**Oakton receives
\$60,000 grant from IBM**

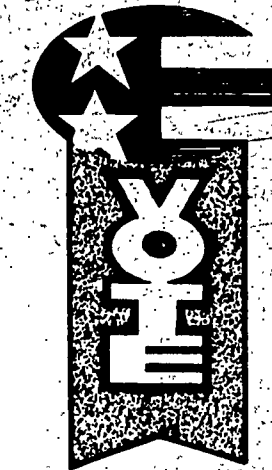
Oakton Community College will be the recipient of a computer-aided design system valued at \$200,000 and a cash grant of \$60,000 from IBM, according to Dr. Frederick Salzberg, professor of engineering and coordinator of OCC's engineering programs.

IBM Fastdraft Systems for computer-aided drafting will be given to Oakton to improve the two-year curricula in Engineering Graphics, Electronics Drafting and Architectural Drafting and Facilities Engineering courses. In addition, OCC will receive \$60,000 over

three years to develop curricula and resource materials using the system, and to upgrade faculty skills.

"We are extremely pleased to be receiving this generous grant from IBM," said Dr. Frederick Salzberg, professor of

Light turnout expected
following low-key campaigning

**Primary
Election
Tuesday**

Following a low-key primary campaign, voting may be light on Tuesday when voters will go to the polls to decide who will appear on the Democratic and Republican tickets in November.

Twelve candidates are running for office in the area's three Congressional districts.

9TH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT

In the 9th Congressional District which extends from Division St. in Chicago along

Lake Michigan up Dempster St. to Northbrook, incumbent Democrat Sidney Yates is facing James Wright and Michael Markovitz.

The only candidate in the 9th District Republican race is Chicago physician Herbert Sohn.

11TH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT

In the 11th Congressional District, located in the south end of the community, incumbent

Fifteen residents showed up Thursday night at Niles Park Board meeting to discuss the possibility of disannexing from Park Ridge's park district and coming into the Niles district. They are all Niles village residents who live west of Washington Street and roughly between Oakton and Dempster Streets.

Before the meeting ended three of the audience members left. At least one of the remaining audience voiced he favored staying in the Park Ridge district.

The Niles park district initiated sending 660 letters to residents inquiring of their interest in such an action. Twenty-one percent, or 139 residents replied. Fourteen percent of the original 660 looked favorably on disannexation to Niles while five percent looked with disfavor of such plans.

Niles park director, Bill Hughes explained the board could not initiate any such annexation action. It would have to be activated by the residents who live there.

Park board president Elaine Heinen told the audience what a "fantastic park district" Niles has had the past 10 years. She said, "the district has climbed to the top," using a bit of hyperbole to tout a district she's very proud of.

Cragin Federal lowers mortgage rates

Cragin Federal Savings has lowered its basic 30 year adjustable mortgage loan (AML) rate from 11% to 10.5%. Jahns called this index "one of the most stable and slowest moving indexes being used today because it reflects a consolidated average of savings costs from hundreds of savings associations." The loan has a floor of 10.5% and may never change annually more than 1.5%.

Cragin has also lowered the first year rate on an alternative AML, from 11.5% to 11%. While the rate may change, it's guaranteed never to exceed 15% over the 30-year term.

Cragin charges a \$200 application fee and 3% closing costs for both loan programs.

Cragin Federal has also liberalized its lending policies to now offer 90% financing on one to four-unit owner-occupied property and up to 95% financing on single-family detached homes.

A fixed-rate mortgage is also available, locked in at 12 3/4% for a maximum of 15 years.

Cragin Federal operates five Regional Lending Centers in Chicago and four suburbs to accept mortgage applications: Chicago, 888-1000; Mt. Prospect, 437-7850; Schaumburg, 884-0100; Itasca, 773-0800; and Wheaton, 688-3600.

