SOMETHING TO BELIEVE IN

Stays in Vegas (City Zip) will contest Saturday's GI Starlet S. at Los Alamitos Race Course, which could prove a source of healing for the partnership of Jungle Racing LLC and KMN Racing LLC, who lost champion Shared Belief suddenly last week to colic.

"It's been a rough week and everybody has been trying to handle the grief in our own way," said Kevin Nish of KMN Racing. "We've seen a lot of tributes on the internet from fans and that helps us handle the grief, knowing that there are other people that share it with us."

Stays in Vegas, who was purchased by Solis/Litt Bloodstock on behalf of Jungle Racing, KMN and LNJ Foxwoods as a \$40,000 KEESEP yearling, took the Juan Gonzalez Memorial S. at Oak Tree Pleasanton July 4 and the Wine Country Debutante S. at Santa Rosa Aug. 14 in her first two career starts for trainer Jerry Hollendorfer. Fifth in the GI Del Mar Debutante Sept. 5., she then switched to the turf for her next two starts—both wins—in the Surfer Girl S. at Santa Anita Oct. 10 and the Pike Place Dancer S. at Golden Gate Nov. 1. The juvenile filly will return to the dirt for the Starlet and will try the 1 1/16—mile distance.

"We had her nominated for a turf race at Del Mar and, with the guidance of Jerry and Alex [Solis] and Jason [Litt], we opted for the race at Los Alamitos," Nish explained. "She has run well on dirt up in Northern California before, too."

DOWN THE SHEDROW WITH MARK CASSE

It has been quite a memorable year for trainer Mark Casse in 2015. The 54-year-old scored a career high just last month when landing his first Breeders' Cup victory courtesy of **Catch a Glimpse** (City Zip) in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf Oct. 30. He didn't have to wait long for his second one as the talented **Tepin** (Bernstein) bested the boys with an impressive victory in the GI Breeders' Cup Mile the very next day. The Casse barn has a total of 17 graded stakes wins so far this year, with five of those being Grade Is. Casse gave the *TDN's* Christie DeBernardis the latest on all of his top runners and also pointed out some up-and-coming juveniles to watch for in the future. *Cont. p3*

NY STREAMING LIKELY TO CONTINUE



That's going to be a tough few hours, but we're hoping the excitement of the race also helps. 

• CATCH A GLIMPSE (f, 2, City Zip)

After a failed attempt in an off-the-turfer on debut at Saratoga July 30, Catch a Glimpse really came into her own when switched to the turf, starting with an impressive allowance win at Woodbine Aug. 22. Capturing the GII Natalma S. there next out Sept. 12, the Gary Barber, Michael Ambler and Windways Farm runner rose to the top of her division with a victory in the Juvenile Fillies Turf (video).

"She's doing great. She's actually at Palm Meadows. She is galloping and we are aiming for the [GIII] Sweetest Chant [S. Jan. 30]. We are just taking it one race at a time right now. I would say, we will aim her for the Sweetest Chant and then probably the [GIII] Florida Oaks at Tampa [Mar. 12]."

"It was special for sure [getting his first Breeders' Cup win in the Juvenile Fillies Turf]. What's so special about her is that we had a lot of issues with her early on. She was just so nervous. We wanted to run her on the grass, but then it came off and we had to run on the dirt. I thought she had ability, but boy, when she got on the grass she was just a totally different horse. It was a good race and she is a really good horse. I think she proved that."





AIROFORCE (c, 2, Colonel John)

A debut winner on the turf at Kentucky Downs Sept. 5, John Oxley's Airoforce followed suit with another success in Keeneland's grassy GIII Dixiana Bourbon S. Oct. 4. A gutsy second by just a neck in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf Oct. 30, the gray proved to be quite versatile when capturing a sloppy renewal of the GII Kentucky Jockey Club S. on the Churchill main track Nov. 28 (video).

"He's in South Florida and he is just kind of chilling. He's just taking it easy. He's had a couple of weeks of just going around the shedrow. He starts back galloping Monday. I haven't really decided where we are going to bring him back yet. That's a discussion Mr. Oxley and I will probably have in the next couple of weeks. We'll see how he does. My only concern with running at Gulfstream would be how speed

oriented that track is, so we'll see. We have had some luck going the Derby way through Tampa, so that would be a possibility."

"Going into the Breeders' Cup, I had a lot of confidence in him. I thought he was going to be very tough to beat. I thought he really struggled with the course on Breeders' Cup day. At the half-mile pole, if you told me he was going to be second, I would have hugged and kissed you. I really didn't think he was going to finish anywhere. My dad still talks about it. He says, 'I just wish that horse could have won, so you could have won three Breeders' Cup races instead of two.' I said, 'Dad, I'm okay with it!' [laughing]. At the half-mile pole, he was just struggling, so I think he ran second just on pure ability and pure determination. Of all our Breeders' Cup horses, he was the most exhausted after the race. He laid down for two or three days, which would go along with our feeling that he just didn't handle the turf that well that day."

"He always trained very well on the dirt. The only reason we ran him on the grass the first time was because I believe a maiden special at Churchill was only \$38,000 and a maiden special weight at Kentucky Downs was \$120,000. So, we ran him on the grass just because of the bigger purse, and because of his

breeding, we figured he shouldn't have any problem handling the grass. We weren't sure that he would, but we didn't think he would have a problem with it. We were more sure he would handle dirt, obviously, but we tried him [on grass] and he ran so well that we didn't want to take him off of

it. The first thing I thought when he won the way he won was the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf. In our mind, we always wanted to try him on the dirt, so that is how he ended up in the [Kentucky] Jockey Club."

