How You Can Help Your Child at Home

Tips for Reading Comprehension

- Have your child read the text aloud to you, or take turns reading alternate sentences or paragraphs together.
- Talk with your child about what they have read, and brainstorm ways the information in the text relates to their life.
- Discuss the meanings of unfamiliar words that they read and hear.
- Help your child monitor his or her understanding of what they have read. Encourage your child to consistently ask themselves whether they understand what the text is about.
- To ensure understanding of the text, have them retell what they have read.

Tips for Completing Activities

- Review instructions with your child to ensure they understand the questions.
- Encourage your child to go back to the article to support his or her answers.

 Then have your child highlight the important information from the text passage to help them answer the question.
- Offer your child ample opportunities to share with you their answers and the thinking processes they used to arrive at those answers.

What is EQAO? EQAO is an acronym for the "Education Quality and Accountability Office." Each year in Ontario, EQAO administers Reading, Writing, and Mathematics tests to grade 3, 6, 9, and 10 students. Tests are based on The Ontario Curriculum and are developed, reviewed, and scored by teachers in Ontario.

Instructional Strategies

How to find the Scoring Guides and previous EQAO Open-response Questions

- 1. Visit the website www.eqao.com.
- 2. Select English or French.
- 3. Select Educator Resources.
- 4. Scroll down the page to Student Assessment and Scoring Guide.
- 5. Select a Year: Each question has the date either at the top or bottom of the page indicating when it was used by EQAO.
- 6. Select whether you want the Assessment and/or the Scoring Guide (the exemplars). The Assessment Booklets give you blank test questions. The Scoring Guides give you the exemplars for each open-response question.
- 7. Scroll down until you find the question that suits your purpose.

How Scoring Guides can be used in the classroom

- 1. Post the exemplars in your classroom and have students decide the level of their work, based on the exemplars. Don't forget to have a discussion with students about how to advance their responses to the next level.
- 2. Show exemplars with an overhead projector and have a class discussion about each level. Students should learn what is required to achieve the next level.
- 3. Remove the level assigned to each answer and have students try to determine whether the work is a level 1, 2, 3, or 4.

Student Tips for Taking Tests

Here are some tips to help you when you have to write a test.

1. Get enough sleep the night before the test.

Your brain works best when you are not tired. It is harder to remember things when you are sleepy.

2. Don't sleep late the day of the test.

You don't want to start the day by rushing to get to school. Rushing can make you feel more nervous.

3. Pay attention to instructions.

Listen carefully to instructions your teacher gives you about writing the test. Carefully read any instructions that are on the test.

4. Read each test question carefully.

Make sure you answer the question that is asked. Read the question carefully and think about it before you answer.

5. Be relaxed.

If you are feeling nervous during the test, take some slow deep breaths. You think better when you are relaxed.

6. Check your answers.

If you finish the test early, go back and check your answers.

More Student Tips

Steps for Answering Open-response Questions

- 1. Take time to read the question carefully. Underline key words.
- 2. Restate/use part of the question in your answer
- 3. Answer the question.
- 4. Support your answer by using specific details and relevant information from the reading selection.
- 5. Read your final response. Does it answer the question?

Steps for Answering Multiple-choice Questions

- 1. Carefully read each question and underline key words.
- 2. Read all choices before choosing your answer.
- 3. Answer any questions you are sure of first.
- 4. If you are unsure of an answer, eliminate any wrong choices before guessing.

Legibility of Your Answers

- 1. Write only on the lined space provided.
- 2. Print neatly to make your answers easy to read.
- 3. Think about the size of your printing so you have enough space to write your answer.
- 4. Take your time! Don't leave any blanks.