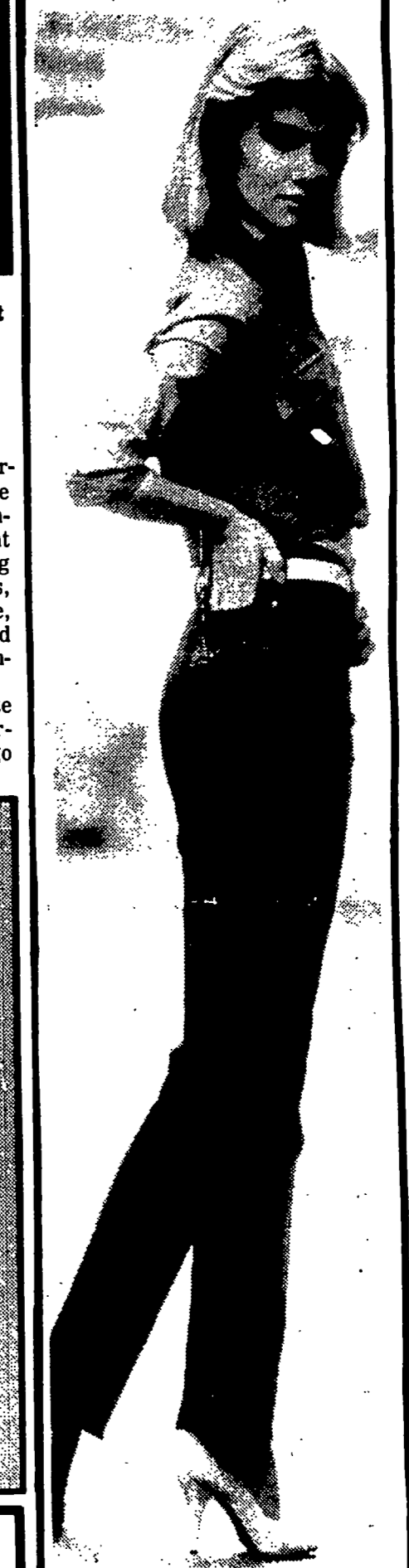

Corcoran charges Percy sides with Hart, Mondale, McGovern

"When the Democratic presidential candidates come here campaigning for support, the people of Illinois will be hearing from some of Chuck Percy's most celebrated voting partners," Republican Senate candidate Tom Corcoran said today.

Percy has often sided with Democratic Sen. Gary Hart and former Democratic Senators Walter Mondale and George McGovern, an analysis of "Senator Charles Percy's 13 Worst Votes" as listed last August by the Corcoran campaign shows.

A 17-year Senate Veteran, Percy faces Corcoran, an eight-year Congressman, in the March 20 Republican Senate primary. A review of the 13 Senate roll-call votes reveals Percy and Hart have voted the same way six out of the eight times they cast votes on the same legislation. Percy has agreed with Mondale all six times they have taken positions on the issues, and Percy sided with McGovern all four times that they voted on identical measures.

According to the voting sample, Percy most recently sided with Hart when they both voted to defeat President Reagan's proposed 1984 budget last May 19. Percy and Hart have also voted together against capital punishment, in favor of giving away the Panama Canal, in favor of multi-million-dollar U.S. loans to communist governments in Southeast Asia, against declaring it U.S. policy to stop communist Cuban expansionism, and in favor of Jimmy Carter's multi-billion-dollar synfuels program.

Niles Township GOP endorses Shapiro

Jeffrey Shapiro, candidate for State Representative in the 56th District, won a glowing endorsement for his candidacy from the Niles Township Regular Republican Organization. The precinct captains and organization officers had several opportunities to meet the announced candidates.

Later the Niles Township Regular Republican Organization caucused and unanimously endorsed Shapiro. Shapiro said he is proud of this endorsement and looks forward to working closely with Committeeman Patricia Handzel and the Organization.

Simon says legislation would slash gas bills

U.S. Rep. Paul Simon (D-Ill.) recently announced that gas bills in Chicago and surrounding communities could be slashed by twelve percent if legislation he introduced in the last legislative session was passed.

The legislation, which combines two previous bills, would roll back natural gas prices to September, 1982 levels and require pipeline companies to transport cheaper domestic gas to Peoples Gas and Other Illinois Utilities. Price of current natural gas supplies would be rolled back and kept under controls for two more years, after which time they would be allowed to rise no more than the rate of inflation. Gas drilled after enactment would be completely decontrolled, as incentive to production. If no congressional action is undertaken, price controls are set to expire January 1, 1985.

Simon is the chief Democratic sponsor of HR 2685, which would make pipeline companies common carriers, like railroads, and require them to transport gas contracted for delivery directly from purchasers.

Simon noted most Congressmen have been meeting over the recess with angry constituents about skyrocketing winter utility bills. "I want Congress to consider this bill after a cold, cold January," Simon said.

Kustra bill to aid village water and sewer systems

State Senator Bob Kustra (R-28th) has introduced legislation to help local governments finance improvements to their water and sewer systems and other public works projects designed to alleviate flooding and to properly maintain and build waste water treatment plants, solid waste disposal facilities, bridges and other essential public works. The legislation authorizes the Illinois Development Finance Authority to pool and package local government bond issues and sell those issues on the national bond market.