"All that being said, I'm quite proud of him because how many horses, especially 2-year-olds, can you say have the kind of record he has. He has shown ability on the dirt and on the turf. Obviously, Nyquist (Uncle Mo) is going to be the champion 2year-old colt, but I think Airoforce should be in the final three."

• CONQUEST BIG E (c, 2, Tapit)


A \$700,000 KEESEP purchase by Ernie Semersky's Conquest Stables last year, Conquest Big E was impressive enough in his second-out graduation at Keeneland Oct. 2 to give Casse the confidence to go to the Breeders' Cup (Click here for catalogue page). Eighth in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Oct. 31, the gray bested late-running "TDN Rising Star" Unexplained (Ghostzapper) in a Churchill allowance last time Nov. 28.

"He is in the same boat as Airoforce. He got a couple of weeks of just going around the shedrow. He starts back Monday. That will be a conversation as he gets a little closer to running that Ernie Semersky and I will have on whether we will go the Florida route, the New Orleans route or the Hot Springs route. "Conquest Big E is definitely a Derby horse and we will give him every opportunity to prove us right."

"[Airoforce and Conquest Big E] have different running styles, so off the top of my head, I would think Conquest Big E would like Gulfstream a little more than Airoforce. I think Airoforce would prefer to have a track where he can sit back and come with a bigger run, where a horse like 'Big E' likes to sit a bit closer to the pace."

• TEPIN (f, 4, Bernstein):

Robert Masterson's Tepin stamped herself as one of the best turf milers of either sex this term when taking down some of both Europe and America's top grass horses in the Breeders'

Cup Mile (video). That was just the grand finale to an already sensational season following the filly's victories in the GII Churchill Distaff Turf Mile S. May 2, GI Longines Just a Game S. June 6 and GI First Lady S. Oct. 3. The bay was also second in both the GI Diana S. July 25

and GII Ballston Spa S. Aug. 29, respectively.

"Tepin is doing great. She is in South Florida and her goal is going to be the [GIII Endeavor S.] at Tampa [Feb. 13]. Our main goal for her would be to be back Derby day at Churchill and defend her title in the [GII] Churchill Distaff Turf Mile [S.]."


• NOBLE BIRD (c, 4, Birdstone)

Runner-up in the GII Alysheba S. May 1, John Oxley's Noble Bird got the better of favored Lea (First Samurai) with a neck victory in Churchill's GI Stephen Foster H. June 13. The chestnut exited a ninth-place effort in Saratoga's GI Whitney S. Aug. 8 with a hip injury and has been sidelined since.

"Noble Bird is just about ready to start breezing. I watched him train this morning. He is doing well. He will probably come back in an allowance race, probably at Oaklawn. He is in Florida, but we will send him to Oaklawn when it gets closer. He could start at Gulfstream. It would just depend as we get further along and where there is a race for him. He would start in an allowance race, more likely on the dirt."

• LEXIE LOU (f, 4, Sligo Bay {Ire})

Another runner Casse is nursing back from the sidelines is 2014 Queen's Plate S. victress Lexie Lou. The Gary Barber colorbearer captured the Woodbine Oaks prior to her defeat of males in the Queen's Plate and also took the 2014 Wonder Where S. *Cont. p6*





Closing out that season with a victory in Santa Anita's GIII Autumn Miss S. and a runner-up effort behind Horse of the Year California Chrome (Lucky Pulpit) in the GI Hollywood Derby, Lexie Lou has not been seen since finishing second when

switched to the dirt in Arcadia's GII La Canada S. Jan. 17.

"Lexie Lou is just about a month [away] from running. She had just a small injury [after the La Canada]. We had her all ready. We actually had her in at Woodbine this

fall and she hurt her eye. She missed about 60 days because of her eye, but she's back and she's doing well. She'll pop up in the entries some time in January. She will probably run in some type of allowance race on the grass [at Gulfstream]."

WORLD APPROVAL (c, 3, Northern Afleet)

Live Oak Plantation homebred World Approval comes from a long line of talented turf runners being a half-brother to champion Miesque's Approval (Miesque's Son), MGSW and MGISP Za Approval (Ghostzapper) and MGSW millionaire Revved Up (Sultry Song).

The sophomore already has a pair of black-type wins of his own with victories in the GIII American Derby at Arlington July 11 and Saratoga's GIII Saranac S. Sept. 5. The gray was last seen finishing fourth in Belmont's GIII Hill Prince S. Oct. 3.

"I just saw him [Wednesday]. He looks wonderful. He's at Live Oak. Mrs. Webber loves to bring the horses home for a little while and give them a break, so we sent him home after his last start. He's galloping and he looks better than ever. He will probably go down to South Florida at the beginning of the year and get ready down there."

• OL' FASHION GAL (f, 3, Sky Mesa)

Winner of last term's GIII Jimmy Durante S. at Del Mar, Bill & Vicki Poston Racing's OI Fashion Gal finished off the board in her next two tries in graded company, but captured Woodbine's GIII Selene S. when last seen May 24.

