Title I

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ESEA – Elementary and Secondary Education Act

What is Title I?

- Title I provides financial assistance to local educational agencies, public and charter, to meet the needs of educationally disadvantaged children at preschool, elementary, and secondary school levels.
- receive Title I funds based on the number of low-income families that reside within the district as determined by the US Census.

What is Title I?

- 50 The purpose of Title I programs is to help all students succeed in reading and mathematics.
- This is accomplished through supplemental programs that consist of instructional services, instructional support services, school wide reform efforts, and increased involvement of parents in their children's education.
- Supplanting Rule: Title Funds must be used for services above and beyond the typical services provided to every school. The district cannot replace an existing service with Title funding.

Two Title I Models

Schoolwide Program

- Over 40% of students receive free or reduced lunch
- so Comprehensive plan designed to upgrade entire educational program.

Gateway Pointe Elementary

Frogram Targeted Assistance Program

- Fewer than 40% of students receive free or reduced lunch.
- Focus on meeting the needs of identified students struggling in reading and/or math
