# ■ ENGL 490: Senior Seminar: Victorian Fiction

Critical analysis of several major novels of the Victorian period and the way Victorian authors addressed the profound changes transforming the world around them.

# ■ ENGL 222: British Literature II (1800-1950) (online and face-to-face)

Representative British authors and works from the Romantic period, the Victorian period, and the British Modernist period are studied in their social and cultural contexts.

# ■ ENGL 221: British Literature I (450BC-1799)

Representative authors and works from the Anglo-Saxon period, the Medieval period, the Renaissance, and the Restoration are studied in their social and cultural contexts.

### ENGL 284: Introduction to Literary Criticism

Critical interpretation of 19<sup>th</sup>- and 20<sup>th</sup>-century British poetry, fiction, and drama.

# ■ ENGL 192/492: Literary Tour of Europe (online and face-to-face)

Major 19<sup>th</sup>- and 20<sup>th</sup>-century Irish, Scottish, and British literary figures are considered in their critical, historical, and cultural contexts. Class culminates in a two-week "Literary Tour of Europe".

# REPRESENTATIVE COURSES TAUGHT (conf'd)

# **REPRESENTATIVE** • ENGL 201: Composition II – Film Studies

Theme-based course centered on film studies. Text and multimodal based writing and research developed through analysis of film and other media. Courses include:

- <u>Trauma in Film</u> Explores theories of trauma and memory, focusing on modern cinematic representations of psychological trauma; cinematic representation of traumatic pasts and to what degree these "pasts" become mediated memories.
- American Counterculture Focus on the American counterculture of the 1950's and 1960s and its legacy in contemporary society; analysis of the historical, philosophical, and sociological foundations of the American counterculture in music, literature, and film.
- <u>Psychological Thrillers</u> Explores the attraction of the psychological thriller and its cultural aspects as represented in film.
- The Road Explores the lure of the road as portrayed in novels, films, and music; addresses the
  vagabond ethos, the myths and realities of life on the road, how travelers' tales have shaped
  popular imagination, and how social and economic factors affect the journey and the traveler.

# ■ ENGL 213: Backgrounds to Literature

Theme-based course centered on influences of literary tradition. Courses include:

- The Beat Generation Study of the literature of the Beat writers who challenged the status quo and brought attention to issues of sexuality, class, race, and gender.
- <u>Sherlock Holmes</u> Study of the enduring and universal appeal of the Holmesian mystery, considering contexts of gender, social class, ethics, and morality.

# ■ ENGL 484: Literary Criticism

A survey of major literary critical theories, the methods of each theory, and how to apply those methods to works of fiction, drama, and poetry.

# ENGL 230: Young Adult Literature

- <u>Dystopian Literature</u> Analysis of critical issues pertaining to war, violence, poverty, social
  justice, culture, technology, propaganda, and historical consciousness in dystopian literature.
- <u>Trauma in Harry Potter</u> Analysis of psychological trauma in the Harry Potter series and the role of trauma in the field of young adult literature.
- <u>Fairy Tales</u> Analysis of classic and modern fairy tales and the evolution of folk and fairy tales, their incorporation into mass culture, and the social and political issues they address.
- Lord of the Rings Analysis of hero archetypes, themes, races, and cultures within J.R.R. Tolkien's The Hobbit and The Lord of the Rings.

Developing clear writing and logical thinking; how to effectively locate, analyze, and cite sources.

Journalism law and ethics; techniques for gathering, organizing, and writing news stories for print, broadcast and digital media.