"She is just starting to breeze. We will probably do the same thing that we did with Tepin. I try, especially with our 3 year olds once they have to start competing in stakes against older horses, to give them some time off to grow up and that's what I did with her. I could see her being ready somewhere around the first of the year for an allowance race."

SIDING SPRING (c, 2, Warrior's Reward)

A debut winner at Kentucky Downs Sept. 14, Siding Spring finished third behind stablemate Airoforce in the Bourbon. The Gabe Grossberg runner tried his hand at the dirt last time out. finishing 10th in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile.

"Siding Spring actually ran very well in the Breeders' Cup. I think overall he had the third best Thorograph number or something like that. He just had a difficult trip. I thought it was a really good race first time on dirt. He didn't get beat that far. My feeling is that he is a Derby horse as well. He did have a quarter crack after the Breeders' Cup and he has been back training now for maybe a week. He will get a couple of weeks of galloping and then breeze. We are hoping to get him started somewhere in the middle to the latter part of January and hopefully he is a Derby prospect as well."

"He is another horse who showed a lot of ability on the dirt." The only reason we started him on the grass is because of the economics of it. If I could do it, I'd love to start every first-time starter on the grass. I think it is a much better and easier first experience for them because if they get away a little bad or something, the kick back is not as severe on the turf. I just think it's a great learning experience for them."

CONQUEST BEBOP (f, 2, Scat Daddy)

Conquest Stables' 2-year-old Conquest Bebop romped by 7 1/4 lengths in her career bow going 1 1/16 miles over the Woodbine synthetic Nov. 7 (video).

"She was [impressive]. She is in South Florida. We will see how she trains on the dirt, but most likely she will come back in an allowance race on the grass."

CONQUEST BABAYAGA (f, 2, Uncle Mo)

Ernie Semersky stretched to \$425,000 to acquire Conquest Babayaga at the OBS June sale after the juvenile breezed a furlong in :09 4/5 (Click here for catalogue page). The dark bay earned her diploma by 6 3/4 lengths sprinting on the Woodbine synthetic Oct. 31 and finished second behind undefeated "TDN Rising Star" Ami's Mesa (Sky Mesa) in that venue's Glorious Song S. Nov. 21.

"She broke her maiden impressively and she was second in the Glorious Song. I think she got a 90 Beyer which is quite good for a 2-year-old. She will probably show up on the dirt in some type of allowance race."

JENNIFER LYNNETTE (f, 2, Elusive Quality)

Jennifer Lynnette was tabbed as a "TDN Rising Star" after an impressive 5 1/4-length success in her Woodbine unveling Oct. 18 (video). The Conrad Farms colorbearer overcame a difficult trip to finish third last time in the Glorious Song.

"Jennifer Lynnette is a really good filly. She had a troubled trip in the Glorious Song. She finished strongly and galloped out well after the race. She is a Canadian-bred. I'm not exactly sure whether we will start her back on the dirt or the grass, but her main goal would be to try to get back to Canada for the Canadian Oaks next year. I don't know how we are going to do that just yet, but we will let her tell us when she is ready to run. The [Queen's Plate] is always a possibility [after the Canadian Oaks]. I have been impressed with her."

CONQUEST DADDYO (c, 2, Scat Daddy)

Conquest Daddyo graduated at first asking at Woodbine July 16 and finished second in that venue's Vandal S. next out Aug. 15. Winner of the

GII Summer S. there Sept. 12, the Conquest Stables runner finished fourth in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf.

"He will probably aim for an allowance race. He is definitely a nice grass horse. The thing with 'Daddyo' is the farther they run, the better. We will have to spot him around. I thought he worked well enough on the dirt--Joe Bravo worked him--that he could possibly get a chance on the dirt as well."

"I thought he ran really well [in the Breeders' Cup]. I think he finished really strong. It was only a mile, so he is going to get better."



CONQUEST ENFORCER (c, 2, Into Mischief)

Casse thought highly enough of Conquest Enforcer to debut him in the Summer, a move reminiscent of fellow Conquest colorbearer My Conquestadory (Artie Schiller), who bested the boys in the 2013 Summer and went on to take the GI Darley Alcibiades S. next out. Conquest Enforcer finished fourth to Conquest Daddyo in that test, but impressively earned his diploma next out in the Cup and Saucer S. going 1 1/16 miles on the Woodbine turf Oct. 11 (video).

"A horse we haven't mentioned yet that is as good as any 2year-old we have is a horse named Conquest Enforcer. He made his first start in the Summer S. and he was fourth to Conquest Daddyo. Patrick Husbands chose to ride him versus Daddyo and then we ran him back in the Cup and Saucer and he won by six or seven lengths. He was blocked the entire way down the lane and got loose at the eighth pole and just opened up. Patrick Husbands says he is as good a horse as he has ever sat on." Cont. p9





"Conquest Enforcer is a Canadian-bred. He is at the farm in Ocala, had a little time off and is just coming back. He is going to be aiming for the Queen's Plate."

• CONQUEST WINDYCITY (c, 2, Tiznow)

Conquest Windycity, who is out of a full sister to GSW and GISP Jump Start (A.P. Indy), brought \$800,000 from Semersky at the OBS March sale after breezing a quarter-mile in :21 4/5 (Click here for catalogue page). Second on debut over the Saratoga lawn Aug. 8, the dark bay finished third in Churchill's GIII Iroquois S. Sept. 12 and graduated next out when switched to the dirt at Keeneland Oct. 2.

