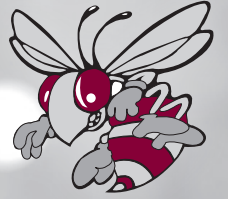



Transportation *Update*

Our top priority here in the Transportation Department is the safety and well-being of your children. The COVID-19 pandemic has not changed that for our drivers, aides, and mechanics. They have been working diligently to keep our safety standards as high as before.

- After every run, they clean the high touch areas.
- At the end of every shift, they clean and disinfect all seats, windows, and railings.
- Drivers and aides wear face coverings at all times. In addition, aides also wear gloves.
- Each child has been given an assigned seat to insure they are social distancing and to know who each child sits by for tracking purposes.
- Bus windows have been cracked open to help with air ventilation.
- Mechanics clean and disinfect any area of the bus they come into contact with when doing maintenance on them.
- The mechanics are changing the cabin heater filters more often.

You as parents can also help us with our safety standards. You can also reinforce some of these changes with your children.

- Please make sure your child has a mask when getting on the bus. They must wear them at all times.
- Students cannot share items.
- Pick-up and drop-off locations of students must be at one location for all five days.

With all these changes this school year, a few things still remain the same. Students can still say "hi" and "bye" to their drivers. They can still talk with their seat neighbors on the bus.

Our drivers care, love what they do, and will get your children to and from school safely.

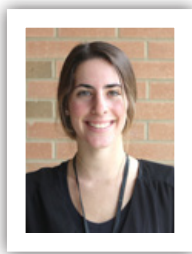
New Employees

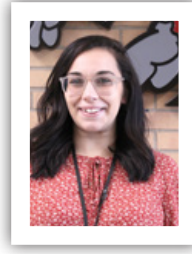


Welcome Miss Malick

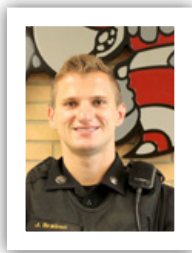


New SRO Deputy Brabon

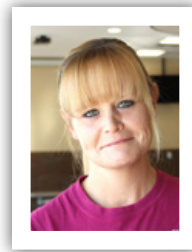
"I look forward to meeting the kids and faculty and being a part of this team about which I have heard so many great things," said Brabon.

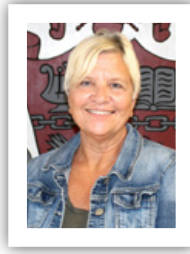
New Retirees

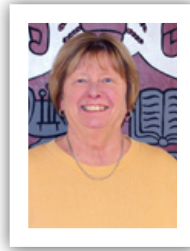

Let me begin by thanking all of our parents, staff, and community for their support and encouragement over these past several months. I am pleased to share that we have had a successful reopening of school and our students have settled in well with positive habits both new and old. Despite the restrictions, our students can be heard throughout the school spreading laughter and joy. I have the very special privilege of greeting them all each morning as they enter the building and am so proud of the wonderful character they display with happy greetings and waves.

As you may know, we have unfortunately had to reduce or eliminate non-essential visitors to our school. This has regrettably meant the loss of some of our special opportunities such as birthday lunches with parents and perhaps most notably our annual Open House Celebration. While the loss of some of these cherished events has been disappointing, we have made the most of our opportunities by engaging families in virtual meetings and conferences through Google Meet and most recently celebrated the fall with a very well attended drive through Trunk or Treat Parade. Many thanks to our parent teacher organization STEP Boosters for planning and putting on this amazing event.

Since we are unable to have visitors in our school, let me share with you little of what you might see if you visited our school. Each morning, as our students unload from the school buses they are greeted by adults up and down the bus loop and in the hallways. While many of us worried about how the students would handle wearing masks and maintaining physical distancing, I am pleased to share that they are doing wonderfully. Our teachers have built in routines throughout the day that allow for masks to be removed and are quick and kind to support a student who may not feel comfortable. In classrooms you will see students sitting physically distanced but still talking and socializing with one another. We truly know the importance of social interactions and continue to find new and creative ways for students to collaborate and socialize while maintaining safe personal space.

Beyond the topic of COVID and reopening plans, our school continues to provide unique and innovative ways to make learning interesting and fun. For example, our 5th grade team has found a safe way to once again hold the Annual Alien Museum. This very popular hands-on experience



allows students to learn about planets and the solar system while developing research, writing, and presentation skills. Each 5th grader presented his/her "alien" in the form of a written report and presented it to classes throughout the building using Google Meet.

Meal Distribution *Update*

Please note the following change in the Byron-Bergen CSD meal distribution for students not receiving meals at school, such as, hybrid students, fully remote students, quarantined students, etc.

Starting the week of November 30th, meals will be available for pick up from 2:45 pm to 5:45 pm every Wednesday.

If there is no school on Wednesday, meals can be picked up on the preceding Tuesday from 2:45 pm to 5:45 pm.

