### FROM THE HEADMASTER

t the time of writing, our Junior School students are swimming their hearts out at the Junior School inter-house Swimming Carnival, following in the footsteps of their Senior School counterparts who last Friday created an explosion of colour and noise at the Bendigo Aquatic Centre.

It was Frew, with a very tightly choreographed repertoire of war-cries, which took out the poolside Spirit Cup and Jenkin held the winners' cup aloft after winning in the pool.

Swimming is not for everyone and I am glad to say that our Swimming Carnivals are not what they were when many of us adults went to School.

Blessed with beautiful weather, there was as much action poolside as there was in the water and our Senior students conducted themselves with unbridled but mature enthusiasm. I saw countless acts of support both in and out of the water between peers and from older to younger students, reminding me of the importance of these multi-age, inter-House events.

Meanwhile trackside, the Girton Racing Team had their final vehicle test-run and training on Sunday, before their Energy Efficient Vehicle is shipped to Singapore, with the assistance of a \$10,000 grant that the team recently secured. The team is again the only Australian school team to make selection to compete in the prestigious Shell Eco Marathon, an international event for Energy Efficient Vehicles with competitors from all over the world. For students who are strong in Mathematics and Systems Engineering, working in combination with fit and skilled team mates, this co-curricular activity provides a great opportunity for students to immerse in their passions and really test themselves.

The Senior School Production cast has been finalised and more than eighty students will take to the stage at The Capital Theatre in June. In addition, there will be some Junior School students featuring in this year's Production and when you include the tech crew and dancers, the cast is more than 130 strong, the biggest group of students ever involved in a Girton production.

I was very pleased to see a large number of Year 7 students cast this year making it a truly multi-age group who will work together now for several months and form great friendships along the way. Details of the production are being kept under wraps but I am told the show will have



its own very unique swagger. Although not a musical, there will be a jazz ensemble performing live on stage and multi-media will feature like never before. Enough said!

We said 'bon voyage' to our French Exchange students last weekend and will soon welcome a group of Japanese students to the school, continuing our tradition of international ties with sister schools.

Several staff members this week undertook RULER training, delivering on our commitment to have every staff member trained in this evidence based approach. Teachers at Girton are expected to lead by example and even the very best student wellbeing initiatives and systems can be undermined if they are not supported by adults who show the way. Our students have already expressed great comfort in knowing that the "Imagine" school charter is applicable to every person within the school and we will continue to keep the charter front of mind in all that we do.

### UNIFORM UPDATE

### FROM THE HEAD OF JUNIOR SCHOOL

### SAFETY AND PROTECTION

irton Grammar School has always been committed to ensuring that the highest possible standards of child safety and protection from harm are maintained. Last year the Victorian State Parliament enacted world leading child protection standards with Ministerial Order 870. The Order mandates child safety and reporting measures for all organisations that have dealings with children. Girton Grammar School fully supports the introduction of this legislation and has enacted the Order to its fullest. To this end the school has ensured the following:

- strategies to embed an organisational culture of child safety, including through effective leadership arrangements.
- a child safe policy or statement of commitment to child safety.
- a code of conduct that establishes clear expectations for appropriate behaviour with children.
- screening, supervision, training and other human resources practices that reduce the risk of child abuse by new and existing personnel.
- processes for responding to and reporting suspected child abuse.
- strategies to identify and reduce or remove risks of child abuse.
- strategies to promote the participation and empowerment of children.

Girton staff have completed Child Safety and Protection modules to learn what constitutes abuse, how to identify potential signs of abuse and what action must be taken.

Parents or community members who have concerns that a child may be unsafe and in danger of emotional, physical or sexual harm are urged to contact the school and ask to be referred to one of the school appointed Child Safety Officers,



contact the Department of Human Services directly (1300664977 or A/H 131278) or the Police (000).



# PERFORMING ARTS / DRAMA



On The Floor is a new small theatre company who have designed a Theatre in Education programme specifically for students of non-naturalistic drama. Blake Barnard (ex- Girtonian who graduated as school captain in 2009) and graduate of Bachelor of Acting, Federation University Ballarat and Maddy Stewart, graduate of the National Theatre St Kilda visited us on Monday February 20, to entertain, inform and instruct 34 students of drama from across the Year 9 Elective Drama and VCE Drama courses.