"He broke his maiden the same day Conquest Big E did at Keeneland. He is a nice horse. We gave him a little time off, but we feel he is possibly a Derby horse as well. He is in Ocala right now, but he will be going to South Florida pretty soon to get ready for the Derby."

GREATEST GAME (c, 2, Giant's Causeway)

John Oxley's Greatest Game opened his account with a first out success sprinting over the Woodbine synthetic Oct. 18 and was third when stretched out to 1 1/16 miles in an allowance over that strip Nov. 8. The chestnut was second last time over that track and trip in the Display S. Nov. 29.

"He broke his maiden impressively first time out and then he was third in an allowance race. He was just third in the Display S. at Woodbine. He kind of got shut down on the rail, which may have cost him the win. They went very fast. He got a pretty good number. He is another horse that could possibly be a Derby horse. We are going to give him an opportunity to see."

STREET GRAY (c, 2, Street Cry {Ire})

Out of a half-sister to GISW multi-millionaire Honey Ryder (Lasting Approval), Street Gray is an unraced juvenile colt purchased by Oxley for \$750,000 at the OBS April sale after he breezed a furlong in :09 4/5 (Click here for catalogue page). The gray displays a steady string of works at Palm Meadows, most recently breezing five furlongs from the gate in 1:01 (2/25).

"One horse to watch for that hasn't started but we like a lot is a horse of Mr. Oxley's called Street Gray. He is a first time starter that is getting ready to run that we think a lot of, too. We are hoping he will be a good horse. He will [start in Florida]. We are hoping to get him started this year at the end of the month, and if not, the beginning of next year."

DURKIN FINDS THE PLAY'S THE THING

Fifteen months into retirement, Tom Durkin returns to a different--though familiar--form of live entertainment Friday in the opening night presentation of Miracle on 34th Street in Saratoga Springs, N.Y.

As a Communication Arts major focused on drama at St. Norbert College in De Pere, WI., Durkin appeared in 17 productions as an undergrad, but his distinguished career as a track announcer precluded work as a actor. Free of the demands of a daily job, he steps back onto the stage

for a two-week run, a total of nine performances, in the cast of the Home Made Theater's family-oriented play.

During the fall, Durkin responded to Home Made Theatre's on-line notice of an open audition and is part of a cast of 28 for the stage adaptation of the well-known movie. He said that he has been having a blast.

"At least a dozen members of the cast are little kids. Another half dozen are high school kids," he said. "It's kind of fun being around them. I've really never been around kids that much. It's just nice to see their energy, their enthusiasm and their personalities. That's been a real nice part of it.

"And my fellow cast members are all really nice folks. Interesting and genuine and fun to be with. I'm just enjoying the experience."

Durkin said there was another reason beyond a love of theater that drew him to the audition for the play.

"I want to become a bona fide member of the Saratoga Springs community, as opposed to summer/snow bird," he said. "It's a great way to congregate and co-mingle with your fellow citizens. It's great."

This is Durkin's first acting role since he had a part in Promenade, All! at the Green Bay Community Theater in 1973. He said he could not consider getting involved in a theater group while he was calling races.

"It wasn't an option," he said. "I certainly would not have had the time."

Durkin, 65, retired on the next-to-last day of the 2014 Saratoga meeting after calling Condo Commando's smashing victory in the GI Spinaway S. He has settled nicely into the next chapter of his life, splitting his time between Saratoga Springs and Florida, doing some promotional work for West Point Thoroughbreds, and pursuing his many interests. "I love it," he said. "I think it's about what I expected. I'm pretty busy. Last year, I probably gave 20 or 30 speeches. During the racing meeting it seemed like every night that I was emceeing some function.

"I have been doing some traveling and went to Italy twice. I've been busy but not to the point where I don't want to be any more or less busy. It's been hitting all the right notes."

Durkin participated in some high school productions during his youth in Chicago and got far more serious about the performing arts during his college days. Home Made Theatre, now in its 31st season in Saratoga Springs, stages its performances at the Spa

Little Theatre, located in the state park between the Gideon Putnam Resort and the Saratoga Performing Arts Center. Durkin said he was invited to the audition for *Miracle on 34th Street* after completing an application.

"I read for a couple of parts that were age and

gender appropriate," he said. "I have three parts. They are relatively small. I think I'm in five or six scenes in the whole show, but they are fun parts.

"My first piece is I play a drunken Santa Claus, which is a lot of fun to do. Any time you can play a drunk on stage it's pretty good. If you're Santa Claus and you're drunk it's twice as good. Another part I play, not completely against type, is a radio announcer. The biggest of the three parts I play is Mr. Macy, R.H. Macy."

As far as Durkin can see, the work involved in handling three characters is just about right.

"It's not an overburdening sort of thing," he said. "I'm glad I didn't have one of the lead roles because that would have been a little daunting after being away from it for so long."

As a track announcer, Durkin had to learn and then forget the names of horses and jocks and the silks owners of each race every day. That skill did not help him much in the preparation for the play.

"It's a different kind of memorization doing your lines, as opposed to memorizing horses's names," he said. "You'd have thought it would been an easy transition, but it just took me a little while to get the hang of it."

