2013 Year At A Glance

More than ever before, 2013 provided more opportunities for Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma to embrace the potential of people and our communities where we operate. Listed below are some highlights of the year.

GoodGuides® Outstanding Mentor Recognized – January

Captain Kevin Penn, USAF, was recognized at the Oklahoma state capital as a nominee for the 2012 Mentor of the Year. "Kevin stands out because, no matter what country he is in, or what he is doing, he still keeps up with me and shows me he cares," writes Johnenri Lee his mentee in the GoodGuides[®] program. The program helps young people who are at risk for dropping out of school, those who are facing legal trouble, and those who are at risk of delinquency.

Spring Clean Up – March

Goodwill of Central Oklahoma reached out to the community to "clean up this spring" and help support their community by donating unwanted or unused items to one of 25 Goodwill Attended Donation Centers or 10 retail stores. Helping Oklahomans receive job training or assistance is as easy as cleaning out your closet.

Free Tax-Filing Services - April

Goodwill of Central Oklahoma teamed up with the IRS to host a Volunteer Income Tax Assistance site to provide free tax preparation services to the community. This partnership was developed to help workers determine if they qualified for Earned Income Tax Credit worth up to \$5,891 when they file their tax return.

Disaster Relief – May

Following the storms of May 2013, Goodwill responded to the outpour of solidarity and generosity from our local and nationwide communities. Receiving nearly 3 million pounds and over 2,600 donations, over 1,000 volunteers assisted Goodwill of Central Oklahoma to provide support to those affected.

Peace Love & Goodwill Concert - June

Goodwill of Central Oklahoma invited the community to a block party outside of the Chevy Bricktown Event Center and a benefit concert to benefit the Oklahoma Red Cross and Goodwill disaster relief support. The evening was dubbed a celebration of the Oklahoma spirit.

Computer Recycling Event – October

Dell Computers and Goodwill of Central Oklahoma teamed up to hold a free computer-recycling event on Saturday, October 5th. Both Dell and Goodwill are committed to encouraging an environmentally responsible culture within our community. Since 2004, Dell has kept more than 200 million pounds of used electronics out of landfills, thanks to the partnership with Goodwill.

Although Larry had hoped to follow the second path, his attempts to find work and financially support himself met with disappointment when no one would take a chance and hire him. Homeless and out of work, Larry was contemplating his next steps when he sat down on a bus bench next to a caring stranger who suggested he visit the Job Connection Center at Goodwill. Larry followed his advice and that decision has literally transformed his future.

When Larry visited the Job Connection Center in Oklahoma City he found his second chance when he met Employment Consultant, Dorothy Wilson. Dorothy didn't see his past as a barrier, in fact she said, "I got this!". "There's a good job waiting for you out there and we're going to find it." For the very first time in a very long time Larry had hope. This fresh start allowed him to gain financial independence and self-confidence.

Larry is now an Assistant Manager at our NW 23rd & Meridian store. Goodwill is in the business of second chances and Larry is a wonderful example of a life restored, full of hope and promise.

Selina Hill faced many obstacles to stay in school. Growing responsibility to help care for her six younger brothers and sisters, as well as transportation issues to get to school had resulted in consistent tardiness. Though Selina's participation with GoodGuides[®], beginning in middle school, she was able to receive resources and support from the program and her mentor to tackle these obstacles.

Rosalind Evans, GoodGuides[®] Social Services Assistant said, "Athough quite shy at first, Selina has blossomed into an enthusiastic and dedicated participant in the program. In fact, she has participated in almost every program offered: service learning and quarterly events, job skill training and the GoodGuides[®] summer program." Selina added, "I'm hoping to get a part time job this year and attend college next fall to become a nurse."

What's more, Selina has now become an excellent role model to her six siblings, which increases their chances of graduating from high school too. David Horne, HRVP Program Manager said, "Progress only works if the person has initiative, and Ruben has demonstrated he is ready and willing to accept the help he needs to get off to a great start." Initially riding a bicycle 20 miles a day for over five months to get to public transportation to report to his new job at Herman's Plumbing, Ruben has won the respect of his employer and his co-workers.

Ruben's face lit up with pride when he said, "I now have my own apartment and will be getting my drivers license soon." He thanks Goodwill for providing him the support and confidence to overcome his situation and now seeks ways to give back by helping others who are struggling.

