

Dalasan holds pride of place in Cox Plate field for studmaster Hayes

Multiple Group 1-placed entire an outside chance for Saturday's stallion-making Moonee Valley feature

am Hayes will feel a sense of pride when Dalasan (Dalakhani), a five-year-old entire bred, owned and trained in South Australia, lines up in Saturday's Cox Plate (Gr 1, 2040m).

The Cornerstone Stud principal may not have any direct attachment to the Leon Macdonald and Andrew Gluyas-trained Dalasan, who was bred and part-owned by well-known South Australian Harry Perks, but the meritorious achievement of the "state" having a prospective runner in the weight-for-age contest is not lost on Hayes.

Dalasan, by the late Cornerstone Stud shuttle stallion Dalakhani (Darshaan), was conceived at the South Australian stud in 2015, the last of three consecutive seasons the striking grey shuttled from France to Australia.

<< Continued from page 2 A five-time stakes winner, including of the VRC Danehill Stakes (Gr 2, 1200m) at three, Dalasan is also a four-time Group 1 placegetter: in the South Australian Derby (2500m), Doncaster Mile (1600m), Queen Elizabeth Stakes (2000m) and a last-start third in the Epsom Handicap (1600m).

"He loomed early in his career to be a really likely stallion prospect and he didn't quite hit the right type of Group 1 and now he's probably in some of the best form of his life and he's obviously handled remaining a colt," Hayes told ANZ Bloodstock News.

"The fact that he was bred here in South Australia, Harry Perks is a good friend of ours, and it's a nice story that keeps on giving.

"We can't wait for the race. I think Leon and Andrew have got him very well and he certainly warrants a spot in the field."

Just how Dalakhani came to be on the Cornerstone Stud roster is a backstory in itself and one that proves that perseverance can pay off.

"It was a great story, really. It was (well-known agent) Hubie De Burgh, a family and industry friend, who mentioned to us that the Aga Khan Stud's team could potentially be interested in shuttling a horse like Dalakhani," Hayes recalled yesterday.

"Darren Thomas, of Seymour Bloodstock and Thomas Foods, was my business partner at the time. We flew up to Europe to see if we could get him down here (in 2012), and that was unsuccessful, but then we went again the next season to come up with a deal. "We structured a deal whereby we leased him and we had him in South Australia for three years, and he would have come back again.

"He was standing for a fee of \$20,000 and covering pretty good books of 90 to 100 mares

from memory, but eventually, being a grey and being almost white in the end, he started to get cancerous growths and his fertility dropped back to zero and was unable to get mares in foal.

"His last season standing anywhere was here in Australia."

Dalakhani, who only died in January, was certainly successful in Europe with his now Westbury Stud-based son Reliable Man, a Queen Elizabeth Stakes (Gr 1, 2000m) winner for trainer Chris Waller, among his haul of 55 stakes winners in both hemispheres.

The Cox Plate is arguably an underrated source of quality stallions. Savabeel (Zabeel), the 2004 Cox Plate winner, is a champion sire for New Zealand's Waikato Stud, while his barnmate Ocean Park (Thorn Park), the 2012 Cox Plate winner, has made an impact at stud.

Back-to-back winner So You Think (High Chaparral) (2009-2010), who stands at Coolmore, was Australia's most popular stallion with breeders last year while his roster mate, 2014 Cox Plate Continued on page 5>>

<< Continued from page 3 winner Adelaide (Galileo), has Group 1-winning daughter Funstar, who was sold for \$2.7 million as a broodmare this year, to his credit.</p>

The 2013 winner, Rosemont Stud's Shamus Award (Snitzel), is also the sire of Australia's current boom racehorse, Saturday's dominant Caulfield Cup (Gr 1,2400m) winner Incentivise, and eight other stakes winners this calendar year alone.

Further back, Octagonal (Zabeel) - the sire of Lonhro - won the Cox Plate in 1995 and Rubiton (Century), the sire of dual Cox Plate winner Fields Of Omagh, won the race in 1987.

Dalasan and dual Group 1 winner Mo'unga (Savabeel), who ran fifth in the Epsom Handicap, are yet to have stud deals confirmed, unlike fellow Cox Plate-bound Group 1-winning three-year-old colts Anamoe (Street Boss) (Darley) and Captivant (Capitalist) (Newgate Farm).

Furthermore, co-trainer Natalie Young said on Sunday that she and training partner Trent Busuttin could direct Forgot You (Savabeel) to the Cox Plate in order to increase his stallion appeal.

"You would have to say that a Cox Plate winner would have to find a commercial home at stud," Hayes said.

"Dalasan probably deserves his opportunity at stud regardless. While 2000 metres isn't as sexy as a 1200-metre two-year-old race, when you look at those horses such as Savabeel and Shamus Award - you only have to look at last weekend that it's not bad breeding a 2400-metre winner.

"Based on how he's going this prep he deserves a commercial opportunity at stud. Tavistock is no longer and Savabeel did win a Cox Plate, but he profiles up a bit like them."

Dalasan might be at \$34 with bookmakers ahead of this morning's Cox Plate final acceptances and barrier draw, but come Saturday Hayes will be cheering loudly if Dalasan, the pride of South Australia, hits full throttle at the top of the short Moonee Valley home straight.

"Dalasan is an interesting subplot in the race. We were so proud of the fact that we were able to shuttle a stallion on behalf of the Aga Khan Studs," he said.

"It was one of the few shuttle deals they'd ever done and I think one of the first at the time. It was a little feather in our cap and something that we are still very proud of.

"To see Dalasan still racing at the elite level, we love that connection."

