Sisters and brothers in Christ,

Many German families have used the name "Augustus"; I had a great uncle named August (when he or we were particularly non-august, the name was Uncle Gus. During my college years, a peer couldn't remember the name "Scott" so Scott became "Gus." That happened in the first week of college. After his passing, we honored Gus.

"August comes from the Latin word *augustus*, meaning "consecrated" or "venerable," which in turn is related to the Latin *augur*, meaning


"consecrated by augury or "auspicious." In 8 B.C. the Roman Senate honored Augustus Caesar, the first Roman emperor, by changing the name of their month "Sextilis" to

"Augustus." Middle English speakers inherited the name of the month of August, but it wasn't until the mid-1600s that "august" came to be used generically in English, more or less as "*augustus*" was in Latin, to refer to someone with imperial qualities." (*Source: Merriam Webster*)

Last month I shared the poem "What If" by Shel Silverstein. I have been reflecting on the pandemic and that poem. Imagine how quickly the COVID-19 virus has spread from person-to-person around the entire world. We are watching the spread of the contagion into the inner region of the country. Mercer County was the last county in the State of Ohio to register its first case just last week! What if our ministry were to have that kind of imperial contagion. What if we were to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ just as actively, person by person, to spread across the globe. Similar to the outbreak, we could gather the world with God's love, mercy, and grace.

Or would that bother us and them, like wearing a mask?

Also during the month of August, the vegetables and flowering plants reach full bloom and begin to fruit. Just as the weeks of fresh corn wear down early in



the month, in comes the tomato harvest. The more I pinch the blooms, more blooms appear. The plants are created to bloom, and bloom abundantly ... even when in a pinch.

Similarly, we have been created and called by God to thrive by giving witness to Jesus the Christ who redeemed us that we might continue to bloom (spread the good news) over and over again until the frost comes. In doing so, we fulfill God's purpose and our purpose as children of God.

For me, the question is whether or not we are blooming augustly. That is, how do we bloom continually to this community with imperial quality fit for the kingdom of heaven ... for the King?

My friends, the harvest is coming. Get blooming with out fail, even when life pinches you. The kingdom of heaven is near. Let anyone with ears, listen.

WHAT IF IT DIDN'T HAPPEN?

On July 20, 1844 while serving as pastor of the Xenia Lutheran Church, Pastor Lehman's wife Sarah Elizabeth died. That same year the Rev Ezra Keller (founder of Wittenberg College at Springfield) became the pastor of the church in Springfield allowing Pastor Lehman to concentrate on our church. Also, in 1844, the Miami Synod of the Lutheran Church was formed and Pastor Lehman became a member of it and he was ordained by the Miami Synod in 1845 (previously he had been merely licensed, but not ordained), In 1847, Pastor left Xenia and moved to Lancaster, Ohio. That same year with the urging of Rev. Keller, Solomon Ritz became pastor of the Xenia congregation and served there for until 1851. Pastor Ritz was a revivalist and favored the use of the English language in the churches, instead of German. At that time, the parish consisted of our church, Mt. Zion (8 miles west of Xenia), Beaver Church (4 miles west), Aley and Union Church which were both 7 miles from Xenia. During the year 1848 under the direction of Pastor Ritz, a church building 40 X 55 feet was put under roof on West Main Street. Unfortunately, the wood for the inside burned, resulting in a \$300 debt. Rev. Ritz appealed for help through the Lutheran Observer, a well-known periodical in its day, to keep from having to sell the structure to pay for it. Apparently, it was saved, for on February 10, 1850, the church was dedicated (with a \$125.00 debt outstanding). The house of worship remained until 1974 when it was demolished by a devastating tornado. Solomon Ritz served as Pastor until he left for Ashland Ohio in 1851,

I made some new friends and I'll always cherish the experience of being part of this record-breaking chorus with such an evocative message.

Eric Whitacre, who pioneered the virtual choir concept a decade ago, composed the music and text of "Sing Gently" specifically for this time of social isolation and division. The video's motif resembles the Japanese art of Kintsugi – the mending of broken pottery with gold, which renders the piece stronger and more beautiful. - Monetary donations as well as pre-packaged or individually wrapped food items are in need.