The incursion involved a devised non-naturalistic performance of "Who's Afraid?". This was followed by a note-taking and discussion forum and then, an all-hands-on-deck drama workshop. All students were "on the floor" at this stage and worked in mixed age groups to prepare and present scenes which incorporated some of the non-naturalistic conventions that they had just seen Blake and Maddy perform. The students took to the task with gusto and presented some hilarious and ingenious short scenes as a result.

Here are some comments from the Unit 3 drama students after the session.

In the workshop session we had the opportunity to learn to lead and work with students from younger year levels. Everybody really had to contribute and the older students got to be leaders of the group.

### NEW BOAT, NEW COACH, NEW FUTURE FOR GIRTON ROWING

Rowing programs at Girton Grammar School are set to improve following the donation of an elite racing boat by Carey Grammar School in Melbourne and the appointment of an ex-Olympian rowing coach.

The boat, a fibreglass racing 8 complete with carbon fibre oars, will enable young male and female rowers to be competitive in Rowing Victoria regattas.

Headmaster at Girton Grammar School, Mr Matthew Maruff, said the new racing 8 will boost the school's rowing program.

"We are incredibly grateful for the generosity of Carey Grammar School.

"The timing of this donation is splendid because we have just announced the appointment of a new Head Rowing coach, Ms Sarah Heard, an Olympian who rowed for Australia in the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games.

"We are keen to build a strong reputation in this great team sport.

"The new racing 8, along with our new coach, will enable us to improve our Rowing program with high quality coaching and equipment," Mr Maruff said.

The donation of the boat was facilitated by the Bendigo Rowing



Club which has connections with both Carey and Girton Grammar Schools.

The racing 8 which is yet to be formally named will be stored at the Lake Weeroona pavilion and used by both Bendigo Rowing Club members and Girton Grammar students.

According to Bendigo Rowing

Club president Peter Morrison, the new racing 8 will boost rowing in Bendigo.

"The racing 8 will enable Bendigo's young male and female athletes to be more competitive in elite Rowing Victoria regattas.

"One day we hope to see a Girton Grammar crew represent Bendigo in a prestigious rowing event like the Head of the Yarra or the Victorian Schools Championships. That would be a great outcome," he said.

The racing 8 will replace a classic antique wooden rowing boat which the Bendigo Rowing Club is keen to donate to a good home.

The students are using D-Club during their class time and have been working hard alongside their LaTrobe University Exercise and Physiology Mentors. Our focus has been on strength and conditioning technique development and mobility training. Another new addition to our program is students now spend one period of our class time at Vitality Yoga Studio, where they are working on their flexibility, breathing patterns and core strength. So far, we have focused on pelvic alignment and gluteal activation. While this has been challenging for some, the benefits of these sessions are extremely worthwhile as all movement patterns and techniques covered are vital for all of our athletes, regardless of their chosen sport.

We also now have a notice board in the Gym Foyer specifically for the Sports Excellence Program.

Here, we can celebrate our athlete's successes, display athlete profiles, publish fitness testing results and share other news from the program. We have had a number of our athletes achieve very impressive results in the past weeks, and we look forward to sharing their efforts with the broader Girton community.

The Girton bowlers performed extremely well under pressure and managed to bowl the opposition out for 137. ### **Need to know badge information:**

Students will only ever receive one badge.

- A badge may be swapped with a peer or a member of staff once a year, so long as there is a staff member present and the student can explain what it means to wear "Imagine Trust" or "Imagine Respect" as they hand it over to their friend.
- From this week any or lost or broken badges can be replaced via Morey reception or Junior School reception but will require parent permission for the badge cost to be added to the child's school account.



If parents wish their student child's future enrolment to be viable, the Application Fee of \$110 must be paid. If an Application Form and Fee are received, parents will be contacted, in order of receipt, and invited to arrange an Enrolment Interview. This will normally start to occur approximately twelve to eighteen months prior to the year of entry. An offer for a place in the School will follow if vacancies exist.

