As of December 1st, Dr. Greg Miller has assumed the role of provost for the university.

Dr. Miller joined the Malone community in 2000 as associate professor of history and was promoted to professor in 2006. He previously served as chair of the HPSS department and also as University Director of General Education. He is a two-time recipient of the Malone Distinguished Award for Teaching Excellence and a recipient of the Distinguished Award for Scholarship and Research.

He served as interim provost, developing and launching an aggressive process for program planning and launch leading to new programs including cybersecurity and criminal & restorative justice. Miller is currently planning to continue teaching a class or two in the HPSS department while he assumes his new role full time.

3 AMBER ZWICK New Franklin, OH History // 2014






