Kantian Cosmopolitanism and the Racial Hierarchy

My dissertation offers an account of Kant's concept of race in the context of his cosmopolitan theory. This account is framed as a critical response to two widely accepted claims: the claim that Kant's work can be separated into distinct periods before and after he changed his thinking about race, and the claim that Kant's views on race are marginal, having no systematic implications for the rest of his philosophy. I contend that the concept of race is an integral part of what Kant sets out to accomplish in the 1790s. His understanding of cosmopolitan society is built on the theory of inequality, and that theory in turn is organized by the concept of race in two ways. First, it provides Kant a methodology for understanding the purpose of inheritable differences in nature. Second, racial difference supplies Kant with the contours of an explanation for why differences exist in human nature. He integrates these two ways of looking at race into a theory of inequality that has a decisive impact on his cosmopolitanism. In turn, my critical approach to the marginalization of Kant's concept of race in recent scholarship is thematic: I examine Kant's texts

on race, teleology, and cosmopolitanism as a part of a single coherent narrative about the purpose of race.
