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

Timmons Wins Cow Creek Award for YHS

Each year, fourteen graduating seniors from throughout Douglas County are awarded a \$1,500 scholarship to Umpqua Community College from the Cow Creek Umpqua Tribe. This year's Yoncalla High School recipient is Aubri Timmons. The winners not only receive the scholarship money, but will also be honored at an awards dinner to be held in May at Seven Feathers Convention Center in Canyonville.

The Tribe has given out the scholarships each year since 1997. One senior is selected from each of the fourteen high schools in Douglas County. The criteria for the award is given out based on scholastic effort and commitment, potential for college-level work, good citizenship and behavior, motivation, and industriousness.

Timmons exemplifies these traits and many more. "She truly represents what is special about YHS and someone who understands what the core values of the high school represents. I am proud of all the work that she has accomplished and what the future holds for her," said Principal Brian Berry.

Timmons has been part of the YHS student body for the past two years. She has been involved in sports and has been involved in various volunteer opportunities throughout the community. She plans to attend UCC and is interested in becoming a pre-school teacher. "I am excited to receive this scholarship. It is nice to know that the teachers at YHS have recognized my hard work," stated Timmons.

YHS Band News

The Yoncalla music program has a busy spring schedule with several festivals planned for our performing ensembles. The choir, which has doubled in size since last year, will attend the Douglas Invitational Choir Festival on March 14 at Roseburg High School and the OMEA District 10 Choir Festival on April 4 at UCC. Yoncalla is one of only 37 1A/2A high schools in Oregon that have competitive choral music programs. The choir has qualified for the state championship for the last five years in a row, and in 2017 the choir earned 9th place.

The High School Band will perform at the Willamette Valley Concert Band Festival at LCC on March 22, and at the OMEA District 10 Band Festival at North Douglas on April 11. The band has earned qualifying scores for the last four years in a row and took 3rd place at the 2015 state competition.

Soloists and small ensembles will perform on March 10 at Glide High School at the OMEA Solo/Ensemble contest. Nic Johnston will perform a tuba solo, and Olivia Cardillo, Ashley Keevy, and Bryson Dover will perform as a vocal trio. Those performers with qualifying scores will advance to the state competition at Pacific University in April.



A record number of participants in Eugene gathered at the Willamette River on Saturday, February 10th to take the plunge for Special Olympics Oregon (SOOR). Local group North Umpqua Unified club, consisting



of Elkton High School, North Douglas High School, and Yoncalla High School, took part in this plunge.

A number of teams and individuals gathered at Maurie Jacobs Park early Saturday morning enjoying music and refreshments anxious to get in the water. A costume contest was held for the many creative costumes that day, such as the fish from Finding Dory, Bearded Villains, Bananas and Monkeys, Boats, Mermaids, and Policemen and many others.

What influenced you to take the plunge?

"It was a great opportunity to raise money for North Umpqua Unified Club and Special Olympics to sustain

the futures of our current and upcoming athletes. It will help them receive the opportunity to play sports and interact with other SOOR partners and athletes" says YHS student Brody Best who is a part of the North Umpqua Unified basketball team.

Dressed as monkeys and bananas, this group ran and dove into the ice cold water to high-five the line of divers from Lane County's sheriff's office that helped pull this day together.

There were an expected 320 participants this morning, each plunger being responsible for raising

at least \$50, everyone was able to come together to raise about \$30,000. North Umpqua Unified Club was able to raise \$5,685 for Special Olympics.

Wickman is undecided as to where he will be attending college. He wants to play college sports and become a math teacher. "It's an honor to play in the 8-man all-star game. It just goes to show that effort and hard work pays off," stated Wickman.



Tutoring Takes Shape at YHS

After its initial year, students from YHS continue to volunteer at the pre-school and elementary school. This group of students walks less than a half a mile to Yoncalla Elementary School where they tutor at all levels as part of the Yoncalla Early Works project. Whether a tutor is reading aloud, talking, or writing with a child, it is a valuable experience for the youth. Students from the middle school and high school have interest in working with them.

One of the best ways to encourage literacy skills is to read aloud with a child as often as possible. Students from YHS do just this. "I love reading to the kids," stated YHS 8th grader Lilly Bell. "I want to be a pre-school teacher and this is good practice for me."

Yoncalla Early Works is an initiation of the Ford Family Foundation, the Children's Institute, the Yoncalla School District and other local partners. Its mission: to bring parents, the school and the community together to meet the needs of children – prenatally to age eight – and to ensure every child is prepared for kindergarten and school success.

Under the direction of YHS teacher Jerry Fauci, the tutoring program began to form at the beginning of last school year. "The goal was to encourage young people to get involved with the Early Works project and to teach a valuable skill to the high school students," said Fauci. The purpose of this program is to provide training and opportunities for students to tutor preschool and elementary school students and learn about what it takes to be a teacher. Students have been given formal training on issues ranging from how to react to behavioral issues, interacting with different cultures, dialogic reading and play and how to handle confidential information. YHS junior said, "I am having a lot of fun with this. It is fun working with the kids and helping them be creative." Head of the Yoncalla Pre-School Megan Barber said, "I love it and it's working well. It gives the teenagers an opportunity to interact with my students and learn about the educational process."

This is one of many experiences that students at YHS have an opportunity to receive towards career training. It is also an opportunity that will help build the foundation for those returning the favor.
