ER Inducement Discussion

Emergency Room (ER) Inducement Proposal

September 2017

In Exchange for establishing and committing to operate an ER for at least a 10-year period, the County will offer one or a combination of the following options. The magnitude offered through each option will be determined by the services offered, the financial viability of the project, and the overall plan for the project.

- 1. Purchase property
 - County can purchase property, transfer it to the Industrial Development Board (ID Board), who then uses it as an inducement for a hospital to locate an ER here. This may be offered as a lease or a "gift", based upon the total request of the hospital system.
- 2. PILOT program
 - Offer a PILOT program to a "for profit" hospital system to waive any property taxes
- 3. Revenue Bonds
 - ID Board can issue revenue bonds for the project. The proceeds from the project pays the bonds.
 - The property has a lien against it in favor of the bond holders.
 - The County can donate to the ID Board for the expressed purpose of offsetting the repayment of the bonds, as long as there is not a binding commitment to do so
 - A process is available for the County to fully back the proposal, but only with a ³/₄ affirmative vote of the citizenry.
- 4. County Public Support
 - Once written and financial commitments are made by a hospital system to establish an ER in the County, the County will endorse the project and support their request for a Certificate of Need (CON).

PROCEDURE FOR FILLING VACANCIES BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY

under 2008 Public Chapter 871, as amended by 2009 Public Chapter 14

The county legislative body is required to fill vacancies within 120 days after receiving notice from the county clerk, unless during that time there is a general election scheduled in the county and there is sufficient time for the vacancy to be placed on the ballot. (5-1-104).¹

The county clerk is to provide notice to every member of the county legislative body of the need to fill the vacancy. This formal notice is directory and may be waived by the members of the county legislative body if all members have constructive notice of the vacancy through another source of information. (5-5-111). In addition, the presiding officer of the county legislative body must cause public notice to be given in a newspaper of general circulation in the county at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting of the county legislative body at which the vacancy is to be filled, notifying the public of the vacancy and specifying the office to be filled at the meeting. (5-5-111).

Before the county legislative body votes or considers any motion or resolution regarding the office to be filled, the chair must allow registered voters of the county an opportunity to submit names to the CLB for consideration. Such names may be submitted in writing to the chair prior to the meeting or may be submitted in person at the meeting. In order for a name to be considered, a member of the CLB must subsequently nominate the person. Members of the CLB may also nominate a candidate or candidates to fill the vacancy without such name being submitted by a voter. Nominations do not require a second. If the person nominated is not present at the meeting, the person making the nomination must submit a signed statement from the nominee that the nominee is willing to serve in the office if appointed. (5-5-111).

If a member of the county legislative body accepts a nomination, the member cannot vote on the appointment or any motions or resolutions relative to making the appointment until the office is filled. For the purpose of determining a majority, the membership of the county legislative body shall be reduced to reflect any member or members prohibited from voting on the appointment. If a member of the county legislative body upon accepting the appointment. If the member shall immediately resign from the county legislative body upon accepting the appointment. If the member shall not be required to resign and may continue the member's duties on the county legislative body upon the conclusion of the vote on the appointment.² (5-5-111).

After nominations cease, the county legislative body may discuss the nominations and may, at the discretion of the chair, interview nominees or allow nominees the opportunity to address the county legislative body. Upon motion passed by a majority of the members, the vote to make the appointment may be postponed to a subsequent meeting, provided that adequate public notice of the meeting is given in accordance with Title 8, Chapter 44 (the Open Meetings Law or "Sunshine Law"). (5-5-111).

To receive an appointment, a nominee must receive the votes of a majority of the members of the county legislative body eligible to vote on the appointment. The county legislative body is required to adopt rules of procedure for eliminating nominees in cases where there are multiple nominees for an appointment and no nominee receives a majority of the votes after the initial vote. Secret ballots are prohibited. Each member's vote regarding the appointment process must be recorded by the county clerk and entered on the minutes of the county legislative body. A tie vote of the county legislative body regarding an appointment may be broken in the same manner that other tie votes of the body may be broken. (5-5-111).

Any complaint challenging the legality of an appointment must be filed with the chancery court of the county within ten (10) days of the date of the appointment. (5-5-111).

¹ These provisions for filling vacancies do not apply in Davidson or Shelby Counties. 5-1-104((b)(1).

² 2009 Public Chapter 14 clarifies that members of the CLB are required to resign their seats only when they are appointed to fill a vacancy in an office that is required under the Tennessee Constitution to be filled by the county legislative body. Other positions are governed by the statutes that create the particular position.

CONTRACT FOR SERVICES RENDERED

This is a contract entered into by JACKSON AREA COUNCIL ON ALCOHOLISM AND DRUG DEPENDENCY (JACOA) (hereinafter referred to as "the Provider") and FAYETTE COUNTY RECOVERY COURT (hereinafter referred to as "the Client") on this date, July 1, 2017.

THE PROVIDER'S place of business is 900 East Chester Street, Jackson, Tennessee 38301 and the Client's place of business is 705 Justice Drive, Somerville, Tennessee 38068.

THE CLIENT hereby engages the Provider to provide services described herein under "Scope and Manner of Services." The Provider hereby agrees to provide the Client with such services in exchange for consideration described herein under "payment for services rendered."

SCOPE AND MANNER OF SERVICES
