ENGLISH

9th Literature/Composition

Course Description: This course focuses on a study of literary genres; the students develop initial understanding of both the structure and the meaning of a literary work. The students explore the effect of the literary form in regard to interpretation. The students will read across the curriculum to develop academic and personal interests in different subjects. The student will demonstrate competency in a variety of writing genres: narrative, expository, persuasive, and technical. The students will engage in research, timed writings, and the writing process. Instruction in language conventions will occur within the context of reading, writing, and speaking, rather than in isolation. The students demonstrate an understanding of listening, speaking, and viewing skills for a variety of purposes.

Honors 9th Literature/Composition

Course Description: This course is an accelerated college prep course designed for the student who has a serious interest in interpreting literature. The student will demonstrate competency in a variety of writing genres: narrative, expository, persuasive, and technical. The students will engage in research, timed writings, and the writing process. World Literature/Composition

Course Description: This course focuses on a study of World Literature; the students develop an understanding of chronological context and the relevance of period structures in literature within world cultures. A focus is to explore the ways the work's place of origin affects its structure and how the chronology of a literary work affects its meaning. The students develop an understanding of literature as both a culture's product and a culture-bearer. An exploration of commonalities and differences among works of literature from different times and places in the world is a major component. The students will read across the curriculum to develop academic and personal interests in different subjects.

Honors World Literature/Composition

Course Description: This course is an accelerated college prep course designed for the student who has a serious interest in interpreting literature. It includes literary selections from the entire world of writers to promote proficiency through a variety of writing styles. It stresses organization and development of written thought. It includes grammar, mechanics and usage, and research skills and activities designed to enhance speaking and listening abilities. Students develop an understanding of chronological context and the relevance of period structures in literature within world cultures. A focus is to explore the ways the work's place of origin affects its structure and how the chronology of a literary work affects its meaning. The students develop an understanding of literature as both a culture's product and a culture-bearer. An exploration of commonalities and differences among works of literature from different times and places in the world is a major component. The students will read across the curriculum to develop academic and personal interests in different subjects.

AP English Language & Composition/American Literature

Course Description: This course conforms to the College Board's course description for AP English Language and Composition as well as the Georgia Standards of Excellence for American Literature. With the goals of developing critical literacy and facilitating informed citizenship, this course guides students through reading and writing activities aligned to an introductory college-level rhetoric and writing curriculum. Students deepen and expand their understanding of how written language functions rhetorically by reading a variety of texts and writing analytic and argumentative essays that proceed through several stages or drafts. Students evaluate, synthesize, and cite research to support their arguments.

Dramatic Writing I – (1 English credit and 1 Fine Arts credit earned in one semester with this course)

Students apply these skills to create and develop dramatic writing for theatrical media with special emphasis on film and television.

Honors British Literature

AP English Literature & Composition

Course Description: This course conforms to the College Board's course description for AP English Literature and Composition. With the goal of developing students' ability to experience, interpret, and evaluate literature, the course offers opportunities to read poetry, drama, fiction (both novel and short story), and expository prose. Emphasis is placed on the literary artistry of a work and how its author attempts to capture and convey human experience. Writing assignments focus on the critical analysis of literature and include expository, analytical, and argumentative essays as well as creative writing to deepen students' understanding of how literature is written. Reading selections include sophisticated works aligned with an introductory college-level literature course.

Journalism I

Course Description: This introductory course explores elements of journalism including laws and ethics, research and writing, technology and visual design, and publication management and organization. This is an English elective course.

Journalism II

Course Description: This course builds on students' exploration of elements of journalism and expands opportunities for publication. This is an English elective course.

Mythology

Course Description: This course explores mythology through literature and film. Focusing on a study of modern mythology, the student develops an understanding of chronological context and relevance of period structures in literature within mythologies of different time periods around the world. This is an English elective course.