Durkin spent the final 24 years of his career as the track announcer for the New York Racing Association and is a well-known, beloved figure in the Saratoga Springs region. His retirement, which included a ceremony in the winner's circle, was an emotional high point of the 2014 season.

As a result, his involvement has brought some added attention to the play by a company that already has a great deal of respect in the marketplace.

"I was really surprised at the level of professionalism involved here, the directors and the lighting technicians and the sound technicians and stage and scenery builders. It's really first rate," he said. "Don't let the name community theater fool you. We've got a proper theater. The stage is a proper stage that can fly in scenery. It's pretty involved and it's far different than the last community theater play I was in. But the pay is the same."

Durkin laughed as he delivered his punch line. He is pleased with the life he is living away from the stress that was part of his career, pointing out that he has lost weight and is much more focused on his health than he was as a guy with binoculars and a microphone.

"It's all good," he said, chuckling. "I walk around with a Fitbit, not a Rolex."

NY STREAMING LIKELY TO CONTINUE EVEN WITHOUT MUTUAL CONSENT by T.D. Thornton

Buffalo Raceway has yet to sign off on an annual agreement that requires mutual consent among all of New York's pari-mutuel tracks and off-track-betting venues in order for the Internet streaming of live Thoroughbred and Standardbred races to continue in 2016. But an executive of the holdout harness track said on Thursday that even if he chooses not to sign the agreement, a new amendment to it appears to guarantee that the streams will continue.

Although he wouldn't call it a "deadline," Buffalo Raceway's chief operating officer Jim Mango said he was asked to sign and return an amended streaming agreement to the New York State Gaming Commission by Friday. Mango told *TDN* that instead of signing the amendment, which he just received Tuesday, he has requested a meeting with the NYSGC to answer concerns he has about how the agreement adversely affects Buffalo Raceway.

"I don't even want to say I'm holding off on signing it," Mango said. "I just asked for the meeting. I made it clear that I don't think live streaming video has properly given protection to my little racetrack. That's clear, I'm not going to back off on my statement. But I do wish to discuss my issues with the regulatory body, which is what I should do as a license holder. This is not an act of war, it's a quest for knowledge. That's the best way I can put it."

The collaborative streaming agreement among New York pari-mutuel licensees dates to December 2010, when New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. ceased operations. As a way to compensate for lost OTB revenue and to give state residents easy access to live racing on the Internet, an agreement was forged pursuant to Racing, Pari-Mutuel Wagering and Breeding Law sections 1003 and 1012.

Mango explained that at the time, the mutual agreement clause was inserted as a safeguard to keep New York tracks and OTBs from fighting over customers in overlapping regions. But he said now he thinks that protection is not happening because competing advance-deposit wagering companies are signing up online customers from within his geographic region that used bet at his brick-and-mortar facility. Buffalo Raceway does not have its own online ADW portal.

Based on previous versions of the agreement, it is unclear whether the lack of mutual consent would mean that New York tracks and OTBs could not stream races only within the state, or if they would be prohibited from sending live Internet streams of races to ADWs nationwide. On Tuesday, Mango said that was "one of the major issues of confusion." Lee Park, the director of communications for the New York State Gaming Commission, underscored in an email Tuesday that the agreement would have "no bearing whatsoever on out-of-state ADWs."

But the new amendment to the agreement apparently gives a different NYSGC interpretation of the mutual consent rule. Mango, despite voicing concerns over the proposed amendment, would not disclose his copy of it. Park did not respond to a Thursday email request prior to deadline for this story that asked for a copy of the amendment, clarification on whether it was a public document, and if the NYSGC would be granting Buffalo Raceway the opportunity to meet over the issue.

"I'm not trying to be an antagonist here or an obstructionist," Mango said. "Unfortunately, what's happened in New York State is not favorable to my little racetrack, and my job is to do what I can to help this racetrack...Let me just say, on the record, that whether I sign or not, this is going to be dealt with in a favorable manner to those who still wish to have live streaming video in New York State."

Mango continued: "My intent was never to disrupt that...Regardless of whether I sign the amendment or not, the language in it appears to protect the live streaming video issue in New York State. I have to still deal with my hopes that the gaming commission will give me the chance to sit down with them and discuss some of my issues and concerns."

"Retiring horses while they are sound gives them every opportunity to excel in a second sporting career. It also gives a dignified ending to their career on the track." Changing Leads Thoroughbred Retraining Project, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization dedicated rehabilitating, retraining, and rehoming retired Thoroughbred racehorses, was founded in 2014 by Goodrich, along with professional hunter/jumper trainer Kirstin Murphy, and Team Valor International Vice President Megan Jones. To date, 38 horses have entered the organization's retraining program, and more than half of those horses have been placed in new homes and are enjoying second careers.



SIYOUNI SHARE SELLS ONLINE FOR €355,000



Siyouni, Europe's leading second-crop sire | Aga Khan Studs

A 1/50th share in Europe's leading second-crop sire **Siyouni (Fr)** (Pivotal {GB}) was purchased by Ireland's Merriebelle Farm for €355,000 on Arqana Online in a virtual auction that concluded Thursday. The price matched that paid by Hesmonds Studs for another 1/50th share in the Aga Khan Studs sire on Arqana Online Nov. 13.