Shaunte Smith struggled with low self esteem,

low paying jobs, and a string of unemployment before she came to Goodwill as a participant in our Recycling Training Course. "When you have a prior felony, no one is willing to give you a second chance," said Shaunte, "but all that changed when I found Goodwill."

Over the course of the 4-week class, Shaunte's attitude and outlook transformed from one of discouragement to hope. She was committed to the program and became excited about integrating the ideas she learned in class for her plans of future employment in the green jobs program. By week four she had applied for positions at Goodwill and was hired in August of 2011, working at our NW Expressway store.

Over the past three years, Shaunte continued to grow both personally and professionally. She now oversees donation processing at the NW Expressway location and supervises eleven staff members. "I love working with my staff, helping them to succeed too," said Shaunte. "Someday I would like to move into management or even start my own business." "Goodwill helped me to break out of my shell and become a leader at work. I now supervise 11 staff; something I would never have imagined 3 years ago!"

Goodwill turns the community's discards into programs that give a hand up to homeless Veterans, at-risk youth, adults with disabilities, and other members of our community with multiple barriers to employment. This is how Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma embraces the potential of people and communities.

Job Connection Center

Providing job candidates with basic employment readiness skills including computer training, skill assessment, job search, resume writing and interviewing.

Work Adjustment Training

Helping high school juniors and seniors with disabilities to prepare to transition into the workforce and independence following graduation.

Recycling and Environmental Technician Training

Assisting the chronically underemployed through training to enter *green* jobs with Oklahoma companies while teaching participants how to build, change and rethink life patterns that affect our environment.

Supported Employment

Helping the dream of achieving successful, stable, and permanent employment a reality to qualified individuals with disabilities through vocational rehabilitation services.

GoodGuides® At-Risk Mentoring Program

Providing a positive adult role model for at-risk youth. Through these partnerships our students learn to develop positive relationships, behaviors and skills to improve their success towards high school graduation. The GoodGuides[®] curriculum is career-based and helps students transition into continuing education or meaningful employment.

Supportive Services for Veteran Families

Bridging barriers for low-income veteran families who are homeless or at risk for becoming homeless by providing legal services, employment counseling and other services to maintain long-term housing stability.

Homeless Veterans Reintegration Program

Helping homeless veterans reintegrate into meaningful employment within the labor force by providing targeted training to match their interests and skills.

Donated Goods – Changing Lives

Since 1936, Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma has been collecting and selling second-hand goods to support an extensive program of job training and supportive services that benefit thousands of people within the counties we serve. 2013 was no exception and not including disaster relief we received:

336,590 DONATIONS or 15,209,920 LBS. of donated goods!

Recycling Center – Environmental Stewardship

Items not suitable to be put on the sales floor (damaged or unsafe) and those not sold in the Outlet Store are recycled at our Goodwill-Chesapeake Recycling Center. Approximately 10 million pounds are diverted from the city landfill each year. Additionally, recyclable items such as plastics, metals, paper, etc. are accepted at all Goodwill stores and Attended Donation Centers. Outlet Store – Consumer Power

After four weeks of being on a Goodwill retail store floor, unsold merchandise from our retail stores are sent to the Outlet Store at 1320 W. Reno in Oklahoma City. This store's model is very different from regular Goodwill retail stores. Merchandise is put into rolling tables and totes for shopping, and then rotated every two hours with fresh items. Except for the individually priced furniture, merchandise is sold for \$1.49 per pound.

Contract Services – Professional Partnerships

Goodwill's Community Contracts division offers janitorial, unarmed security, recycling and small assembly services. A partnership with Goodwill gives your business a competitive edge and benefits the entire community. Our Community and Industrial contracts emphasize learning integrated with industrial work skills needed in the community. Our crews work greener, smarter, and harder for you. Goodwill provides security and/or janitorial services to the State of Oklahoma and the Oklahoma Military Department facilities.

Although Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma is not a disaster relief agency, we embraced the needs of our community after the devastating results of the May tornados. In fact, many of our Goodwill families were impacted which strengthened our resolve to help.



Oklahoma storms are not uncommon, however, the people of Oklahoma and their neighbors have an uncommon way of stepping in to provide whatever is needed to help their neighbors recover and rebuild.



In just one short month we received 2,472 donations or 3 million pounds of donated goods for this effort. Hundreds of hours of overtime by our staff and drivers were provided to support the needs of our community.


