Safety and Security – Zack Keenan and Matt Hontz	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The safety committee reviewed their minutes from the March 8 meeting. • Considerations: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ The numbers have been trending down. ○ Church will re-open on Easter for 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services. ○ Going forward through summer, service will be 9 a.m. ○ At the end of summer, congregation will be poled to decide service time in the fall. ○ MASKS MUST BE WORN AT ALL TIMES. ○ Temperatures will be taken upon entering the building. ○ Optional additional viewing within the building will be available ○ No singing in church will be allowed ○ Handbells will be allowed ○ Communion will be pre-packaged ○ Offering collection box will continue in the Narthex ○ Ushers will guide guests to their seat to maintain safe distance as well as excuse them at the end of the service through two different doors. ○ Acolyte and crucifer will be confirmation class students who will sit with their parents and only go on the altar to light/extinguish candles and carry the cross. ○ Church will be sanitized between services using “wipe down” method. • Dan stated that Tara Miller would like to hold outdoor Zumba classes. • A motion was made by Tom Smykowski/Patrick Ladd, to open the church as recommended above (Phase 2), and to allow Tara Miller to hold the Zumba classes outside. Motion passed. • The sanitation method will be investigated. To use wipes on wood, we must get a product that will not damage the wood.

Dear Pastor Busted and the faithful people of Faith Lutheran,



We were still soaring with the hope inherent in a New Year when a City water main pipe running beneath Lexington Avenue broke the morning of January 4. While this singular event dramatically changed so much, it did not wash away our hope. Quite the contrary, hope only strengthened as you and others responded: coming together — friends, members, admirers near and far — to sustain Saint Peter's at this crucial time.

There was no stopping the hundreds of thousands of gallons of water and mud that poured first into our outdoor plaza and then into our building. Our sanctuary filled for a period of time until water flowed into the mechanical room below and ultimately to the lowest level. The church archive, music rooms, meeting rooms, storage, sacristy and theatre endured both water gushing across floors and water raining from above. I remember thinking "this feels like Niagara Falls." Indeed, the sheer force of water knocked down lights, pushed out ceiling tiles and clawed at insulation.

While we are still enumerating the loss, mold has been mitigated, important archival materials are with conservators, the Klais organ is now safely offsite, rooms have been emptied and we are both drying out and cleaning up. In the weeks ahead, further mitigation of the sanctuary will take place. After this, we will take the next step on the road to recovery.

Thank you for your gift of 10,000 in support of the recovery. While we do not yet know the totality of the loss or have a full picture of how we will rebuild, we are reserving these funds for that rebuilding effort.

In addition to you and others coming to the aid of this iconic building, Saint Peter's has been named to the 2021 sacred spaces cohort of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. This builds on Saint Peter's 2017 NYC Landmark status, allowing us this spring to begin urgent repairs to the sanctuary's skylights (more water!) and exterior. We have already begun coordinating with the cohort to dovetail this conservation effort with the rebuilding process.

While 2021 surely will not be the year we initially anticipated, thanks to your hope-inspiring gift it remains a year filled with hope. Please continue to keep us in your heart. We will continue to share updates with you, particularly at www.saintpeters.org/flood.

Queridos Padre Busteed y fieles de Faith:



Todavía estábamos volando con la esperanza inherente a un Año Nuevo cuando la tubería principal de agua de la ciudad que pasa por debajo de la Avenida Lexington se rompió la mañana del 4 de enero. Si bien este evento singular cambió tanto dramáticamente, no borró nuestra esperanza. Muy por el contrario, la esperanza solo se fortaleció cuando ustedes y otros respondieron: vamos juntos- amigos, miembros, admiradores cercanos y lejanos, para sostener a Saint Peter's en este momento crucial.

No hubo forma de detener los cientos de miles de galones de agua y lodo que se derramaron primero en nuestra plaza al aire libre y luego en nuestro edificio. Nuestro santuario se llenó por un período de tiempo hasta que el agua fluyó hacia la sala de máquinas de abajo y finalmente a la plata baja. El archivo de la iglesia, las salas de música, las salas de reuniones, la bodega de almacenamiento, la sacristía y el teatro soportaron tanto el agua que brotaba del suelo como el agua que caía desde arriba. Recuerdo haber pensado "esto se siente como las cataratas del Niágara". De hecho, la fuerza del agua derribó las luces, empujó las tejas del techo y arañó el aislamiento.

Si bien todavía estamos enumerando la pérdida, el moho se ha mitigado, los conservadores tienen importantes materiales del archivo, el órgano Klais ahora está seguro fuera del sitio, las habitaciones se han vaciado y estamos secando y limpiando. En las próximas semanas, se llevará a cabo una mayor mitigación del santuario. Después de esto, daremos el siguiente paso en el camino hacia la recuperación.

Gracias por su regalo de 10,000 en apoyo de la recuperación. Si bien aún no conocemos la totalidad de la pérdida ni tenemos una imagen completa de cómo reconstruiremos, estamos reservando estos fondos para ese esfuerzo de reconstrucción.

Además de que ustedes y otras personas acudieran en ayuda de este emblemático edificio, Saint Peter's ha sido incluido en la cohorte de espacios sagrados de 2021 del National Trust for Historic Preservation. Esto aprovecharse de a Saint Peter's como un New York City Landmark, lo que nos permite esta primavera comenzar reparaciones urgentes en los tragaluces del santuario (¡más agua!) y en el exterior. Ya hemos comenzado a coordinarnos con la cohorte para encajar este esfuerzo de conservación con el proceso de reconstrucción.

Si bien 2021 seguramente no será el año que anticipamos inicialmente, gracias a su regalo inspirador de esperanza, sigue siendo un año lleno de esperanza. Continúe manteniéndose en su corazón. Continuaremos compartiendo actualizaciones con usted, particularmente en www.saintpeters.org/flood.

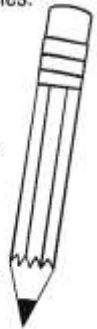


WHERE IN THE WORLD?

FIRST QUARTER FINANCIAL REPORT

Obviously, the last year has been quite a challenge to everyone. Faith Lutheran is experiencing financial challenges which need to be addressed if we want to continue as a thriving congregation for years to come. Concerns about closure of the church and resultant possible reduction in Giving/Income were taken into account in the development of the 2021 budget.

Additionally, actions were implemented to reduce expenses beginning mid-year 2020 and further actions were initiated in January, 2021. All of these actions have been detailed in previous Newsletters and Constant Contacts.

Listed below are some of the actions that have been taken since April 2020:

- Applied for and received PPP (Payroll Protection Program) loan, which will be forgiven
- Council issued an edict to reduce all expenses to minimal levels
- No capital spending, only required maintenance
- Reduction of office hours and reduction of salaries of three employees, whose workload was reduced by closing the church and reduction of time and responsibilities

Unfortunately, we do not control the weather and snow removal was much higher than budgeted this winter.

We feel that we have been prudent in the managing of Faith finances during the pandemic, but we do not control income from giving. Here are the results of Giving for the first quarter of 2021-

There are fixed expenses that cannot be reduced or avoided- utilities, insurance, salaries, and benevolence, office and maintenance contracts. Council and all committee chairs are aware of expense containment until the church is fully open for worship and the organizations who use the church and pay rent have returned.

We fully understand that the pandemic has caused many to review their personal financial situations and react accordingly. We ask that as a member of Faith Whitehall that you, to the best of your ability, share some of your blessings with your church.