Siyouni was France's leading 2-year-old sire last year and his profile was greatly bolstered this year thanks to his three-time Group 1 and Classic-winning daughter Ervedya (Fr), as well as Group 3 winner Bourree (Ger) and unbeaten juvenile Group 3 winner Trixia (Fr). Siyouni will stand for \in 30,000 at Haras de Bonneval next year, up from \in 20,000 this year. Siyouni's weanlings sold this year averaged \$92,383 off a \in 7,000 stud fee, and on the eve of last week's Arqana December Breeding Stock Sale, agent Mick Flanagan purchased a nomination to Siyouni for \in 52,000.

A total of 27 breeders and agents from France, Ireland and Britain registered, and 10 bids were placed.

"It is interesting to see that bidders who did not get the other share were still very active for this one, and that new bidders appeared to be interested as well," noted Arqana President Eric Hoyeau. "We will be happy to welcome more sales like these in 2016."

YORK SPEAKS ON BETTING PARTNERS

York Racecourse will not enter into new sponsorship deals with bookmakers not signed on as Authorized Betting Partners, however, it will continue to accept sponsorship from bookmakers who already sponsor its races. York currently has race sponsorship agreements with Betfred and Sky Bet, among others, who are not ABPs.

Authorized Betting Partners are bookmakers deemed by British racing to have a fair funding relationship with the sport in relation to offshore digital operations and Levy contributions. The Jockey Club Racecourses and Arena Racing Company, which own many of the country's major tracks, announced in October that they would not enter into any new sponsorship agreements with bookmakers that do not meet ABP standards. York is the first of Britain's four major independent racecourses to state its position on ABPs; Goodwood, Ascot and Newbury have yet to comment.

"York welcomes both the positive action already taken by some digital bookmakers to sign up as ABPs, as well as the support York receives through the strong, long-standing partnerships that already exist with bookmakers who sponsor at York," said a statement from the racecourse. "Whilst working to deliver for its existing and valued bookmaker sponsors, the course hopes that it can encourage them and other betting companies to reach a wider settlement with the racing industry. As agreements for 2016 are already in place, there are no renewals pending with non ABP bookmakers. To demonstrate its support for the principle of the scheme, in the short term, the course will not sign sponsorships with any new betting brands that are not authorised betting partners. As this is an important matter for the sport, York and the other large independent racecourses will continue to engage with interested parties of all perspectives, as the detail and operation of the scheme develops."



progressive approach by looking outside the Thoroughbred industry box to other world-class organizations in order to enhance the personal development of its graduates and, through them, the fortunes of the greater racing industry.

While education has always been one of the defining hallmarks of Darley Flying Start, a portion of the conference is also dedicated to promoting and facilitating leadership by harnessing the collective brainpower of alumni to discuss and address the global horse racing brand.

In the first section of day one, attendees looked to entrepreneur Philip Turner of the Chestnut Group; Barbara Clancy, legal counsel of World Rugby; and Chairman of Irish Sports Council Kieran Mulvey on how to build their own brands and manage crises in today's dynamic and fast-changing world. One of the topics covered in depth by the speakers was the challenges relating to brand that today's up-and-coming generation are going to face as they move through their careers in an increasingly connected and shrinking world. To paraphrase the emcee of the day Jocelyn Targett, one can spend a lifetime building a reputation and brand, but in today's world, all of that can be lost in 140 characters. As such, one of the key aspects that Phillip Turner highlighted was understanding the currency of individual or company brand.

Essentially, the question was "what is it that customers or clients truly find valuable when a service or product fails to meet expectations?" Another challenge discussed in relation to Kieran Mulvey and Barbara Clancy's experience of working in the professional sports industry was the importance of reputation on an industry-wide scale and how other international sports and their governing bodies are facing tremendous scrutiny and investigation worldwide because of their tarnished reputations.

The consensus among alumni was that it is this generation's responsibility to maintain and collectively lift even higher the Thoroughbred industry brand and reputation through both business and personal interactions.

Following the lively panel discussion, the conference moved into its second phase where Darley Flying Start Manager Clodagh Kavanagh presented the alumni with a case study entitled Global Horseracing: What's Our Brand? and opened up the floor to discussion. Attendees then broke up into small groups to brainstorm the topic before reconvening and presenting their collective findings to the group. One of the comments that was consistent in the various group discussions was that racing, regardless of how it is branded on a global or national level, must maintain a reputation of integrity in both business practices and horse care.

Able Friend's trainer John Moore--who will saddle 10 of the day's 55 entrants--is impressed by the depth of talent that has

descended on Hong Kong for the week.

"Overall, the Jockey Club has attracted some really talented horses this year, which makes our job much tougher, but that's what the event is all about." he said. "We want to see the best horses to really fully test our Hong Kong horses and see that our best are

equal to world class on the day. That's what it's all about."

Designs on Rome (Ire) (Holy Roman Emperor (Ire)), provided Moore with an HKIR double last year, just outgaming his onetime stablemate Military Attack (Ire) (Oratorio {Ire}) in the G1 Longines Hong Kong Cup, but that 5-year-old underwent surgery on both front fetlock joints and will have just his second run of the year in his title defense.

"Designs On Rome galloped [Thursday] morning and he had a good blow," Moore commented. "We know he's all heart and he'll be running hard until he hits the line." But, he cautioned, "There's always going to be that doubt second race up." Click for the HKJC race form guide.

Japan's Cup?

