



# FACT SHEET ON "NEETs"

(Persons who are not in employment, education or training)





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# 1. BACKGROUND

People who are not employed and who are not in education or training are referred to as NEETs. Information about NEETs is used to monitor the labour market and the social dynamics of the marginalised people in society. It is generally acknowledged, both nationally as well as internationally, that NEETs constitute one of the greatest threats to social stability. Researchers and the media frequently raise the spectre of idle youths as a ticking social time bomb, and there is now heightened awareness of the young people who are NEET to cause serious social disruption. In South Africa, the impact of NEETs is brought to the fore by crime statistics that reveal that the average age of a house robber is between 19 and 25 years and that of all arrested robbers, 90% had not passed Grade 12 and/or were unemployed<sup>1</sup>. Consequently, the monitoring of NEET trends and strong interventions to address the challenge of NEETs are key to promoting peace and stability in a society.

This presents the social backdrop against which the Post-School Education and Training (PSET) system has to determine its priorities since many South Africans lack the appropriate skills, work-related capabilities and the necessary qualifications required for existing occupations in the workplace. Additionally, on the demand-side, the economy is not growing fast enough to absorb new entrants into the labour market.

## 2. PURPOSE

This Fact Sheet provides a detailed profile and characteristics of people who are NEET in order to ensure that interventions in the PSET system address the appropriate target groupings. Information about NEETs assist the DHET to make informed decisions about PSET. In particular, NEET data provides us with evidence that we can use to undertake policy, develop strategies, undertake planning, set targets and undertake budgeting.

#### 3. METHODOLOGY

The statistics used in this publication are drawn from the Quarterly Labour Force Survey conducted by Statistics South Africa. More specifically, this Fact Sheet uses annual figures calculated using the average of the four quarters of the year. Internationally, many countries use young people aged 15 to 24 years as the unit of analysis for understanding NEETs, however, this Fact Sheet provides NEET data for a broader age range of people, since the Department of Higher Education and Training's (DHET) mandate includes adult learners, and not only young people.

## 4. TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

## 4.1 Tertiary education

Tertiary education refers to the following qualifications:

- an undergraduate degree
- a post-graduate degree
- a diploma
- a Higher Certificate (upon completion of matric)
- an advanced Diploma or advanced Certificate

#### 4.2 NEET rate

The NEET rate has been calculated by dividing the number of persons in a given age group who are NEET, e.g. persons aged 15-24 years, by the total population of the same age group in a country, e.g. 15-24 year old population.

# 4.3 Youth

Youth in this publication refers to persons aged 15-34 years.

#### 5. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

- Between 2013 and 2017, the actual number of people who were NEET (in the age group 15-60 years) increased by 881 000, from about 13.1 million to about 13.9 million. However, the proportion of people who are NEET remained virtually unchanged at around 39% in the same period.
- When looking at the number of NEETs by age group, the number of adults (35-60 years) who were NEET increased by 510 000 from about 5.7 million in 2013 to about 6.2 million in 2017, while youth (15-34 years) increased by 466 000 from about 7.4 million in 2013 to about 7.8 million in 2017.
- The NEET rate for persons aged 15-34 years increased slightly from 38.2% in 2013 to 38.6% in 2017 while the NEET rates for adults aged 35-60 decreased slightly from 39.5% to 38.8% in the same period.
- At the provincial level, Gauteng, KwaZulu-Natal and Eastern Cape had the highest number of NEETs recorded in all the age groups over the 5-year period under review.
- The majority of people who were NEET in South Africa had as their highest level of educational attainment, some secondary level schooling, but without a matric.



Most of the people who were NEET were African/Black and female in the 5-year period under . review. The share of the African/Black who were NEET remained high at about 84%, while the share of the females who were NEET remained at about 58% of the total NEETs in the same period.

- Female NEETs had slightly higher levels of education than their male counterparts. About 34.8% of the females who were NEET have achieved educational levels of Grade 12 or tertiary gualification in 2017, whereas the share of the males who have achieved the same level of education was lower by about 2.6 percentage points recording 32.2% in the same year.
- There are many reasons why people are NEET in South Africa and they differ between the youth (15-34 years) and the adults (35-60 years). The highest number of youth were NEET because they were new entrants in the labour market (about 2.0 million) in 2017, followed by those who were discouraged job-seekers (about 1.5 million) and those who were home-makers (about 1.2 million). This shows that about 3.5 million youth in South Africa who were NEET were willing to work but they cannot find work.
- Among the adults (35-60 years), the highest number of people who were NEET were home-makers (1.3 million) in 2017, followed by those who had health reasons for not working (about 1.1 million) and other reasons for being unemployed (including job leavers and job losers).