The new program will be called the Municipal Infrastructure Assistance Program and it will also provide for the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs and the Illinois Development Finance Authority to provide technical assistance to local governments in the areas of debt management bond issuance and proper maintenance procedures.

Kustra's bill was recommended strongly by Governor Thompson in his State of the State message as a way for smaller cities to use the power of state government to issue bonds and notes to make funds available at reduced rates and on more favorable terms for borrowing by local governments. Citing the advantages of using the state's bonding power, Kustra pointed out, "Flooding is a particularly serious problem in my district and some communities might be able to rebuild some of their sewer systems if they could get more favorable interest rates." This piece of legislation will do just that.

Spring Auto Tips

New car finishes conceal warning signs for waxing

Auto makers seeking to extend the shiny appearance of cars rolling off Detroit production lines are beginning to use alternative paint systems that impart a longer lasting high-gloss look.

One of the newest processes being offered to new car buyers is a two-coat finish that is cosmetically superior to the traditional one-coat paints. Referred to as the "color coat/clear coat" system, it consists of a base coat of pigmented paint over which clear coat is applied to provide a deeper, more lustrous finish.

The result is an eye-catching sheen which greatly enhances the car's overall appearance. However, the new system presents some potential pitfalls for car owners who are in the habit of protecting their vehicles with a coat of wax only when they see the finish begin to lose its gleaming appearance.

With the color coat/clear coat system, the usual indicators for deciding when to wax no longer apply. The finish does not dull slowly over time. Instead, it remains bright and shiny for an extended period even though inclement weather, road film and other hazards may attack the finish. The new system is also susceptible to deterioration from sunlight which can cause the outer clear coat layer to discolor and break down before its time.

To capitalize on the beauty of the clear coat effect and give these finishes the protection they need,

car care experts recommend the same kind of regular waxing schedule used on more conventional finishes. Waxing provides cars with a protective overcoat that shields the clear coat surface from harsh environmental conditions including exposure to ultraviolet radiation from the sun.

Waxes containing a UV light absorbing agent, such as Borden's new Sun Shield™ car waxes, have been developed to help fight the damaging effects of the sun's rays on these color coat/clear coat systems. Their UV-absorbing capability is particularly important for cars maintained in warmer, sunnier climates, such as the Southern U.S., where the sun is a constant threat to the autobody surface.

Waxing the new finish regularly is also prescribed to inhibit road and atmospheric particles from scratching the outer clear coat.

When to Wax Existing studies indicate that establishing a regular waxing schedule for a car is the best method to ensure its finish is protected from environmental elements. Generally, a regular schedule consists of waxing the vehicle once every two to three months.

Getting into the habit of on-going car care becomes even more desirable when one considers that consumers generally pay a premi-

um for the optional color coat/clear coat paint application. If an owner allows the outer layer to wear away, the car will require a totally new finish job at a considerable cost. The clear coat cannot be re-stored without refinishing the entire car.

Overseas Origins The introduction of the color coat/clear coat finishes began with cars from both Europe and Japan. Shortly after its introduction, U.S. auto manufacturers adopted the process to position domestic cars as competitive with their foreign counterparts.

Currently offered to add a superior look to metallic paints, the color coat/clear coat process will also be available in non-metallic versions as well.

Now that Detroit has decided to enter the new paint system marketplace, it's apparent that the new finishes are here to stay. In fact, their use on newer cars may cause us to re-evaluate the way we look at automotive finishes. But remember that proper care and treatment is required to help protect your investment and to continue drawing admiring glances from passersby.



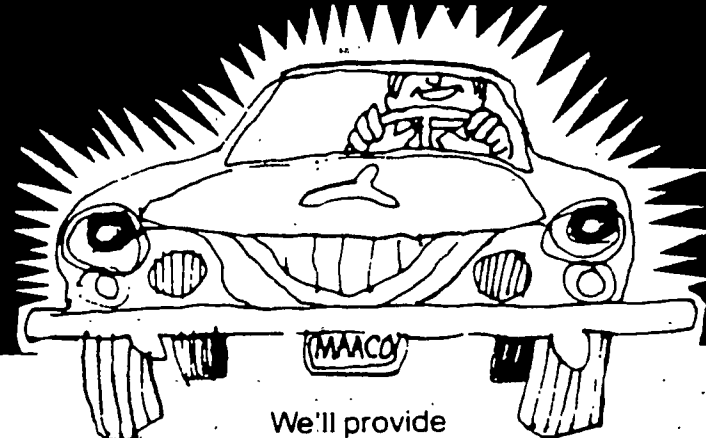

Guard against overloading economy cars on long trips

Newcomers to the downsized car scene packing for vacation travel may be pleasantly surprised by the cargo space available. However, while the new, gas-efficient vehicle may be lighter by a thousand