### Withdrawal of Students

Parents are reminded of Point 4 of the Business Regulations regarding withdrawal of students. 4. WITHDRAWAL OF STUDENTS

To withdraw a student from the School, at least one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation, must be given in writing to the Headmaster. If the required minimum notice of one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation period (in writing to the Headmaster), as described in the following examples, is not given for withdrawal from the School, a Tuition Withdrawal Fee equal to one tuition fee instalment will apply. There is no Prompt Payment Discount for a Tuition Withdrawal Fee. For example:

(a) Students leaving at the end of the school year (except Year 12 students) or during the following vacation or during First Term the following year will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster no later than 5 p.m. on the last school day of Third Term (in September).

(b) Students departing at the end of second Term or during Third Term will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster by the last school day of the First Term. Please also note that once the signed enrolment Form is received, and the first instalment of the Capital Fee is paid, the student is deemed to be enrolled in the School. Hence the notice of withdrawal period as described in Clause 4 is required to be given if a parent subsequently decides not to proceed.



### The role of Rotary

Rotary clubs around Australia play a key role in assisting the NYSF to find Australia's future scientists and engineers.

Rotary clubs should:

- 1. Contact their local schools' science departments to make sure there is awareness of the NYSF for their year 11 STEM students.
- 2. Field enquiries from students who are keen to gain endorsement for their application to attend the NYSF. It is important to respond quickly to student enquiries.
- 3. Interview applicants for suitability to participate in the NYSF, and endorse their application to the Rotary District selection process.
- 4. Support students who are successful in gaining selection by either contributing to the cost of participating in the program or helping them to contact local businesses or supporters who could contribute.

There is no limit to the number of students that a Rotary club can endorse for District selection. It is NOT COMPULSORY for a Rotary club to offer funding for participation in the NYSE for any student that it endorses. However, Rotary clubs MUST discuss with students the level of the financial contribution available — if at all — when they are endorsing applications. This avoids confusion and disappointment, and families then understand the level of their own financial contribution. Students from disadvantaged and diverse communities are encouraged to speak with their Rotary club about

### When a Rotary club interviews applicants, consideration should be given to the following:

- 1. Is the student able to demonstrate a genuine interest in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM)?
- 2. Is the student open to new ideas? Do you have a method for assessing this?
- 3. Will the student benefit from attending the NYSF? Are they already on the STEM path? Would another student benefit more?
- 4. Will the student contribute and give back to the NYSF, and the wider community?



Operating since 1984, more than 10,000 young people have participated in the program.

The NYSF Corporate Team is based in Canberra, with a national reach through our networks







Expressions of Interest (EoI) are submitted through our online system at **nysf.edu.au**.

Students lodge an EoI when they are in year 11. If selected students attend the NYSF in the January before starting year 12.

The NYSF EoI process opens on 1 March and all documents must be completed and lodged by 31 May.

Register on the NYSF online  $\operatorname{system}-\operatorname{nysf.edu.au}-\operatorname{to}$  receive a reminder of when applications open.

A Rotary club in the student's local community must endorse all applicant Eols. Applicants are encouraged to contact Rotary clubs early to discuss this step, and whether any financial contribution from the club will be available. This should be done before the end of May so that paperwork can be lodged in a timely manner.

Applications are open to Australian citizens and residents.

Students who apply DO NOT need to be top of their science class but should demonstrate a commitment to and passion for science subjects, as well as having a broad range of extra-curricular interests.

Students can complete their Expression of Interest (EoI) through the NYSF's online system at nysf.edu.au

Rotary clubs consider EoIs from students for endorsement, and forward to Rotary NYSF District Chairs for selection processes.

District selection panels are held to identify the students who will be selected to attend the NYSF in the following January.



### INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

### CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.



### EDUCATIONAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES 2017



Our School's Pastoral Care system includes my specialised services which include consultancy, counselling and educational assessments for students of all ages in both the Junior and Senior School.

The consultancy services involve regular meetings with the Pastoral Care team throughout the School. Staff present student issues for discussion and support plans are made collaboratively.

Counselling Services may be initiated by parents or staff. This generally involves matters which are complex, and possibly requiring Mental Health Care Plans from General Practitioners. Such issues may include stress management, separation, anxiety, depression and grief.

Educational Psychology assessment work may also be initiated by parents, but may also occur following teacher concerns being expressed to their Head of House, LRC staff or following consultation with myself. Early identification of Specific Learning Difficulties can do much to address student skill levels and to assist them achieving their potential.
