

NEW SEMINARY located on the spacious 250-acre site in Glenmont. The structure is called "Modern Medieval" and will give the impression of "hand-made" construction.

NEW SEMINARY RISES ON GLENMONT SITE

"Modern Medieval" is the phrase coined by the Fathers of the Congregation of the Mission of St. Vincent de Paul to describe their new Seminary of Our Lady of the Angels.

Now under construction on a spacious 250-acre site near Albany, N.Y., the new Seminary has been designed as a combination of modern architecture and traditional craftsmanship, by the New York architectural firm of Urbahn, Brayton and Burrows. The Seminary, which will be essentially completed this fall, will provide a sixyear program of study for 100 philosophy students and 150 theology students.

The 73-foot tall high-arched main chapel, the focal point of the building-complex, was designed to convey the majes-

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tic effect of Europe's Gothic cathedrals. It is surrounded by a suncken court and a number of interior gardens. The steep copper batten roof, which also constitutes its side walls, is supported by seven tall structural arches.

The two end arches frame the east and west window walls. These will be of brilliantly colored glass, reminiscent of early religious stained glass techniques, according to Max O. Urbahn, partner-in-charge of the project. The stonework and bricks used in the Seminary have been selected to impart a medieval "hand-made" character.

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

Craft articles in abundance are the outstanding feature of the new idea in souvenir shops being exhibited this year at State Fair by the Woman's Program of the State Commerce Department. TAKE-HOME TREASURES is the name of the shop -- and also just what the Woman's Program believes souvenirs should be.

"Our shop is based on the idea that craft articles are -and can be further developed as -- delightful and useful souvenir items truly representative of the State, " Miss Guin Hall, Woman's Program head, explained. "Too many souvenir items now available to travelers are shoddy and meaningless articles sold from New York to California. They have no genuine connection with our State or the area in which they're


offered; and the purchaser, whenhome, soon discards them.

"Good craft articles, on the other hand, typically New York, would be permanent and cherished momentos, "she believes.

Handcrafts of all categories are displayed in the TAKE-HOME TREASURES shop: ceramics, woodware, jewelry, weaving, and leather gathered by the Woman's Program staff. Other examples of possible souvenirs were obtained from N.Y.S. industries -- Corning cookware and Steuben Crystal, Revere copper and steel serving and cookware, Syracuse china, and Oneida Community silver and pewter.

A Take-Home Treasure shop should have something for everyone's taste, according to Miss Hall, who says that the shop's layout was planned to make browsing and buying easy. "It has a 'Male Here' section, with masculine items such as gun racks, hand-woven ties, decoys, and men's jewelry," she explained; "a Ladies' Lane' full of pottery, china, glass; a 'Children's Corner' with toys and puzzles; and a 'Christmas Cupboard' crowded with handcrafted decorations for Christmas." A "Bachelor Uncle Department" is for articles costing more than \$10, and another area promotes New York State foods as excellent souvenirs.

Distributed free at the exhibit is a new Woman's Program booklet telling how to start and operate a Take-Home Treasures shop. Miss Hall says the booklet also contains a wealth of ideas for potential shop owners



and craftsmen who would like to develop similar "take-home treasures" to sell, Sheemphasized that New York is "rich agriculturally, historically, architecturally -- and, most of all, in the inventiveness of its people" and pointed out that this forms "an inexhaustible mine of ideas and motifs for craft articles truly indigenous to New York,"




Bethlehem Reformed Church Starts Fall Schedule

Senior Choir rehearsal is held every Wednesday at 8 P. M. and the Boy Scouts meet on Thursday at 7,










Five staff members of the Farm Family Life Insurance Company, Delmar, passed a total of 14 Life Office Management Association Institute examinations.



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
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WAUSAU CELEBRATES FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

DOING DIAPERS AT HOME By Margaret B. Long Supervisor, Home Economics Education Jacksonville, Florida

Again we turn to the one individual who more than any other has gained the confidence of today's new mother when it comes to those puzzling little questions about baby. We are, of course, referring to the diaper service routeman or route woman.

That new mothers confide in the man or woman who delivers baby's diapers is mainly because in modern mobile America, most young families live at some distance from their own parents. To meet this unique responsibility, the nation's diaper service industry trains its routemen and route women to answer most questions that are asked about baby, except those that seek medical advice. Here again are some of the questions new mothers ask most often:

Q. Can I tell in advance the color of baby's eyes?

A. There's no way to accurately predict the permanent color. At birth it's usually slate-blue.

Q. When baby sneezes is he

getting a cold?

A. Not necessarily. Sneezing is baby's way of cleaning his nose.

Q. How much weight should baby gain a day the first month?

A. It varies but an ounce a day is said to be average.

Q. When will baby be able to roll over?

A. Usually late in the fifth or early in the sixth month.

Q. When may I begin punishing baby for misbehavior?

A. When baby is old enough to know better,

Q. Can diaper rash be prevented?

A. Good diaper hygiene to prevent diaper rash can be practiced simply and surely be diapering baby with correctly processed diapers and following a fastidious diapering routine as long as baby wears diapers.

Q. When will baby be ready for a high chair?

A. Usually in about the sixth month, if he's able to sit without tiring.

Q. When will baby start holding his own bottle?

A. He may make his first attempt to help you hold his bottle at about the age of four months and be able to do it himself at about eight months.

Q. Is there a crawling state?

A. Baby may crawl at about eight months but not all crawl, some walk instead.

Q. How often does a new baby get hungry?

A. On the average, about every three hours.

Q. Must a new baby cry?A. Crying is baby's way of expressing discomfort.

In the event of inclement weather, the Field Day will be postponed until next Saturday, September 16, 1961.



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
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