With the stalls set up right in front of the Sha Tin grandstand, the run into the first turn for the Hong Kong Cup is reasonably short, putting a decided premium on a good draw. Staphanos (Jpn) (Deep Impact {Jpn}), one of three in the race for his sire and one of six on the program, returns to Hong Kong for the first time since belying odds of 17-1 to finish two lengths' second to Blazing Speed (GB) (Dylan Thomas {Ire}) in the G1 Audemars Piguet Queen Elizabeth II Cup over this course and distance in April. Exiting a longshot third in the G1 Tenno Sho (Autumn), Staphanos saw his task turn slightly tougher when he was assigned post 11 in the field of 14.

"We may have to think about our strategy now or simply let our jockey ride him as he sees fit," said assistant trainer Kazuo Fujiwara of the 4-year-old, who typically settled midpack.

In contrast to that one's style, his compatriot A Shin Hikari (Jpn) (Deep Impact {Jpn}) prefers to strut his stuff from the head of affairs. Able to use that front-running prowess to best **Satono** Aladdin (Jpn) (Deep Impact (Jpn)) in the G2 Mainichi Okan Oct. 11, he went too hard in the Tenno Sho and faded to be a well-backed ninth. The gray, who quickened up well down the straight Thursday drew just to the outside of Staphanos, and his track rider Tomoyasu Sakaguchi said, "there is no option but to lead from the draw."

any case and I can ride my own race on him from there," his jockey Joao Moreira said.

Mile cont.

Maurice (Jpn) (Screen Hero {Jpn}), winner of five straight and widely regarded as the best chance to cause an upset in the Mile, will eyeball Able Friend to his outside in gate 11. Hat Trick (Jpn) (Sunday Silence) is the last non-Hong Kong horse to take out the Mile back in 2005. Maurice exits a victory in the G1 Mile Championship, the same event used as a springboard to his Hong Kong success by Hat Trick.

In contrast to the Cup, the horses in the Mile have the better part of 900 meters to slot in and get a spot, making the draw somewhat less relevant. **Mondialiste (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}), who finished with a flourish to win the GI Woodbine Mile this past September and came with a similarly stinging late rally to finish runner-up to Tepin (Bernstein) in the GI Breeders' Cup Mile Oct. 31, drew gate 13, but the result was of little concern to his connections.

"It (gate 13) really doesn't have a big effect [on us]," said assistant trainer Fearghal Davis. "We're going to be taking our time anyway. From out there with a long run into the turn we can make our own trip, hopefully."

Take Your Pick in the Sprint

If the G1 Longines Hong Kong Sprint were a sporting event between two teams, the line would very likely read 'pick-em.' A case can easily be made for half of the 14 rivals, but the shortest of the four races and another abbreviated run into the bend could wreak havoc on those with double-digit draws.

That fact applies to a horse no more than it does **Peniaphobia** (Ire) (Dandy Man {Ire}), the 2014 Sprint runner-up who was saddled with the riverside gate in 14. He has Joao Moreira calling at the controls, but a similar scenario from gate

"I will ride the horse however I'm instructed to do, but I would think it might be best to ride him a bit quieter, looking for some cover, from that gate," the Brazilian explained.

There is no Lord Kanaloa (Jpn) (King Kamehameha {Jpn}) among the trio of Japanese short-trackers signed on, each of whom drew in double digits.

"There were only two options left. It could not be helped," said assistant trainer Kazuo Fujiwara of G1 Sprinters' S. winner **Straight Girl (Jpn)** (Fuji Kiseki {Jpn}). "She always breaks well from the gate and, at least, we have no concern about being boxed in."

Americans Satisfied With Post Positions

The connections of both American-bred sprinters were at peace with the results of Thursday's draw.

Trainer Wesley Ward arrived in Hong Kong late Wednesday and made his first appearance at Sha Tin to oversee the return to the track of **Green Mask** (Mizzen Mast). The 4-year-old has been under something of a minor injury cloud after appearing a bit lame the day after zipping 800 meters in :47.3. The

conditioner shed some light on the situation.

"He trains in glue-on shoes and he went quicker than I wanted him to go on a pretty firm track," Ward explained. "Sometimes that glue bruises their inside heel, and that's what happened. He initially came out of the work beautifully, but the next

morning, he was a little sore when they pulled him out of the stall. We pulled the shoe off for the last two days and soaked it with hot water and Epsom salts and pulled the soreness out. When I pulled him out first thing [Thursday] morning, he was completely sound. He trained beautifully--I trained him barefoot and I don't see any problems at all. It happens all the time when you train a horse with glue-on shoes. They breeze a little quick and that glue sort of jams into the quarter." Cont. p7

'FRIEND' READY AND 'ABLE'

If trainer John Moore is lacking in confidence that **Able Friend**(Aus) (Shamardal) can bounce back from an unexpected loss in the G2 Jockey Club Mile Nov. 21, he certainly isn't showing it.
The Australian, already the owner of six victories on Hong Kong International day, is looking forward to adding to that total, and his hopes were boosted after the stable stalwart shone in a Thursday morning work down the Sha Tin backstretch.

After warming up beneath an exercise rider around the tight trotting ring in the stable area, Able Friend walked off and the

reins were handed over to Joao Moreira. The duo stepped on to the track at the top of the chute, right at the 1800-meter start, and broke off into an easy gallop, getting that opening two furlongs in :27.8. Moreira gradually increased the tempo and

allowed the nearly 1300-pound chestnut to stretch out over the next 400 meters, completing the work in :25.6.

