes to the table with different experiences and expertise, and when they all collide together, amazing things can happen. Ms. Beley has been directing the high school musicals for over 10 years now, so she can provide a lot of useful tips for directing and producing a show. She also serves as my costumer, and she definitely has a much better eye than I do in this area.
Mrs. Doria has been a dancer since she was in school, and she's been choreographing shows almost as long as Ms. Beley has been directing them. I am not a dancer by any means, so I always turn to her for advice on choreography, even when it's not a big routine.
There's no possible way one person can do everything in a musical. Not only that, but it's always good practice to get different advice and critique durthe creative process. Often we get so emerged in our vision, that we fail to look at it from a different perspective. Having a great set of staff, students, and parents to help me is truly appreciated!

## What have you done in your musical career? (such as musicals, choruses etc.)

My love of music goes all the way back to 3rd grade, when I decided to learn viola in the school orchestra. Just a couple years later, in fifth grade, I joined band on the French horn, as well as our elementary chorus. When I moved on to our Jr. High in 7th grade, I decided to pick up the trombone so I could be in the jazz band. I also started playing in the pit orchestra for our Jr. High musicals, which included The Wizard of Oz and Bye Bye Birdie.
Starting in 9th grade and continuing through high school, I decided I wanted to move from the pit to the stage, performing in four shows total: Hello, Dolly!; How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying; Sugar; and Carnival (where I landed a lead role). During this time, I was also a member of the marching band, and was selected as drum major my Senior year. Between band, orchestra, chorus, marching band, and the musicals, it's clear that music was a big part of my life in school!
In fact, music was such an influence, that I went on to play French horn in the U.S. Army band field for four years. After completing my Basic Combat Training in Ft. Sill, OK, and the

Armed Forces School of Music at Little Creek Naval Amphibious Base, VA, I was stationed at Ft. Lee, VA, and later at Ft. Bliss, TX. When it came time to re-enlist, I instead decided to end my time in service so that I could pursue a career as a music teacher.
During the next four years of my life attaining a Music Education degree at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, I improved my musicianship and learned great ways to teach music to children. I was a member of the Horn Studio, Symphonic Band, Symphony Orchestra, and "The Legend" Marching Band. Even since graduating college and moving to Pittsburgh, I continue to play my French horn in local ensembles, such as the West Hills Symphonic Band and Pittsburgh Horn Club. I have also played in many different high school musical pit orchestras, including Riverview, Woodland Hills, Aliquippa, West Allegheny, Avonworth, Blackhawk, and Carlynton.

The past 25 years have certainly been full of different musical opportunities, and I hope the next 25 are just as fun and rewarding! I guess it's pretty obvious why I teach music, huh?

A: I love having the same students for 4 years in a row and watching them grow and develop into amazing young musicians.

Q: What is Band of Hope?

## Candy Cane Cookies <br> By: Hannah Berkovic

Ingredients<br>1 cup sugar<br>1 cup soft margarine/butter<br>$1 / 2$ cup milk<br>1 egg<br>1 teaspoon vanilla<br>1 teaspoon peppermint extract<br>$31 / 2$ cups flour<br>1 teaspoon baking powder<br>$1 / 4$ teaspoon salt<br>$1 / 2$ cup sugar<br>$1 / 2$ teaspoon red food coloring<br>$1 / 2$ cup crushed peppermint candy

Mix sugar, butter, milk, egg, vanilla, and peppermint extract thoroughly. Stir in flour, baking powder, and salt. Divide dough in half, tint one half with red food coloring, cover, place in refrigerator for at least 4 hours. For each cookie roll take 1 teaspoon of each and roll in into a 4 " rope on a lightly floured board. Place them side by side and press lightly, then roll the together. Place on an ungreased cookie sheet in the shape on a candy cane. Bake at 375 degrees for $9-10$ minutes. Mix crushed peppermint and sugar together and sprinkle it over the cookies immediately after they come out of the oven.