Fillies from More Joyous family to hit the market

Inglis Digital have confirmed that they will offer both a daughter of and a sister to eight-time Group 1-winning mare More Joyous (More Than Ready). Joyous Legend, an \$800,000 Inglis Easter Yearling purchase, is a debut winner who ran third in the Percy Sykes Stakes (Gr 2, 1200m) as a juvenile and will be offered as both a racing and breeding proposition in a bespoke online auction that is due to begin tomorrow and end on Thursday, October 21. Sunday Legend, an unraced sister to More Joyous, who herself cost \$500,000 at the Inglis Easter Yearling Sale, will also be offered as a racing and breeding prospect as part of the Inglis Digital October (Late) Online Sale which is set to be held from October 22-27. "I am not really a breeder, racing is my passion and while I bought these fillies as race fillies, I knew that they would have significant value as breeding prospects in time," said Bon Ho, owner of both Joyous Legend and Sunday Legend. "There is nothing too elaborate about offering them in separate sales, we just felt that selling both of them a week apart would allow each the necessary time to be carefully considered by buyers. They have been carefully and considerately managed and I have no doubt that they have the potential to represent fantastic value for sophisticated investors."

Manikato under consideration for Hustle

Jason Warren and Dean Krongold may still yet run Brooklyn Hustle (Starspangledbanner) in Friday's Manikato Stakes (Gr 1, 1200m) at Moonee Valley despite having a preference to run on Derby Day instead. The five-year-old mare has been disappointing this season with two below-par runs and Warren said that Friday night's Group 1 may be worth having a crack at. The Linlithgow Stakes (Gr 2, 1200m) or the Begonia Belle Stakes (Gr 3, 1100m) for mares are the races that are under consideration on October 30. "It's shaping like a good year to have a go at the Manikato, but the owners are pretty keen to go to Derby Day, but they're keeping their options open," Warren said. "It's more than likely she'll run Derby Day but we're keeping our options open on whether to run on Friday night." A last place finish in the Moir Stakes (Gr 1, 1000m) was followed by a fifth in the Northwood Plume Stakes (Gr 3, 1200m) at Caulfield on October 9. "She was like one of those dragsters, they can't turn after they've lit up, so it's been a disappointing start to the campaign for a horse that is absolutely flying," Warren added.

McDonald maintains faith in Zaaki

James McDonald arrived in Melbourne on Sunday and will head into six days of quarantine so that he can ride Zaaki (Leroidesanimaux) in Saturday's Cox Plate (Gr 1, 2040m) at Moonee Valley expecting the Annabel Neasham-trained seven-year-old to bounce back after a shock odds-on defeat in the Caulfield Stakes (Gr 1, 2000m). With McDonald still in Sydney for

Zaaki's last two races, Craig Williams has been aboard the gelding but McDonald is looking forward to getting back on top the dual Group 1 winner when Williams rides the Godolphin colt Anamoe (Street Boss) in the Plate. "I think he has more to offer," McDonald told RSN. "He won the Sandown race (Underwood Stakes) in good style by a few lengths, but Caulfield tripped him up a bit last time and I'm hoping he can bounce back at The Valley on a forgiving surface. It looks like we're going to get a little rain during the week which will only help and if he bounces back to his Sandown form then he'll be very hard to beat."

May no certainty to lead Cox Plate

Improving gelding Callsign Mav (Atlante) is one of the only real pace angles in the Cox Plate but his trainer John Bary is hopeful that the fiveyear-old can get a lead instead of having to make the running himself. The son of Atlante (Fastnet Rock) managed to win the Tarzino Trophy (Gr 1, 1400m) when leading from start to finish but sat off the pace when winning the Windsor Park Plate (Gr 1, 1600m) on his most recent start. "The only reason he led in the Tarzino was because he had a wide draw and had four of them kicking up underneath him so he had to keep going forward," Bary said. "There's a couple of three-year-olds there in Anamoe and Captivant and often one of those with the light weight tries to run along, and I don't think they'll hold Zaaki up this time. I'd prefer him not to lead. I'd prefer to be sitting in the one-one, getting a drag along." Callsign May arrived in Australia last Wednesday and is housed with Danny O'Brien, who will take over the training of the gelding after his Cox Plate run. "He cantered around Moonee Valley on Saturday in company with Miami Bound and has settled in well," Bary said.



Wilde weighs up Geelong Cup start

Tralee Rose (Tavistock) was one of 14 horses to take up their entry for tomorrow's Geelong Cup (Gr 3, 2400m) with her trainer Symon Wilde having to make the decision of whether to run the five-year-old or hold off until the Melbourne Cup (Gr 1, 3200m), with it looking all but certain that the mare will gain a spot in the 24-runner field on November 2. Getting just fifth placing in the Melbourne Cup would earn connections \$230,000 while winning tomorrow's Geelong feature will pocket them \$240,000. "We'll weigh it all up," Wilde told Racing.com. "It (Geelong Cup) looks a nice race for her so we'll look at the track condition and weigh up whether she needs to run and whether it's beneficial for her to run. The Geelong Cup is the more winnable race but (in the Melbourne Cup) Incentivise looks nearly unbeatable and there's that good European horse (Spanish Mission) but outside of those it is fairly open and we look a really good top-five chance."

Sirileo Miss to bypass Empire Rose

Sirileo Miss (Pride Of Dubai) remained undefeated this preparation when she took out the Ladies Day Vase (Gr 3, 1600m) at Caulfield last Wednesday and Wilde now has to make the decision on where his stakes-winning mare could head next, with tomorrow's Geelong Cup a possibility before a tilt at the Melbourne Cup. Wilde was also looking at putting the four-yearold in the Empire Rose Stakes (Gr 1, 1600m) but has admitted that the race may well be too strong for the daughter of Pride Of Dubai (Street Cry). "She's a horse that has surprised me a bit, she's just a winner, she's got a great winning strike-rate, she's tough," Wilde told Racing.com. "After getting a stakes win with her we were thinking originally of perhaps the Empire Rose, but I think that will be a really strong race this year, there's some great mares going for that race. There's a race on Oaks Day, the Inglis Bracelet, that she's eligible for and it's a \$250,000 race and it might be a good chance to keep the picket fence going with her. It's a good money race and now she's a stakes winner we can probably look to those sort of races a little bit more."