pounds or more, the weight of the load it may be expected to carry may stay about the same. So, while the driver of the 4,000-pound car of yesterday might notice little change in handling with a 600-pound load, this same 600 pounds can make a noticeable difference in a 3,000-pound car.

The relatively greater increase in weight can affect handling and can cause the car to "bottom out" on bumps. It also can cause headlights to blind oncoming drivers because of the lowered rear end of the car.

To be sure the new, lighter car is travel ready, try to trim as much weight as possible from your vacation gear. If you still believe your cargo is overweight, consider installing overload shock absorbers to maintain level ride. Check your owner's manual for maximum permissible load for your car.

Good preventive maintenance practices are especially important before taking the car on a trip. Be sure lubrication, oil and filter changes have been taken care of; take a good look at the cooling system and check the condition of your tires, including inflation pressure, before starting off.

Air filter

The job of the carburetor air filter is to clean the enormous amounts of air used by the engine. It must filter out foreign matter which might otherwise get into the engine and cause wear. Most late model cars and light trucks use the replaceable dry paper filter elements.

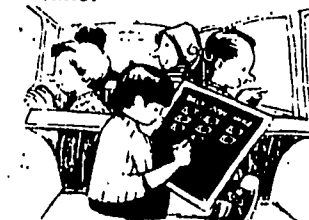
Remove the fastener (wing nut, bolt, or clamp) located on the top of the air cleaner assembly.

Remove the cover and pull the filter out. To clean, hold the filter by the rim and tap it several times on a firm surface.

To determine if the filter needs to be replaced, hold it so light from a flashlight shows through from the inside outwards. Turn the filter or move the flashlight to shine light through each section of the filter. If light does not pass through the filter, it must be replaced. Replace the filter in the air cleaner and re-install the cover and fasteners.

An important consideration is engine performance. A spark plug that might have misfired intermittently in your old car with its big engine may have been barely perceptible, even under heavy load. However, you are more likely to notice the difference in a smaller engine which generally will have fewer and smaller cylinders.

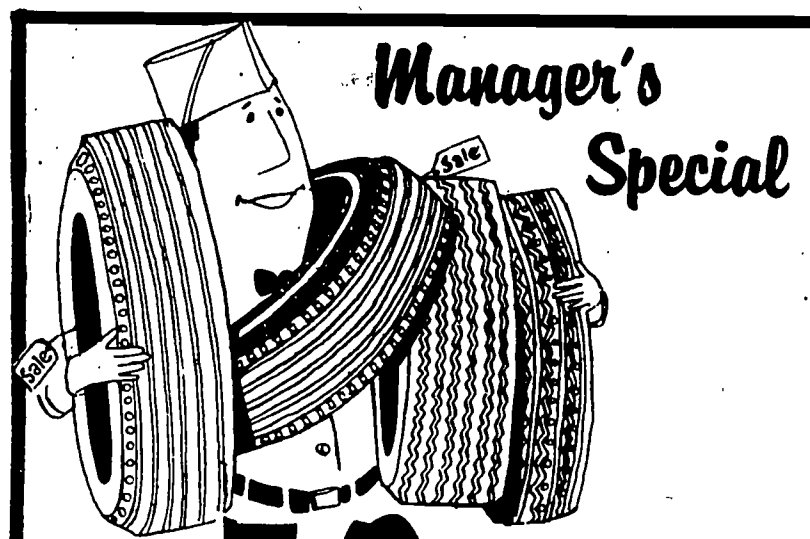

New lightweight packaging helps do-it-yourselfers

You may be among a growing army of motorists who do some of their own routine car maintenance. A boon to do-it-yourselfers is a handy new lightweight user-friendly packaging for automotive fluids.

Industry surveys indicate that 57 percent of motorists now at least add motor oil themselves and 43 percent change oil themselves. Plus, 37 percent of women motorists now add oil themselves, with 24 percent doing oil changes.

