


Look carefully, our BOBCAT is watching you.

The Thrift Shop provided workers for the event.

In 2010, the event was given to the Craft Ladies when LaReine was no longer able to do the work. In 2010 and 2011, the Bazaar continued to be held in the old Emerald Room. The event is now called the Holiday Bazaar.

The Craft Ladies did the pricing and storing of items and with the help of many volunteers, set up the new Emerald Room for the Bazaar. **Walta McCarley** was the chair for the first 3 years, Martha O'Keefe chaired in 2014 and brought new ideas which were incorporated and for the past 2 years **Shirley Doyle** and Walta cochaired. This year, we set up during 2 partial days. There were 65 volunteers this year.