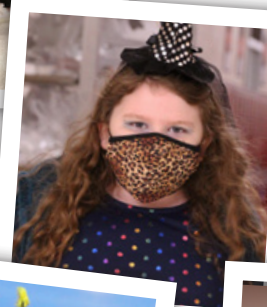
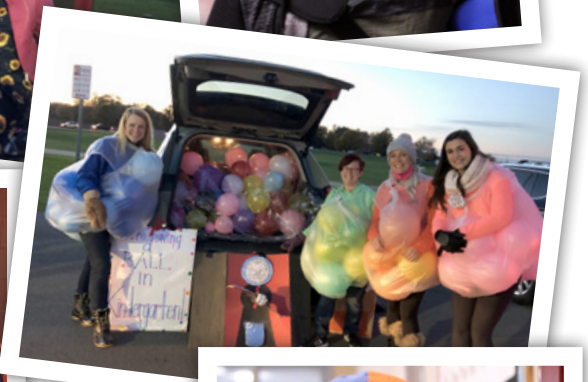
The meal pickup will consist of three complete breakfasts and lunches for hybrid students and five complete breakfasts and lunches for fully remote students.

In accordance with USDA regulations and while federal funding lasts, these meals are free to all children newborn to 18 years old, no matter what the financial status of the family is. The program is paid for with federal funding received. We only receive funding if families participate. If you're available, please feel free to stop in by parking in the Jr./Sr. High School bus loop and going to the overhead door entrance (which is to the right of the High School main entrance).

It is absolutely wonderful to just be back connecting with our kids. While not ideal or what we ideally want, I am thankful for everyone making the best of this situation. I especially want to thank our students, staff, and families for their patience and flexibility as we continue to navigate through the complexities of this school year.

On October 28th we were able to bring back the Class of 2021 for their class picture, lunch, and some fun filled activities. I am so proud of the resiliency and positive attitudes that these young adults have displayed. They are another amazing group of BB students who are going to make this world a better place when they graduate. Over the next few weeks we will continue to look for opportunities to bring our kids back in the building to promote school culture, social emotional learning, and academics.

I want to stress to everyone the difference in how school looked during the closure in March through the time school ended in June versus how we started school in September. Our priority with staff, families, and most importantly our students last year when the crisis hit was to do the best we can to get through the year without adding any extra stress or anxiety to our teachers, our students, and our families. I have attached a graphic (Crisis Response vs. Remote/Hybrid Online Learning) that outlines the difference between school closure from March to June and school beginning in September. While this is not an ideal system, the reality is that we have to bridge the gap and get all of our students back on track whether they are in school or learning remotely.

We continue to support strong communication between home and school - it is essential for students to reach their highest potential. This fall we have added an app called ParentSquare. ParentSquare is a multi-purpose platform to facilitate communication, collaboration and increase family engagement in schools. Pesticide Notice

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation enacted a program that requires all schools to provide you with information about pesticide product applications made throughout the school year. Under State law, the school is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour advance written notice prior to a pesticide application.

The Following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;

- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-eat pastes, forms, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR.25;

- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals.

In the event that an emergency application is necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list. To register your name with the school to be on a 48-hour notification list, send a request to Byron-Bergen Central School District Office, 6917 W Bergen Rd., Bergen, NY 14416. A written request must be submitted annually.

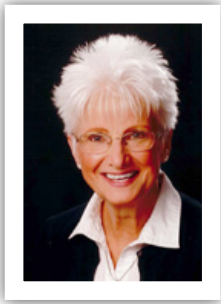

Alumni Hall of Fame 2020

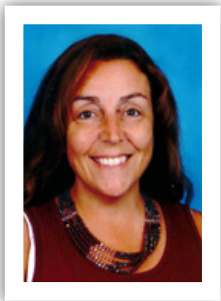

While attending Byron-Bergen, Ms. Kowalczyk participated in National Honor Society, Student Council, Spanish Club, Art Club (winning a Scholastic Art Award), Model Congress, Music Groups, All County Music, Drama Club, was Co-Editor of the 1970 Yearbook, and won a DAR award. She earned her Bachelor's Degree from LeMoyne College, worked as a Family Court Clerk in Washington, D.C., and earned her Law Degree from St. John's University (1979). Ms. Kowalczyk was admitted to the Bar in New York State in 1980 and opened her own law practice in Warsaw, with a primary focus on representing children in Wyoming and Genesee Counties. She retired

in December 2019 after a 40-year career. Recognitions she has received include the NYS Fourth Department, 8th Judicial District 'Outstanding Women in Law' Award (2017), and the Fourth Department 'Law Guardian of the Year' Award (1996). She has been a lector at St. Michael's RC Church in Warsaw for 40 years and a religious educator there for 20 years. She was a Scout Leader for 10 years and coached T-Ball and Summer Soccer in Warsaw for many years. She is the mother of 4 and grandmother of 10. An advocate for youth, Ms. Kowalczyk serves as an excellent role model for the students of Byron-Bergen.
