TUITION POLICIES

Fall 2017 Course Descriptions

Mondays

NT501-1 Learning New Testament Greek

Classroom 2

12-2:50pm

Introduces the Greek alphabet, vocabulary and grammar in a systematic way using relevant examples from the New Testament. The goal of this course is for the student to learn the basics of Greek grammar and basic Greek verb paradigms. Provides the skills for reading and translating the Greek New Testament and the basis for developing exegetical competence.

3 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Peter Gurry</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

CF507-1 Marriage and Family Ministry

Classroom 4

4-5:50pm

This course applies biblical and counseling concepts to practical approaches to marriage and family ministries including premarital counseling, marriage enrichment, family ministry and integrated approaches to youth ministries. Students work with area churches and some travel may be required.

2 credits Instructor: Dr. Justin Smith Frequency: Odd Falls Prerequisite: None

Notes: General elective for all other programs except MAC.

BC498-1 Graduate Research and Writing

Classroom 2

5-5:50pm

This course is an essential introduction to graduate theological education at Phoenix Seminary. Every discipline has its unique style and formatting – theology is no exception. The course is designed to hone your skills of graduate theological research, reading, and writing. You will learn argumentation, effective reading strategies, how to format your papers, and how to use the library. This class will greatly enhance your ability to perform at the graduate level.

1 credit Instructor: <u>Dr. Brian Arnold</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None Notes: All new Fall students are required to take this course except for Master of Arts in Counseling students.

NT503-1 Using New Testament Greek

Classroom 4

6-7:50pm

A verse-by-verse reading of Ephesians, in which the student is introduced to a method for moving from exegesis to preaching and teaching. Students will also study a unit from the New Testament of their own choice.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Peter Gurry</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: NT501 & NT502

TH504-1 Systematic Theology: A Socratic Approach

Classroom 5

6-7:50pm

Prepares you to clearly communicate what you believe and why you believe it. Designed to help you develop a personal, practical and applied systematic theology.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Mr. Kyle DiRoberts</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: BL501, TH501, TH502 and TH503 Notes: Limited to MDiv and MABL students preparing for TH599 Theological Oral Exam. Concurrent enrollment in TH599 is suggested. Enrollment limited to 15 credit students.

BL501A-1 Principles for Biblical Interpretation

Classroom 2

6-8:50pm

A study of the principles involved in accurately interpreting the Word of God. This course is designed to help you understand what the bible says as well as what it means by what it says. Provides the foundation for further study in theology and biblical literature courses.

3 credits Instructor: <u>Pastor Brian Arnold</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

Notes: Required within first 30 credit hours for all programs except MAC.

Tuesdays

IS501-1 Cross-Cultural and Diversity Competency

Classroom 2

2-3:50pm

This course will equip the student to learn from and minister to men and women of diverse cultural and ethnic backgrounds.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Malcolm Hartnell</u> Prerequisite: None Frequency: Fall 2017 & Every Spring

BC501-1 Methodology of Biblical Communication

Classroom 5

4-5:50pm

This course, first in a two-course sequence in homiletics, is designed to develop speech/rhetorical skills essential to effective oral communication, with a view to their application to bible teaching and expository preaching. Uses New Testament passages to develop structures for oral communication and proper handling of biblical texts. Familiarity with Greek or Hebrew is helpful, but not required.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Chip Moody</u> Frequency: I Notes: Enrollment limited to 12 credit students

Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: At least one course from BL502-BL507.

BL502-1 Survey of the Pentateuch

Classroom 4

4-5:50pm

A survey of Genesis to Deuteronomy in historical and cultural context. Covers the outstanding features and basic teachings of each book within the broader context of God's total, progressive revelation while discerning practical principles for contemporary Christian livina.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. John Meade</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

Notes: Required for all programs except MAC.

CF527-1 Biology, Cognition, and Behavior

Classroom 2

4-5:50pm

Students will develop competence in applying a coherent counseling approach to specific issues including: depression, anxiety, relational problems, impulse control, and personality disorders. The cognitive and behavioral basis of experience is explored in depth.

3 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Justin Smith</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

Notes: This is an expanded three-credit version of CF503 Counseling Issues and Strategies. There is an additional 1 hour online course work per week.

CF503-1 Counseling Issues and Strategies

Classroom 2

4-5:50pm

Students will develop competence in applying a coherent counseling approach to specific issues including: depression, anxiety, relational problems, impulse control, and personality disorders. The cognitive and behavioral basis of experience is explored in depth.

2 credits Instructor: Dr. Justin Smith Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

IS503-1 Evangelism and Discipleship in a Pluralistic World

Classroom 5

6-7:50pm

Provides the foundation for students to develop both a personal and church-based approach to evangelism and discipleship. Investigates implications for evangelism arising from contemporary American culture and examines specific evangelistic and discipling models and tools that have proved to be effective in the American cultural environment.