"I'm happy with him, that was just to keep him turning over," Moore commented. "All he needed was a freshen-up after his race in the mile a couple of weeks back and he's there now, he's cherry ripe. Joao had a big smile on his face when he came back."

The victory in the 2014 Mile was the second of six on the bounce, culminating with a success in the G1 Champions Mile that was as ridiculously easy as the one he'd recorded six months prior. It all came crashing down on the opening Tuesday at Royal Ascot, as Able Friend was undone by the track, or the surroundings or Solow (Ire) (Singspiel {Ire}) or some combination of all those. Despite the loss, Moore believes that experience could make Able Friend a better horse.

"He might have been beaten at Ascot, but the time Able Friend had in the paddock at Newmarket after that race did him the world of good," Moore opined.

Able Friend did not face the starter again until the Premier Bowl H. over a 1200-meter trip that was supposed to be way too sharp. In spite of that, a 133-pound impost and the presence of nearly all the best local sprinters, Able Friend whooshed past late. That effort may have left him on the dull side for the Jockey Club Mile, but given the impression he made Thursday morning, there's no reason to believe a title defense is out of reach.

JAPANESE RUNNERS GET FINAL POLISH

Japan will field no fewer than 10 starters at Sunday's International meeting, and, as is their custom, several of the runners finished off their main preparations with some fast work Thursday morning.

Straight Girl (Jpn) (Fuji Kiseki {Jpn}), third to the sidelined Aerovelocity (NZ) (Pins {Aus}) in last year's race, had her race-

day rider Keita Tosaki in the irons as she clocked a relatively easy :25 flat for 400 meters while looking a touch unfocused.

"I did not ask her a lot, just tried to run comfortably today, so I asked her to drive strongly at the end," said the jockey, who was a

creditable third in Wednesday's Longines International Jockeys' Championship at Happy Valley. "She responded very well and seemed to be able to shift into top gear. She looks well."

Her fellow Sprint contestants worked over a bit further. **Mikki Isle (Jpn)** (Deep Impact {Jpn}) went 800 meters in :50.7 (:28.4, :22.3), while **Sakura Gospel (Jpn)** (Sakura President {Jpn}) galloped over 1200 meters in 1:26.4 (:33.6, :30.3, :22.5).

Hong Kong Cup candidate **A Shin Hikari (Jpn)** (Deep Impact {Jpn}) was put through his paces by Yutaka Take and was given the time of 1:28 for his six-furlong 'breeze," which was capped off by an ultimate 400 meters in :24.3.

"He sometimes has an issue with his temperament and it is new for him to gallop on turf," Take explained. "But I think he is in good condition and looks well. Hopefully he will be settled on race day."

Maurice (Jpn) (Screen Hero {Jpn}) did not do any fast work Thursday morning and was relegated to a soft canter twice past the stands. He was noticeably wet in his left shoulder as he made his way past the press on his way back to the barn on a morning that was neither especially warm nor humid.

"He cantered nicely," offered Masanori Watanabe, assistant to trainer Noriyuki Hori. "The only concern with him is that he is tense. He is a bit nervous with the new surroundings, but other than that, things have gone smoothly up to now." **Cont. p9**

One of the more unexposed Japanese runners is the 3-year-old Danon Platina (Jpn) (Deep Impact {Jpn}). The gray colt, winner of the G1 Asahi Hai Futurity S. at two, has made a favorable impression on track this week and impressed again Thursday by finishing 800 meters of work in :23.3.

"He concentrated on his work today," commented Keisuke Miyata, assistant to trainer Sakae Kunieda. "It was raining last night, but the track condition seemed to be better than expected. He was happy and moved nicely in the stretch. He is looking well."

PREFERMENT A FIRST FOR WALLER

Trainer Chris Waller oversees some 120 horses at Sydney's Rosehill Gardens and has topped the city's trainers' premiership on five consecutive occasions. The 41-year-old will be represented by his very first Hong Kong runner when

The 4-year-old colt, winner of the 2014 G1 Victoria Derby, was a near-miss runner-up in the G1 Rosehill Guineas three starts later, but was spelled off an eighth-place effort as the favorite in the

G1 Australian Derby this past April. He upset the G2 Hill S. at Randwick in his second-up run Sept. 19 and backed up that effort with a rallying success in the G1 Turnbull S. at Flemington Oct. 4. He can be excused for his ninth behind stablemate Winx (Aus) (Street Cry {Ire}) in the G1 Cox Plate and 20th in the G1 Melbourne Cup and returns to arguably his preferred 2400-meter trip Sunday afternoon.

Working over 1200 meters on the course proper with jockey Hugh Bowman in the saddle, Preferment was timed in an easy 1:29.1, with a final 400 meters in a smooth :25 flat.

"He's well. He brushed home 400 [meters] this morning," the New Zealander said on his first morning at trackwork. "I just wanted to take the edge off him, as he's quite a masculine horse and he was proving a bit of a handful yesterday. He's a pretty good horse and I would rate him a top-three chance. He's ready to fight. You can forgive his past two runs at home and he comes here guite fresh. He didn't really have a run in the Melbourne Cup the way it panned out. They went very slowly and he wasn't taxed. If they'd gone 10 seconds quicker in the [Melbourne] Cup and he'd had a tough run, he probably wouldn't be here."