The growing do-it-yourself trend is being speeded by advances in efficient easy-to-handle packaging. An example of this is Mobil's new light, leak-proof plastic packaging which covers the company's full line of automotive lubricants, starting with the fully synthetic high-performance Mobil 1, official motor oil of the 1984 Winter Olympics. Its easy-pour bottle top eliminates the need for a spout or funnel.

If you're not using the whole quart at once, you can store the oil by screwing the cap back on, which protects it from dust, dirt and other contaminants. Mobil has also expanded its line with new multi-grade oils in response to new, more varied viscosity recommendations by car-makers.

Still, converting to the do-it-yourself trend puts a new responsibility on the motorist. Car experts say you should visit a full-service station periodically to get important items checked out — or

make a point of doing so yourself.

Periodic check-up routines should include the following:

- Fluids: motor oil, transmission oil, rear-axle lubricant, power steering fluid, radiator coolant.
- Battery: Wire-brush corroded terminals to prevent streaking or scratching windshield.
- Replace worn wipers to prevent streaking or scratching windshield.
- Replace frayed belts

or brittle, bulging or soft hoses under the hood.

• Keep tire pressure up to recommended levels for fuel efficiency and smooth and safe rides.

• Make sure all lights work.

• Check the sticker on your door post to see if it's time for an oil and filter change and lube job.

A little routine care helps protect a car — which is generally the second biggest investment after the purchase of a home.

Broken thermostat affects gas usage

If your car has been slow to warm up during cold winter mornings, you may be due for a new thermostat. Controlling the flow of water between the radiator and the engine, the thermostat is a temperature control valve which keeps engine temperature within proper limits.

Replacing this part is a minor expense that can pay for itself in a short time says Car Care Council. A thermostat that's stuck open will cause the engine to run cold, increasing gasoline consumption by as much as 10 to 20 percent. If it sticks in the closed position, the car will overheat, possibly damaging

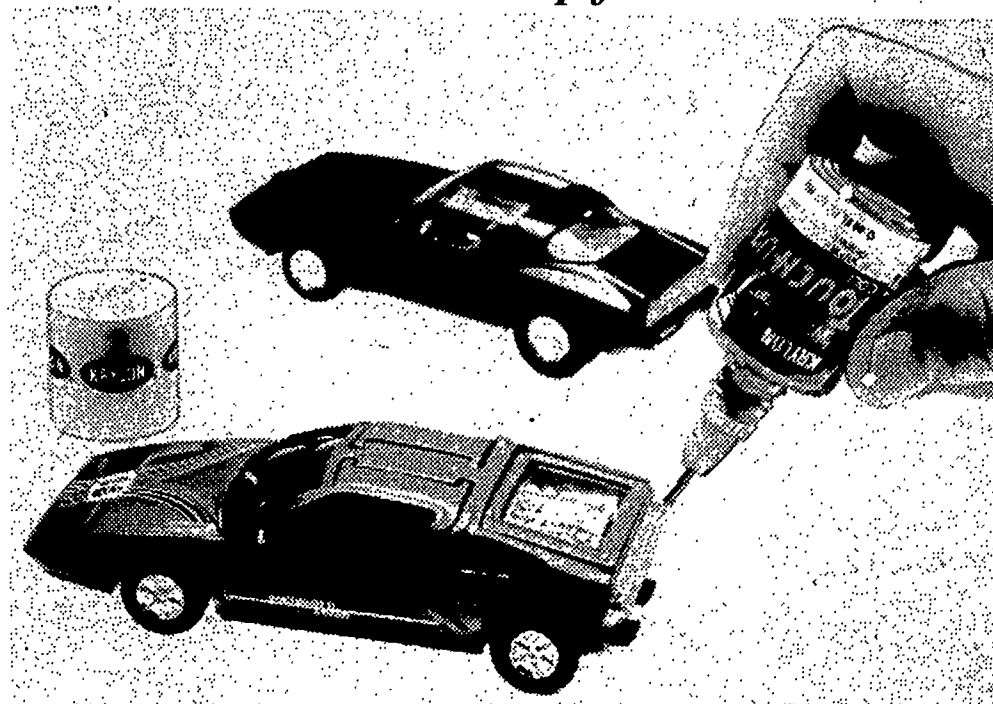
the engine.

Another valve in the cooling system is the radiator pressure cap, which keeps the cooling system under pressure, thereby increasing the boiling point of the coolant. When the pressure cap fails the engine may overheat and coolant goes into the reservoir tank, eventually overflowing to the ground.