Calthorpe after lucrative Sydney Award

Chris Calthorpe is hoping that Group 1-winning mare Media Award (Shamus Award) can gain a big payday in the \$2 million The Invitation (1400m) at Randwick on Saturday. The winner of the Australasian Oaks (Gr 1, 2000m) on just her sixth career start, Media Award also has the \$7.5 million Golden Eagle (1500m) at Rosehill on October 30 as another potential target. "I said to the owners you're going to potentially race for \$9.5 million in seven days, where's that going to happen in the world?" Calthorpe said. "There's obviously some good fillies and mares in the race, but once you've won your Group 1 you've got to take them on somewhere. There's no Winx in it, it seems an even bunch of highly rated quality mares." Media Award accepted her invitation to Saturday's race which will also see star mare Entriviere (Tavistock), Group 1 winner Forbidden Love (All Too Hard) and the Doncaster (Gr 1, 1600m) runner-up Icebath (Sacred Falls) all line up.

Incentivise given 1.5 kilogram rise

Caulfield Cup (Gr 1, 2400m) winner Incentivise (Shamus Award) has been handed a 1.5 kilogram penalty for his impressive display and will now carry 57 kilograms if he is to line up in the Melbourne Cup. "Incentivise was imperious in winning the Carlton Draught Caulfield Cup on Saturday and, along with Jameka in 2016, arguably the most impressive Cup victor since Might and Power won by seven and a half lengths and broke the track record in 1997," Greg Carpenter, Racing Victoria's executive general manager of racing, told Racing. com. "Incentivise faces new challenges at Flemington on the first Tuesday in November, extending to 3200 metres for the first time and tackling international contenders in defending champion Twilight Payment and world class English stayer Spanish Mission. In the context of modern Cup history, a 1.5 kilogram penalty and Incentivise's new weight of 57 kilograms represents a significant challenge for the newest star of Australian racing to deliver Peter Moody his first Melbourne Cup victory, but it's one that is not insurmountable given his current form."

Midway queen hoping to reign with Pandora

After already winning two of the newly introduced Midway handicaps, Buchanan has yet another strong contender for this weekend's race in Pandora Blue (Hallowed Crown). The four-year-old has an impressive strike-rate with three wins from just five career outings and lines up this weekend on the back of a pillar-to-post victory at Port Macquarie. The daughter of Hallowed Crown (Street Sense) is a half-sister to Sapphire Stakes (Gr 2, 1200m) winner Two Blue (Dubleo) who was also housed at Buchanan's Wyong-based yard. "It's fantastic, it has really given stables like ours a boost," Buchanan said. "To go racing in town on a Saturday and compete for prizemoney like this, it just keeps everyone going, staff and owners alike." Buchanan also has her eye on the newly introduced \$700,000 Four Pillars (1500m) Midway race, a contest that is structured similar to The Kosciuszko (1200m), with slot holders having a pick of which horse to represent them. "If Pandora Blue can run well on Saturday, I see no reason why she couldn't back up next week and give a good account of herself," Buchanan said. "Jazzland and Margie Bee have also been in really good form too. They are race-hardened, fit and ready to go. Any one of those three would do their slot holders proud."

Triple Missile soars for Smith

Triple Missile (Smart Missile) could be set for a crack at the Winterbottom Stakes (Gr 1, 1200m) on November 27 after he justified strong favouritism in a 1000-metre handicap at Ascot on Saturday to take his career tally to four wins from just five starts. Making his racecourse debut for new trainer Lindsey Smith after transferring from Todd Harvey, the fouryear-old won by an easy two and a quarter lengths under Brad Rawiller after showing a good turn of foot at the 200-metre pole. The win gave Smith the second leg of a double on the day after Apple Schnapps had gained a narrow success three races earlier. "I thought he was pretty good and I thought he trialled pretty good," Smith told Tabradio. "I didn't know much about him to be honest, but he came in in

excellent form and condition. The owners want to have a look at him coming to Melbourne one day. He's a bit better horse than I anticipated. As soon as you gave him a tickle around the bum he seems to drop into another gear. He's an exciting horse."

Classique Legend out for spring

The Everest (1200m) fifth Classique Legend (Not A Single Doubt) will not race again this spring, his trainer Les Bridge has announced. After what was a rushed preparation to get him back for his defence of the \$15 million race, Bridge said it has now taken a toll on the six-year-old son of Not A Single Doubt (Redoute's Choice). Bridge outlined plans to give his 2020 winner of the showpiece race a three- to fourmonth spell, before targeting the TJ Smith Stakes (Gr 1, 1200m) in April and a return to The Everest next spring.

Overpass given Coolmore target

Bjorn Baker has confirmed his colt Overpass (Vancouver) will be directed towards the Coolmore Stud Stakes (Gr 1, 1200m) on October 30 at Flemington. The Darby Racingowned three-year-old has won three times from eight starts, and was most recently seen running fourth in the Roman Consul Stakes (Gr 2, 1200m) behind Paulele (Dawn Approach) on October 9. The decision means Overpass will bypass other possible targets, including the Bondi Stakes (1600m), Classique Legend Stakes (1300m) and Brian Crowley Stakes (Listed, 1400m) in order to contest the Melbourne sprint.