2 credits Instructor: *Dr. Malcolm Hartnell* Frequency: Fall 2017 and Every Spring Prerequisite: None

BL503-1 Survey of the Historical and Wisdom Literature

Classroom 4

6-7:50pm

A survey of Joshua to Song of Solomon in historical and cultural context. Covers the outstanding features and basic teachings of each book within the broader context of God's total, progressive revelation while discerning practical principles for contemporary Christian living.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. John Meade</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

CF500-1 Counseling Skills

Classroom 2

6:30-9:20pm

An in-depth exploration of the essential interviewing skills necessary to helping professionals. The primary focus is on the development of communication skills, including counselor characteristics and behaviors and the assessment of client characteristics and behavior associated with building a therapeutic relationship, establishing treatment goals, selecting interventions and achieving and evaluating successful treatment outcomes.

3 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Justin Smith</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

Notes: Required for MDiv CF, MAM CF, and MAC. General elective for all other programs. Enrollment limited to 18 students.

Wednesdays

OT503-1 Using Old Testament Hebrew

Classroom 5

2-3:50pm

Includes the full process of exegesis of the biblical text; thus it includes the skills of Old Testament textual criticism, Hebrew word studies, analysis of Hebrew syntax, developing knowledge of Hebrew grammar and genre, and finally writing an exegetical paper of a specific passage.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. John Meade</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: OT501 and OT502

Notes: Required for MDiv BC. General elective for all other programs exceptMAC.

TH506-1 Contemporary Moral Issues

Classroom SBC A5

3-4:50pm

This course will teach you how to practically apply God's truth to the toughest issues facing our culture such as divorce/remarriage, homosexuality, abortion, race relations and euthanasia.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Steve Tracy</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

BL505-1 Survey of the Gospels

Classroom 2

3-4:50pm

A survey of the Gospels giving an overview of the life of Christ with an emphasis upon Second Temple Judaism and the social worlds of Galilee, Samaria and Judea. Develops your ability to think biblically by interrelating theological convictions and making personal application.

2 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Peter Gurry</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

Notes: Required for all programs.

CF501-1 Counseling Theories

Classroom 4

3-5:50pm

Survey of major models of counseling, especially empirically supported approaches to therapeutic processes and change. The student will be encouraged to develop a basic approach to counseling that is theoretically sound, empirically supported, sensitive to issues of faith-tradition, practical, and effective.

3 credits Instructor: Dr. Justin Smith Prerequisite: None Frequency: TBD

OT501-1 Learning Old Testament Hebrew

Classroom 2

5-7:50pm

Introduces the Hebrew alphabet, vocabulary and grammar in a systematic way using exercises gleaned from the Old Testament. The goal of this course is to learn the basics of Hebrew grammar and the Hebrew Strong Verb forms. Provides the student with the skills necessary for reading and translating the Hebrew Bible and the basis for developing competence in exegesis.

3 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. John Meade</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: None

Notes: Required for all programs.

TH502-1 Humanity, Angels, and the Person & Work of Christ

Classroom SBC Conf. Rm.

5:30-9:20pm

This will deepen your walk with God by focusing on the Person and work of God the Son. This course is an in-depth study of man, his nature and his need for a Savior. Explore the nature and significance of angels, Satan and demons. Focus on the Lord Jesus Christ and His death on the cross and the work of the Holy Spirit.

4 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. Steve Tracy</u> Frequency: Every Fall Prerequisite: BL501 and TH501

CF524-1 Psychological Testing and Appraisal

Classroom 4

6:30-9:20pm

Provide understanding of individual and group approaches to assessment and evaluation. Study the use of standardized and non-standardized tests to evaluate individuals; including test development, selection, administration and interpretation. Course provides foundational concepts of validity, reliability, and psychometric statistics.

3 credits Instructor: <u>Dr. William Mobley</u> Frequency: Odd Falls Prerequisite: None

MA501-A Integrative Seminar I: Leadership / Ecclesiology (Trinity Bible Church)

3:30–5:30pm AND 2nd Saturdays 9:30am-Noon

MA501-B Integrative Seminar I: Leadership / Ecclesiology (Church on Mill)

9am-Noon AND Individual time to be arranged

You will track this evangelicalism as both a result of European reformations and participant in further globalizations. Finally, you will be asked to integrate this knowledge with your own spiritual, theological and vocational commitments.

NT501-o Learning New Testament Greek

Introduces the Greek alphabet, vocabulary and grammar in a systematic way using relevant examples from the New Testament. Provides the skills for reading and translating the Greek New Testament and the basis for developing exegetical competence.