A visual check of the pressure cap may expose a faulty gasket or a weak spring. But the best check is with a pressure tester designed for this purpose, generally used by most service shops. This indicates the condition of the cap and tests the rest of the cooling system for leaks.

When it is time to change your engine oil (consult your owner's manual or maintenance schedule for oil change intervals and engine oil capacity), position your vehicle on a flat surface. Run the engine for a few minutes to warm the oil and help it drain freely.

Place a flat drain pan under the motor oil drain plug and washer. Let the oil completely drain from the crankcase and clean and replace plug and washer. Remove the oil dipstick. Wipe it clean and reinsert it to its full length. Then check the dipstick to make certain the engine oil has been drained.

Caution: Be careful when replacing the plug. It should turn easily; if it does not, back it out and try again, then tighten fully. Place the drain pan under the oil filter. Use an oil filter wrench and turn the filter counterclockwise; remove and throw away.

After the oil stops dripping from the engine, take a rag and wipe the area where you removed the filter. Also apply a thin coat of clean oil to the gasket on the new filter to lubricate it. Spin the new filter onto the engine, turn an additional one half turn unless otherwise directed by the filter manufacturer. Remove the oil filter cap and pour the required amount of new oil into the engine.

Check your owner's manual for the type and amount. Run the engine at idle for a few minutes. Check to be sure the oil pressure light goes out or the gauge indicates pressure. Shut the engine off and check the dipstick reading to be certain the oil level reads full. Check the oil filter for leaks. Properly dispose of oil according to local ordinances. †

Elaine took stock of Niles parks' excellent facilities. She noted the fine TAM nine-hole golf course, the two swimming pools, the indoor ice rink, the Lou Schreiner Gymnasium and the excellent fitness room facility at the gym which can be used by residents for a modest \$15 a year. She reported all these activities can be used at a much cheaper resident rate than a non-resident rate, reasons the Niles Park Riders should consider coming back home.

Niles park attorney Gabe Berrafato said more than half the residents would have to submit a petition to the Park Ridge park board seeking disannexation. They have the right to turn it down.

Berrafato suggested a second way to come into the NPD would be for residents whose property is contiguous to the NPD could file an intention to disconnect. The property must be residential, not more than one acre and must be alongside the NPD residents or who live across the street from the property which is contiguous and is seeking the disconnection.

While most of the sturdy 12 residents who turned out on a very cold night and remained at the meeting felt becoming a part of the NPD was a good idea, one gentleman objected. He did not like the idea of children who go to school in District 64 not being in the same park district (Park Ridge) as the remaining students from that school district.

A counter-opinion came from a man who said he wanted to be represented in his park district. He thought the Park Ridge reps on their park board had no interest in Niles residents. He said he felt Nilesites are second-class citizens in the Park Ridge park district. He said, "they have us in a little corner" and left the impression they were not given consideration in the

district. Board members Jim Pierski and president Heinen seemed to be the most gung-ho in seeking annexation plans. Jim noted the Niles district received 22 phone calls from this area's residents and 13 favored annexation. In a fit of enthusiasm Jim said, "the majority (of the phone-callers) prefer Niles."

Ms. Heinen, a lady who always abounds with extra gung-honess subscribed to petitioners seeking to annex into Niles. When an attorney in the audience sort of volunteered to prepare the petitions Elaine seemed pleased. She said, "Let's get it going," as if beginning to lead a charge out of the Park Ridge desert and into the promised land in Niles.

A Mr. Joe Salerno, a gentleman who has resided in the area for over 20 years, said several people he spoke to about disannexation are "on the fence" over the issue. In Joe's miniature survey of neighbors and friends, he said some favored it while others did not. "Some like Park Ridge," he said.

Joe mentioned the Ni-Park Ridge park in that area was a concern of residents. Some feared annexation might mean the closing of the park. Another resident at the park board meeting complained the park was neglected by Park Ridge, and contrasted poorly with Niles' newer parks which have up-to-date recreation equipment in them.

Mr. Salerno spoke for most of the residents who were at the meeting. He said, "I believe in Niles. I prefer Niles and I prefer to belong to a community." He decried the closing of Jefferson and Emerson schools in Niles in the Park Ridge-Niles school District 64 area.

Citing the closed schools and the half-classed park Mr. Salerno said, "We don't know where we belong."

57TH ILLINOIS HOUSE DISTRICT
The race in the 57th Illinois House District is shaping up as a repeat of the November 1982 election when incumbent Republican Penny Fullen ran against Park Ridge teacher and Democrat Diana Burgess Sheffer.