Boss to make permanent move to Victoria

Glen Boss has made the decision to permanently move back to Melbourne after gaining permission to travel last week. The three-time Melbourne Cup-winning jockey will be one of a handful to make the trip over for the Spring Racing Carnival but unlike fellow riders James McDonald and Hugh Bowman, Boss will not be in need of a return ticket. "I'm actually coming back to Melbourne to live," the rider told Racing.com. "I've been in Sydney

for the last two-and a-bit years, Sloane (Boss's wife) was just desperate to get home and be with the kids around," he explained. "They're not kids, they're young adults, but when you're not around them all the time, it's really difficult. A big part of my decision coming home is to spend more time with them and be a bit more proactive around them." After a three-year stint in Singapore, Boss returned to Australia in 2019 and has won 23 feature races since, with eight of those Group 1s.

Byrne's Golden Eagle backflip

Leading Queensland jockey Jim Byrne has had a change of heart and will now travel to Sydney to partner Apache Chase (Better Than Ready) in the Golden Eagle. The decision means Byrne will have to undergo a week of quarantine prior to his arrival in Sydney, while he will also need to complete two weeks' hotel quarantine upon his return to Brisbane after his application to quarantine at home was refused. Byrne has ridden the Desleigh Forster-trained four-year-old to four of his five wins this year, including when beating Ayrton (Iffraaj) in the Fred Best Classic (Gr 3, 1400m) in May.

Invader colt Battledance wins trial

Battledance, a colt from the first crop of Aquis stallion Invader (Snitzel), won a trial at the Gold Coast yesterday morning for Kacy Fogden. Wearing the colours of Aquis principal Tony Fung, Battledance won by a head over Kalea (Zoustar), with the pair drawing three and a half lengths clear of the remainder in the 900-metre trial. The colt, who is out of the USbred More Than Ready (Southern Halo) mare Fascinatin' Rhythm, was withdrawn from the Magic Millions National Yearling Sale last year and retained to race by Fung.

Hong Kong's Ho Ho Khan joins Freedman

The Group 3-winning Hong Kong stayer Ho Ho Khan (Makfi) will continue his career in Australia after joining the stable of Mitchell Freedman at Ballarat. The seven-year-old won the Queen Mother Memorial Cup (Gr 3, 2400m) in 2019, among four victories in Hong

Kong for David Hall, while he ran fourth in last year's Hong Kong Vase (Gr 1, 2400m) behind Mogul (Galileo). "I've just built up a bit of a relationship with David Hall through selling him a horse probably 12 or 18 months ago now," Freedman told Racing.com. "He just thought Ho Ho Khan needed a change and probably get his head back in the game a little bit." Freedman is hoping to allow the horse time to settle in his new environment. "He's had that one jump-out; he's probably going to have another one next Tuesday and he might want another one before he's ready to go to the races. We're thinking one or two runs this prep, have a bit of a look at him and get used to the horse a bit. We might set him for some races in the winter next time around with some rain-affected tracks, or if he's going good enough, he might head up to Sydney or something like that."

Qld set to reopen state border on December 17

Queensland premier Annastacia Palaszczuk yesterday outlined a roadmap for the state to open up borders to the rest of Australia and internationally, raising hopes of more interstate participants being able to travel to the Gold Coast for Magic Millions' curtainraising yearling sale which begins on January 11. ANZ Bloodstock News reported recently that the auction house was optimistic of interstate buyers being able to attend the seven-day sale, with managing director Barry Bowditch saying he is 'confident of hosting a Covid-safe event'. The Queensland state government is expecting their vaccination rate to hit 70 per cent on November 19, at which point fully vaccinated travellers will be allowed into Queensland from Covid hotspots, including New South Wales and Victoria, but must continue to undergo 14day home quarantine. That requirement is expected to be dropped on December 17, when Queensland is forecasted to hit a vaccination rate of 80 per cent. At this stage overseas visitors are welcome but must undergo 14-day home quarantine. Not until the state reaches a 90 per cent vaccination rate will quarantine be dropped for overseas travellers.

Stewards call for Gelagotis suspension

Following a penalty hearing yesterday, Racing Victoria stewards have called for Peter Gelogotis to be suspended after a charge of presenting a horse to race with an elevated TCO2 reading. Gelogotis was initially charged in June 2019 after Strong Influence (Squamosa) presented to race at Sandown with a reading 1.8 millimoles per litre of plasma over the limit 36 millimoles. The recommendation comes despite the trainer being found not guilty of deliberately administering the bi-carb drug. Gelogotis has twice previously been found guilty of drug offences. In 2013 he was fined \$2,000 for the use of therapeutic drug Ibuprofen, while in 2015 he was suspended for three months for the raceday use of an amino acid supplement. The three-person tribunal panel yesterday reserved its decision on penalty.

Hickmott hit with \$2,000 fine

Robert Hickmott has been handed a \$2,000 fine after being found guilty of negligent conduct following an incident in which he invited two of his Melbourne-based stable staff to a lunch in Ballarat, in contravention of Covid-19 rules at the time. Although the event itself, which was attended by ten licensed trainers, was in accordance with Covid rules, the attendance of the staff from the Greater Melbourne area was not permitted, with the pair in Ballarat on authorised worker permits. Hickmott escaped a ban after it was deemed he was unaware of the differing restrictions, while pleading guilty and cooperating with the stewards' investigation.

New Hobart meeting on Sky

Tasracing announced yesterday a new meeting on Thursday at Hobart which will replace Saturday's meet that was cancelled due to the snap Tasmanian lockdown. A total of 106 horses were nominated yesterday for Thursday's seven-race card, which will be staged a day before Launceston's meeting on Friday evening. A statement from Tasracing read: "Tasracing has secured Sky 1 broadcast for the first four races, and of course live free coverage of the entire meeting on TasracingTV ... Tasracing is confident that

racing on Thursday will have no negative impact on the Friday night Launceston thoroughbred meeting."

