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Hi-lights July 18th, 2011 Meeting	Manager's Report
Treasurer's Report Ed Bangel presented the financial statements for period ending June 30, 2011. Revenues are right on plan while expenditures are still somewhat under due to a slow start to our planned mainte- nance activities because of the weather. Insurance expenses are under year to date mainly due to the fact that the budget was prepared prior to the final figures coming in from our insurance provider. This may help to offset other areas. Jim Kraus reported that there are two new mem- bers on the Finance Committee. Chuck Troendle and Mike Brick	Wynn Collins, EVHOA Maintenance Manager reported that he is investigating the purchase of new signs to replace damaged or missing ones within the village. Hopefully by the August meeting we will have a decision as to how many are truly needed and where they will be placed. Wynn also reported on fencing replacements both along walkways and decks. He is investigating vinyl fencing as a possible alterna- tive to wood, which could cut down on maintenance in the future, but as with everything, there is an upfront cost. Currently, vinyl fencing has been installed at a few units within the village, two instances at the resident's request where they picked up the cost of the fencing and the Association covered the labor. Currently, the preferred method is to repair the wood fences where damaged with the same material already there. More to fellow in the next neurolatter.

#### **Resident Issues Presented**

Gerry Mahoney presented some issues and concerns to the board at the July 18th meeting. One concern was in regards to mulching around trees. It was suggested that the mulch be pulled back from the trunks of the trees to prolong their lives.

Gerry also raised a concern about the chemicals being used on the lawns. Pro-Scapes has assured us that the chemicals they use are safe. The question was raised as to the quantity and frequency of treatments. The Lawn Committee took note and will address the concerns with our vendor.

Residents Lorrie Hickox, Ro Day and Millie Sitnik presented issues concerning the beach. With the seasonally warmer than normal temperatures, the beach has been busier than in past years. Concerns were raised about non-residents using our facilities and unauthorized parking in designated residential spots adjacent to the beach. Five resident volunteers have been identified to assist in patrolling the beach area. They are tasked with confronting visitors to ensure that they truly live in the village or are with a resident. These volunteers have identification tags and may approach you if you are at the beach asking for proof of residency. We ask for your cooperation and assistance as this is not meant to offend anyone, it's a matter of liability. If you do not have a beach pass and would like one, please contact the office at 656-5148.

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Painting and Paving	Boat Ramp
Wynn reported that the painting is almost complete for the season. Paving started on July 18th and sealing will begin the 1st week of August. A transformer failed, resulting in a blown fuse on a power pole adjacent to Burdick Street. Several lanes, predominantly on the north side of the Village were without power for quite a few hours. They had to call in a special "forestry" crew apart from their regular line crews to clear out around the boxes. This added to the time residents were without power while they awaited	
the arrival of the special crew. Fortunately after the overgrowth was cleared, they located the failed transformer at the first site they checked. At that time,	
we were informed that they would be back in the Village the following week clearing around all of the transformer boxes so they would not have similar problems in the future.	Snow Removal
National Grid has a 10' rule policy and one that we have no control over in regards to plantings around power boxes. Over the years good intentioned residents have planted flowers, bushes and shrubs around the power boxes in an effort to shield them from view.	Although we are still in the midst of the summer season, specifications have been completed to send out for bid for the 2011-2012 snow removal contract. This year's bid in- cludes specs for type of equipment, stakes, time and other requirements. The contract will be going out for four sealed bids.
Unfortunately over time many of these plantings have grown resulting in the overgrowth problem. Some residents have	
planted shrubbery and flowers around the boxes to hide them from view. Unfortunately this is on common ground and most likely permission was not sought for these plantings. In any event, it is a National Grid policy and we have no recourse in the matter. We don't know if they ever publicized this rule and it never was a factor until they encountered this recent prob- lem. 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Gardening in the Northeast	Gardening Continued
Great-looking landscapes don't have to be a lot of hard work. If you pick the right plants, you can enjoy a yard that's filled with color from spring to fall without having to spend every weekend tending it. Astilbe—Beloved for handsome foliage and dense colorful plumes of flowers, astilbe blooms in shades of pink, red, white, lavender in early summer. Many selections have bronzy foliage too. Veronica—This versatile sun-loving perennial blooms through the summer in blue, purple, pink or white spikes.	Trillium—Native to woodland areas of the region, trilliums love the shade and offer beautiful blooms in shades of white, yellow, or maroon.
	Coral Bells—This slowly spreading plant is a hummingbird magnet; it produces spikes of bright red, pink, or white flow- ers in late spring and early summer. Bee Balm—Bee balm is a beautiful regional wildflower that's adored by hummingbirds and butterflies. It will bloom all
	summer long and because of it's mint smell many pests pass it by.
Miscanthus—Perfect for any bed or border, ornamental grasses offer four-season interest. This plant is among the easiest to grow.	Soapwort—This relatively unknown plant deserves a lot more attention. It's a cinch to grow and features clusters of phlox-like pink, purple or white flowers in summer and fall.
Blue Star—This extra-easy growing perennial takes heat and drought well, isn't bothered by deer or rabbits, and offers beautiful blue flowers in spring. It offers an extra bonus in that the foliage turns yellow before dropping in the fall.	More tips in next month's newsletter