Ruling made over Sandown future

The sale of Sandown appears a step closer after the Melbourne Racing Club received an exemption from a developer tax that could have put the project in jeopardy. The tax would have collected up to 50 per cent of profits from any sale of the site. The decision comes after new legislation was devised by the state government, which still needs to pass through parliament. "The government tabled draft legislation last week with the windfall gains tax and it was Caulfield Cup week, so we didn't focus on it too much," MRC CEO Josh Blanksby told Racing. com. "But we've had a good look at it now and it needs to go through parliament. But on the first reading, it seems that the government has acknowledged that certain rezoning processes that were well in play and advanced shouldn't be applied to this tax." Blanksby was keen to stress that participants will have a chance to have their say on the proposed sale. "We have always said if any changes are made to Sandown then first and foremost our members will make that decision. But the industry will get a say, absolutely. Those that are concerned about the sale of Sandown need to realise a lot of conversations will occur and they will be completely briefed and heard." However, a similar attempt to see Caulfield exempt from the developer tax was refused, with the redevelopment at the track reliant on the sale of both Sandown and land at Caulfield.

Toowoomba meeting rescheduled

Racing Queensland have confirmed that a replacement race meeting has been scheduled for October 19 after the abandonment of the final five races at the Toowoomba meeting on Saturday night. The new meeting will comprise of the same five races that were scheduled to take place on Saturday, with no changes made to the saddlecloth numbers and barrier draws, however, the scratchings have been reinstated. A full copy of the race program, including race times, will be published as soon as practical.

NEW ZEALAND

Bosson close to raceday return

Opie Bosson is nearing a return to race riding after spending two months on the sidelines in his home, south of Pukekawa, after it was deemed to be in the region of Auckland for Covid-19 lockdown purposes. The 41-yearold was given an exemption to relocate three weeks ago and will now move to Te Akau Stud in West Waikato, which will see him return to riding at Te Rapa and Cambridge meetings under Alert Level 3 restrictions. "It's just been frustrating really, not knowing where we're at," Bosson said. "I've found it harder the last few weeks, where I've been losing weight. David (Ellis) and I have been on a very strict diet and I've been training hard every day in the gym and going for runs all around the farm. I'm just keeping busy and eating properly and keeping the fitness up." The jockey has 83 Group 1 wins to his name and has set Monday's Labour Day meeting at Te Rapa as his day of return.

Funny Girl continues strong run for Noble

Having sent out six winners from his last 15 runners, Karaka-based trainer Lance Noble may be frustrated about the current Auckland lockdown but will certainly not be upset about his yard's current form. The latest of those winners came on Sunday as threeyear-old filly Funny Girl (Showcasing) came home a comfortable winner of a 1215-metre race at Rotorua. "She had won first-up on the synthetic and then in the Gold Trail I just don't think she copped the off-track down there," Noble said. "We gave her a bit of time to get over the trip to Hastings and she was strong yesterday back on reasonable footing." The daughter of Showcasing (Oasis Dream) is now likely to have a break before coming back for her first stakes assignment in the Almanzor Trophy (Gr 3, 1200m). "I don't think she'd get a Guineas trip (1600m), and you're a bit limited in options if they don't go that far," Noble said. "We will back off her for a week and then make a plan backwards from Karaka Million night."

Three for Profitable

Darley's Profitable (Invincible Spirit) sired his third individual stakes winner when Mr Professor (2 g ex Law Of The Range by Alhaarth) left his previous form behind to get the better of his more fancied rivals in yesterday's Silver Tankard Stakes (Listed, 1m) Pontefract. The winner of two races earlier in the year, the juvenile was sent off a 16-1 chance after trailing in last on his sole previous try in stakes company but yesterday beat oddson favourite Westover (Frankel) by a neck with the first two pulling four lengths clear of the third home, Approachability (New Approach), in a well stretched out field. A 105,000 guineas (approx. AU\$204,000) purchase out of last year's October Book 2 yearling sale at Tattersalls, Mr Professor is the third foal out of the Listed winner Law Of The Range (Alhaarth). Profitable, who sired Royal Ascot's Queen Mary Stakes (Gr 2, 5f) winner Quick Suzy, stood at Kildangan Stud in 2021, where his fee was listed as €10,000 (approx. AU\$15,685).

Five for Nathaniel

Galileo's (Sadler's Wells) son Nathaniel sired his fifth individual elite-level winner when Mutamakina (5 m ex Joshua's Princess by Danehill) kept on will to take out the E P Taylor Stakes (Gr 1, 10f) at Woodbine on Sunday. Lining up off the back of a win in Grade 2 company, the Christophe Clement-trained five-year-old beat stablemate La Dragoneta (Lope De Vega) by a neck with the same margin back to Kalifornia Queen (Lope De Vega) in third. Bred in Britain by Widgham Stud, Mutamakina is out of the Danehill (Danzig) mare Joshua's Princess, who has produced seven winners from as many starters and delivered a Camelot (Montjeu) colt this year. Mutamakina's third dam is European Horse of the Year Ridgewood Pearl (Indian Ridge). Shawn Dugan purchased Mutamakina for 100,000 guineas (approx. AU\$194,300) from New England Stud's consignment at Book 2 of the Tattersalls October Yearling Sale in 2017.

CAN: Avie's Flatter back to winning ways

Later on the Woodbine card, Avie's Flatter (5 h Flatter - Avie's Empire by Empire Maker) notched his fifth stakes win, and his seventh in total, with a victory in the Nearctic Stakes (Gr 2, 6f). Having finished down the field in the Woodbine Mile (Gr 1, 8f) on his previous outing, the five-year-old returned to winning ways with a half-length score over Turned Aside (American Pharoah). Olympic Runner (Gio Ponti) was a further length away in third.

US: Bob Baffert's Breeders' Cup runners to face enhanced testing

All horses trained by Bob Baffert that compete in any 2021 Breeders' Cup races will have to undergo enhanced out-ofcompetition, pre- and post-race testing, and other security protocols, at Baffert's own expense, to participate at Del Mar, Breeders' Cup announced on Sunday. The organisation previously announced it had commenced a review process as to whether the Hall of Fame trainer would be permitted to participate in this year's Breeders' Cup on November 5 and 6. Baffert is embroiled in legal battles connected to Zedan Racing Stables' Kentucky Derby (Gr 1, 10f) winner Medina Spirit (Protonico), who tested positive for the corticosteroid betamethasone in both initial and split-sample blood tests. While no regulatory action has taken place on that failed test, Churchill Downs have taken action. The trainer is suspended from running horses through the spring meet of 2023 at the Louisville track. Baffert was granted a preliminary injunction to race in New York in July by a United States District Judge after the New York Racing Association sought to suspend him in May.

Spring racing at its best

spectacular runaway Caulfield
Cup (Gr 1, 2400m) and a heartstopping Everest (1200m),
captured the racing headlines this
past Saturday.

In the case of the Caulfield Cup, seeing is believing. Yet, even seeing how Incentivise (Shamus Award) sat wide from the outside barrier (18) around a tricky Caulfield track, went even wider rounding into the straight before bolting clear once heads were turned for home, was still unbelievable.

Racking up nine consecutive wins, including three successive Group 1s, this son of Shamus Award (Snitzel) seems to have no limits. Certainly, he was full of running at the end of the 2400 metres. The Melbourne Cup (Gr 1, 3200m) on November 2? Why not ten in a row?

By contrast, The Everest saw Nature Strip (Nicconi) seemingly in control at the 200 metres then suddenly, in the final strides he was all out to hold out a fast-finishing Masked Crusader (Toronado) by a long head.

It was third time lucky for Nature Strip who, two years ago, led the field to the 100 metres before fading slightly to fourth. Last year he trailed Eduardo (Host) to the 200 metres, led briefly before being swamped to finish seventh. His Randwick 1200-metre form includes two Group 1 TJ Smiths but as James McDonald said of the straight run: "You have no idea. It felt like a minute."

Neither Incentivise nor Nature Strip were foaled here but the former's five-eighths brother, Ardrossan (Redoute's Choice), is in the middle of his third stud season at Waikato Stud. His first crop will be offered this coming January.

Rewarded

Meanwhile, here in New Zealand, a comparatively tame Livamol Classic (Gr 1, 2040m), the third leg of the Hastings Triple Crown, went the way of tough mare Savy Yong Blonk (Savabeel), getting up in the last strides for a valuable victory.

The six-year-old, who has an upcoming date with Waikato Stud sire Super Seth (Duneel), already had a pair of Group 3s to her name having taken out the City of Auckland Cup (2400m) at Ellerslie on New Year's Day plus the Manawatu Breeders' Stakes (2000m) at Awapuni in April.

Once covered, the mare will continue her race career, with connections hoping to add to her already attractive record.

She becomes the 24th individual Group 1

winner for her sire Savabeel (Zabeel) and it is appropriate that she should visit the stud that is responsible for the first three generations of her immediate family.

Sir Tristram magic

Savy Yong Blonk's family history in New Zealand is due to Celebrity II (Meadow Court), a filly imported as a two-year-old by John Higgs of Cottonwoods Stud in Cambridge.

Higgs imported the filly in 1969 and although unplaced in four starts as a juvenile, she was a half-sister to the Ireland's Champion Two-Year-Old filly Kathy Too (Beau Sabreur). Her dam, Celestial Gold (Golden Cloud), was a sister or half-sister to four stakes winners, three achieving stakes success at Churchill Downs, Hollywood Park and Hialeah in the USA.

Her sire Meadow Court (Court Harwell) was very well performed on the racetrack earning the title of Ireland's Champion Three-Year-Old due to his 1965 Irish Derby (Gr 1, 1m 4f) victory. Unluckily born the same year as the freakish Sea-Bird (Dan Cupid), he had to settle for second in that year's Epsom Derby (Gr 1, 1m 4f) but the day prior to his Irish Derby he took on a new part-owner, American crooner Bing Crosby.

Higgs, in partnership with Patrick (now Sir Patrick) Hogan, wasted little time in getting Celebrity II in foal. Her first mate was Persian Garden II (Alcide) who was in his fourth season as resident sire at the Hogans' Fencourt Stud in Cambridge.

Dual Derby winner Classic Mission, bred by Higgs from Persian Garden II's second crop, would not complete his Victoria-AJC Derby (Gr 1, 12f) double until the spring of 1971.

As a broodmare she was given every opportunity and the following year visited Battle-Waggon (Never Say Die) to produce Celerity Girl, the fourth dam of ill-fated Rock On Wood (Redwood), winner of last year's Captain Cook Stakes (Gr 1, 1600m).

Two visits to Hermes (Aureole) then Adios II (Silly Season), Final Orders (Final Court) and Heir Presumptive (Tambourine) took place but until her last foal, Celebrity II had produced just one winner.

Her final mating, with Sir Tristram (Sir Ivor), produced the fine race filly Star Of The Knight who enjoyed great success at Brisbane's Eagle Farm where at two she won the Queensland Sires' Produce Stakes (Gr 2, 1400m) and at three the Queensland Guineas (Gr 3, 1600m). Celebrity's honour was saved.

Savy Yong Blonk joins four previous Group 1 winners descending from Star Of The Knight, namely dual Group 1 sprinter Sacred Star (Flying Spur), Spring Champion Stakes (Gr 1, 2000m) winner and Windsor Park Stud resident Vanbrugh (Encosta de Lago) plus the brother and sister act Diademe and Embellish (Savabeel).

If it works, add more

Although from different branches of the same line, it is noteworthy that three of the five are by Savabeel. Also significant is that within those three, Sir Tristram again enters the fray via Zabeel, thus presenting a double up of Cambridge Stud's outstanding and enduring sire influence.

Three daughters of Star Of The Knight, all by Waikato Stud's Centaine (Century), have seen the family expand to include a further 17 stakes winners. Her stakes-winning daughter Starcent is, including herself, responsible for seven, whereas sisters Night Star (Centaine) and Professionelle each have five stakes-winning descendants.

Powerful combo

A story begun by Sir Tristram then added to by Centaine, Pins (Snippets), O'Reilly (Last Tycoon) and Savabeel, is proving to be a very powerful combination.

Garry Chittick took over Star Of The Knight's stud career from the Hogan-Higgs partnership in 1988 and the three Centaine mares he bred are the driving force that is keeping the family so prominent.

Cambridge Stud's Embellish, whose first crop of yearlings will be available in January, is bred on virtually identical lines to Savy Yong Blonk.

His grandam and her third dam are the sisters Night Star and Starcent. His dam is by O'Reilly, while her grandam, Classic-placed Ambitious, is by O'Reilly's sire Last Tycoon (Try My Rect)

Ambitious' half-sister Make A Wish (Pins)

is the dam of Group
3 winner Another
Dollar (Ocean Park)
as well as I Wish I Win
(Savabeel), second
in last season's
Manawatu Sires'
Produce Stakes (Gr 1,
1400m) and a strong
third in Saturday's
Barneswood Farm
Stakes (Gr 3, 1400m)
at Ashburton.

Ampin (Pins), dam of Savy Yong Block, never raced yet has produced two Group winners, the second being her 2016 foal and Caulfield Autumn Classic (Gr 2, 1800m) winner Adelaide Ace, also by Savabeel. Ampin ranks as a half-sister to Strike The Stars, yet another Savabeel and winner of the Gloaming Stakes (Gr 3, 1800m).

Starting with Centaine then adding Pins, O'Reilly and Savabeel, it would appear that any combination of those sires is enormously successful. The Star Of The Knight connection as a base merely makes the chances of success even greater.

Trelawney tale

The class of Red Badge Sprint (Gr 3, 1400m) winner Two Illicit (Jimmy Choux) was evident on Saturday when she moved out of traffic from the 300 metres, found clear running and then joined in half way down the straight.

In a few bounds from the 150 metres she outclassed her opponents, and showed the sort of form that two seasons ago saw her among the top three-year-olds of her crop.

The Red Badge was her fourth stakes win and sixth career win in just 14 starts. At three, she scored a Listed race at Ellerslie in the spring. Returning to Ellerslie in January she bagged the Royal Stakes (Gr 2, 2000m) and followed that up next start when taking on and beating the boys in the Waikato Guineas (Gr 2, 2000m) at Te Rapa.

Three weeks later she finished a solid and clear second in the New Zealand Derby (Gr 1, 2400m) before being put aside.

Last season at four she won first-up at Ellerslie then headed to Hastings where she ran fourth in the Windsor Park Plate (Gr 1, 1600m) before finishing fifth in last year's Livamol Classic.

Rested until last autumn, she was a freshup third before a Queensland campaign that resulted in two unplaced efforts, where the mare was below her best and found the tracks too firm.

Part-owner and breeder, Brent Taylor of Trelawney Stud, explains: "The transition from three-year-old filly to four-year-old mare can often be a difficult one. A good example is Jennifer Eccles who was top class at three but found the next season a challenge. Our own Loire found the transition a challenge also. Two Illicit had some issues too but with those behind her we can only hope that she continues and proves her three-year-old form.

"An old adage is that class is permanent and form is temporary and we know she has class," said Taylor.

Co-trainer Robert Wellwood also commented: "If we can keep her right, she is a very talented horse who showed us that as a three-year-old. It's just good to see her back in the right order and winning nicely. She has just had a few niggles but hopefully we have ironed those out now and we can keep her in this order as we will win some nice races with her."

Two Illicit's New Zealand story starts with the imported (to Australia) Twin Town, a daughter of Halling (Diesis) and half-sister to Newmarket's Joel Stakes (Gr 3, 1m) winner Confront (Nayef).

Twin Town's race career of four wins included one in Adelaide while her dam, Contiguous (Danzig), never raced. However, the latter was certainly well-related being a three-quarter or half-sister to no less than eight stakes winners. One of those is Epsom Oaks (Gr 1, 1m 4f) winner Reams Of Verse (Nureyev), the grandam of New Zealand-based sire Zacinto (Dansili).

Her first foal, Two Illicit's dam Gemini (Tale Of The Cat), was purchased for the significant sum of \$210,000 by Trelawney Stud from Cambridge Stud's draft of the 2011 Karaka Premier Yearling Sale.

Trelawney's Brent Taylor said: "Gemini was a nice type and by a sire I have a lot of time for, in Tale Of The Cat. She showed some ability. We sold a nice Ocean Park filly out of her then bred Two Illicit. Being by Jimmy Choux she would not have been popular commercially so we decided to keep her to race as she was the best style of foal that Gemini had produced thus far."

Ups and downs

The ups and downs of breeding definitely apply to Gemini. Her racing career resulted in several placed efforts before she retired to stud in 2013. Trelawney bred three fillies, the third being Two Illicit, which the stud retained. The stud then sold the mare in 2017 for \$10,000 in foal to Showcasing (Oasis Dream).

Taylor added: "Sometimes, tough decisions

must be made and Gemini wasn't cutting it so we had to move on. That's business. Keeping Two Illicit though, was because we race horses so we gave her a chance. Gemini's half-brother has since added to the family and we have a future broodmare."

Later that year, Gemini's half-brother, Easy Eddie (Super Easy) broke his maiden. In March of 2019 he captured the Maurice McCarten Stakes (Gr 3, 1100m) and earned more than \$600,000 in prize-money from eight wins and a further 12 places in 34 starts. In the October Two Illicit also got her race career off to a great start by winning at her second start at Ellerslie.

So, in a little over two years after Gemini's sale the family's fortunes really turned around. Twin Town is still breeding and last year produced a colt to Turn Me Loose (Iffraaj). Sadly, Gemini's fate was not so positive. She died in 2019 after producing five successive foals.

The high hopes relating to Gemini's purchase, followed by the decision to sell, is reflective of the realities of breeding. Without a doubt, Trelawney's decision to retain Two Illicit is one that they will savour. She is a talented mare and will be part of Trelawney's history for years to come.

Taylor summed up: "She likes Ellerslie so a race like the Zabeel Classic is one we might shoot for. She is not nominated for Riccarton so we'll keep her in the north. We also might look at the Captain Cook at Trentham in December."

The local scene

There You Go (Niagara) made a big impression when taking out Saturday's

Barneswood Farm Stakes (Gr 3, 1400m) at Ashburton by leading from the 1000 metres. The way she dispatched her challengers indicates there was something in reserve and that the extra 200 metres of next month's New Zealand One Thousand Guineas (Gr 1, 1600m) should be well within her scope.

Listed placed in the Auckland Futurity Stakes (1400m) at Ellerslie last May on debut, the filly was put aside until September before finishing fourth in the O'Leary's Fillies Stakes (Listed, 1200m) at Wanganui.

Two weeks ago at Riccarton she cleared out by more than five lengths to break her maiden and found the step up in class to Saturday's Group 3 not too much of a problem.

She is now favourite for next month's Guineas and judging from the ease of this most recent win, she will be a force.

Her sire, Niagara (Encosta De Lago), stands alongside Darci Brahma (Danehill) and US Navy Flag (War Front) at The Oaks Stud in Cambridge and she is his third stakes winner.

The second winner from her Sydney-winning dam, Not A Dancer (Not A Single Doubt), There You Go's New Zealand family began in the 1980s when her fourth dam, Elegant Style (Sir Ivor) was imported by Blandford Lodge, Matamata. She had a filly foal at foot by Green Dancer (Nijinsky).

Elegant Style would later produce Cuddle Stakes (Gr 3, 1600m) winner Elegance (Sky Chase) and her foal at foot, named Dance Style, the unraced third dam of There You Go, would produce the Listed two-year-old Adelaide stakes winner Hollywood Fred (Sanction).

New winners

Almanzor - The Kevin Ryan-trained Franz (2 c ex Gemstone by Galileo) made a winning debut in a mile novice contest at Haydock on Friday to become the sixth individual winner for Cambridge Stud shuttler and first season sire Almanzor (Wootton Bassett). The juvenile won by half a length from the late-closing runner-up Mandobi (Iffraaj), with a further length and a half back to Paradias (Kodiac) in third. Franz was bred by Highclere Stud and Ors Bloodstock and was a 100,000 guineas purchase for Haras d'Etreham and Cambridge Stud at last year's Tattersalls Book 1. His dam Gemstone (Galileo) won at Listed level and was Group 3 placed, and has produced the Listed winner UAE Jewel (Dubawi). She is a half-sister to Karamela (Mastercraftsman), a Group 3 winner in Argentina, and to the dam of Irish St Leger (Gr 1, 1m 6f) winner Sonnyboyliston (Power). It is also the family of Irish 2,000 Guineas (Gr 1, 1m) winner Bachelor Duke (Miswaki). Almanzor stood the northern hemisphere season at Haras d'Etreham fee of €30,000, while his Cambridge Stud fee is \$30,000 (inc GST).

Churchill - Coolmore shuttler Churchill (Galileo) sired his 21st individual winner after his son Lawful Command (2 g ex Blue Geranium by Dansili) struck in a seven-furlong nursery at Yarmouth on Monday. Trained by Brian Meehan, the gelding was having his seventh start as he beat Bonita B (Oasis Dream) by half a length with Full Of Beans (Spill The Beans) another three-quarters of a length away in third. A 50,000 guineas purchase out of Tattersalls Book 2 last year, Lawful Command is the second foal out of Blue Geranium (Dansili) who herself is out of the English 1,000

He is a half-brother to recent Prix Jean Romanet (Gr 1, 2000m) winner Grand Glory (Olympic Glory), out of Madonna Lily (Daylami) and from the family of Alzao (Lyphard). Toronado shuttles to Swettenham Stud where his fee for this season is \$49,500 (Inc GST).

Zarak - Lizaid (2 f ex Litaara by Wiener Walzer) remained unbeaten in Sunday's Preis die Winterkönigin (Gr 3, 1600m) at Baden-Baden and became the first stakes winner from the first crop of Zarak (Dubawi). Tracking the pace, she picked up in the closing stages to win by two and a quarter lengths from Rondina (Intello) while Barina (Gleneagles) was a short head away in third. Trained by Peter Schiergen, she is out of Litaara (Wiener Walzer), who was placed in the Diana-Trial (Gr 2, 1m 2f) and is herself a half-sister to multiple Group winner Liang Kay (Dai Jin). Zarak, a Group 1-winning son of Dubawi (Dubai Millennium) and Zarkava (Zamindar), stands at the Aga Khan Stud's Haras de Bonneval in France where his fee this year was €12,000 (approx. AU\$18,700).


